

# Students Blast Off In Space Shuttle Program

"Countdown: 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1. We have lift-off!" The crowd cheered when the 'Tahoka Starlight Space Shuttle' launched from in front of Tahoka Schools at 10 a.m. Friday, May 18, in what was the first attempt by an elementary school in this part of Texas to simulate the Space Shuttle Challenger program sponsored by the National Aeronautics Space Administration (NASA). Tahoka second grade teacher Susie Rhodes was instrumental in bringing the program to Tahoka I.S.D., and worked closely via tele-

phone with officials at NASA's Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center in Houston to emulate as closely as possible the astronaut training and selection, pre-launch preparations, payload specialists, shuttle launching procedures, ground crew technicians and post-flight procedures implemented by NASA. All Tahoka second grade students participated in the program with 15 astronauts selected to man the "Zooming Kids Space Shuttle" and other students performing duties such as ground crew technicians, security, public relations, scientists, medical person-

nel, etc. at the "Tahoka Starlight Space Center" mission control, which was based in the second grade classrooms.  
"If the real Space Shuttle had been in orbit at the time we blasted off in our Tahoka Space Shuttle, NASA indicated that we could have actually talked to Houston's Mission Control and Shuttle personnel through ham radio and satellite transmitters," said Mrs. Rhodes. "That would have really thrilled my students!"  
The Tahoka Space Shuttle was actually a school bus that had been

transformed by Tahoka Jaycees to resemble a space shuttle. They removed some seats from the inside of the bus to make room for desks for payload specialists to conduct their experiments while "in flight" on the shuttle, and painted the "shuttle" with black and white tempera paints.  
The astronauts went on the flight to conduct various experiments, but of course never actually left the ground. The flight route covered 56 "orbital" miles during the 3-1/2 hour mission duration, blasting off at 10 a.m. and "landing" at Tahoka T-Bar Airport Runway 17 at 1:30 p.m. The

flight plan included stops at "Planet Wilson" where the students met "alien beings" from Wilson Elementary, and then proceeded to "Planet New Home" where the aliens invited the astronauts to join them for lunch in the New Home School cafeteria. From there, the shuttle "flew" (at a top speed of 35 mph) to the T-Bar Ranch where the crew conducted experiments before "landing" at the T-Bar Airport.  
The student astronauts were "sequestered" on the evening before lift-off, just as real astronauts are. The 15-member crew brought sleep-

ing bags and space suits (each was responsible for having his/her own suit made) to the Tahoka Elementary library after school Thursday, and studied their various duties and responsibilities before settling down for the night (about midnight, according to students). They had a wake-up call at 6:45 a.m. on launch day, and were served breakfast at 7:45. At 8:10 a.m., student medical personnel checked the astronauts for vital signs, including blood pressure, pulse and temperature, and at 8:30 the astronauts suited up and received last minute briefing.

At 9 a.m., student security personnel cleared the launch area, and at 9:05 the astronauts boarded a transfer van in front of the school, which took them to the shuttle area for pre-launch ceremonies.  
A large crowd of cheering students, parents and well-wishers were on hand at the ceremonies to view the "blast off," including State Representative David Counts, Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon, Tahoka I.S.D. Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter, and Elementary Principal Molly Helmlinger, as well as all students and teachers in elementary, the Tahoka Bulldog Band, parents, and some junior high and high school students. Three television stations from Lubbock covered the event as well.

At the pre-launch ceremonies, Tahoka Space Shuttle Commander John-Michael Jay led the crowd in the Pledge of Allegiance. Rep. Counts presented the Texas flag which was flown over the State Capitol on that day (Friday) to space shuttle pilot Kassidi Andrews, and gave a short speech, saying he thought Tahoka Elementary was doing an excellent job in creative teaching techniques and that he was "very impressed" with the elementary space shuttle program.

It was later learned that Rep. Counts was going to compose a resolution in Austin commending Mrs. Rhodes for her "outstanding teaching techniques".

