## Tahoka's Top Citizen To Be Named At Banquet

Tahoka's Outstanding Citizen Award, this year based on community service not just for the previous year, but over the years, will be announced Friday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet starting at 7 p.m. in Tahoka School cafeteria.

Speaker for the event will be Harold Elliott, chaplain for the Arlington, TX Police Dept. Since 1968 Elliott has appeared before banquets and conventions as a polished speaker, only to transform midway through his talk into the homespun philosopher, "Levi Littleton."

As Levi Littleton, Elliott embraces the qualities of wisdom with a humorous outlook on himself and on life. He has spoken in the U.S., England and France.

Elliott was born and reared in Clarendon, where he says he met many characters and heard many of the stories he relates. He is a graduate of the University of Texas at Arlington and of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth. He is a published author and has appeared on national television.

Chamber President Danny Preston will hand over the gavel of leadership for the organization to

Dustie Cook. There will be drawings for four \$25 cash awards. Gail Faries will introduce Elliott, and Cal Huffaker will present the Outstanding Citizen Award.

Susie Rhodes will provide piano music for the turkey and dressing dinner, prepared and served by the school cafeteria personnel.

Directors of the chamber will be recognized. They include Miss Cook, Huffaker, Carl Reynolds, Retha Pittman, Betsy Pridmore, Trent Leverett, Doyle Webb, Faries, Joe Calvillo, Eunice Stephens, Tome Alvarado and Elaine Boone.

## City Elections Set In Four Towns In County

City elections are scheduled in Tahoka, New Home, Wilson and O'Donnell on May 5, with March 21 the deadline for filing for any of the available positions.

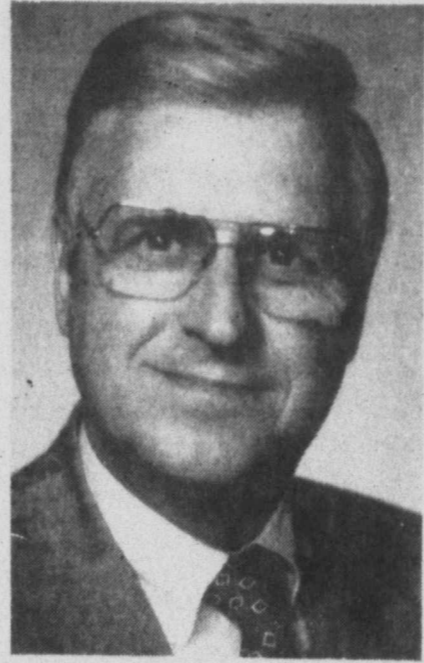
At Wilson, terms of Mayor Jackie Bishop and council members David Cook and Oscar Follis are scheduled to expire. Cook and Follis already have signed up for re-election. No others had signed for the city election as of Tuesday.

In Tahoka, terms of council members Dayton Parker, Wayne Tekell and Jimmy Huckabay are scheduled to expire. Neither these nor any other candidates had filed by Tuesday afternoon.

Forms for signing up for the elections are available at the city halls of the respective towns.

## Runoffs Possible In Two County Democratic Races

Lynn County voters will make their choices in races from the county to the state level as Democratic and Republican primaries are conducted in Lynn and other Texas counties next Tuesday, when polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

With no Republican candidates filed for any of the county offices, Democratic nomination for the available county offices will be the same as being elected, since these Democratic nominees will have no opposition on the general election ballot in November. And since two of the contests for Democratic nomination have more than two candidates, runoffs for the nomination are possible in these races, for district clerk, and for commissioner of Lynn County Precinct 2.

Seeking the nomination for dis-

trict clerk are the present officeholder, Joy Laws, and two challengers, Maxine Paris and Donna Whitley. The other race with three candidates is for county commissioner of Precinct 2, where incumbent Boyd Barnes of Draw community is being challenged by Tahoka residents T.A. Stone and Junior Meeks.

Contested races in the county whose officeholders will be determined by the Democratic primary include a race between Precinct 4 commissioner J.T. Miller and challenger C.W. McCullough, and the race for Lynn County clerk, where longtime clerk C.W. Roberts is opposed by Mrs. Marvin (Barbara) Pierce.

Unopposed on the Democratic ticket and also without Republican opposition are County Judge J.F. Brandon, justices of the peace H.W. Edwards (Pct. 1) and Ben Morrison (Pct. 4), all for re-election, and Mrs. Janet Porterfield, seeking the office of county treasurer after the present treasurer, Cindy Bryan, chose not to run again.

Even if the two three-candidate races in the county don't develop into a primary runoff, there will be runoff races by both parties, since there are

several contests with three or more candidates on the state level. There are, in fact, 14 candidates for governor of Texas, seven on each party's primary ballot. There also are seven candidates for Texas commissioner of agriculture on the Democratic ballot, including incumbent Jim Hightower, and three candidates for the Republican nomination.

Runoff election date for the primary nominations is April 10.

