Post, Sundown To Join District Next Season

Post and Sundown will join Tahoka and most other former District 4-AA teams in newly numbered District 5-AA next fall, with Shallowater and Morton moving out of the district into District 3-AA.

District 5-AA will include Tahoka, Post, Sundown, Idalou, New Deal, Seagraves, Crosbyton and Ralls. Next fall's football season will be the beginning of athletic competition in the new district.

Post, with a strong athletic program and generally a winner in Class AAA, is moving down to Class AA, while Sundown is moving up from Class A.

Meadow is new in Six-Man football District 4-A, which next fall will include Wilson, New Home, Meadow, Ropesville, Smyer and Southland.

O'Donnell will be in a new district 6-A, which will include Sudan, a team which the Eagles have faced twice in a row in bi-district, plus Anton, Lorenzo, Petersburg, Plains and Whiteface.

Three Charged With Burglary Of Residence

It was a busy week at Lynn County jail as 14 new inmates were booked in, including three 18-year-old Lubbock young men accused of burglary of a residence four miles north of New Home last Wednesday afternoon.

The three, Deon Craig Ellison, Kevin Lee Coats and Chancellor Lee Tate, each posted \$10,000 bond, set by Justice of the Peace H.W. Edwards. They were arrested on information supplied by a witness in the

vicinity of the home of Robert Nolte, where a front door was kicked in and items including a VCR, two .22 rifles and a 12-gauge shotgun were stolen. These articles were recovered from a pawn shop in Lubbock after the suspects were questioned.

Of the other 11 persons jailed during the week, one was charged with five different offenses: driving while intoxicated, unlawfully carrying a weapon, no liability insurance, not wearing a seat belt and failure to control speed. Charges against the other 10 inmates included resisting arrest, driving while license suspended, three for application to revoke probation, other traffic and DWI, truancy to a minor, and hindering arrest.

Fields Need 2-8 Inches Of Water Before Planting

Lynn County irrigators within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 will have to apply from 2 to 8 inches of water to bring the five-foot zone soil profile to field capacity before 1990 spring planting, according to soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Soil Conservation Service.

The most favorable soil moisture conditions in the portion of Lynn County within the Water District is in the area extending from the Lubbock-Lynn County line to the area southwest of Wilson. In this area bordered by U.S. Highway 87 and FM 400, two to four inches of water will be needed to bring the soil to field capacity.

Soil moisture deficits ranging from 4 to 6 inches were found east of Wilson to the Lynn-Garza County line. Dry field conditions with deficits ranging from 6 to 8 inches were found in the New Home area and extended to the Lynn-Terry County line. A smaller area of dry field conditions was found in the northeastern corner of Lynn County.

Only the north part of Lynn County is included in the water district, so no similar figures were available for the central and southern portions of the county.

Pleading guilty before 106th District Judge George Hansard in Tahoka Monday was John Andrew Bergera, 27, of O'Donnell, on a charge of felony DWI. He was assessed a fine of \$1500 plus court costs, drivers license was suspended for a year, and nine months in county jail. Also sentenced by Judge Hansard was Jack Benavides Jr., 2009 S. 8th St., Tahoka, on a charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. He was sentenced to four years in prison on an application to revoke probation on an earlier charge of DWI.

Ima Littlepage of 2405 N. 4th, reported to Tahoka Police Dept. Monday that someone had damaged her storm door. The glass had been shot, apparently by a pellet gun.

On Sunday, police investigated an accident at 2000-block N. 1st involving a 1979 parked Chevrolet owned by Larry Monk of Tahoka and a 1986 Chevrolet driven by Ruben H. Perez of Tahoka. Perez was taken to Lynn County Hospital, but was not treated.

The police department has recovered a boys' 20-inch bicycle found at Tahoka High School. It will be returned to the owner if it can be properly identified.

Famous Dribbler Haynes Leads Stars In Game Here

Legendary basketball star and comedian Marques Haynes, known

as the "world's greatest dribbler," led his team, the Harlem Magicians, past the "Lynn County Best All-Arounds" in a fun basketball game here last Wednesday night.

