Five Charges Filed After OD Incident

A 23-year-old O'Donnell man was taken to Lynn County jail after a series of incidents in O'Donnell Wednesday, June 6.

The suspect was charged with breaking the window of a 1985 Dodge pickup owned by James Williams of O'Donnell. Lynn County Deputy Will Turner chased the suspect down and arrested him after a struggle. The suspect was charged with criminal mischief, destruction of property, resisting arrest, disorderly conduct and application to revoke his probation on a prior charge of driving while intoxicated.

Vaga Pebsworth of Tahoka reported that several items had been stolen at a farm 15 miles southeast of Tahoka about May 9. Stolen were a radio off a John Deere tractor, a fence charger, two batteries and one 1100-16 tractor tire. Total value of the stolen articles was set at \$730.57.

Noel Tijerina, 24, of Tahoka, pleaded guilty in district court Tuesday of charge of aggravated assault involving a slashing incident May 30, 1989, in which another Tahoka man was cut on the head. Judge George Hansard assessed a one-year probated sentence and ordered Tijerina to pay restitution to the man who was wounded.

Jerry Isbell, 2023 N. 7th, reported to Tahoka police Saturday that someone had stolen a Murray 10-speed bicycle valued at \$100 from his residence Friday night or early Saturday.

Ten new prisoners were jailed during the week, including the O'Donnell suspect, two for DWI, one for DWI plus attempted burglary of a habitation, one for DWI plus speeding and no insurance, one for DWI and fleeing from a peace officer, one DWI second offense, one DWI plus possession of cocaine, one held for federal authorities, one for public intoxication.

BUGS BUNNY is 50 years old this year, and in observance of his birthday—and also with an eye toward making a lot of money out of the deal—AstroWorld in Houston is planning some special attractions, including a couple of new shows, tied into the cwazy wabbit's anniversary.

The two new shows are the "Bugs Bunny Birthday Revue" and the "Bugs Bunny Fireworks Extravaganza". The revue is professionally-choreographed song and dance show which include audience participation by both children and adults. Sylvester, Porky Pig and Daffy Duck also are included in the revue.

Among other rabbitry things on display at AstroWorld this season, already open daily, is a 23-foot Bugs Bunny balloon (which my granddaughter would probably want to take home, if she should see it).

The thing that really irks me about Bugs Bunny (and Mickey Mouse, and Little Orphan Annie and Dorian Grey) is that they don't look any older than they did when they were created. At 50, Bugs ought to have some grey hares.

According to the folks at AstroWorld, it is generally acknowledged that on July 27, 1940, Tex Avery, "the father of Warner Bros. cartoons," developed the picture that marked the true birth of Bugs Bunny. Titled "A Wild Hare," the cartoon featured the character that is easily recognized today as Bugs Bunny.

It was also in "A Wild Hare" that Mel Blanc coined Bugs' voice. "They showed me the storyboard and told me this rabbit was real tough little stinker," said the late legendary voice man. He said he figured the toughest voices had to be Brooklyn and the Bronx.

It was also in "A Wild Hare" that Bugs first uttered his immortal "What's Up, Doc?" which was very popular with movie-goers.

I wonder if anybody 50 years from now will remember Roger Rabbit.

By the way, ticket prices for AstroWorld are \$18.50 plus tax for adults, but in celebration of Bugs' 50th birthday, children under 48 inches are admitted for half the price of the adult one-day ticket.

If I go to AstroWorld this year I will try for the 48-inch fare. I think I can just barely come under that, lying down.

