

Jury In Fatal Wreck Suit Deadlocks

A 106th District Court jury which had been hearing a lawsuit over a fatal accident in Lynn County in 1985, reported to Judge George Hansard here Tuesday morning that they were unable to reach a verdict.

The suit was filed against the Texas Highway Dept. by the wife of a man and mother of a young boy who died in the wreck on FM 212 east of Tahoka late in the afternoon on July 23, 1985. Damages totaling more than \$2 million had been sought in the lawsuit by Sharla Ray, widow of Rodney Dale Ray and as next friend of Lindsey Ray. Sharla Ray and the girl, Lindsey, were injured in the wreck which killed Rodney Ray, 31, and Bradley Ray, 5.

The original petition by the plaintiff, represented by Lamesa attorneys Willis E. Gresham Jr. and William E. Fulbright, named the state, the highway department, Hackberry Co-Op Gin and the drivers of three trucks owned by the gin, one of which was involved in the head-on collision with a 1983 GMC pickup driven by Rodney Ray. The case against the truck drivers and the gin had been settled earlier, for an amount totaling about a million dollars, payable to Mrs. Ray and Lindsey over a period of years.

Defense attorneys Richard Naylor and Don Morgan of Austin disputed the allegations of the original petition that the accident occurred on a road in which the highway department had "performed work in a negligent manner and had negligently created special defects in . . . the roadway so as to create an unreasonable risk of harm or injury" to persons driving on the road at the time of the accident.

At the time of the accident, the Rays lived near Grassland. Mrs. Ray now lives in Lubbock.

The case went to the jury Monday before noon and the jury debated for several hours Monday and Monday

Member of First United Methodist Church, where he currently is chairman of the administrative board and is a member of the pastor-parish committee.

Member of the Lynn County Stock Show committee for the last four years, and very active in working at the county show each year.

He was named Outstanding 4-H Adult Leader in 1986, when he also helped organize and joined the ride with 4-H during the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train.

He has served as a cook at the Old Settlers Reunion.

He was sponsor for the junior high United Methodist Youth Fellowship in 1988.

He assisted the chamber of commerce during the Moonlight Madness sale, and in 1989 substituted for Santa Claus during the event.

He has assisted the annual auction conducted by the Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary.

Stone, Miller, Roberts, Laws Win County Races

No runoffs developed in either of two Lynn County contests which had three candidates, and of the four contested races on the county level in the Democratic Primary, three were won by incumbents in voting Tuesday.

A relatively light turnout of 1529 voters returned C.W. Roberts to the county clerk's office, J.T. Miller to his Precinct 4 commissioner job and Joy Laws to the district clerk's office. But incumbent Precinct 2 commissioner Boyd Barnes was defeated by T.A. Stone, whose 235 votes were enough to overcome Barnes' 184 and the 39 votes received by the third candidate, Junior Meeks.

Roberts received 906 votes to 542 for challenger Barbara Pierce. Miller defeated his challenger, C.W. McCullough, by 295 votes to 120. And Mrs. Laws got enough votes to defeat two other candidates. She had 790 votes, Donna Whitley 432 and Maxine Paris 254.

In each of these races, nomination means election in November, since no Republican candidates filed for those offices.

Although there will be no runoffs in county races, there will be primary runoffs by both parties on April 10, for statewide offices.

Lynn County Democrats voted for Harley Schlanger over Hugh Parmer as nominee for the U.S. Senate, to oppose Republican Phil Gramm in the general election in November. Schlanger had 728 votes and Parmer 300.

In the governor's race Jim Maddox was most popular in Lynn County, with 858 votes, to Mark White's 242 and just 173 for Ann Richards, who

will be in a statewide runoff with Maddox for the nomination. For attorney general in this county, it was Odam 779 and Morales 494. Jim Hightower was a close winner with 490 votes for agriculture commissioner in Lynn County over Neal Burnett with 439. The county went for Bob Krueger for railroad commissioner, Gene Kelly, Ross Sears, Frank Maloney, Bill White and Herb Hancock for judges' races and Tom Bowden for state treasurer.

The Lynn County Republican primary drew 81 voters, the most ever, according to local GOP workers. That group gave 49 votes to Clayton Williams, who won the governor's

nomination outright statewide, 30 votes to Kent Hance and 2 to Jack Rains. J.E. (Buster) Brown was winner in the race for the attorney general nomination in the county, with 44 votes. Lynn Republicans also voted for Warren Harding Jr. for attorney general, Kay Hutchinson for treasurer, Wes Gilbreath, who campaigned in Tahoka, for land commissioner, Rick Perry for ag commissioner, Beau Boulter for railroad commissioner, Tom Phillips, George Barbary, Charles Ben Howell and Joe Delaney for judges' spots.