The event was sponsored by the Lynn County Jaycees and proceeds will be used in future county projects. The All-Arounds had lots of fun as did the audience in the contest, despite the final score of 90-48 in favor of the Magicians, led by Haynes, who has played basketball for more than 43 years, mostly with the Globetrotters and Magicians.

Haynes has appeared before royalty, popes, presidents, kings, politicians and countless basketball fans in such places as Kenya, England, Zimbabwe, Japan, Hong Kong, Egypt, the United States, Canada, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Tahoka. He has played basketball in seven decades since graduating from Langston University in Oklahoma, and he still is very active on the court as player-coach. However, he indicated he may retire next year.

Last year the Magicians' schedule included more than 200 games.

Last Thursday in the first game of the JV district tournament, the Dogs were beaten by Morton 91-65, although four Tahoka players were in double digits. Billy Wilborn and Lee Elder had 14 points each; Brewer and Albert Mendoza had 11 each, and Holland had 9. On Saturday in the second game of the tournament, New Deal won 56-40. Elder had 9 and Wilborn and Holland 8. Timmy Stice scored 4.

City Hoping New Rules On Landfill Can Be Eased

Tahoka city council, hoping for relief from newly announced EPA rules regarding landfill operations, Monday night passed a resolution to be sent to Sens. Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen and U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm urging them to press for modifications to the regulations which will cause the city to discontinue its landfill north of town.

Regulations already announced by the EPA but not yet in effect would require new procedures such as daily cover of dumped garbage (now done weekly by the city), and other procedures which city officials

say would be so cost-prohibitive that the landfill would have to be closed down and used as a gathering point for garbage to be trucked daily to a large landfill operation somewhere in the area. Indeed, current plans call for the closing of the landfill in September.

"This doesn't mean, however, that people no longer will be able to dump out there," said Barry Pittman, city manager. "Dumping will be allowed, but instead of covering up the garbage, it will have to be trucked daily to some other large-scale landfill operation." He added that this will be expensive.

Council members Monday also passed an ordinance providing for taxation of property exempt under Texas law, a measure related to property in place in the city for no longer than 150 days per year. Currently this will have little or no effect on city tax rolls, said Pittman.

Dan Hawkins, director of water utilities for the City of Lubbock, was on hand to explain planned renovations in the Canadian River water treatment plant which Tahoka utilizes. The renovations over an extended period, also to meet new government standards, will cost the City of Tahoka a small amount for its pro-rated portion of the expense.

Police Chief Jerry Webster gave a report on activities of his department during January.

All council members and Mayor Jim Solomon also were present.

Tahoka Varsity Boys Continue To Play Tough

The Tahoka Bulldog boys team put on a furious last-quarter rally against Shallowater Tuesday night, but fell a single point short of making their second consecutive major upset of a district opponent, as the Mustangs won 54-53.

The Bulldogs were five points short of the Mustangs in each of the middle quarters, but came back with 19 points in the fourth to just 9 for Shallowater, coming up just a point from putting the game into overtime. Michael Burleson had 17 points and Joey Stone 10 for Tahoka.

Last Friday night in Tahoka, the Bulldogs pulled off their second district win in a row by surprising Seagraves 67-62, with margin of victory actually coming in the second quarter, which the Dogs won 18-13. Burleson had 15 points, while sopho-

I HAVE ALWAYS heard that when you have back trouble, you've got bad trouble, and I have had occasional back pain enough to know that when your back is out of whack, you really can't do much of anything. I sincerely hope I never know what it means to have constant back trouble.

A story in the Lubbock A-J the other day said that "When your mother told you to sit up straight, she knew what she was talking about," because sitting up straight is one way of lessening the chance of back pain while increasing the strength of your back. That is according to the Associated Press and the Baylor College of Medicine.

The story offered some tips for preventing back pain while sitting, standing, sleeping or driving for prolonged periods of time. Here are some of them:

- When sitting, push hips back in the chair with thighs parallel to the floor (try this if you're less than 5-8, in some chairs, and your feet won't touch the floor).

