Stock Show Underway

First judging of animals in this year's Lynn County Livestock Show will be this evening (Thursday) at the show barns in Tahoka, with steers to be judged starting at 6 p.m. Judging of lambs entered by 4-H and FFA members in the county will begin a half hour after the steer judging is completed.

The largest segment of the 13th annual show, the barrow competition, will be judged starting at 9 a.m. Friday, and will take most of the day. Also at 11 a.m. Friday will be the judging of the baked goods division.

At 11:30 a.m. Saturday the popular barbecue luncheon will begin, with serving to continue for an hour or more.

Following the barbecue will be the annual sale of animals and presentation of awards. "The auction is a big event, showing the young exhibitors how they are appreciated by businesses and individuals in this agricultural area," said show President Billy Davis.

Special awards will be presented to those showing grand champions and reserve grand champions, and also there will be showmanship awards.

Livestock show officials expressed appreciation to all those who are helping in any way to make this year's show successful.

Woodwork...

McCALL'S MAGAZINE says most adults get about three or four colds per year, but "a small child gets six or seven, while an elderly person can expect one or two.

I usually have three or four a year, only now they last about a month each, when I used to throw off a cold in a couple of days. Colds are really aggravating, and are part of the reason I don't like winter. When a person has a cold, he just can't think straight, because the gears in his brain are all clogged up with sinus fluid or something.

It's amazing that scientists can put men in outer space and get them back, and invent a microchip that will do impossible things, but can't come up with lawnmowers that will continue to run, toilets that will flush like they should, or a cure for the common cold.

Anyway, this article in McCall's had some interesting comments on how we catch a dumb cold. Most people catch a cold through direct contact with an object contaminated with a virus (lips that touch Tylenol shall never touch mine at all). "Only 10 to 20 per cent of cold viruses are transmitted by carriers who sneeze and cough, spraying the viruses into the air."

A cold virus, says the story, can live about three hours outside the body on hands, hard surfaces such as drinking glasses, telephone receivers, remote controls and door-knobs and on cloth items such as handkerchiefs, towels and pillow cases, where an uninfected person can come into contact with the germs. If the healthy person then touches his nose or eyes, the virus is introduced into the membranes. "Similarly, when someone with a cold covers a sneeze or cough with their hand, then a few minutes later extends the same hand to you in greeting, you may pick up the virus."

So, from the article and from my own membranes (the only brains I have that still function properly), I have concluded that there are several things one can do to help his chances of not catching a cold:

1. Keep influenza vaccines up to date.
2. Get plenty of sleep.
3. Eat a balanced diet (eleven pounds on each side of the plate).
4. Exercise regularly.
5. Don't share food or drinks (this stuff is mine, and you can't have any of it).
6. Use disposable tissues (especially don't use somebody else's handkerchief).
7. Avoid touching your eyes, mouth and nose after coming in contact with someone who has a cold. And don't shake hands with someone who has a cold (if they stick out their hand, recoil and cry out "Unclean!").
8. Avoid irritating air pollutants (get out of West Texas), and don't smoke.
9. Wash your hands often with hot water and soap.
10. Wear surgical gloves and a gas mask all summer, spring and fall.
11. Spend your winters on the moon. Alone.

LYME DISEASE

To avoid getting bitten when walking in wooded areas, wear long sleeves and long pants tucked into boots. Use tick repellent spray on clothing. Afterward, check for tiny specks (the Lyme tick) on clothing and skin - pull them straight out from skin with a tweezers. Apply antiseptic. For a few weeks, watch for rash, chills, fever. With early detection, an antibiotic will stop the disease.

