

Cooper Kicks Dogs, 54-12

The Cooper Pirates feasted on dog meat last Friday, showing a lot of talent and strength and coasting to a 54-12 victory over Tahoka in the Bulldogs' first home game of the season. The Bulldogs, now with one win and one loss for the season, did give the visitors indigestion a few times with flashes of good play, including a touchdown pass on the last play of the first half and a blocked kick which gave Tahoka another T.D.

One win and one loss? That's correct, because Plains, which had beaten Tahoka in the opening game of the season, notified Tahoka school authorities last week that they were forfeiting the first game because they had used an ineligible player. So Tahoka officially won that game 1-0.

Led by Superman lookalike Dennis Hobbs at defensive end, the Pirate defense swarmed all over Tahoka quarterback Paul Glisson on most of the Bulldog offensive efforts and pretty well bottled up Tahoka's attack, while Cooper running back Jimmy Martinez scored three times to lead the Pirate onslaught.

Cooper scored three times in the first period to take a 19-0 lead, with the biggest play a 61-yard run by

Martinez. Tahoka managed just one first down in the quarter, on a 10-yard pass from QB Paul Glisson to End Adam Holland. In the second quarter, Cooper added 13 more points to go up 32-0 with 2:24 left.

At that point, Tahoka got its offense going better, and drove down to the Pirates 25. On the last play of the first half, Glisson hit wide receiver Daniel Garvin on a perfect strike in the end zone, which Garvin caught going across the end line. After Tahoka failed on pass for two points, it was 32-6 at halftime.

Cooper scored a safety and a touchdown in the third, and Tahoka did better in that period, with Glisson hitting Trey Nance for 10 yards, Cody Bailey for 12, and passing to Garvin for 15, while running back Tim Young began to make some yards. But the Bulldogs couldn't score in that period, even after getting the ball down to the Cooper 15 following an interception of a Cooper pass by Garvin.

In the fourth, Young broke through to block a Pirate punt, and Tahoka's Albert Mendoza grabbed it and ran 24 yards for a Tahoka touchdown, to make it 40-12. Cooper scored twice before the game ending, adding a 2-

point pass on one of the scores, to make it 54-12.

Linebackers Michael Isbell, with 13 assists on tackles, and Cory McCleskey with 12 led the Bulldog defense. Nose guard Ricky Saldana and Joey Stone also turned in some good plays for Tahoka on defense. Coaches also had gcod words for the defensive efforts of linemen Dallas Williams and Valentin DeLeon. Young was the leading rusher for Tahoka with 22 yards in 7 carries.

At 8 p.m. Friday Tahoka will journey to Coahoma to take on the red Bulldogs, who beat Stanton last week, 19-8.

Program Slated Here On

Catastrophic Health Act

The Lynn County Extension Program Council is sponsoring an education program on the new catastrophic health act. Donna Clarke, Program Specialist with the South Plains Association of Governments will present the program Wednesday, Sept. 27, at 12 noon at the Lyntegar Meeting Room in Tahoka. The Extension Program Council will serve a free lunch of beans and cornbread.

Last year Congress enacted what is being called the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act of 1988. According to Golden Rule Insurance Co., the senior citizens who will be helped are the 20 percent who currently have no medicare supplement, and those with income below the poverty line, because their medicare premiums deductibles, and co-insurance will eventually be paid by their state government. The seniors who will be hurt are those with sufficient income to pay federal income tax because this law requires them to pay a medicare tax on top of the federal income tax already paid based on their federal income tax liability.

Ms. Clarke will help interested seniors understand the rules of the new Catastrophic Health Act. She will explain what it will and what it will not do for seniors.

Grand Jury Here Indicts 16 Persons

indictments returned Monday by a grand jury in 106th District Court in Tahoka, including an indictment for murder naming Porfirio Garcia, 48, of Tahoka, accused in the shooting death last March 5 of Juan M. "Johnny" Cortez, who was shot 16 times at his home just east of the Tahoka city limits.

Other felony charges cited, and those charged in the indictments returned, were:

Securing execution of a document by deception, Debbie Maines, 38, of Round Rock, a charge related to her allegedly obtaining a \$4,000 loan in Wilson in July, 1987, by putting up as collateral a stock trailer which she reportedly did not own.She also was indicted on a separate charge of forgery involving a check passed in March, 1988.

