Suspect In Copper Wire Theft At Substation Burned

One of three suspects in theft of copper wire from a Lyntegar Electric Co-Op substation was badly burned by coming into contact with a live wire at the location a mile south of Draw on FM 1054 last Saturday just after midnight.

Treated at Post Medical Hospital for severe electrical burns, described as 60 per cent, second and third degree burns, was Steven Shell, 27, of Lubbock. He later was transferred to University Medical Center in Lubbock, where he reportedly remained in serious condition at mid-week.

Shell and Brent Spradling, 21, and Joe Johnson, 31, all of Lubbock, were charged with criminal mischief

in the incident. Bolt cutters apparently were used to gain entry to the substation, and a quantity of copper wire valued at more than \$2,000 was stolen.

Lynn County deputies called to the scene found part of camouflage shirt burned, and blood on some rocks. A check with hospitals turned up the suspects, two of whom had taken the third to the Post hospital.

A home burglary in the county also was quickly solved. David Eaker, 4.5 miles of O'Donnell, saw a pickup leaving rapidly from near his home, and Richard Rodriguez, 30, of Lubbock, later was arrested and charged with burglary of the Eaker residence.

A home owned by Mrs. Ruth Mathis of Floydada on FM 212 in Lynn County was reported on May 1 as having been burglarized. Items totaling \$5357 in value were listed as stolen, including a satellite dish and control system, 21-inch Zenith color TV, Sony stereo, Sharp microwave and two Lazy-Boy recliners.

Karen Young, 3.5 miles north of FM 211 on FM 179, reported a 1981 Mercury taken from near the home Tuesday. The car later was recovered in Hockley County.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated three vehicle accidents during the week. An accident last Thursday at the intersection of Lockwood and Main involved a 1981 International

truck driven by Theodore Monroe Goddard of Lubbock and a 1986 GMC pickup driven by Claude Junior Meeks of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

On Friday at Lynn County Hospital parking lot, a wreck involved a 1986 International truck driven by Billy Ritch Johnson of Lamesa and a parked 1990 Lincoln owned by C.T. Louder of Tahoka. There were no injuries.

Officers investigated a collision on Monday at 2200 N. 4th between a 1984 GMC Suburban driven by Carol Jean Miller of Tahoka and a 1988 GMC pickup driven by Gloria Gamez DeLeon of Tahoka. No one was reported injured.

Jimmie Tejada reported to police Monday that someone had cut one Tiger Paw tire valued at \$100, on her 1987 Buick while it was parked in her driveway.

Police arrested a 26-year-old Tahoka man last week for driving while intoxicated, possession of drug paraphernalia and no liability insurance. Another Tahoka man also was arrested for DWI during the week.

These two plus two of the suspects in the substation incident and the burglary suspect from Lubbock were jailed during the week, and Lynn County also received four new federal prisoners to hold pending federal court action.

THE WEATHER last weekend was "not conducive to outside activities," as the weather people say on TV and radio. In some places, including a couple of spots I visited, this would be a considerable understatement, and a better description would be "not fit for humans to be out in."

Whether you were wanting to paint the fence, work in the yard or garden, play in a golf tournament or ride a bicycle or motorcycle out on the open road, you would have been better off staying at home and playing scrabble. Fishing was not good, either, although there was plenty of water where we went.

It was a masterpiece of careful planning which caused us to schedule our annual motorcycle trip downstate last weekend, with plans to spend the night at Lake Brownwood and then proceed into East Texas. (AT Lake Brownwood is not bad; IN Lake Brownwood is a little much).

Anyway, to make the story brief, only one motorcyclist got to the Lake, and managed to get back out to the north the next day. Another (me) spent an exciting night alone in a motel room in Cross Plains, and eight other bikers, warned by phone to stay away from central and east Texas, took off for Alamogordo and Arizona. They returned Monday, bucking high winds and partially frozen.