Mayor Solomon, Dr. Carter and Miss Helmlinger also addressed the

## 93 Graduating From County Schools

Ninety-three seniors are scheduled to graduate from the four high schools in Lynn County within the next week, starting with commencement exercises tonight (Thursday) in O'Donnell High School auditorium, a combination baccalaureate and

commencement program. O'Donnell has 27 seniors, with Brad Snellgrove class valedictorian and Christie Parker salutatorian. Tahoka's commencement is Friday night, Wilson's is Saturday night and New Home's ceremonies will be

next Tuesday.  
At 8 p.m. Friday in the school gymnasium, 46 Tahoka High School seniors are scheduled to receive diplomas. High school Principal Charles Cate will introduce valedictorian Arron Miller and salutatorian Amy Holland, and later will present the graduating class. Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent, will present awards and Joe Hays, president of the school board, will present the diplomas.  
A special presentation will be made by senior class president Connie Parker and Miller will perform special music. The Tahoka High School band also will take part in the ceremonies.

On Saturday evening, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Wilson High School auditorium, commencement will be held for seven candidates for graduation. Robin Lyn Wheeler, daughter of Jack and Jackye Woody and Gary Wheeler, is valedictorian of the class, and Melissa Tobias Hernandez, daughter of Adrian and Ester Rodriguez, is salutatorian.  
Miss Wheeler has been in band four years and was chosen for the all-region and bi-state bands, and was a state qualifier in baritone solo for two years. She is senior class president and has been an officer in Future Homemakers of America, and has excelled in debate. She plans to attend Texas Tech for a pre-med major.  
Miss Hernandez was a varsity cheerleader two years and played basketball. She has been president of FHA and president of the Christian Youth Organization. She was named the outstanding math/science/computer science student in 1990. She plans to attend South Plains College and major in accounting.

I DID AN informal survey of six persons (three males) around the dinner table the other evening, and to my surprise, although they are all younger than I am, not even the males knew about Candy Barr, Bubbles Cash or Morganna.

Morganna is the stripper who runs out onto football and baseball fields and basketball courts, disrupting the game until she is arrested and hauled away, and who claims to have a 60-inch bust. And she said that Ann Richards "is not the great white granny hope" and is not representative of most Texans. "But she did beat out General Jimbo, and that was good," she said in reference to Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox.

Her measurements were not given, although it's certain they aren't as, uh, staggering as Morganna's. Still—and I have no idea how many votes she'll get in November—it is likely that in most races she would finish away out in front.

