County JP Precincts Are Changed

Boundary lines for the Justice of the Peace precincts in Lynn County have been changed, and three of the five precincts have been eliminated, County Judge J.F. Brandon said Wednesday morning.

Judge Brandon said the Justice Dept. had notified the county of the changes and consolidation of precincts which the county had been seeking for some time.

Lynn County now will have just two justice of the peace precincts, Precinct 4, which includes O'Donnell, New Moore and points south of S. 2nd St. and west of U.S. 87 in Tahoka. Areas north of O'Donnell and east of 87 up to the Tahoka south city limits and all of the north part of the county will be in Precinct 1 (Draw, Grassland, Wilson, New Home, and most of Tahoka). A part of the city of Tahoka east of U.S. 87 will be in Precinct 4, now served by Justice of the Peace Ben Morrison, who is seeking re-election. The rest of the county now will be in JP Precinct 1, which currently is served by H.W. Edwards, also seeking re-election.

The action by the Justice Dept. will eliminate Precinct 5, now served by John Armes of New Home, although he will continue in office through 1990.

Young Japanese Visitor Sees Cotton Gin Operating

A Japanese teenager who has been living in the Amarillo home of a former Tahoka resident since last April visited Tahoka over the holidays and took advantage of the chance to see a cotton gin in operation at Wilson.

Yoshiko Hanashima will end her year of living with John and Charlotte Huffaker and their daughters, Lacey, 11, and Shannon, 13, next April and will return to Japan with fond memories of her stay in Texas. Yoshiko, 16, is the daughter of Takehiko and Mieko Hanashima of Tokyo, where her father is a middle management executive with the Mercedes-Benz seat cover facility.

The girl quickly became "Hana" to her American friends.

Considering the cotton trade agreements between Japan and the United States, the Huffakers have tried to show Hana the various stages of cotton production on each of her visits to Tahoka, where John Huffaker grew up and attended school, the son of Nina and the late Calloway Huffaker, and now an attorney in Amarillo. On earlier trips to Tahoka, Hana has been shown planting and cotton growth in different stages, and last week she was given a tour of the Wilson Co-Op Gin by gin manager Ronnie Nettles, who explained and demonstrated to her and her friends what was happening to the cotton in the ginning process.

Hana said that in Japanese schools, students learn four alphabets, including the traditional Japanese alphabet "kanji" which has 2000 symbols. Pupils start studying English in the 7th grade.

In Amarillo, Hana is a high school

sophomore, and has been studying very hard because of the language difficulties, but has made good grades. But because of the differences in the school systems, Hana will repeat the Japanese equivalent of her sophomore year when she returns to Tokyo.

While living in Texas, Hana has been taken on trips to Dallas to see *Into the Woods*, to Texas Tech football games, to the state capitol at Austin, to San Antonio and the Alamo, two visits to the Huffakers' ranch, and to a performance of *Texas!* at Palo Duro Canyon. Trips she will make before returning to

Japan include one to Santa Fe for skiing and a trip to New York City with a group of teenagers for a theater tour.

She has been to lots of parties and teenage events, but has not dated American boys because in the much more strict culture of Japan, 16 is too young for dating.

Hana says she loves to shop, ride horses, write and receive letters, and likes Mexican food.

And shivering in the gin yard at Wilson last Friday, she said it doesn't get that cold in Tokyo, although it does get cold in the northern part of Japan.

Some Of 1989's Top Stories In Tahoka

Some of the top stories in Lynn County as reported in the Lynn County News during the last year are reviewed briefly, in chronological monthly order:

JANUARY

Leland White of New Home is elected a state director of the Texas Farm Bureau. F.B. (Pete) Hegi, chairman of the board of the First National Bank of Tahoka, retires after 60 years of banking in Tahoka. The annual Lynn County Livestock Show winners were announced, with top exhibitors including Matt Hogg of O'Donnell, Kris Belew of Tahoka and Cory Ballard of New Home.

FEBRUARY

The Myriad wholesale ceramics business in O'Donnell is destroyed by fire. Otis Pendleton, 24, of Tahoka, is fatally injured when a car in which is a passenger strikes the Whitaker Hardware building in downtown Tahoka.

MARCH

New Home makes its first trip to the state basketball tournament after winning regional by beating Gruver 63-62, only to lose to Moulton 65-61 in the state semifinals at Austin. The body of Juan M. (Johnny) Cortez, 30, of Tahoka, is found in his living room. He had been shot numerous times.