Voting in the Democratic primary in the county will be at the usual voting boxes, although one box has been added to the former 13 voting boxes in the county. Voting Pct. No. 14, which includes some voters formerly in Pct. 1, will be in the district courtroom, second floor of the courthouse, accessible from the courthouse elevator. Voting registration certificates contain the information as to which voting box a person is supposed to go to for casting a ballot.

All Republican voters for the primary in Lynn County are to cast ballots at the Wharton building on Main St. in Tahoka. Earlier the county Republican leaders had announced there would be a voting box in Wilson, but certification problems with the federal government caused them to cancel that plan.

## Two Sentenced To Prison Terms For Burglary

Two Slaton men were sentenced to prison terms last week after pleading guilty of charges of burglary of George's Garage in Wilson. Vincent Ray Cruz, 19, was assessed a 12-year prison term by District Judge George Hansard in Tahoka, and Raymond Perez was given a 10-year term.

Judge Hansard also assessed a 7-year prison term, probated, for Deon Craig Ellison, 18, of Lubbock, for the Jan. 21 burglary of the home of Robert Nolte, about 4.5 miles northeast of New Home. And Debbie Maines, 38, of Round Rock, was handed a 10-year term, probated, for securing execution of a document by deception.

On Feb. 27, Cruz and Perez were arrested in Wilson after one of them had been detained by Wilson residents near the garage.

Also cleared this week, according to sheriff's officers, were two burglaries which occurred Jan. 7, one at the Wilson home of Joe Vasquez and the other at a trailer house owned by Donald Basinger of Slaton and located 1.5 miles west of Southland. According to officers, suspects in these two burglaries already are in custody for other offenses, and charges in those cases are pending.

Math Bartley of Tahoka reported that between March 1-6, three saddles valued at a total of \$3700 had been stolen from a barn on S. 5th St.

Celia Curry reported to police on Monday that persons unknown had broken into Tahoka Dairy Queen on the west access road of U.S. 87, in the early morning hours, with entry gained by breaking a drive-in win-

OVER THE WEEKEND, something somebody said got me to thinking about hemidemisemiquavers and a musical instrument which goes boing-boing, only I have not seen one of them in years.

A hemidemisemiquaver is a musical term for a very brief note, a sixty-fourth note, to be exact. Those people who count music (ah-one, ah-two, etc.) can appreciate that a sixty-fourth note is brief, indeed, and in fact, if you are playing a piece of music and you have one of those notes to play, you'd better be ready when your turn comes. And you don't really count for a note that short; you just do as quick as you can.

I have heard some songs, mainly rock and country, that would be better sung in about 16 hemidemisemiquavers rather than in 32 measures of squalling quarter notes, but that's another story (and also a matter of opinion).

The other musical thought which struck me (injury was minor) had to do with a jew's harp, and only after checking with the dictionary later did I learn how to spell it after all these years. Webster says a jew's harp is "a small musical instrument consisting of a lyre-shaped metal frame held between the teeth and played by plucking a projecting bent piece with the finger."

I remember having one or two of those things around when I was kid, and even a little older, but I never could get out of it anything resembling music, nor did I ever know anyone who could play one. And I always thought the name of the device was a "juice harp", because you can't play one without slobbering all over it. This also taught me not to stand too close to anybody trying to play one.

Well, anyway, if there is anybody out there who has one of those things, juice harp or jew's harp (Hebrew harmonica?), I'd be interested in hearing you play it.

Just briefly, though. Maybe a hemidemisemislobber.

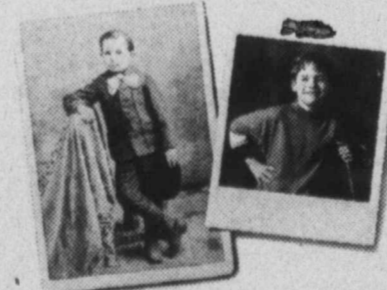

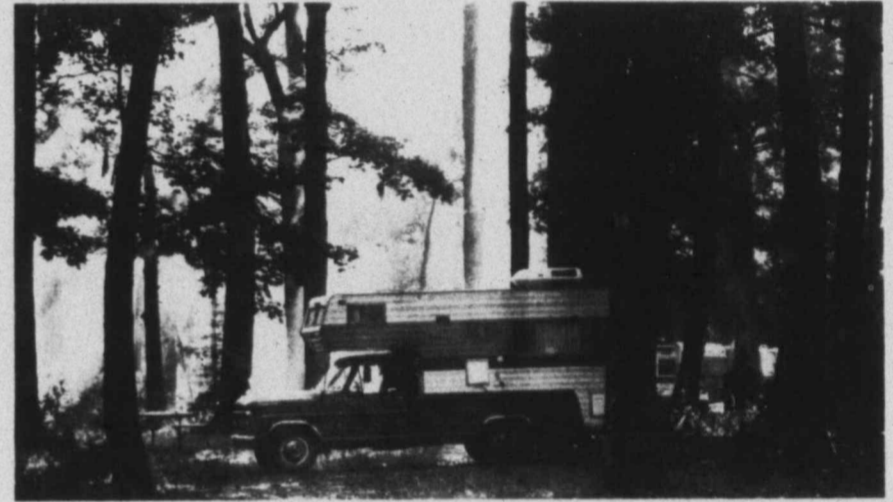

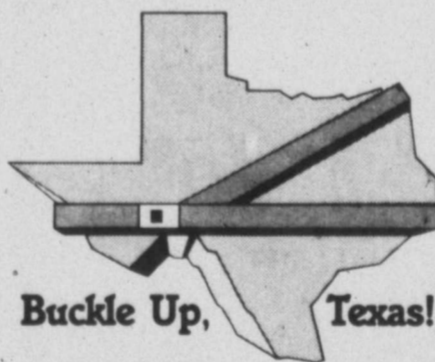
Funds Available To Needy For Energy Crisis

