Battered Dogs To Host Morton

The battered Tahoka Bulldogs, still suffering from a lack of offense, went down 39-0 at Ralls last week in the first district game of the season. The loss left the Bulldogs 0-1 in district play and 1-3 for the season.

This Friday night the Bulldogs will play Morton before a homecoming crowd as former students have their annual gatherings and throw their support behind the Bulldogs in the homecoming game, following a homecoming parade and pep rally Friday afternoon.

Morton lost 40-12 to Seagraves last week, but the Indians have an outstanding running back in Tarnell Pritchett, who scored twice against Seagraves on long runs.

Against Ralls, the Bulldogs showed some fire and looked good on the first couple of series, until the ball was stolen away by a Ralls player who ran down inside the Bulldog 10, leading the game's first touchdown. Ralls built a halftime

lead of 25-0 and Tahoka did better in the second half, but still yielded two more scores. Tahoka also passed for an apparent touchdown on the last play of the game, but officials ruled it was not across the goal line.

Despite the team's poor output, yardage-wise, Coach Joe Paradis remained optimistic this week, saying that the offensive line blocking is improving—"we just need to do better all of the time"—and noting that several players did well on defense, and also that some players who have been out with injuries, such as running back Joey Stone, will be back in

action this week. Fumbles were recovered in the Ralls game by Tackle Dallas Williams and linebacker Cory McCleskey. Top defensive lineman Ricky Saldana injured his ankle at Ralls, but may play this week. Cody Bailey intercepted a pass in the Ralls contest.

Saturday's Harvest Festival To Offer Fun, Food, Prizes

A wide variety of entertainment is expected to lure county residents to the 14th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival Saturday, an event which offers games, contests, prize giveaways and other activities all day long on the Courthouse square in downtown Tahoka.

Drawings will be held on the hour for prizes donated by county merchants, and food, games and crafts booths will draw much interest. Something new this year will draw much attention also: Cow Patty Bingo. The cow will be released on a street marked with squares to determine who will win a \$300 meat gift certificate.

Activities will kick off at 10 a.m. with a variety of children's games on the courthouse lawn, and the Arts and Crafts Fair will have items on display in the former Heritage Furniture building on the west side of the square. Booths will open at 10:00 a.m. Merchants Drawings will begin at 11:00.

The Harvest Festival Princess Contest will be held on the Band Stand at 1:15 p.m. There are 17 candidates, all Tahoka girls ranging in age from kindergarten through sixth grade, and the one who sells the most tickets will be named 1989 Princess. The girls are selling tickets to win two bicycles and a Texas Tech weekend. The Tech weekend includes two tickets for the Tech-Arkansas game on Oct. 14 and accommodations at the Holiday Inn Civic Center in Lubbock.

The Queen Contest will be held at 2 p.m., and there are 16 Tahoka High School girls vying for this year's crown. They are selling tickets for a trip to Puerto Vallarta, Mexico and must sell at least 100 tickets each to qualify as finalists. The girls are also judged on personal interviews conducted before the Harvest Festival, and on poise and presenta-

tion during the contest on stage. Judges from Robert Spence School of Modeling in Lubbock will determine the winner. Upon the Queen's graduation from high school, she will be presented a scholarship from Tahoka Chamberettes.

Tahoka Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Slave Auction at the Festival, which will be held immediately following the Queen contest. Prominent local citizens who have consented to "go up for bid" will be sold to the highest bidder.

"The Country Edition" band from Lubbock will entertain on stage during the day and for the Street Dance on the courthouse square from 8 p.m. until midnight. Tahoka Rotary Club, who sponsors the festival band each year, will sell sausage on a stick during the Street Dance.

Several prize drawings, other than the hourly merchants drawings, will be held this year, including one especially for children. Children up

through age four may register at the Band Stand for a sand castle to be given away. Also, children from age five up through high school seniors may register at the Band Stand for a jam box with a television in it. A \$50 cash drawing will be held from those names registered from the bubblegum toss at the homecoming football game Friday night. Student Council members will toss bubblegum to the crowd in the stadium, and those who receive a wrapper with a number in it should bring that number to the band stand and register before noon Saturday to be eligible. A quilt auction and quilt raffle will be held also.

Anyone interested in playing "42" may participate in the 42 Tournament which will be held in the courthouse lawn. Call Edith Wallace to register, or register at the festival.