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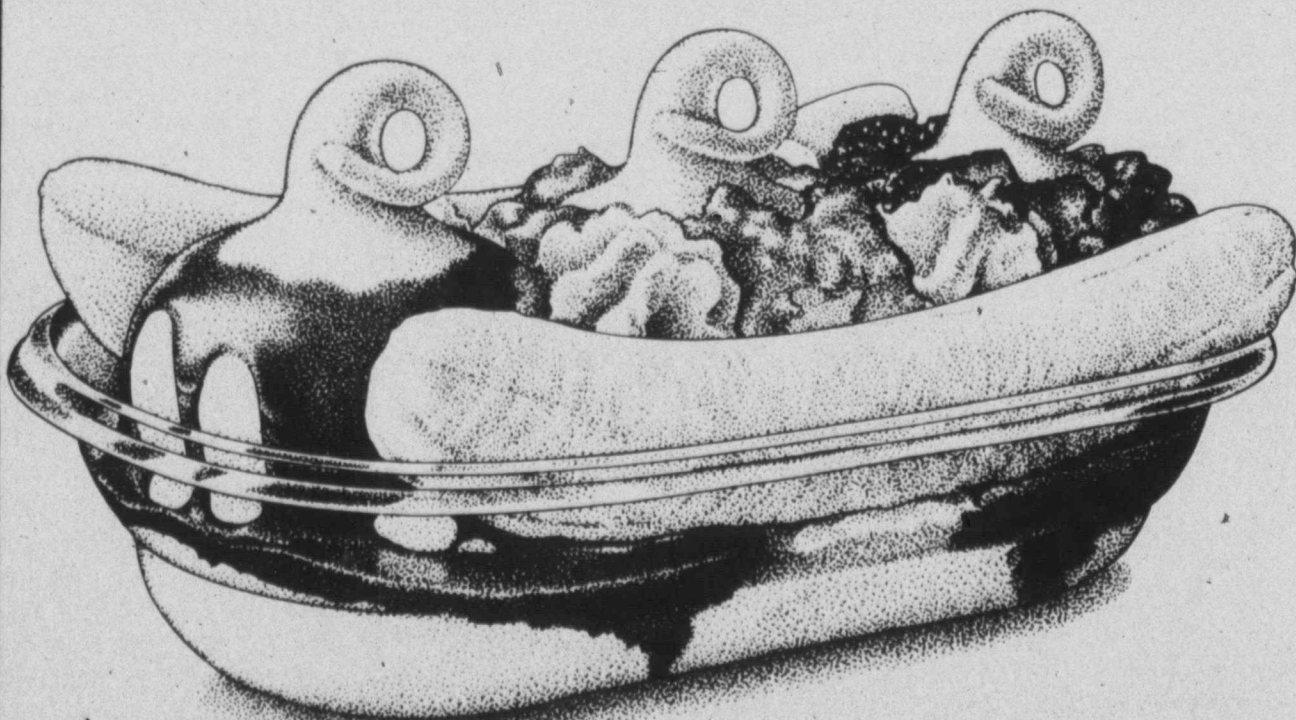

Former Tahokan Father Of In Vitro Fertilization Twins

When twin boys were born to David and Natalie Aycock of Lubbock June 6, it made news all around the area, but there was an added interest in Tahoka, because the father of the twins born as a result of a process called in vitro fertilization is a former resident of Tahoka.

Lois Thornton of Tahoka Care Center said this week that the twin boys are the grandchildren of Mrs. Orban Aycock who moved from Tahoka to Lubbock only a few months ago. The twins' grandfather, Orban Aycock, died several years ago. Mrs. Thornton is an aunt of the newborn boys.

The boys, named Ethan and Nathaniel, were born in Lubbock Methodist Hospital after getting their start in a Denver, Colo., infertility clinic eight months ago. They were born six weeks premature.

"We're definitely going to tell them," their mother was quoted in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

"When they get old, it (in vitro fertilization) will be more commonplace."

One of the boys weighed 5 pounds and the other 4 pounds 12 ounces. A dozen of Natalie's eggs were retrieved through a perforation in her bladder, according to the Lubbock newspaper, and the eggs were fertilized in a laboratory with her husband's sperm and implanted in her uterus.

The success rate for the Denver clinic reportedly is 15 to 20 per cent.

Since the first "test tube baby" was born in 1978, 15,000 babies have been born to couples worldwide through in vitro fertilization.

Sales Tax Rebates Told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office sent checks totaling \$83.3 million in local sales tax rebates to cities and counties in Texas.

Merchants collect the sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 percent share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

Tahoka received \$3,056.64 net payment this period compared to \$3,673.46 for prior year and \$29,558.35 payments to date compared to \$32,595.35 for same period in 1989.

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Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has instituted a Class Action Lawsuit seeking judicial approval of a settlement reached in Docket No. 7297, an inquiry of General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission of Texas into possible overcharges which occurred between September, 1976, and February, 1987, due to rounding practices, on bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff. The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.