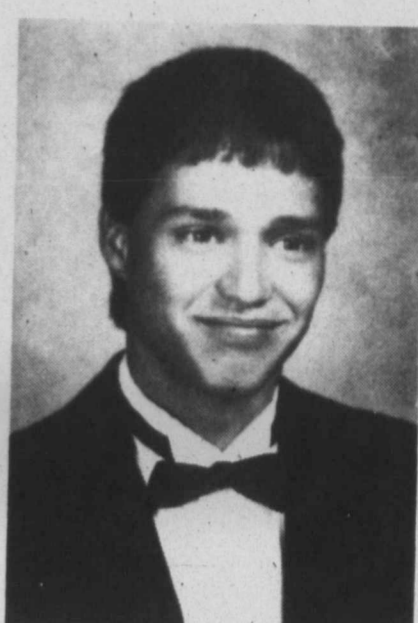
**MANUEL DELOS SANTOS**

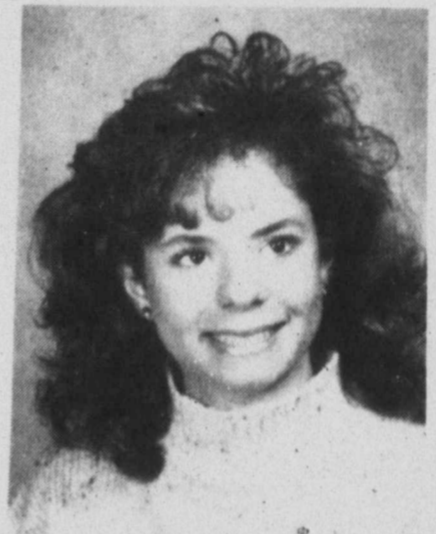

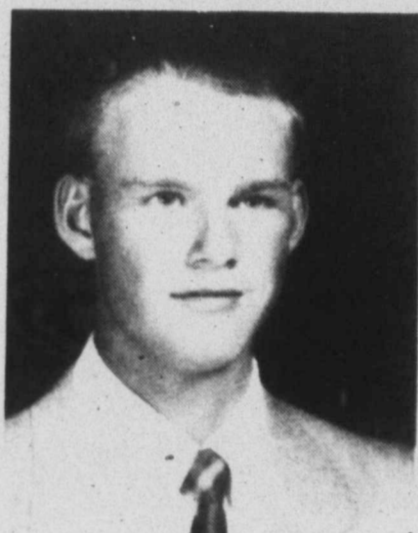
**JACOB LOWE**

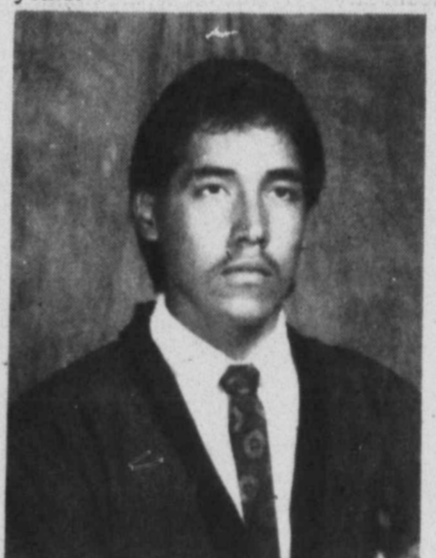

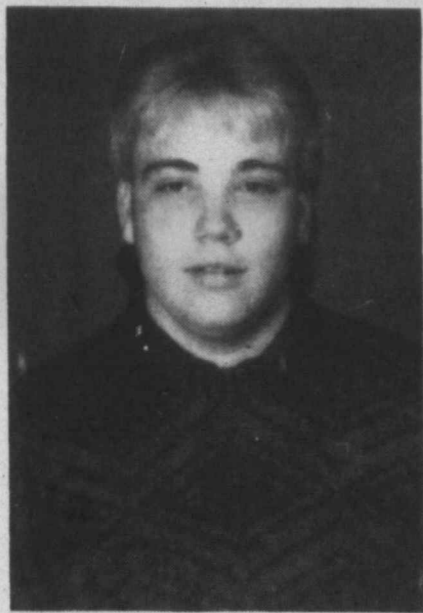

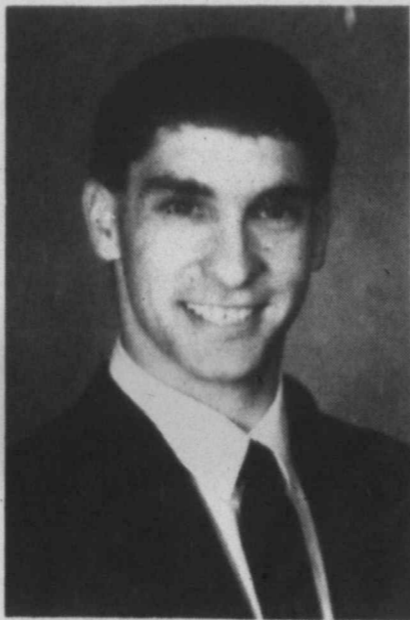
**LANCE GILLIAM**

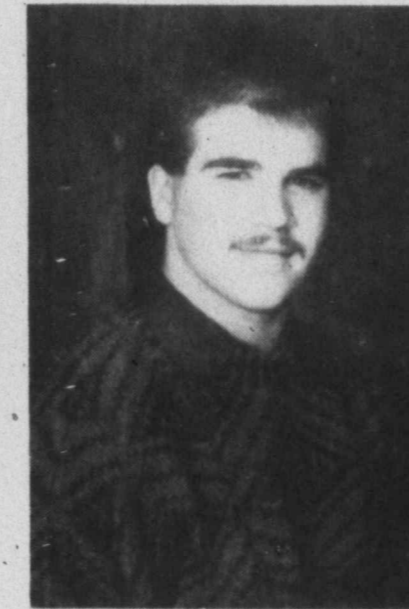
**VICTOR RESENDEZ**

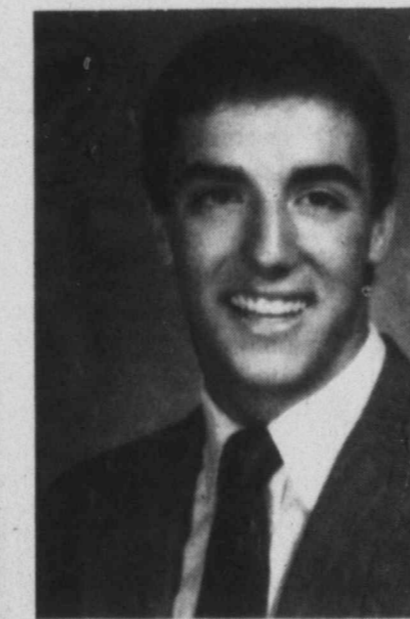
**CHRISTINA GARZA**

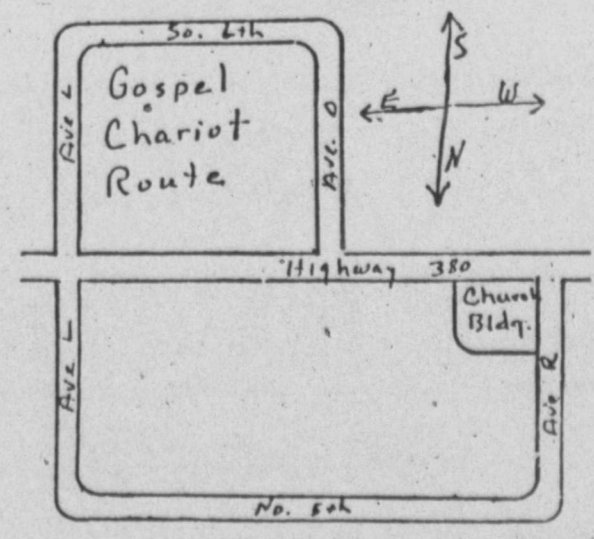

Electrical Perils Draw Warning

As warm weather draws more people outdoors, Southwestern Public Service Co. (SPS) is reminding its customers to be careful around power lines and electrical facilities.

"We say all year to watch up for power lines, but it's especially appropriate to issue an additional reminder as people begin to spend more time outdoors," said Doyle Webb, SPS's Tahoka local manager. "People are trimming trees, repairing roofs and doing other things around the house that could bring them into contact with overhead lines."

Violent spring storms can create other hazards, Webb warned.

"If anyone sees a downed power line, stay away and don't touch anything the line is touching. Keep others away, and contact the electric company immediately," Webb said. "A downed line can be completely free of sparks but still can be very 'live' and dangerous."

There are many other safety tips to keep in mind this time of year, according to Webb. For example, farmers handling irrigation equipment should be especially careful.

