Woodwork... by Dalton

McCALL'S MAGAZINE says most adults get about three or four colds per year, but "a small child gets six or seven, while an elderly person can expect one or two.

I usually have three or four a year, only now they last about a month each, when I used to throw off a cold in a couple of days. Colds are really aggravating, and are part of the reason I don't-like winter. When a person has a cold. he just can't think straight, because the gears in his brain are all clogged up with sinus fluid or something.

It's amazing that scientists can put men in outer space and get them back, and invent a microchip that will do impossible things, but can't come up with lawnmowers that will continue to run, toilets that will flush like they should, or a cure for the common cold.

Anyway, this article in McCall's had some interesting comments on how we catch a dumb cold. Most people catch a cold through direct contact with an object contaminated with a virus (Lips that touch Tylenol shall never touch mine at all). "Only 10 to 20 per cent of cold viruses are fransmitted by carriers who sneeze and cough, spraying

the viruses into the air." A cold virus, says the story, can live about three hours outside the body on hands, hard surfaces such as drinking glasses, telephone receivers, remote controls and doorknobs and on cloth items such as handkerchiefs, towels and pillow cases, where an uninfected person can come into contact with the germs. If the healthy person then touches his nose or eyes, the virus is introduced into the membranes. "Similarly, when someone with a cold covers a sneeze or cough with their hand, then a few minutes later extends the same hand to you in greeting, you may pick up the virus."

So, from the article and from my own membranes (the only brains I have that still function properly), I have concluded that there are several things one can do to help his chances of not catching a cold:

1. Keep influenza vaccines up to date.

2. Get plenty of sleep.

3. Eat a balanced diet (eleven pounds on each side of the plate).

4. Exercise regularly.

5. Don't share food or drinks (this stuff is mine, and you can't have any of it).

6. Use disposable tissues (especially don't use some-

body else's handkerchief). 7. Avoid touching your eyes, mouth and nose after

coming in contact with someone who has a cold. And don't shake hands with someone who has a cold (if they stick out their hand, recoil and cry out "Unclean!").

8. Avoid irritating air pollutants (get out of West Texas), and don't smoke.

9. Wash your hands often with hot water and soap.

10. Wear surgical gloves and a gas mask all summer, spring and fall.

11. Spend your winters on the moon. Alone.



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



Institute Says Schools Are Doing 'Poor Job'

Petersburg school district is the districts as the best in Texas, in which passing statewide tests of minimum skills. San Elizario school district near El Paso is the "worst" school district in the state, with 88 per cent of the students failing the tests. These are conclusions of Report Card on Texas Schools released by the National Center for Policy Analysis (NCPA), a research institute in Dal-

"best" district in Texas, with 100 per at least 85 per cent of the ninth gradcent of ninth grade students there ers passed the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) tests. The 37 worst school districts listed in the report are ones in which more than 60 per cent of the students failed the tests. TEAMS tests are administered each year to students in grades 1,3,5,7,9 and 11. All students must pass the 11th grade (junior year) test to receive a high school diploma in Texas.

"Overall, Texas schools are doing a poor job," said NCPA president John Goodman. "Four out of every 10 ninth-grade students in Texas are failing to meet standards in reading, writing and mathematics."

Goodman said "minority students are the principal victims of the failure of the Texas public schools. The longer black and Hispanic students stay in school, the worse they perform, relative to our expectations." According to the NCPA report, more than 70 per cent of black and Hispanic students pass the TEAMS tests in the first grade, but by the time these students have spent nine years in the public schools, only 46 per cent of blacks and 49 per cent of Hispanics pass the tests.

The report also concluded that there is no relationship between the taxable wealth of a school district, or the amount of spending per student, on the student performance on the TEAMS tests.


The NCPA is a nonprofit, nonpartisan research institute. It originated the proposal for merit pay for school districts, a plan subsequently adopted in Texas and South Caro-

No percentages of ninth graders passing the TEAMS tests were given for schools which tested fewer than 25 students, so no figures were listed for O'Donnell, Wilson or New Home

According to the report, 52 per cent of Tahoka ninth grade students passed all three TEAMS tests taken in February of last year. Compared to other schools in the UIL district, Tahoka fared the worst, except for Shallowater, which was listed as having only 8 per cent of its students passing. This could be a typographical error, however, since Shallowater is not listed in the "37 worst" districts headed by San Elizario with 12 per cent passing.

Percentages of ninth graders passing all tests included Seagraves 55 per cent, Morton 79 per cent, New Deal 59, Idalou 66, Ralls 58 and Crosbyton 53.

Tahoka school officials said the ranking of Tahoka ninth graders was not a matter of major concern, since the school still is among the top 75 per cent of districts. "Of course, we'd like for them to do better on the tests, but we are staying at about the same level and so long as we show a little improvement, we're not alarmed," said an official. He added that some schools have their students studying

Plant Pecan Trees Properly

One of the keys to growing pecans, whether in the backyard or in a commercial orchard, is to plant the trees properly so that they get off to a good start, said Brett Cypert, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Tree planting time is at hand-January and early February are the best times— and here are a few guidelines.

To begin, select a tree 4 to 8 feet tall as soon as nurseries get supplies. Plant as soon as possible, using care not to let roots dry out or freeze.

Dig the hole only as large as the tree's root system. If the hole is too deep, the tree will settle and this can cause poor growth or death. The taproot should sit in the bot-

tom of the hole. If the hole cannot be, as deep as the length of the roots, cut back the taproot to fit the hole.

Pack original soil around roots as tightly as possible. Packing the soil in 2 to 3-inch layers is better than watering to pack the soil. Use adjacent soil to complete filling the hole, not light soil, sand or potting soil. The tree can drown in rainy weather if light fill soil is used on clay land.

Plant the tree at the same depth it grew in the nursery row. Look at the colors to determine the soil line: the bark is gray and the root is dark

Cut off the top half of the tree at planting to balance the stem and roots and to force growth close to the

Wrap the lower 18 inches of the trunk with aluminum foil to prevent side shoots, sun scald and rabbit







Annis Godfrey The best way to acquire a fund for emergencies is to make saving a habit.

Regular savers end up saving more than occasional savers, even when they set aside a small amount at a

There are several ways to get started on a savings plan:

* Every payday put money into a savings account first, before paying

other expenses.

Have a portion of your earnings deducted from your pay and deposited directly into a savings account.

* When you pay off a loan, save the amount of the old payment instead of putting it back into the budget for spending.

* Put your change in a home bank or jar. When it's full, deposit the money in the bank.

It's advisable to have a fund to draw on in case of unemployment or a financial emergency. You may want to build a fund of 2 to 6 months take-home pay, an amount equal to your fixed expenses for a year, or some other amount appropriate for your financial situation.

Since money saved for emergencies should be convenient and readily available, it should be kept in a savings plan. Once you have reached your goal for an emergency fund, however, you can start investing your savings where they will earn higher interest.

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
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
