The Bailey County Junior Livestock Show's premium auction brought in big bucks Saturday, but fell short of the total for the 2006 auction.

According to the records received from the Bailey County Extension office, this year's top seller was Kaleb Baker's grand champion British steer, purchased by West TexFeed Feedyard, with a price of \$3,400.

Abby Kirby's reserve grand champion exotic steer took second place with a bid of \$1,600 from the Buvers' Club.







Park View sale is good for the community

One of the basic functions of government is to provide services that cannot be easily provided by individuals or even groups of individuals.

What would a community's sewage disposal system be like if you were responsible for maintaining the pipeline as it ran across your property, only to turn that responsibility over to a neighbor who wasn't quite as "responsible?" No doubt, the neighbor downhill from you would have a greater motivation to keep the line in operation than the neighbor at the top of the hill.

This is why individuals came together, established laws and in many situations took on various projects designed to accomplish tasks meant to better the lives of all of the individuals within the community.

Many years ago, a hospital was built in Muleshoe.

Some years later, the community was faced with the closure of the hospital and responded by forming the Muleshoe Area Hospital District. Individuals joined together to accomplish a task that couldn't be accomplished by one individual or even a small group within the community.

Since that time, the nursing home — which was previously located within the hospital facility — has been moved to a separate location.

During the past year, the MAHD has taken the steps necessary under the hospital's critical access status to separate the two entities under MAHD control — the Muleshoe Area Medical Center and Park View Nursing Care Center.

And now the opportunity has arisen for the hospital district to increase this separation by selling the nursing home and returning its operation to the private sector.

Instead of being a "tax burden," the nursing home will MAHD board: become a valued, tax paying member of the Muleshoe business community.

But is this a good thing? Of course it is.

What is important is that services provided by Park View continue to be available to the communities of Muleshoe and Bailey County.

What is important it that through this action the hospital district — and even more importantly, the hospital itself — become a stronger, more vibrant health care provider. from the Dec. 14 and Jan. 8

To claim that a public entity can better manage the nursing home is to suggest that every business in Muleshoe could be improved if placed under government control, and that just isn't so.

I needed to call my good friend Wade Aplin to tell him about Jeffrey Wade Shelburne.

Little Brylan is as beautiful as her mother Amy Paige. Brylan was one of the only girls in a baby-boy-filled nursery Thursday night when she met her grandfathers. On the way out, Grandpa Randy warned all of those guys that he took their names and numbers.

Brylan's heavenly Father has known her name and her heart for all of eternity. What a blessing for the rest of us who love her to be getting to know her now.