Anybody who gets the news knows that Brownwood was flooded out, the lake was higher than it has ever been in history and there was a lot of damage after the 14 inches of rain which fell in about that many hours.

I have a feeling that this was one of those rare natural weather phenomena which will grow with the telling in future years. Twenty or thirty years from now, oldtimers will be telling how it rained 29 inches and every house in Brownwood was under water. In the late 50s, when we lived in Indiana, we kept hearing about the big snow of 1916, and every year that big snow got an inch or two deeper.

We got out of the Brownwood area, switched to an automobile and drove on into East Texas last weekend, but we had to make a couple of detours (the Bosque River was 8 feet deep across the road near Clifton, for example, according to the highway department worker who turned us back). A bridge washed out near Rising Star. Some of the rivers and creeks got so high you could see under them.

We finally got the two-wheelers home Saturday, when the wind was blowing, and golfers in a tournament out west of town were getting their eyes, ears and mouths full of dirt trying to play their little games.

Anyway, we will remember that trip better than the ones where nothing unusual happened.



Cholesterol Screening Set May 19

A blood cholesterol screening will be held in Tahoka at the Lynn County Show Barn, Saturday, May 19, from 4 to 8 p.m. Also available are triglyceride and glucose screenings, all sponsored by the Red Cross.

A fee of \$6 for each test will be charged for these quick, painless and accurate tests. A finger-stick method is utilized to obtain the blood samples. Results from the tests can be obtained within 3 to 5 minutes per test. The National Institute of Health has estimated that half of adult Americans have cholesterol levels that are higher than desirable; 10 percent have severe elevations and 25 percent moderate or severe.

Elevated blood cholesterol is a major cause of coronary heart disease. Only 7 percent of the general public know their cholesterol level, yet health officials agree it is a vital statistic to know and to take action on.

The next meeting will be in the home of Edna White on May 8.





Farm Safety Requires Joint Effort

Agriculture continues to be one of this country's most dangerous occupations. The dangers associated with farming are as diverse as agriculture itself.

"The difference between farming and other occupations is that farming is a way of life, not just an 8 to 5 job," said Sammy Sims, Manager of Taylor Tractor & Equipment Co., Inc. in Tahoka. "That's why farm safety needs to be a concern of everyone involved with agriculture."

"Safety is often as simple as common sense and taking the time to think about the job we are doing," said Sims. "But if there is uncertainty about specific farm equipment safety practices, there are many sources of information to consult."

Sims said operator manuals are a good source of safety information. "Operator manuals contain much more than just proper service and maintenance tips. They also provide vital safety information about specific pieces of equipment."

"Farm safety doesn't just happen," said Sims. "Teaching by example sets the safety example for our families and employees."

"It's especially important to set a safety example for children," noted Sims, "because they imitate the behavior of their parents and older children."

Sims offered several basic farm safety tips including:

- Never allow riders on any farm equipment;

- Be certain the original manufacturer's safety equipment is functioning properly and is in good repair;

- Think about safety at all times.

"Common sense, knowing the equipment, setting the safety example and following some basic safety rules are the first steps to making agriculture a safer place," concluded Sims. "It requires attention from all of us."

Private Applicator License Program Slated May 8

Lynn County producers will have the opportunity to complete training to meet one of the requirements for obtaining a private applicator license at a program scheduled May 8 beginning at 9 a.m. in the community center in O'Donnell, according to Brett Cyper, County Extension Agent.

To become a licensed private applicator, a producer must attend a Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training program, make a passing score on a Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator examination and submit an application to TDA along with a required \$50 fee. The TDA private applicator license is valid for 5 years.

Texas Department of Agriculture personnel will offer testing at the same location beginning at 1 p.m. on May 8. Persons who plan to attend the training session and take the TDA test are encouraged to obtain a copy of "Using Pesticides - Private Applicator Manual" from the County Extension Office for review and study prior to the training session.