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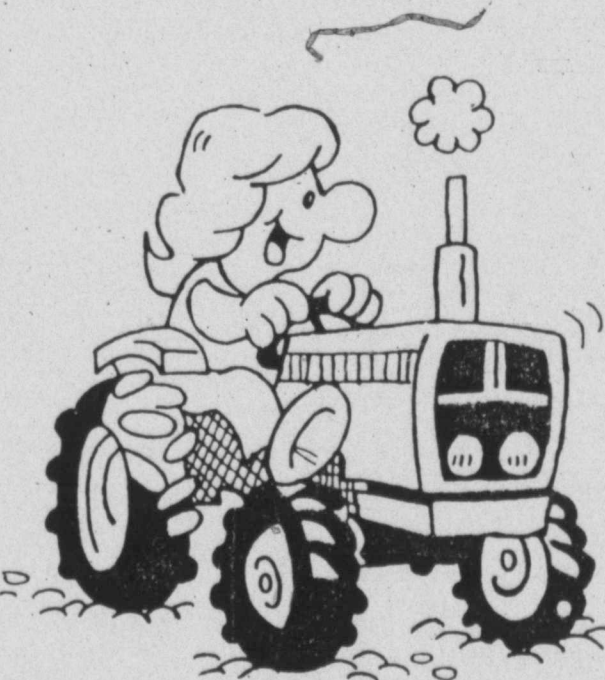
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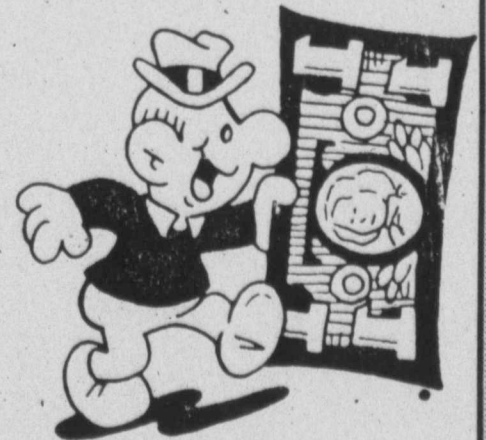
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Wilson News

Price variability is a major source of risk facing cotton producers, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Typically, farmers are in a better position to manipulate the factors that determine yields than the factors that determine prices.

"The producer cannot control the price, but he can control how and when he prices," said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Service economist and management specialist at Lubbock. For farmers to understand how they can reduce their price risk, they must understand the alternative marketing strategies available to them, Smith said.

To help farmers do this, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will conduct a two day workshop June 26-27 at the Dawson County Community building. This in-depth session will include 12 hours of training and will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day.

Knowing when to "price" his crop is one of the most difficult decisions farmers make all year, said Smith. South Plains cotton farmers are currently having to make such decisions. They can price their cotton now, at some time before harvest, or wait and sell after harvest.

The most often-used method of pricing on the South Plains is the cas-

sale at harvest. This method is likely to require only limited storage and other selling costs but the price received is dictated by the market at the time of the exchange and selling at harvest is not likely to result in the season's high price.

Recent strength in the cotton market, however, has provided area cotton farmers the opportunity to price new crop cotton 12 to 13 cents above loan. To use this opportunity, Smith suggest that farmers use the futures market by purchasing put options (price insurance) or taking advantage of available cash contracts.

The workshop here will provide market updates as well as basic training in various pricing alternatives available to area cotton farmers. The cost of the workshop is \$20. A notebook and materials on futures and options will be provided. Spouses are encouraged to attend. The \$20 fee covers both. To register, pick up a form at your local county agent's office.

Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension Service economist specializing in cotton marketing, from College Station, will be the featured speaker.

For more information, contact your local county extension agent. Preregistration of at least 15 people is required by June 15 or the workshop will be cancelled.

Rabies Vaccine Clinic Scheduled At Wilson June 20

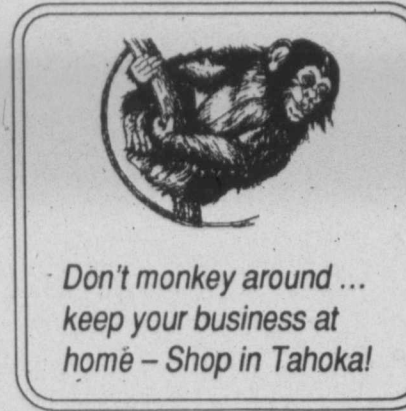
