State FB President Speaks To Lynn Group

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau said Tuesday evening that while the state organization didn't get the legislature to do everything the group proposed on workman's compensation, underground water rights and changing the way the Texas Dept. of Agriculture gets its commissioner, "we're still working on it."

S.M. True of Plainview brought Lynn County Farm Bureau members up to date on the activities of the state organization in the areas mentioned above, and also on central filing, property rights, transportation and labor.

He urged local farmers to conform to the labor laws and stressed that they should maintain proper records on their workers.

True said the state organization worked hard to pressure legislators to change the workman's compensation insurance laws to benefit both employers and employees, but that the changes so far have not been made. "There are too many lawyers in the legislature who really don't want the system changed," he commented.

He added that the Farm Bureau, like at least two other major insurers, is getting out of the workman's compensation insurance business, planning to deny renewal of existing contracts whenever they come due

Pritchett Too Much, Bulldogs Lose 29-2

Morton's Tarnell Pritchett did just about everything a high school quarterback could be expected to do last Friday night, running for 212 yards, passing, kicking extra points, making tackles and generally dealing the Tahoka Bulldogs misery in their 29-2 homecoming loss here before a large crowd of home folks and ex-students.

The Bulldogs played better on defense than they have in any game this season, but still had an anemic offense which produced only 3 first downs. Tahoka had just 40 yards rushing, and sophomore running back Billy Willborn had 37 of that, on 16 carries.

Tahoka had some good chances to score, but just couldn't move the ball. On the opening kickoff, Morton fumbled and Trey Nance recovered for Tahoka on the Morton 33. But three plays made no yards and the Bulldogs punted over the goal line.

Morton came back to the Tahoka 25 before losing the ball on downs as Joey Stone hit the Indian runner for no gain on fourth down. The first quarter was scoreless as the defense, led by tackle Dallas Williams, linebacker Corey McCleskey and defensive end Michael Isbell, played well.

Morton scored three touchdowns in the second quarter, however, starting with a 1-yard run by Jon Cheek on the first play of the period. Pritchett ran 22 and 15 for scores and it was 22-0 with 2:32 left in the half. The Bulldog defense then bottled up Morton deep and on fourth down, the ball was snapped out of the end zone to give Tahoka a safety. It was 22-2 at halftime.

The third quarter was scoreless as Tahoka again contained the Indian offense. In the fourth quarter, QB Paul Glisson hit Nance on a pass of 30 yards to the Morton 9, but the ball went over on downs at the 3. Glisson completed two other passes, both to End Adam Holland, for 7 and 9 yards. Receiver Daniel Garvin was ill and could not play. Sophomore punter Albert Mendoza continued to kick well for Tahoka, averaging 49 yards on 9 punts.

Pritchett scored the final touchdown of the evening on a run of 75 yards midway of the last quarter.

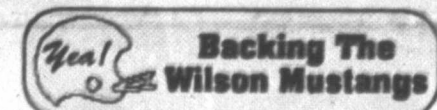

County EMS Needs Volunteers, Donations

The Lynn County Emergency Medical Service is housed at the Lynn County Hospital and operated by volunteers and donations of private citizens. And more volunteers and donations are needed to operate the service, according to Billy Tomlinson, director of Lynn County Emergency Medical Service.

This year there are 17 volunteers who have made 258 ambulance runs January through August, he said.

There are four levels of qualifications for EMS volunteers: emergency care attendants, emergency medical technicians, emergency medical technician - special skills and paramedics, he said.

Lynn County has two ECAs, six EMTs, two EMT-SSs, four ambulance drivers and three people in the process of training for EMT certification, he said.

"These people act as volunteers but work as professionals," Jolene Tomlinson, EMT volunteer, said.

EMS volunteers are trained in prehospital care and basic life support, Tomlinson said.

The EMS service started seven years ago with 21 volunteers, he said. At one time this past year there were only five volunteers available to operate the ambulance.

Tax dollars are not used to support the EMS volunteer program; however, if this program folded, the hospital or county tax districts would have to maintain it, he said.

The hospital auxiliary and other private donations funded the purchase of the ambulance used by EMS personnel, he said.

EMS charges \$65 per person when they pick up a patient within the county. This fee is not enough to

cover the insurance on the ambulance or the liability insurance on the volunteers, he said.

"EMS is like a cotton trailer on a farm; it is useless until you need it," Tomlinson said.

There must be at least two ECA volunteers on each run for the service to be legal in Texas. Volunteers are needed to complete ECA training and help with the service since hospital workers cannot legally work ambulance calls unless they have had the training, he said.

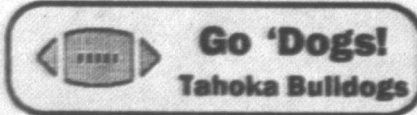
Volunteers have to be recertified every four years and must take at least 60 continuing education hours to maintain ECA standing. EMTs must have 120 hours, and EMT-SS personnel must have 160 hours, he said.

EMS is trying to get an ECA training program started in February in Lynn County. It needs at least 14 volunteers to get the program, he said.

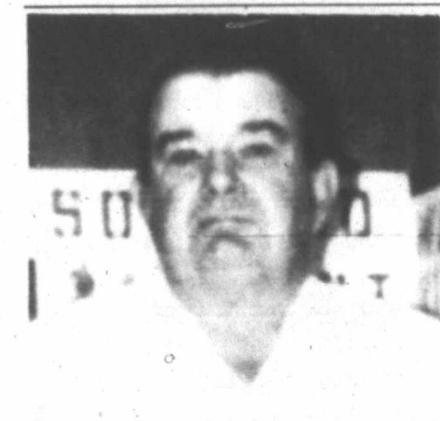

Dale Zant of Wilson was elected to the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors Oct. 3. He will represent Zone 5 of the district.

Purpose of the Lynn County SWCD, headquartered in Tahoka, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers in conservation matters.

The board coordinates the con-

servation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

As one of five persons serving on the district board of directors, Zant will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district laws.

Zant is also active in Federal Land Bank and the Lynn County Hospital board. He has served on the ASCS county committee, gin board at Wilson, and as a school board member. He attended Texas A&M and served two years in the U.S. Navy during World War II. Zant is married to the former Ethel Lynn Gill. They have four children, Leland, Karen, Renea and Raymond.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Unlike most legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the power of taxation or eminent domain.

Care Center officials expressed appreciation to workers at the home who helped make the float, and also to Farmers Co-Op Assn. for use of a trailer and pickup in the parade.

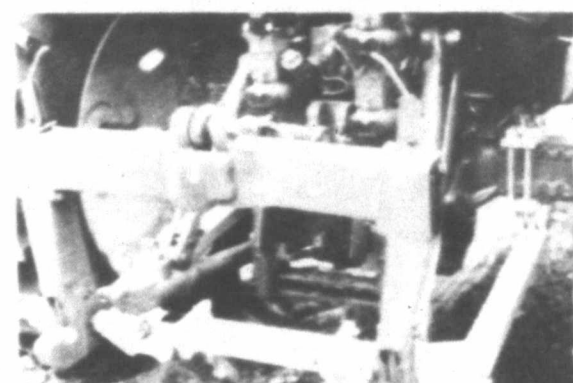