"Metal irrigation pipe is an excellent conductor of electricity," Webb said. "Moving a tall section of irrigation pipe or lifting it to dislodge a rabbit or other animal inside could be fatal if there's a power line overhead."

Another common springtime activity is installing evaporative coolers. These are potential hazards, he warned.

"By the time you get a metal cooler up, you're standing in a puddle of water. Metal and water are both good conductors of electricity, so make sure your unit is grounded. Don't plug in the cooler until everything is hooked up. If you have to make any last-minute adjustments, be sure to unplug the unit first," he says.

Children also should be warned to play safely as they begin to spend more time outdoors.

"Parents should teach their kids to stay away from utility substations and poles," Webb says. "If a kite gets tangled in a power line, they should never try to get it down by themselves. And they should check any tree they are about to climb into for power lines."

Annis Godfrey MILDEW REMOVAL FOR ANTIQUES

You love antiques, but when you bring them into your home they sometimes bring a musty smell. You may be able to enjoy your antiques without the smell. Here's how:

To remove musty odors in enclosed parts of the furniture — open drawers or cabinet doors, for example, first open drawers and doors to air. Next, wash and scrub the insides thoroughly with a mild soap and hot water. Be careful not to soak the wood. Quickly dry damp surface with towel and leave doors and drawers open for a day or two. When thoroughly dried and aired, spray with a cedar deodorizer or place your favorite sachet of potpourri inside to keep it smelling fresh.

