This time the dietitian at Methodist is offering tips on how to eat the good things instead of the bad ones when you are eating out. It's hard not to eat the bad (good) things when you are eating out, because the tastiest stuff is bad for you.

Well, not too bad, and yes, I did deserve it.
Anyway, here are some of the things that Shelley Fillip, outpatient dietitian, suggests we do when going to a restaurant:

1. Look for phrases like steamed, broiled, stir-fried, in its own juice, poached and rack grilled. These adjectives, says Shelley, mean low-fat preparation. Beware, she says, of menu items described as buttered, creamed, au gratin, breaded, sauteed and sauce. These phrases indicated high fat or cholesterol.
2. Ask the waiter how an item is prepared if the menu doesn't tell.
3. Give the chef your special requests. Ask for sauces and salad dressings to be served on the side so you can control the amount. Also request that your entree be topped with low-fat cheese
4. Always remove any fat from meats. Poultry skin is high in fat, so ask the chef to remove the skin.
Most of the chels where I eat would probably try to remove my skin if I asked them to do something like that. There are several more suggestions, but by the time you have done those things in 2,3 and 4 , you probably will be ushered out of the restaurant and told to go get your cholesterol someplace else.
Among those other suggestions made by the dietitian was that you not eat choissants, muffins, combread or was that you not eai choissants, mumins, Combenits Suggested alternatives were bagels, which I understand is a short-legged dog, and whole-grain breadunders
sticks.