Robbery, Kenneth Lynn Smith, 30, of Tahoka, accused of robbery of Brian Newell VanPelt on June 21. The indictment also cited a prior conviction of robbery by Smith in September, 1985.

Burglary of a motor vehicle, David Ray Arguello, 21, of Slaton, accused of breaking into a vehicle owned by A.A. Rinne on Feb. 22, 1989.

Involuntary manslaughter, Uyolanda Carol Bailey, 24, of Tahoka, accused of causing the death of Otis Pendleton III in a traffic accident on

Sixteen persons were named in 18 Feb. 11, 1989, by driving a vehicle at a high rate of speed while allegedly intoxicated. The accident occurred near the courthouse square Tahoka.

> Possession of a controlled substance, Edward Gonzales, 34, of Corpus Christi, accused of possession of a quantity of cocaine on Nov. 11, 1988, and Edward Saldana, 26, of Tahoka, also accused of cocaine possession, on March 25, 1989.

> Aggravated assault, Noel Tijerina, 23, Tahoka, accused of a knife attack on Kenneth Rockwell Turner on March 30, 1989.

> Theft, Cecil Everrett Nixon, 44, of Corpus Christi, charged with theft of \$3546 from Dan Cook in February.

Driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense, Sotero Benavides Jr., 28, Tahoka; Filiberto Renteria, 33, of O'Donnell; Juan Jose Vasquez, 29, of Wilson; John Andrew Bergera, 27, of O'Donnell (two counts).

Unlawful use of a motor vehicle, David E. Tillman, 25, Tahoka, accused of taking and operating a vehicle owned by the City of Tahoka on Sept. 1. Also, Ruben Garza, 42, Tahoka, accused of taking and operating a vehicle owned by Domingo Baeza on Sept. 2.

Police were called to the scene of an accident Saturday at 1800 Lockwood, involving a 1984 Ford pickup driven by Fidel Garcia Jr. of Tahoka and a parked 1979 Chevrolet owned by Clifford Sims of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

On Sept. 13 police arrested a 20year-old Tahoka man on a charge of assault, after another Tahoka resident reported being attacked by the man while working on the west access road of U.S. 87 near the Dairy Queen.



City Votes Tax Increase, Adopts Annual Budget An increase of just over 4 cents per

\$100 valuation for residents of the City of Tahoka was voted by council members Monday evening in regular session. The new tax rate, which will be reflected in bills received by taxpayers around the end of this month, is 51.17 cents, compared to the previous rate of 47.4 cents levied by the city. Of the 51.17 rate, 6.4 cents will go toward debt retirement.

Councilmen then approved the budget for the coming year, with the city's fiscal year starting Oct. 1. Total of the general fund budget, water and sewer, and sanitation budgets is \$773,014, up about \$40,000 from the present year.

Present were Mayor Jim Solomon, City Manager Barry Pittman and all council members except Milt Uzzle.

I never thought I would be embarrassed to live in Tahoka but, I am becoming that way very quickly.



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 7, 1989**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 102 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the salary of members of the legislature to onefourth of the Governor's salary and increase the salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives to one-half of the Governor's salary. The annual salary of members of the legislature, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives is currently \$7,200. Under this provision, the annual salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker would be \$46,716, and the annual salary of members of the legislature would be \$23,358, based on the Governor's current annual salary of ease for the s The incr er and the members of the legislature would take effect when the legislature convenes for its regular session in January 1991. The increase for the Lieutenant Governor would take effect when the term of that office begins in 1991. The salary increase for the Lieutenant Governor would not make members of the legislature ineligible to run for the office of Lievenant Governor. The proposed amendment will appercon the ballot as follows: constitutional amendment to limit the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives to not more than one-half of the governor's salary and to limit the salary of a member of the legislature to not more than one-fourth of the governor's salary."

All elected and appointed officers would be required to take an oath or affirmation swearing to faithfully execute the duties of office and to preserve, protect, and defend the constitution and laws of the State and the United States. In addition, each elected and appointed officer would be required to sign a sworn statement that he or she had not paid, offered, or promised anything of value for a vote or to secure appointment to an office, as applicable. The written, sworn statement would be filed with the secretary of