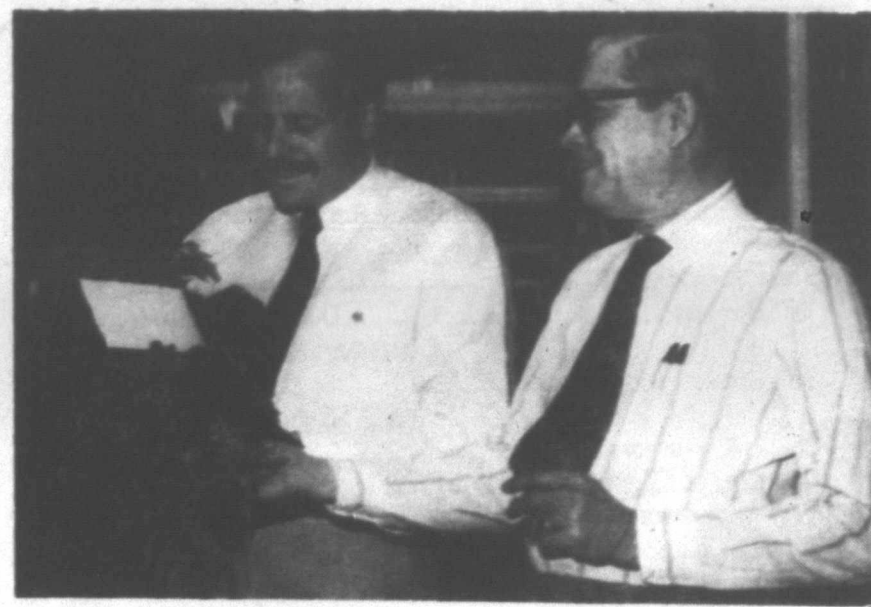

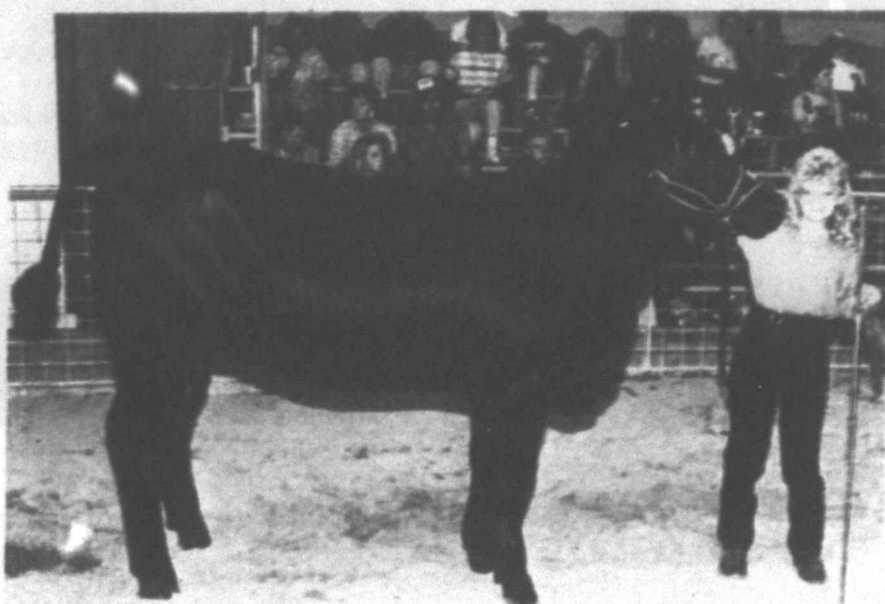

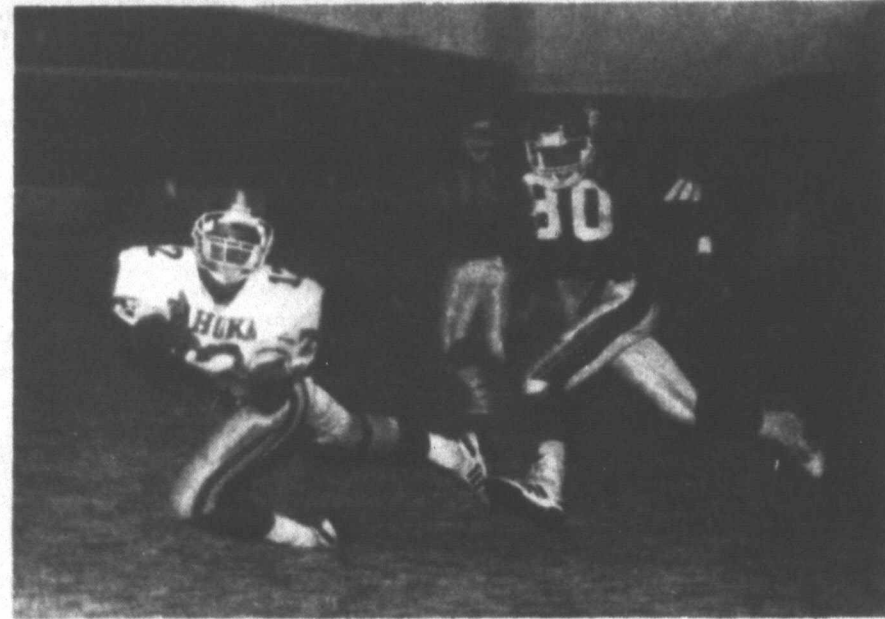