To rid old wicker of mildew, rub the mildewed spots with a cloth dipped in a mixture of ammonia and water. The cleaning cloth should be squeezed well to avoid saturating the wood, which could discolor it. Give cleaned areas a mild salt-water bath and dry in the sun.

To clean a mildewed rug or piece of tapestry, take it outside and brush away any loose mold. If you do this indoors, you could inadvertently spread the mold spores throughout the house. Vacuum away loosened mold and dispose of vacuum bags immediately in an outdoor trash can. Use a fan to dry damp spots. Remove mildew stains with a rug shampoo. If an item is badly stained or too delicate to treat, take it to a professional antique restorer.

To clean dirty, mildewed leather-bound books, use saddle soap. Work a damp sponge into a lather by rubbing it on the soap then apply the sponge on the leather covers in gentle circular motions. Pass a clean, damp sponge over soaped areas until soap is gone, then dry. Buff with a shoe cream in a matching color to restore the leather's suppleness.

crowd before the astronauts boarded the shuttle for lift-off procedures. The astronauts were in voice contact via ham radio with Mission Control at all times, and weather conditions and shuttle preparations were heard by the crowd. At "T-Minus 15 Minutes" a Mission Control weather specialist reported the temperature to be 68 degrees, the wind at "uh — windy" and "all systems are go." Just before the astronauts boarded the shuttle, the Tahoka Band played "America" while the crowd joined in singing. The astronauts all gave a jubilant "thumbs-up" signal and boarded the shuttle. At precisely 10 a.m. the shuttle "blasted off" for

"Space: the final frontier." At a cruising speed of 35 mph and "ground level" altitude, Communicator Jenny Walls confirmed shuttle procedures with Mission Control with the help of volunteer ham radio operator, Dale Huguley of Lubbock. The cargo and payload consisted of 15 astronauts, five adults, radio equipment, maps, barometers, soil samples, meteorological equipment, aerial equipment, biological specimens, (including white laboratory rats) and physics equipment.

Other than Cdr. Jay, Pilot Andrews, and Communicator Walls, the crew consisted of Medical Specialist Brian Alvarado and Kevin Rodriguez; Meteorologists Amie Lopez and Brad Pebsworth; Physics Engineers Shana Harris and Albert Gutierrez; Biologists Christie Garcia and Raquel Garcia; Geologists Valerie Lopez and Becky Salinas; and Aerial Technicians Julian Resendez and Shayla Lawson, all second grade students. Adults on board were Flight Director Susie Rhodes (teacher), video camcorder operator Pat Williams, ham radio operator Dale Huguley, driver Anna Vaca, and Lynn County News journalist Juanell Jones.

The commander and pilot were mission leaders who organized the crew and directed the shuttle flight route. They were also responsible for time, mileage, and speed data records. Communicator Walls maintained communications between shuttle and mission control at all times. Aerial Technicians Resendez and Lawson were responsible for launching helium balloons "satellites" and Biologists Garcia and Salinas collected plant and insect specimens from landing sites and analyzed them to make scientific hypotheses regarding the area. They also observed some white laboratory rats in a cage on board the shuttle, making notations during preflight, flight, and postflight time periods.

Geologists Salinas and V. Lopez collected rock and soil specimens to analyze and compare with those from the space center, and Meteorologists A. Lopez and Pebsworth used standard and student-made instruments to record vital weather statistics at predetermined sites during the flight. They recorded the data in a weather log.

Physics Engineers Harris and Gutierrez conducted physics experiments related to the effects of motion aboard the space shuttle, studying the effects of flight on a top, a paddleball, a gyroscope, ball and jacks, and a yo-yo. They also conducted experiments on the effects of a moving environment on human dexterity, liquid behavior, and mechanical manipulation.

The medical team of Alvarado and Rodriguez were on board to supervise and care for the astronauts, recording vital signs and observing

crew behavior during preflight, flight, and postflight activities. Each crew member had a medical profile.