APRIL

Beth Huffaker is chosen as Tahoka's "Citizen of the Year", announced at the annual Tahoka Chamber of Commerce banquet.

MAY

Tahoka High School senior Jackie Jo Hays wins the state Class AA championship in ready writing. The Lynn County Fun and Food Festival and auction nets more than \$10,000 for the Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary. A dry spell was broken with heavy rains in the county, closing several major highways.

JUNE

Wilson graduates 13 seniors. O'Donnell 25, New Home 9 and Tahoka 44. Pioneer Tahoka resident Lena Short dies in a collision of her car and a rotary hoe attached to a tractor on W. Lockwood in Tahoka.

JULY

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm visits Tahoka and reports on the war on drugs. Tahoka has a good crowd out in the park for the city's first Fourth of July Celebration in years.

AUGUST

Thirty-seven golf cart houses are burglarized at T-Bar Country Club.

OCTOBER

Connie Parker is crowned Lynn County Harvest Festival Queen and Tabitha Miller is THS homecoming queen.

NOVEMBER

The charred body of Edwardo Vidales, 35, of Lubbock, is found inside a burning van at the roadside park four miles north of Tahoka.

DECEMBER

The Wilson family of Janessa Lee is grateful that the 8-year-old again has fought off leukemia and is doing well. Santa Claus visits all the towns in the county, followed by lots of relatives bearing gifts, small children and big appetites.

No New Burglaries Reported In Week

Lynn County Sheriff's office and Tahoka Police Dept. investigated no new burglaries or other major crimes over the last week. The police department did answer several domestic disturbance calls.

In jail during the week were one

person for theft by taking and one for driving while intoxicated.

Woodwork...

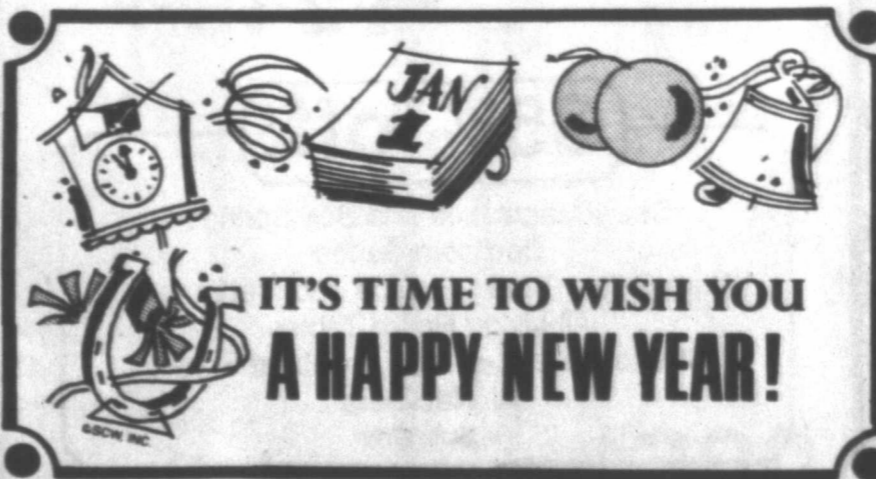
RECENTLY when I heard a reference to David, the boy who killed a giant with a slingshot, it came to me suddenly that youngsters no longer have the fun I used to have as a boy, playing with a device which I made myself from tree branches and other materials.

Webster's Dictionary defines a slingshot as "a Y-shaped piece of wood, metal, etc. with an elastic band fastened to the upper tips for shooting stones."

That almost exactly describes the device we used to make, only in those days, we certainly didn't call it a slingshot. When I was a boy, a slingshot was a single piece of wood, with a single piece of elastic material. You whirled it around and around and then let go, and if you were lucky, you didn't hit yourself in the head or kill any of your buddies standing behind you. Nobody I ever knew could hit the side of a barn with that kind of slingshot. Although I am told that there still are people around who can propel a shot accurately that way, I still have to see it to believe it. In fact, because I never saw anybody who could hit anything smaller than Plainview with a straight-stick slingshot, I always considered David's feat one of the truly great miracles of all time.