- At work, use a firm, straight-backed chair which has arm rests and padded support for the lower back. The chair should allow feet to rest flat on the floor (I wonder if those people ever tried to type while sitting in a chair with arm rests. Besides, sitting so that both feet are flat on the floor is fine for most folks, but my feet don't reach the floor at the same time. If they are flat on the floor, I'm listing to the port side and about to fall out of the chair).

- Stand erect with chin in, head up and back straight (you got that, soldier?).

- Sleep on a firm mattress or put a plywood board between the mattress and springs. And sleep on your side with your knees bent and with a pillow between your knees. Or on your back with a pillow under your knees. Avoid sleeping on your stomach.

Like most folks, I already have my sleeping habits established, and changing would be difficult.

I sure don't want any back trouble, because I know it would be misery. Still, as I have mentioned before, I really have more trouble with my front than I do with my back.

Texas - Gone Wild With Flowers

There's a delicate invincibility to Texas wildflowers. They bloom in places you would not imagine flowers could grow.

Out in West Texas' expanse of Chihuahuan desert, populated by yucca, tumbleweed and sagebrush, a 100,000-acre spectral bouquet of bluebonnets, marigolds and purple sage can burst forth after a blessed rain.

And in Central Texas, miles of hardscrabble hills, deep green with juniper and cactus, are awash each spring in a blue, red and yellow sea of bluebonnets, Indian paintbrush and Mexican poppies.

More than 5,000 species of wildflowers make Texas home. Such an abundant floral archive more than any other state offers not only viewing pleasure for Texans and visitors, but a stiff challenge to botanists who strive to classify and conserve the array.

The National Wildflower Research

Center, founded in 1982 by Mrs. Lyndon Johnson, fulfilled a lifelong dream for Texas' native, "Lady Bird." She created an organization dedicated exclusively to the research, conservation and promotion of native plants in North America.

"At the Wildflower Center I hope we will learn about germination, growth habits and where and how to plant the treasure trove of wildflowers for their aesthetic and conservation potential... and... make such information available to the expanding constituency of those who care." Lady Bird writes in her foreword to *Texas Wildflowers, A Field Guide* (Loughmiller, University of Texas Press, 1984).

Obviously, there is more to the National Wildflower Research Center's efforts than cultivating pretty flowers: As the center's director, David K. Northington, Ph.D., says "Native flora are economical, ecologically sound landscape alternatives for residential

and commercial, urban and rural areas. They already are well-adapted to their regions and, once established, seldom need supplemental water. Using wildflowers and native grasses in public spaces can reduce the need for other high-cost maintenance, such as mowing, herbicides and fertilization."

To see flower power at its best, one should visit the center in spring. The center is set on approximately 60 acres at 2600 FM 973 North, near Austin, 512 929-3600. From mid-April through May the acreage is certifiably abloom with displays of native flora, including the state's official flower, *Lupinus texensis* (Texas bluebonnet).

Also called buffalo clover, wolf flower and *el conejo* (the rabbit), the bluebonnet was adopted as the state flower on March 7, 1901, by the 27th legislature. It is said to have received its popular name for its resemblance to a lady's sunbonnet. There are at least four species of bluebonnets in Texas, brought to the state possibly in grain shipments from Mediterranean countries.

Regardless of when or how bluebonnets arrived, they evidently love their home. Each spring, from the end of March through May, much of the Texas countryside is a giant quilt of blueish-purple *Lupinus texensis*. Annual tours and festivals thrive where the displays are the most prolific, including the Hill Country, the Highland Lakes and Washington Country.

Statewide, Texas' abundance of blossoming plants can be credited to its geographic diversity. Texas elevations

range from sea level coastal plains to the craggy peaks of mountains more

than a mile high. Rainfall measures more than 56 inches annually in the jungle-like regions of East Texas, but less than eight inches in the sun-drenched Chihuahuan desert.

One of the most prolific floral regions is the subtropical Lower Rio Grande Valley. Although lavish with blossoms during spring and summer, this is truly a year-round floral arena. Residential and public gardens flame with poinsettias that grow as high as a house, and boulevards are draped with brilliant red and wide green-leaved bougainvillea.