When the shuttle landed at "Planet Wilson" a crowd of alien Planet Wilson Elementary students were on hand with signs that read "Greetings Earthlings". The aliens proved to be friendly (although some claimed to be "people eaters"), and Cdr. Jay presented them with a flag bearing the symbol of the U.S.A. and the Tahoka Starlight Space Center. After visiting with the aliens and collecting data, the astronauts boarded the shuttle and headed for "Planet New Home." The alien students at New Home proved to be friendly also, and after presenting them with a TSSC flag, they invited the hungry shuttle crew to lunch at the school cafeteria. The crew enjoyed a meal of "space" tacos, salad and beans before venturing outside to conduct more experiments and communicate with the aliens on the school playground.

The aliens bid the astronauts farewell and invited them to "come back anytime" and then the shuttle blasted off for "Galaxy T-Bar" where the astronauts conducted more experiments at the T-Bar Ranch; and enjoyed a space snack. The only mishaps that occurred during the flight was a rubber ball which was "lost in space" between Planet Wilson and Planet New Home when it rolled down the interior of the shuttle during flight and escaped through the "hatch" (a small open area at the base of the bus doors), much to the delight of the young crew, and a narrow escape from injury when Cdr. Jay stepped into a cactus at Galaxy T-Bar. There were no space monsters encountered, and Cdr. Jay said he felt his crew was never in any danger during the flight. The only area that was off-limits to the payload specialists was an area at the ranch where some alien space-cows showed a flagrant disregard for the white-suited astronauts. Flight Director Rhodes said she didn't think the biologists needed any specimens from the alien cows.

The shuttle headed for the T-Bar Airport at approximately 1:30 p.m., where a large crowd was on hand to welcome the astronauts back to Earth, getting only a glimpse of the crew as they quickly boarded a school van which took them to "debriefing" before the press confer-

ence and post-flight award ceremonies held at Tahoka Elementary.

All in all, the program was a great success, with much of the credit going to Mrs. Rhodes, who has worked diligently on the project since January. She explained that she has been on NASA's mailing list for several years, and in January she heard about an extensive program conducted with schools in Ohio. She contacted NASA in Houston, who invited her to bring her students to the Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center for a field trip, not realizing where she was calling from. When she explained that Tahoka was "just a little too far away" officials were very cooperative in helping her plan the program. She worked with NASA through many phone conversations to organize the space shuttle program here, and said, "They were extremely helpful and cooperative, and told me this was the first time a simulated blast-off project had been conducted by an elementary school this far from Houston."

Mrs. Rhodes hopes to make this an annual project for the second graders at Tahoka Elementary, adding she hoped the other schools in the county would also participate and have traveling space shuttles visit from each school on the same day.

"I couldn't have done this project without all the volunteer help I've had," she commented. "Without the help from the Jaycees, Chamberettes, Rotary Club, First Baptist Church, volunteer ham radio operators, school and city officials, parents, and the citizens of Tahoka, the Tahoka Space Shuttle project would never have been organized. I also appreciate Chief Deputy Jake Diggs with the Tahoka Sheriff's Dept. who escorted our shuttle throughout the day. There are too many people to mention by name, but I really appreciate them all," she added.