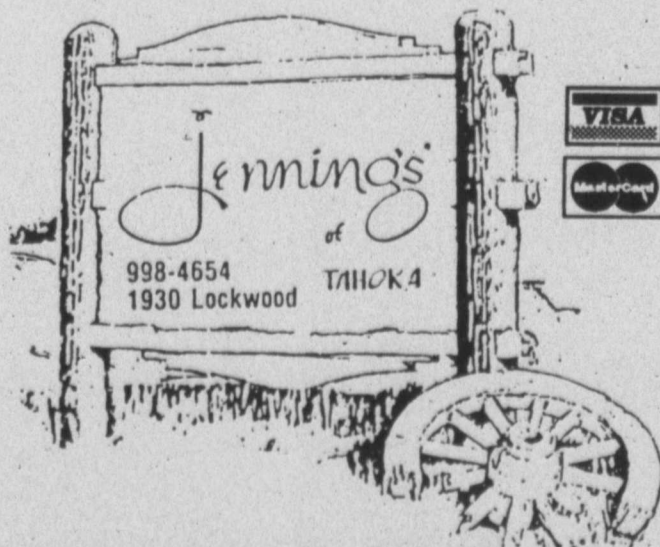

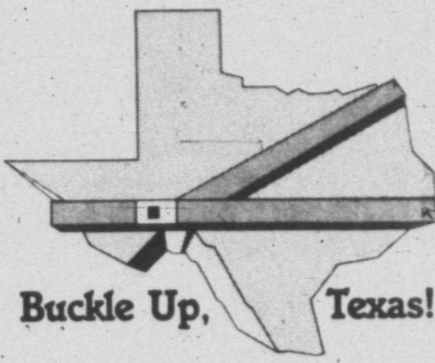

Institute Says Schools Are Doing 'Poor Job'

Petersburg school district is the "best" district in Texas, with 100 per cent of ninth grade students there passing statewide tests of minimum skills. San Elizario school district near El Paso is the "worst" school district in the state, with 88 per cent of the students failing the tests. These are conclusions of *Report Card on Texas Schools* released by the National Center for Policy Analysis (NCPA), a research institute in Dallas.

The report identifies 52 school



districts as the best in Texas, in which at least 85 per cent of the ninth graders passed the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) tests. The 37 worst school districts listed in the report are ones in which more than 60 per cent of the students failed the tests. TEAMS tests are administered each year to students in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11. All students must pass the 11th grade (junior year) test to receive a high school diploma in Texas.

"Overall, Texas schools are doing a poor job," said NCPA president John Goodman. "Four out of every 10 ninth-grade students in Texas are failing to meet standards in reading, writing and mathematics."

Goodman said "minority students are the principal victims of the failure of the Texas public schools. The longer black and Hispanic students stay in school, the worse they perform, relative to our expectations."

According to the NCPA report, more than 70 per cent of black and Hispanic students pass the TEAMS tests in the first grade, but by the time these students have spent nine years in the public schools, only 46 per cent of blacks and 49 per cent of Hispanics pass the tests.

The report also concluded that there is no relationship between the taxable wealth of a school district, or the amount of spending per student, on the student performance on the TEAMS tests.

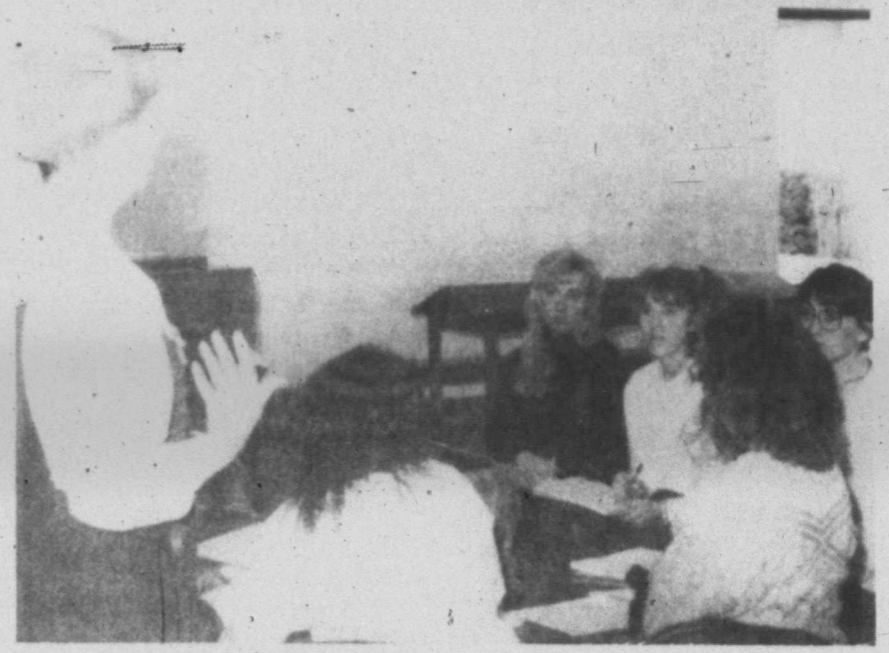
The NCPA is a nonprofit, nonpartisan research institute. It originated the proposal for merit pay for school districts, a plan subsequently adopted in Texas and South Carolina.

No percentages of ninth graders passing the TEAMS tests were given for schools which tested fewer than 25 students, so no figures were listed for O'Donnell, Wilson or New Home schools.