Tapestries of red, orange and yellow Indian blankets warm the broad plains of North Texas each spring. Indian blankets are also known as gaillardia and firewheels, but the blooms most resemble the bright, colored blankets. And, where the roads stop, and only a good pair of boots or a horse will take you, Texans and visitors alike can hike or ride through literally millions of acres that nature annually paints with her phenomenal artistry.

Checks Mailed For Bingo Levy

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$2.4 million to counties and cities in Texas that have legalized charity bingo and levy the two-percent local tax on the games' gross receipt.

Bullock said that today's checks reflect the amount collected by 69 counties and 127 cities during the fourth quarter of 1989.

In Lynn County, net payment this period was \$3,712.75; net payment last year, \$2,611.23; 1990 payments \$3,712.75; 1989 payments to date \$2,611.23; percent change to date +011.0.

Farming Tax Briefs

Gains or losses that result from repossession or foreclosure actions are usually treated like gains or losses from sales or exchanges.

All tangible property placed in service after 1986 must be depreciated under the Modified Accelerated Cost Recovery System (MACRS).

Payments to farmers from the government usually should be included in a farmer's income, regardless of whether the payment is made in cash, services, or commodity certificates.

Loan cancellations are generally considered part of a farmer's gross income.

Farmers can still claim investment tax credits that they earned before 1987 by filing an amended return.

Farming Costs Can Increase Farm Basis

Some farming expenses should be added to the cost basis of the farm rather than being used as deductions.

An example of such a cost basis addition would be expenses for soil and water conservation if these expenses are not consistent with a plan approved by the Soil Conservation Service, or the plan of a comparable state agency. If these costs were part of an approved plan, they should be claimed as a deductible expense.

Also, farmers who use the cash method of accounting may not be able to deduct expenses for certain farm supplies until the year in which the supplies are used. This generally applies to farmers whose prepaid expenses for feed, seed, fertilizer, other farm supplies, and the cost of poultry are more than 50 percent of their other deductible farming expenses for the year.

Dietary Calcium To Prevent Osteoporosis

Osteoporosis, or brittle bone disease, is a disorder in which bone strength is decreased due to a decline in the calcium content. Results from studies suggest that dietary calcium supplementation may decrease the rate of bone loss. It has been recommended that women consume 800 to 1,000 milligrams (mg) of calcium per day before menopause and 1,300 to 1,400 mg of calcium per day after menopause.

It is best to obtain calcium from the foods you eat. Here are some tips to help you select the best foods for your diet:

- Include milk in your diet regularly. Drinking 2-1/2 cups of milk will meet 90 percent of your daily calcium needs.
- Use nonfat dry milk to enrich soups, stews, meatloaf, sandwich fillings and beverages.
- Read the label. Select dairy products fortified with "nonfat milk solids" to get additional calcium, protein and other nutrients.
- Use canned salmon in your favorite sandwich, salad, and casserole recipes.
- Eat more kale, turnip greens, mustard greens, broccoli and collard greens because they contain calcium that is readily absorbed.

Physical activity as well as increased calcium intake is required to develop and maintain optimal bone density. If you are not getting enough calcium in your diet, start increasing your calcium intake and your activity level now.

Withholding that Fits

Employees should check their federal tax withholding early in the year to see if their withholding level is correct for 1990.

The IRS says that employees can tailor their taxes to wind up with little tax owed or to be refunded.

Generally, tax law requires employees to have enough tax withheld from their wages or make quarterly estimated tax payments sufficient to equal 90 percent of their total 1990 tax bill.

Employees who find they are having too little or too much tax withheld should file another W-4 withholding form with their employer.

For information on withholding, the free IRS Publication 919, *Is My Withholding Correct for 1990?* can be ordered by using the order blank in the tax return package or by calling toll-free, 1-800-424-3676.

Who's Responsible?

If you've decided to pay someone to do your federal tax return, the IRS suggests you take your selection of a tax practitioner as seriously as if you were choosing a family doctor or dentist.