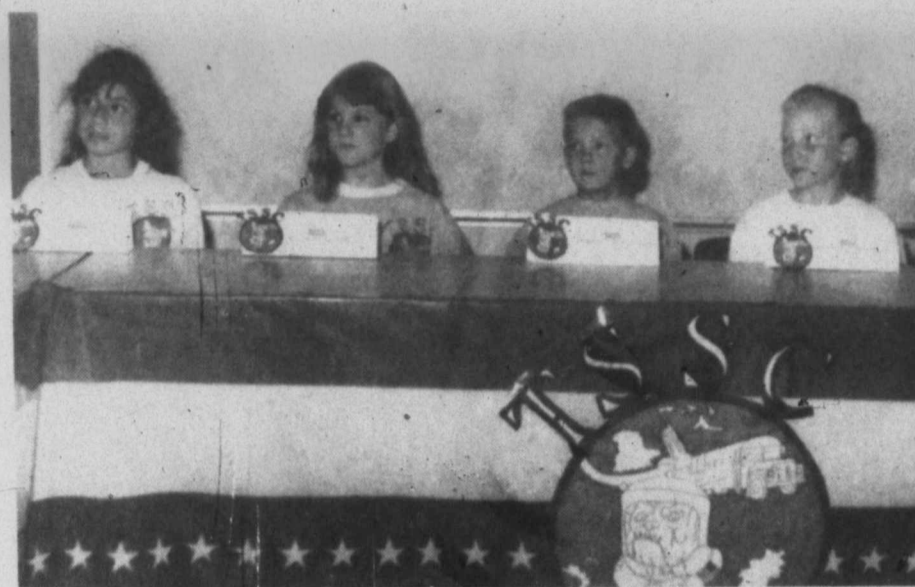

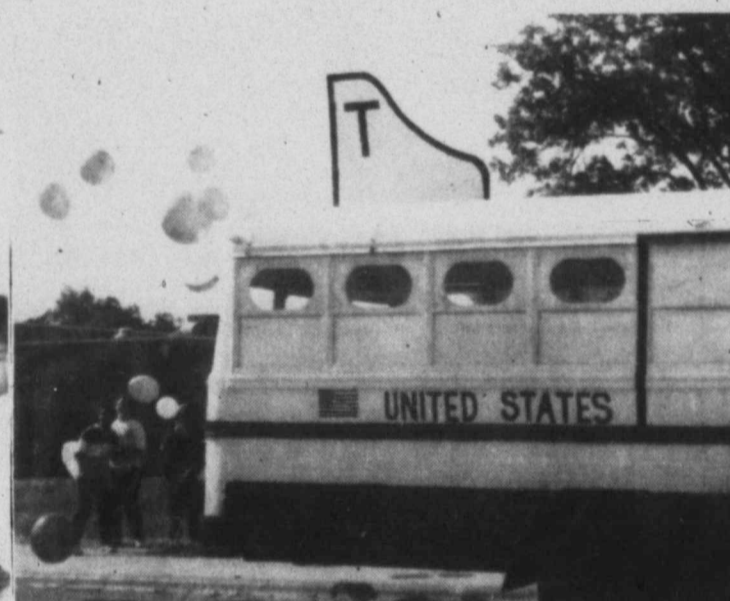

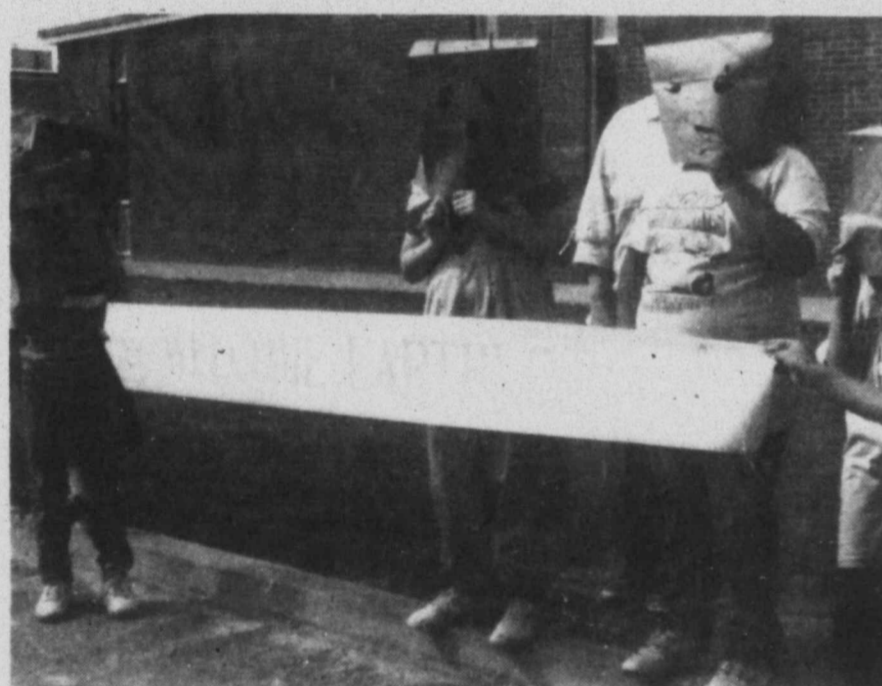
### Garys To Celebrate 50th Anniversary

### Coalition Plan To Change Farm Policy Is Criticized

A coalition in Congress purporting to save money by changing farm policy would actually destroy a program that has produced for American consumers the most abundant, lowest-cost and safest food supply in the world, according to S.M. True, president of Texas Farm Bureau. Congress is now considering farm policy to succeed the farm act that expires at the end of this year. "The coalition, led by Texas congressman Dick Armey (R), and an unusual cast of northeastern members of Congress including Rep. Barney Frank (D-Mass), Charles Schumer (D-NY) and Claudine Schneider (D-RI), has no idea of what it takes to bring safe, plentiful food to the table," True said. The Texas farm leader said the group has targeted programs for peanuts, wool and mohair, dairy and

