## County EMS Needs

Volunteers, Donations
$\begin{array}{ll}\text { By JACQUI LOCKABY } & \text { cover the insurance on the ambu- } \\ \text { lance or the liability insurance on the }\end{array}$ Texas Tech Journalism Student Medical Service is housed at the Lynn County Hospital and operated by volunteers and donations of private citizens. And more volunteers and donations are needed to operate
the service, according to Billy the service, according to Billy
Tomlinson, director of Lynn County Emergency Medical Service. This year there are 17 volunteers who have made 258 ambulance runs January through Augus., he said. There are four levels of qualificutions for EMS volunteers: emer-
gency care attendants, emergency gency care attendants, emergency
medical technicians, emergency medical lechnicians, emergency
medical technician - special skills and paramedics, he said.
Lynn County has two ECAs, six EMTs, two EMT-SSs, four ambulance drivers and three people in the process of training for EMT certification, he said.
but work as professionals," Jolene Tomlinson, EMT volunteer, said. EMS volumcers are trained in prehospital care and basic life suppor, Tomlinson said.
The EMS service started seven
years agowith 21 volunteers At one time this past year there were only five volunteers available to operate the ambulance.
Tax dollars are not used to support the EMS volunteer program; however, if this program folded, the hospital or county tax districts would have 10 maintain it he said. The hospital auxilary and other private donations funded the pur-
chase of the ambuianceused by EMS personnel, he said. EMS charges $\$ 65$ per person when
they pick up a patient within the county. This fee is not enough to Tomlinson said.

volunteers oneach run for the service to be legal in Texas. Volunters are needed to complete ECA training and help with the service since hospital workers cannot legally work ambulance calls unless they have had the training, he said. every four years and must take a least 60 continuing education hours to maintain ECA standing.