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to enact laws requiring or permitting judges to advise juries that a defendant convicted of a criminal offense can receive credit for good conduct that results in a shorter prison term and that eligibility for parole or mandatory supervision can also affect the length of time a convicted criminal serves in prison.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to require or permit courts to inform juries about the effect of good conduct time and eligibility for parole or mandatory supervision on the period of incarceration served by a defendant convicted of a criminal offense."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 102 procoses a constitutional amendment that would increase the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount allowed for federal income tax purposes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for living expenses incurred by a state legislator. The per diem of \$30 would increase to \$81. which is the current maximum living expense deduction. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to set the amount of per diem received by a member of the legislature at the amount allowed for federal inc me tax purposes as a deduction for living expenses incurred by a state legislator in connection with official business."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 71 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require the district attorney in Fort Bend County to be elected and serve terms at the same times as criminal district attorneys in the state. Currently, criminal district attorneys are elected in gubernatorial election years and district attorneys are elected in presidential election years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring a district attorney serving in Fort Bend County to be elected and serve a term in the manner provided by general law for criminal district attorneys.'

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 32 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature, by general law, to permit charitable raffles conducted by qualified nonprofit organizations. The amendment would require that the raffles be conducted, promoted, and administered only by members of the qualified nonprofit organizations and that the proceeds from the sale of raffle tickets must be spent for the charitable purposes of the organizations.

PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 59 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow local governments to invest their funds as authorized by the legislature. Currently, the constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company prevents local governments from making some kinds of investments. This proposed amendment would allow local governments to make any investments authorized by the legislature. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize local governments to invest their funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$500 million of Texas water development bonds. The additional bonds are to be used as follows': \$250 million of the bonds are to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition; \$200 million of the bonds are to be used for water quality enhancement projects; and \$50 million of the bonds are to be used for flood control. The legislature may provide that \$100 million be used for subsidized loans and grants to economically distressed areas of the state for water and wastewater facilities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$500 million of Texas water development bonds for water supply, water quality, and flood control purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amend ent that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide money to establish a Texas agricultural fund, a rural microenterprise development fund, a Texas product development fund, and a Texas small business incubator fund in the state treasury. The Texas agricultural fund would be used to provide financial assistance to develop, increase, improve, or expand the production, processing, market ing, or export of crops or products grown or produced in Texas by Texas agricultural businesses. The rural microenterprise development fund would be used to stimulate the creation and expansion of small businesses in rural areas. The Texas product development fund would be used to aid in the development and production of new or improved products in this state. The Texas small business incubator fund would be used to stimulate the development of small businesses in the State.

The principal amount of bonds outstanding at one time could not exceed \$25 million for the Texas agricultural fund and \$5 million for the rural microenterprise develop- a

House Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature, by general law, to exempt from ad valorem taxes property owned by nonprofit veterans organizations that are chartered or incorporated by the United States Congress.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt property of nonprofit veterans organizations from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 11 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide an exemption from ad valorem taxation for goods. wares, merchandise, other tangible personal property (including aircraft), and ores (other than oil, gas, and petroleum products) if the property is acquired in or imported into the state and is destined to be forwarded out of the state, regardless of whether the intention to forward the property existed when the property was acquired or imported into the state, if it remains in Texas for 175 days or less for assembly, storage, manufacture, processing, or fabrication. The proposed amendment would authorize the governing body of a county, municipality, school district, or junior college district to prevent the exemption of this tangible personal property from taxation by taking official action before April 1, 1990. A county, municipality, school district, or junior college district could rescind a decision to tax the property, in which case the exemption would become effective in the year of the rescission and the property could not thereafter be