The Continuing Care Community: What You Should Know

If you're a senior citizen, a continuing care retirement community can offer the security of knowing you'll have a place to live and the services you need for many years to come. However, there are things you should find out. Here, from the experts at the American Association of Homes for the Aging, is a partial checklist:

- Check with several continuing care retirement communities offering similar services and contracts to determine if the fees are competitive.
• Find out how you will be expected to pay for the care you receive.
• Find out under what circumstances, if any, the monthly charges will be raised or lowered.



The continuing care contract should spell out the providers' obligations to you for the length of the contract.

- Find out what refunds, if any, will be made in the event you decide to leave the community voluntarily.
• Ask if the community is accredited by the Continuing Care Accreditation Commission (CCAC).

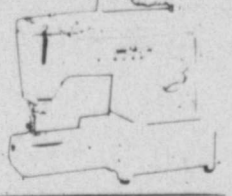

**Herbicides Help Control  
 Range Weeds**

Each year unwanted weeds cost ranchers many dollars in lost production because they rob desirable forages of moisture and nutrients.

To help reduce some of these losses, ranches can rely on herbicides to help combat these weeds.

Range weeds can be a serious problem in some areas of Texas this spring because of winter rains. The eastern portion of Texas received a considerable amount of rainfall this past winter, so ranchers in East Texas should be more cautious.

The rest of the state received less rainfall, and fewer problems are expected. However, each rancher needs to check his rangeland now to see if he has a weed infestation.

Ranchers who do find heavy weed infestation on rangeland should consider control measures. Broadleaf plants such as distaff thistle, annual broomweed, camphorweed, ragweed and others should be the target for herbicide control.

When spraying in early spring, the herbicide 2, 4-D provides excellent control of most annual weeds. Weeds should be growing rapidly, and the herbicide should be applied before they flower.

Herbicides should be applied in March or mid-April. Ranchers may choose to use 2, 4-D amine in areas

that receive more than 25 inches of annual rainfall, while 2, 4-D low volatile ester should be used in areas of less rainfall.

To control harder-to-kill weeds, a dicamba-2, 4-D mixture or a picloram-2 4-D mixture is effective. Dicamba (Banvel) and 2, 4-D may be tank mixed, or a dicamba-2 4-D mixture (1:3 ratio) is commercially available under the trade name Weedmaster.

Likewise, picloram (Grazon PC) and 2, 4-D may be tank mixed, or a commercial formulation (1:4 ratio of picloram and 2, 4-D) is available under the trade name Grazon P+D.

Weed control on rangeland is a practice that can produce significant returns. Weed control result demonstrations have shown a significant increase in grass production by controlling unwanted weeds. In many cases, a pound of grass has been produced for every pound of weeds controlled.

For maximum benefits from herbicide weed control, ranchers should practice good grazing management. Deferred grazing during the growing season will allow grasses to gain vigor and become better established. Proper grazing management can help keep a good cover of grass while reducing weeds.

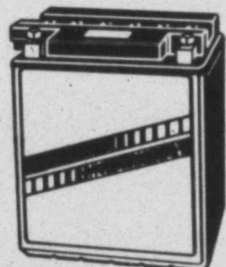

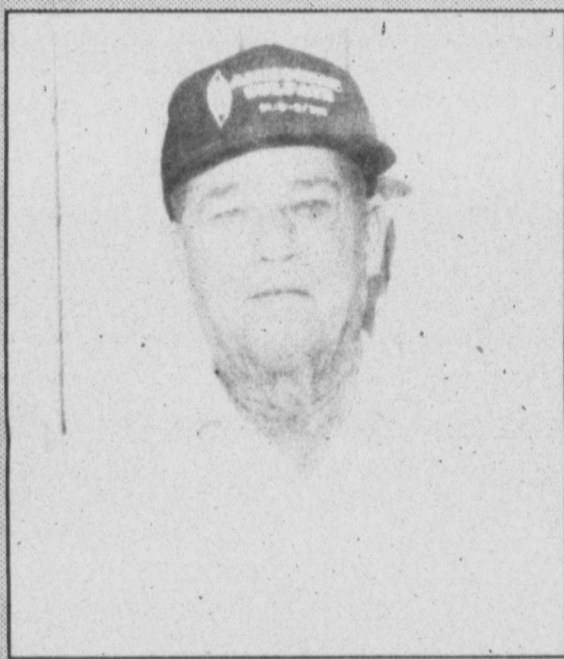