According to the report, 52 per cent of Tahoka ninth grade students passed all three TEAMS tests taken in February of last year. Compared to other schools in the UIL district, Tahoka fared the worst, except for Shallowater, which was listed as having only 8 per cent of its students passing. This could be a typographical error, however, since Shallowater is not listed in the "37 worst" districts headed by San Elizario with 12 per cent passing.

Percentages of ninth graders passing all tests included Seagraves 55 per cent, Morton 79 per cent, New Deal 59, Idalou 66, Ralls 58 and Crosbyton 53.

Tahoka school officials said the ranking of Tahoka ninth graders was not a matter of major concern, since the school still is among the top 75 per cent of districts. "Of course, we'd like for them to do better on the tests, but we are staying at about the same level and so long as we show a little improvement, we're not alarmed," said an official. He added that some schools have their students studying especially for the tests, while others such as Tahoka teach the basic subjects, but do not emphasize preparing for the TEAMS tests.

Tahoka tournament Jan. 6, the 8th graders zapped New Home 26-9 and then came in second after losing 29-22 in the finals to Lorenzo. Miranda Martin scored 6 points, Katy Copeland 5, and Jennifer Patterson and Ginger Malone 4 each against New Home. Patterson had 6, Cindy Ramirez 5 and Martin and Renae Williams 4 each against Lorenzo.

On Jan. 8, the 8th grade girls lost to Ralls 27-22. Martin had 7 and Patterson and Kelly Wells 4 each.

Tahoka's 7th grade boys lost to Seagraves 53-15 on Monday, Jan. 22. Scoring for Tahoka were Greg Smith with 6, and Wesley Solomon, Drew Stone and Rowdy Braddock. The 7th graders record is now 4-7.

The 8th grade boys came in third in the Lorenzo tournament. They lost 40-26 to Lorenzo in the first game, but came back to win over Ralls 36-26, when Michael Solorzano scored 16 points. Gilbert Resendez scored 11.

On Monday the boys lost a close game to Seagraves, 37-34. Chad Lawson scored 14 to lead Tahoka; Cody Hale had five points. The 8th grade boys record is now 4-8.

The Tahoka junior varsity boys basketball team traveled to play in Idalou's "Million-Dollar Gym" on Friday, Jan. 19. With 15 second left on the clock in overtime, Billy Wilborn bagged a 3-pointer to win the game, 43-41, giving Wilborn 17 points. Heath Brewer and Albert Mendoza had 8 each, Donnie Wiseman scored 4.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING TO TAX PERSONAL PROPERTY

The New Home I.S.D. Board of Trustees will hold a public hearing on a proposal to tax non-business personal property.

To tax the above property, the New Home I.S.D. Board of Trustees must approve the proposal by ordinary resolution or order and must find that the taxation of property as proposed will be in the public interest of all residents of New Home I.S.D.

News From ... Home Economics Agent Annis Godfrey

The best way to acquire a fund for emergencies is to make saving a habit.

Regular savers end up saving more than occasional savers, even when they set aside a small amount at a time.

There are several ways to get started on a savings plan:

* Every payday put money into a savings account first, before paying

other expenses.

* Have a portion of your earnings deducted from your pay and deposited directly into a savings account.

* When you pay off a loan, save the amount of the old payment instead of putting it back into the budget for spending.

* Put your change in a home bank or jar. When it's full, deposit the money in the bank.

It's advisable to have a fund to draw on in case of unemployment or a financial emergency. You may want to build a fund of 2 to 6 months take-home pay, an amount equal to your fixed expenses for a year, or some other amount appropriate for your financial situation.

Since money saved for emergencies should be convenient and readily available, it should be kept in a savings plan. Once you have reached your goal for an emergency fund, however, you can start investing your savings where they will earn higher interest.

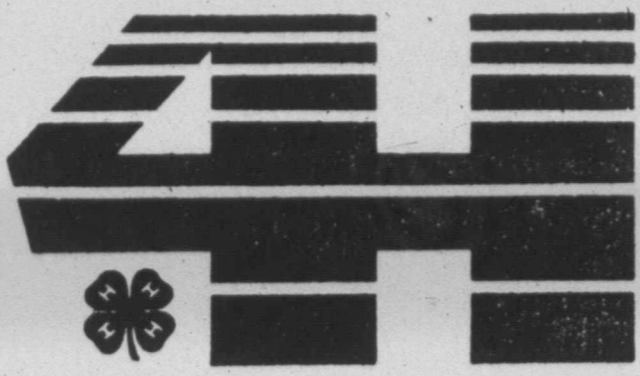
