695 Students Now Enrolled In Classes

Enrollment in all grades at Tahoka schools now totals 695 students, Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent, said at the monthly meeting of the Tahoka Independent School District's Board of Trustees last Thursday.

The trustees voted to increase the 1989-90 budget \$13,458.

The school board approves the textbook committee including Chloie Jan Wells, Debbie Steffens, Cynthia Earthman, Joyce Summers, Diane Andrews, Vivian McAfee, Lela Scott, Alta Harvick, Barbara Jaquess, Steven Morgan, Pat Rambo, Lee Bartolino, Julie Scarbrough and Steve Qualls.

The board went into executive session for the purpose of discussing personnel.

The trustees unanimously voted to pay Julie Alexander a \$1,000 bonus for the 1989-90 school year for assisting the head girls basketball and girls track coach.

Several school policies were presented to the board for the first reading.

Trustees present at the meeting were Thalia Burks, Clint Gardner, Joe Hays, Delbert McCleskey, Gary McCord and Nedra Young.

Dr. Carter, principals Charles Cate and Molly Helmlinger and Loretta Tekell, bookkeeper, were the school personnel present.

Dogs Do Better, But Lose 30-7

If Tahoka's football team gave a player of the week award, junior back Trey Nance surely would have been the winner for his efforts against the Idalou Wildcats Friday. Nance played an outstanding game on both defense and offense as the Bulldogs went down to their fifth straight loss after a season-opening forfeit from Plains.

Nance caught five passes for 116 yards, including one touchdown throw from QB Paul Glisson, and on defense Nance intercepted one pass

and recovered a fumble. And this week when the Bulldogs host Crosbyton, Nance is expected to start at quarterback. If so, Coach Joe Paradis may have to figure out how Nance can throw the ball and catch it at the same time.

Idalou won the District 4-AA contest there last Friday night 30-7, but the Bulldogs played it close until the second half. When Nance caught a pass from Glisson and raced on in to complete a 50-yard touchdown play just before halftime, it was 10-7 in favor of the Wildcats after Albert Mendoza kicked the point.

Mendoza, incidentally, maintained his good punting average in the game, punting seven times for an average of 36.4.

Luis Trevino and Michael Isbell also recovered fumbles for Tahoka.

Tahoka had a total offensive output of 218 yards, tops for the season. Billy Willborn was the leading rusher for the Bulldogs with 24 yards in 11 carries.

The Bulldogs lost five players this week to grades, including three starters.

Woodwork...

METHODIST Hospital has a department which may be working at cross purposes with the business office, since it seems to be trying to keep people out of the hospital. They send out releases to the media trying to get everyone to eat the right things so everyone will be healthy.

This time the dietitian at Methodist is offering tips on how to eat the good things instead of the bad ones when you are eating out. It's hard not to eat the bad (good) things when you are eating out, because the tastiest stuff is bad for you.

I like to eat out. Our son and daughters like to eat out. My wife likes to eat out (she ate me out just the other day). Well, not too bad, and yes, I did deserve it.

Anyway, here are some of the things that Shelley Phillip, outpatient dietitian, suggests we do when going to a restaurant:

1. Look for phrases like *steamed, broiled, stir-fried, in its own juice, poached and rack grilled*. These adjectives, says Shelley, mean low-fat preparation. Beware, she says, of menu items described as *buttered, creamed, au gratin, breaded, sauteed and sauce*. These phrases indicated high fat or cholesterol.

2. Ask the waiter how an item is prepared if the menu doesn't tell.

3. Give the chef your special requests. Ask for sauces and salad dressings to be served on the side so you can control the amount. Also request that your entree be topped with low-fat cheese.

4. Always remove any fat from meats. Poultry skin is high in fat, so ask the chef to remove the skin.

Most of the chefs where I eat would probably try to remove my skin if I asked them to do something like that. There are several more suggestions, but by the time you have done those things in 2, 3 and 4, you probably will be ushered out of the restaurant and told to go get your cholesterol someplace else.

Among those other suggestions made by the dietitian was that you not eat choissants, muffins, cornbread or biscuits. Suggested alternatives were bagels, which I understand is a short-legged dog, and whole-grain breadsticks.

Just reading about all this makes me hungry. I think I'll go out for a cholesterol sandwich, topped off by a big bowl of triglycerides.

Country Club Gets Stolen Items Back

Most of the items stolen from T-Bar Country Club in a burglary Oct. 7 were recovered during the last week by officers who questioned three young men in the case. Damages and loss of golf equipment and supplies totaled about \$3,000 in the burglary, and about \$2,000 worth of items was returned to the club this week.

Three young men, two in their early 20s and one age 18, gave statements at the Lynn County sheriff's office. However, no charges had been filed as of Wednesday morning, according to the sheriff's department.

Two of the suspects are from Tahoka and one lives in Lubbock. All are former Tahoka High School students.

Two Tahoka men were arrested

by Tahoka Police officers this week and charged with forgery after they allegedly attempted to get a check cashed last Friday at Thriftway Supermarket. Bond of \$10,000 each was set by Justice of the Peace H.W. Edwards. Pleading not guilty of the charges and posting bond were Nathaniel Elder, 39, and Clifford Donnell Sims, 26.

In jail during the week were the two above suspects, plus two persons charged with minor in possession of alcoholic beverage, two for driving while intoxicated, and one each on charges of no drivers license plus no liability insurance and failure to appear, minor in possession of alcoholic beverage plus failure to appear, burglary of a habitation and public intoxication.

- Also, a set of three carolers (for

each balcony on the courthouse) could be purchased at a cost of \$29.72 each set.

Chamberettes have a Christmas Decorations budget of \$1000 for this year, and have plans to use these funds to purchase Christmas lights for the large tree on the courthouse lawn by the north entrance and possibly decorate the columns at the entry.

Chamberettes are developing a plan for an ongoing project to decorate the County Courthouse and lawn, and hope to outline a three-year planning phase. "We're really proud of our courthouse," said Mrs. Jones, "and feel this is a way for us to use our funds so that the most people may benefit. We are going to set some high goals and hope to be able to raise the money needed to accomplish them. Eventually, we would like to see the entire courthouse outlined in lights at several levels, and have other decorations added to the lawn," she concluded.

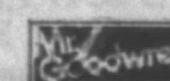
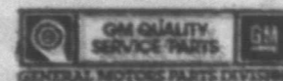
