Skeleton Is Found West Of Tahoka

The skeleton of a person who apparently had been murdered was found last week at a gravel pit about nine miles west of Tahoka. The site of the discovery is less than a mile north of U.S. 380 and easily accessible to anyone seeking to dispose of a body.

Large rocks had been piled on top of the body, which was face down at the bottom of the pit, on the south side. Lynn County Chief Deputy Sheriff Jake Diggs, who had been searching the area, found the spot where the bones were located Saturday morning. Feeling pretty certain that underneath the pile of rocks was the skeleton for which officers had been searching, Sheriff Jack Miller contacted a Texas Tech anthropologist to direct the removal of the skele-

In May a Tahoka Elementary student exploring the pit area found a skull and later took it to school to a science class. School officials notified the sheriff and officers had looked around the area previously trying to locate the rest of the skele-

Dr. Neven P. Lamb, chairman of the Anthropology Dept. at Texas

Tech, had previously looked at the size and manufacturer's name on a skull and he came to the site Saturday to help remove the rest of the bones.

Dr. Lamb at first said the remains were definitely those of an adult female, probably an older woman, but later he backed off that statement, saying it could be a male. He added that it is difficult to determine how long the bones had been at the site, but that "months to years" would describe it best, and he added that they possibly had been there as long as five years.

There was no immediate indication of the cause of death, but Dr. Lamb and Lynn County Sheriff Miller were of the opinion that murder was involved. "I would consider it unusual for a person to be found face down under a pile of rocks and partially covered by a plastic bag," Dr. Lamb said. Also, some of the bones showed evidence of violence.

No grave had been dug for the body; apparently it was placed face down on the ground and then covered with large rocks at the site which is on property owned by E.L. Short of Tahoka.


A few threads and remnants of a T-shirt were found Saturday with the

collar label. As Dr. Lamb removed the rib bones and other bones from the uncovered spot, officers sifted through the bones and dirt for other clues, coming up with a button and later some keys and other articles. Dr. Lamb and the officers worked on the site in the searing heat Saturday afternoon, with temperatures above

In further careful digging since, a cigarette lighter, part of a pair of blue jeans and part of a bank deposit slip have been uncovered, but as of Wednesday no identification of the body had been achieved.

Sheriff Miller said Dr. Lamb advised him this week that it would take some time and tests to answer the questions raised by the finding of the skeleton. According to the sheriff, some additional excavating is being done at the site because there was one bone found which did not seem to fit the others.

A Brownfield woman was reported missing several years ago, and never has been found. Officers were seeking to determine if the skeleton might be hers, but at midweek said this appears unlikely.



Macario Alvarado Jr., 25, of Tahoka was charged with delivery of cocaine, and Gary Lynn Neudiger, 31, of Post, was charged with delivery of a controlled substance and unlawfully carrying a weapon. Alvarado posted \$15,000 bond and and Neudiger posted two \$15,000 bonds,

one on each charge. The suspects were arrested at the Tahoka Texaco station after reportedly selling cocaine to an undercover officer. Confiscated at the scene was 6.5 grams of cocaine, which officer said had a street value of approximately \$1000.


Another incident investigated by Tahoka Police Dept. occurred about 11 a.m. Sunday when Officer Hipolito Zuniga was dispatched to the 2300-block of N. 4th where a darkcolored van was parked in the street. The driver was asked to step out of the vehicle when the officer saw some beer, according to the police report. The man reportedly had difficulty maintaining his balance and he was unable to pass a field sobriety test, he was placed under arrest by the officer. The man then reportedly became violent and pushed the officer down. Zuniga called for a backup and the man continued to struggle, and allegedly threatened to kill Zuniga while he was being taken to jail. The 27-year-old Tahoka man was booked on charges of illegal parking, public intoxication, resisting arrest and making terroristic threats to a police officer.

Police investigated a stabbing incident Saturday, involving a 29year-old Tahoka man who reportedly was stabbed four times with a small pocket knife by a 30-year-old Tahoka man on S. Ave. E. The victim was treated at Lynn County Hospital and then released. A warrant was issued for the arrest of the alleged assailant.

A Tahoka woman in her early 20s reported to police that she was assaulted by a male acquaintance Sunday while walking in the 1100-block of N. 5th, and that the man had stolen \$20 cash from her. No charges were filed, however.

An O'Donnell woman reported two tires missing last Saturday. It later was determined that a relative had taken the tires and sold them.

Willie Nieman, Rt. 4, Tahoka,



reported that on June 20 about 100 gallons of diesel fuel and a pump had been stolen from a tank mounted on a trailer about three miles southwest of . Tahoka. The stolen items were valued at a total of \$190.

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

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has instituted a Class Action Lawsuit seeking judicial approval of a settlement reached in Docket No. 7297, an inquiry of General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission of Texas into possible overcharges which occurred between September, 1976, and February, 1987, due to rounding practices, on bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff. The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District

Court of Travis County, Texas. Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.





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