Although the IRS cannot recommend specific tax practitioners, it does offer the following suggestions:

- Select someone, or some firm, that you feel will be available if you have questions about the preparation of your tax return, months, or even years, after it has been filed.
- Avoid any tax practitioner who claims that he or she can get you a larger tax refund than another practitioner, or those whose fees are based on a percentage of your refund, or who claim a special "m" with the IRS.
- If you feel your return is going to be unusually involved, due to such things as complex investments, moving expenses or large casualty losses, be sure your practitioner is knowledgeable in these tax areas.

Take your tax package you receive in the mail to your practitioner so he or she can use your forms and your peel-off identity label, and the envelope provided by the IRS.

If you are planning to file your return electronically to benefit from the much faster refund return time, call the IRS toll free at 1-800-424-1040. They can tell you who in your area is able to transmit your return to the IRS.

Be sure that your preparer signs your return in the space provided, you receive a copy of the completed return, and that you never sign a blank tax return.

Be sure you feel comfortable with the prepared return; it is still your tax return, and you are responsible for its contents.

Overmedication Threatens the Elderly

While many prescription and non-prescription drugs provide special instructions for children, pregnant women and nursing mothers, few contain special instructions for the elderly. Not surprisingly, of the \$3 billion worth of medications prescribed for senior citizens each year, half are not taken properly.

"Improper use of medication by older adults can have dangerous implications," according to Dr. Stephen Fox, D.O., an osteopathic physician who specializes in working with older adults. In fact, a report by U.S. Inspector General Richard Kusserow found that the elderly account for 51 percent of all deaths from drug reactions.

However, these deaths may not be the sole result of misuse on the part of the elderly patients. Dosing errors frequently are a source of overmedication in the elderly. "Most drugs give a minimum dose," says Dr. Fox, "but there's no assurance that it's really the minimum-effective dose for the elderly." Once a minimum dose is established, further testing is not required to determine whether the dose can be reduced even more.

Currently no mandate exists for testing drugs on the elderly in this country. No studies have included people over age 70—even for drugs that are primarily used by older adults. Women are often under-represented as well.

Older persons are at a higher risk for drug reactions because their

bodies react in different ways to certain medications, creating possible dangerous combinations. More elderly adults are living in unstructured home care, where drug use is unsupervised. The fact that the elderly suffer from more multiple chronic diseases than younger patients also contributes to extensive drug use.

For these reasons, Dr. Fox strongly urges elderly patients to communicate fully with their physicians. He suggests that they put all their medication—including non-prescription drugs—in a bag and bring it to their next regular appointment with their personal physician. "Don't let fear or embarrassment stop you from telling the doctor what he needs to know or asking questions about the medications prescribed," Dr. Fox adds.

By the year 2000, physicians in primary care will be devoting 75 percent of their time to the care of the elderly. As the elderly population continues to grow, and more older adults live on their own without the supervision of nursing homes, it is increasingly important for them to talk with their physicians about the medicine they take.



Need More Time to File?

You may get an automatic four-month extension of time to file, if you file Form 1040 or 1040A.

To get the automatic extension, you must file Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U. S. Individual Income Tax Return," and forward it by April 16, 1990 to the IRS processing center for your area.

But remember, an extension of time to file is NOT an extension of time to pay.

After you've made an estimate of your tax for the year, you must pay the balance due with your Form 4868. If you underestimate the amount you owe, you will have to pay interest on the unpaid amount. If that amount is more than 10% of your tax, you will have to pay, in addition to interest, a failure-to-pay penalty.

If you file Form 1040EZ or intend to request IRS to compute your tax, you are not eligible for an automatic extension. Also, you are not eligible if you are under a court order to file by the regular due date.

Form 4868 may be obtained by using the order form in the tax package or by calling the IRS toll-free at 1-800-424-3676.

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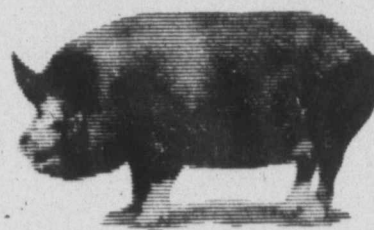