However, the Y-shaped device, now known as a slingshot, but which we called by another name I can't use in this newspaper, was another matter. Some of us were very accurate with it. I learned to hit tin cans, cats, window panes and a big dumb kid who lived next door with reasonable success. And we didn't buy those things; we made them, like this:

First you find a forked branch and cut it off with your pocket knife (sometimes cutting your finger in the process) until what is left is shaped like a Y. The bottom of the Y was used for the grip, and you scored around the tops of the other two prongs about a half inch from the top. Then you cut two pieces of rubber out of an old inner tube, with each piece about a half inch wide and about 10 inches long. Fold

the ends of the rubber pieces over the two scored prongs and secure them tightly with twine, tying it well. If you didn't tie it well, it would come loose later when you pulled on it to shoot, and hit you in the eye. Once this happened, you quickly learned to tie it well (or as well as you could with impaired vision).

After that you had this Y with two pieces of rubber hanging from the top forks. You then go cut the tongue out of an old shoe (be sure it is an old one, or you get in big trouble), cut it to a football shape, punch holes in each end, and tie each end with twine to the ends of the rubber strands. This gives you a little holder for small stones or marbles, or whatever. You grasp the stone inside the shoe tongue with two fingers of the right hand, hold the "slingshot" in your left, aim between the Y at your target, pull back on the rubber pieces as far as you can, and let go.

I never killed any giants, but I did hit my Uncle Orbie in the leg once. It didn't take my mother long to get to the bottom of that problem.

Lower Traffic
Death Estimates
Set For Holiday

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimated a very low number of people to die on Texas highways in 1989, New Year's Holiday. Only 32 persons lost their lives in that 78 hours of Operation Life Save in 1989! This is the direct result of positive safe thinking, conservative driving and closer observance of the traffic laws.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of the 60 counties in Region 5, said, "People are becoming more sensible and sensitive about the drinking-driving problem in Texas. Safety belt usage is up and traffic death rates are lower than they were in 1987. If this trend continues, we may see the lowest count of traffic deaths since the record high of 1981."

The continued use of all safety

belts in Texas vehicles will help preserve more lives. The National Safety Council states that a person has a five to one chance of surviving in a bad traffic accident while belted in their vehicle. With judicious and reasonable use of alcohol, the National Safety Council foresees a reduction in alcohol related traffic deaths.

Major Cawthon said, "The way to make this year's estimates smaller than expected is to select one sober driver per motor vehicle, attending each New Year's party, hold the speed within the posted limit and insist that all persons wear safety belts when the vehicle is in motion."

While the New Year Holiday period is in effect, there will be additional Highway Patrol troopers on duty to assist stranded motorist and enforce traffic laws, so you may have a safer and happier New Year in 1990.

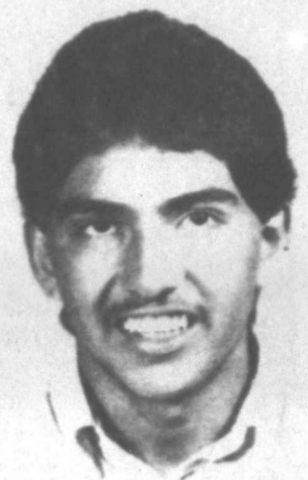
Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

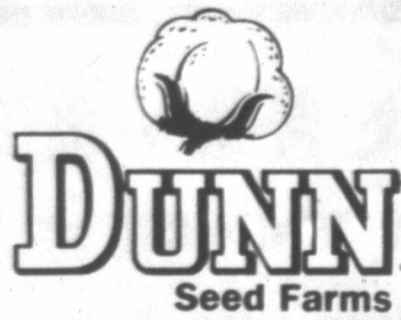
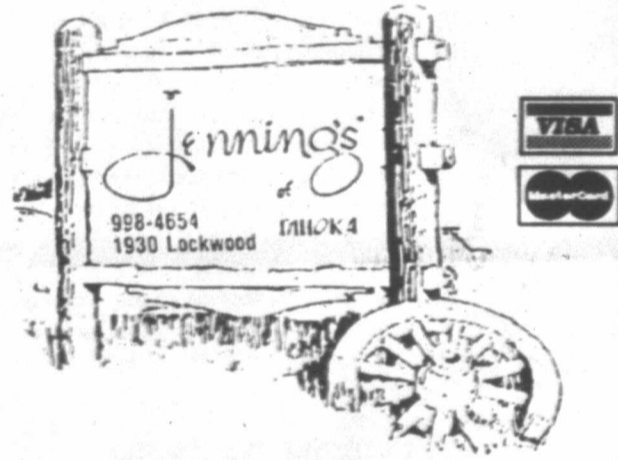