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment promoting economic growth, job creation, and fair tax treatment for Texans who export goods to other states and nations by restoring and allowing, on a local option basis, an ad valorem tax exemption for certain personal property that is in Texas only temporarily for the purpose of assembling, storing, manufacturing, processing or fabricating."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes constitutional amendment that state. The information in the stateoaths of office taken by elected and appointed officials.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to require that a member of the legislature, the secretary of state, and an elected or appointed officer, before assuming office, sign a written oath stating that the member, the secretary of state, or the officer did not engage in bribery to obtain the office."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 24 proposes a constitu ional amendment that would allow he legislature to authorize the issuance of up to \$400 million in general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the bonds could be used to acquire, construct, or equip new corrections institutions, mental health and mental retardation institutions, youth corrections institutions, and statewide law enforcement facilities and to repair and renovate existing facilities of those institutions. The bonds would constitute a general obligation of the state. The bonds and interest on the bonds would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the consitution, less any amount in a sinking fund at the end of the preceding fiscal year that is pledged to payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to facilities of corrections institutions, youth corrections institutions, and mental health and mental retardation institutions and for the expansion of statewide law enforcement facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 101 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to pass laws to organize and combine state agencies that perform criminal justice functions. The legislature could combine into one or more agencies all agencies that have authority over the confinement and supervision of convicted criminals, that set standards for or distribute state funds to political subdivisions with authority over the confinement and upervision of convicted criminals, and that gather information about criminal justice administration. Agencies that could be combined would include the Texas Department of Corrections, the Board of Pardons and Paroles, and the Texas Adult Probation Commission. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to pass laws authorizing the appointment of members of more than one department of government to serve on the governing body.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to organize and combine various state agencies that perform criminal justice functions."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 53 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the use of the permanent school fund and the income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by the state for the purpose of providing loans or purchasing the bonds of school districts to acquire, construct, renovate, or improve instructional facilities. If the permanent school fund were required to make payment as a result of its guarantee of bonds issued by the state, the fund would have to be reimbursed immediately from the state treasury. The amount of bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund could not exceed \$750 million unless a higher amount was authorized by a two-thirds vote of both houses of the legislature. If a school district were to become delinguent on a loan, the amount of the delinquency would be offset against other aid to which the district was entitled.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for using the permanent school fund and its income to guarantee bonds issued by the state for the purpose of aiding school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 prooses a constitutional amendment that would provide a bill of rights for crime victims. This constitutional amendment would give crime victims the right to be treated with fairness and respect and to be reasonably protected from the defendant. On his request, the crime victim would have the right to notification of court proceedings, the right to be present at all public court proceedings unless a court determines that the victim's testimony would be affected by hearing other testimony, the right to confer with a representative of the prosecutor's office, the right to restitution, and the right to information about the conviction, sentence, im prisonment, and release of the de fendant. The legislature would be authorized to enact laws to define the term "victim," to enforce the rights of crime victims, and to provide that certain public officers and agencies are not liable for a failure to protect a victim's rights.

The proposed amendment will ap pear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit and regulate raffles conducted by certain nonprofit organizations for charitable purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to pass general laws authorizing the creation of hospital districts upon approval of a majority of the qualified voters of the district. The amendment would also permit the legislature to authorize the creation of hospital districts by general or special law in counties with populations of 75,000 or less and to authorize the commissioners courts of such counties to levy ad valorem taxes and issue general obligation bonds for the support and maintenance of such districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting to the people the right to decide whether to create and maintain hospital districts to protect the public well-being in a manner independent of the legislature."

PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature, by general law, to authorize the use of public money to provide local fire departments and other public firefighting organizations loans or other financial assistance to purchase firefighting equipment and to aid in complying with federal and state law. The legislature would also be allowed to authorize the use of public money for scholarships and grants to educate and train members of these organizations. Part of the money could be used for administrative costs of this program. The legislature would provide for the terms and conditions of all such scholarships, grants, loans, and other financial assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the state to provide scholarships, grants, loans, and other financial assistance to local fire departments and other public fire-fighting organizations to purchase fire-fighting equipment, to aid in providing necessary equipment and facilities to comply with federal and state law, and to educate and train their members.'

PROPOSITION NO. 18 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 44 proses a constitutional amendment that would repeal subsection (e) of Article III, Section 50-d of the constitution. Article III, Section 50-d currently allows the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conserva-

PROPOSITION NO. 20 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 pronoses a constitutional amendment which, if passed, would abolish the office of county surveyor in Cass, Ector Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris, and Webb Counties. A majority of the voters in an affected county must vote in favor of this proposed amendment before the office is abclished in that county. If the office of county surveyor is abolished in any of these counties, the powers, duties, and functions of the office are transferred to a county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court of the county in which the office is abolished.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county survevor in Cass. Ector, Garza, Smith, Bexar, Harris, and Webb Counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 21 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 74 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to enact laws authorizing the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to provide for, issue, and sell an additional \$75 million in general obligation bonds as college savings bonds. The form, terms, and denominations of the bonds would be prescribed by law. The interest rate and installments would be prescribed by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor. The maximum net effective interest rate would be set by law, Proceeds from the sale of the bonds would be credited to the Texas opportunity plan fund, which is used to make loans to students to attend institutions of higher education in Texas. The bonds and interest on the bonds would be payable from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not already appropriated by the constitution, less the amount remaining in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds as college savings bonds to provide educational loans to students and to encourage the public to save for a college education."