Republicans also elected Gail Faires on a write-in as new Republican County chairman.

Most Coaches, Teachers Offered New Contracts

Tahoka school board members spent several hours dealing with a lengthy agenda last Thursday night, and when the meeting ended just before 2 a.m. Friday, the board had offered new contracts to 49 teachers, to counselor Sherri McCord, band director Steve Morgan, and to five of the system's six athletic coaches.

The resignation of first grade teacher Virginia Griffing, who is retiring, was accepted "with regrets."

Some dissension surfaced on the extension of contracts for some of the coaches. The contract of head football Coach Joe Paradis was renewed after a tie vote of 3-3, with one abstention, developed. Under contract terms, if a contract is not acted upon, it is considered renewed.

Only assistant Coach Greg Tabor and head boys basketball Coach Hulon Kirkland had unanimous board support for renewal of their contracts. Other coaches whose contracts were extended included assistant Charlie Mac Holland and Steve Qualls, head girls basketball coach. Setting the tone for an evening in

which the board generally had divided opinions was the vote of one member opposed to approving the minutes of the previous meeting.

The group did vote unanimously to pay the bills, approve a report from the textbook committee and to seek bids on new band uniforms. Band Director Morgan showed the board a uniform which students and band parents had selected as best of a group of samples received.

All board members, including Thalia Burks, Clint Gardner, Joe Hays, Richard Lopez, Delbert McCleskey, Gary McCord and Nedra Young, were present.

Charges Filed In O'Donnell Shooting Case

A 24-year-old O'Donnell man was shot at close range with a 12-gauge shotgun early Sunday morning and another O'Donnell man was arrested and later charged with attempted murder.

Oscar Ubalde Delafuente Jr., wounded in the hip, was taken to Lynn County Hospital and then transferred to Lubbock General Hospital for treatment. No information on the seriousness of his condition was available.

Charged was Frederico Salazar, 34, who also was being held in Lynn County jail on an application to revoke his probation on a previous conviction for aggravated assault.

The shooting took place in O'Donnell around 2 a.m. following an argument between the principals.

A winch stolen several months ago from the farm of Kenneth Williams, southeast of O'Donnell in Borden County, was located last week at the home of an O'Donnell resident who said he bought the winch from a man whose name he did not know.

John Henderson, Rt. 1, Wilson, reported a Briggs and Stratton motor and pump stolen off a water tank trailer 3.5 miles northeast of New Lynn Gin March 4 or 5. The items were valued at \$350.

Milton Edwards of Tahoka reported that on Tuesday night, March 6, someone took about 250-300 gallons of diesel fuel from a tank at a location about nine miles northwest of Tahoka.

During the week the Tahoka Police Dept. investigated two family disturbance incidents.

Jailed during the last week were the O'Donnell man and one person for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and another for public intoxication.

"I HAVE HERE," announced one of the office people, "something mailed to us by the Aseptic Packaging Council. And, to head off your next question of what in the world is that, it says here that 'Preserving our environment is one of the most important actions we can take for our children. Recycling helps. But first, reduce your waste through source reduction.'"

"In other words," I said, "I can reduce my waist by cutting down on what I put in it? This is hardly a new idea."

It was explained to me that the flyer was not concerned with reducing *waist*, but *waste*, although the concept is the same. This group which calls itself the Aseptic Packaging Council suggests that people do some of these things to help the environment:

1. Use products with minimal packaging.
2. Find other uses for materials you normally toss in the garbage. "Empty bread bags and butter tubs make excellent reusable containers for school lunches and leftovers."
3. Write on both sides of paper, instead of automatically pulling out a new sheet. Use the back side of junk mail for your grocery list or children's drawing paper. (Most of my junk mail is printed on both sides, you dummies).
4. Reuse materials like wrapping paper and shopping bags. (How about Kleenex?)
5. When shopping for just a few items at the store, take the sales receipt but leave the bag behind. (The Harried Husband on Main St. says he tried that once, but she showed up at home only minutes after he got there).
6. Start a backyard composting pit. "It's easy to build and turns your coffee grounds, grass, leaves, plant clippings and other organic waste into fertilizer for your garden." (Just throw everything out the back door instead of carrying it to the dumpster).

Some of those ideas aren't bad, but mostly I didn't care for them. So I just flushed the flyer down into the Aseptic tank.

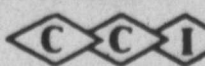

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.