sugar in the quest to "create havoc" in the agricultural economy. "This is a strange strategy because wool and mohair price support comes from tariff revenues while peanut and sugar prices are supported primarily by quotas, rather than general revenue money. "The present farm program, most of which we hope will be continued for another five years, has stabilized income for farmers and has helped us expand exports, which has benefited all Americans," added the Plainview farmer. He said the cost of food to the average American family is the lowest in the world, with one American farmer now supplying food and fiber for 114 persons. "The anti-farmer amendments, if adopted, would disrupt the most efficient farm-to-table food system in the world," True said.

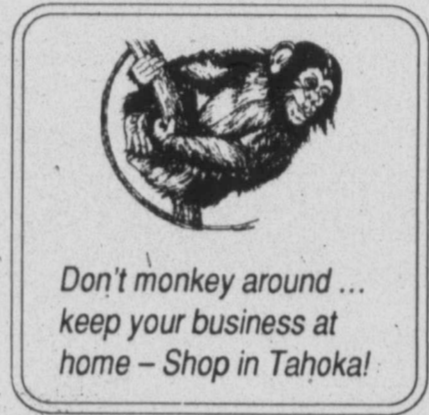

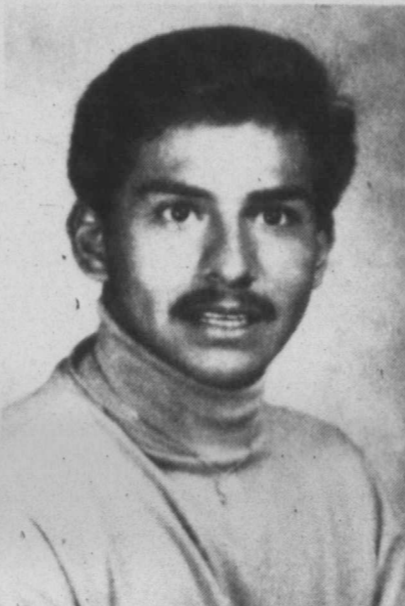

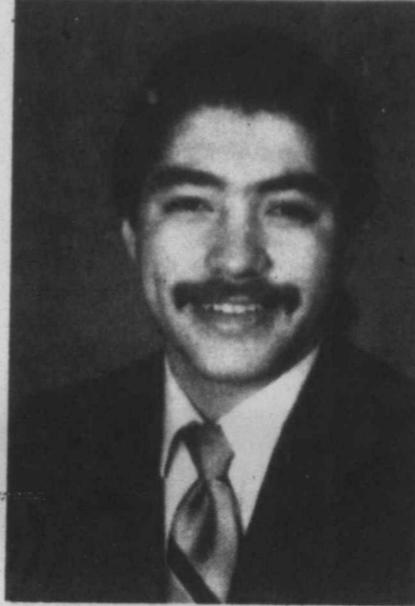

## Scholarships Are Prizes At Texas 4-H Roundup

Eva Gicklhorn will participate in the 4-H Method Demonstration part of Roundup.

Texas has the nation's largest 4-H scholarships program, and it continues to grow with tremendous support from the private sector, said Dr. Lance Bullard, 4-H youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and executive director of the Texas 4-H Foundation.
