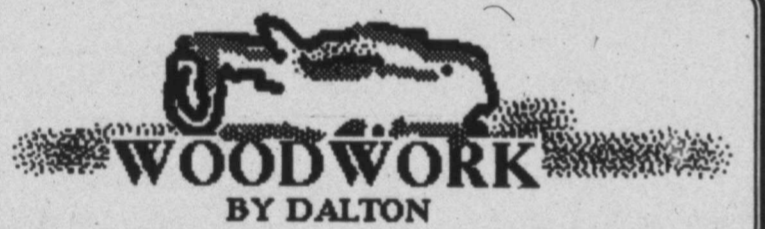

I would say more about cats, but I would only antagonize cat lovers, of which I am not one.

Bones May Be Remains Of Missing Amarillo Man

Bones uncovered at a gravel pit about nine miles west of Tahoka on June 23 may be those of an Amarillo man missing since 1986, officers at Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. said this week. However, the officers were quick to add that no definite identification has been made, and "it's quite possible that the skeleton may be that of someone else."

The sheriff's department still has not received any additional information from Dr. Ray Lamb, chairman of the Anthropology Dept. at Texas Tech, who supervised removal of the bones from the pit on property owned by former State Sen. E.L. Short. The property is about a mile off U.S. 380 and easily accessible by anyone.

Officers said this week that an Amarillo man missing since 1986 possibly could be the victim, and some of the man's relatives this week were to view a belt buckle and other articles found at the scene. In the meantime, neither Dr. Lamb nor the state laboratory at Austin have indicated whether the remains were male or female, or given any more information.

Bones of the forearms and lower limbs still have not been located.

In other activity during the week, sheriff's officers received reports of two new burglaries of barns, a home and a vehicle in an area about 5.5 miles northeast of Wilson on and near FM 400.

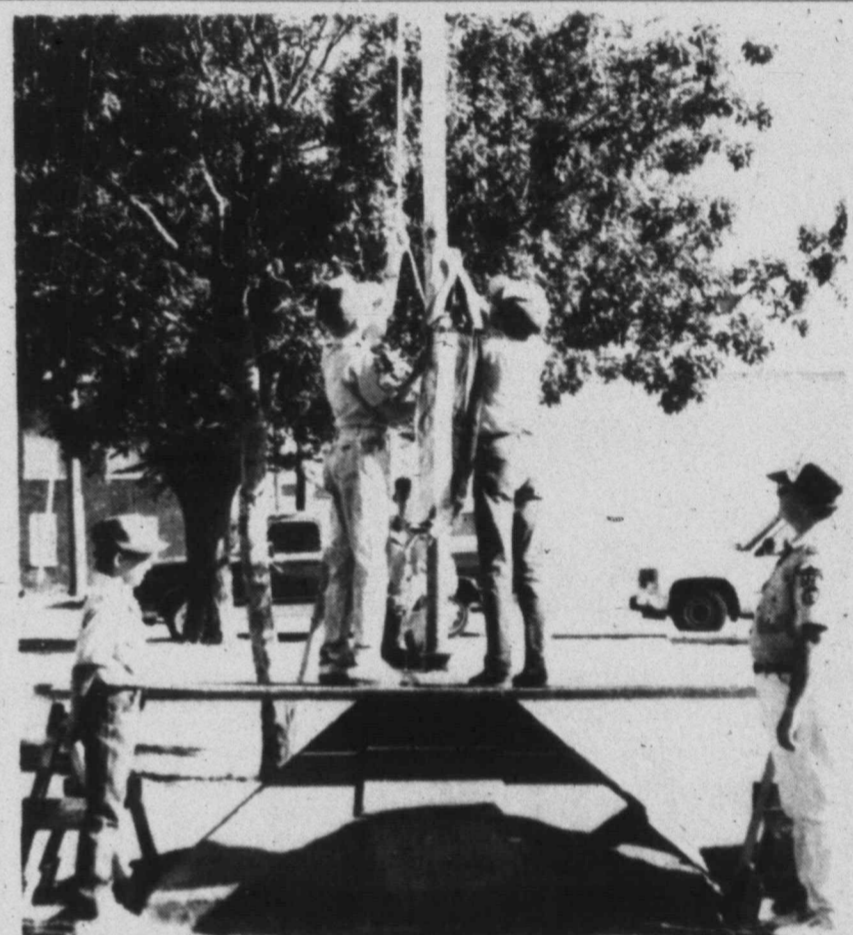
Johnny Denzer, Rt. 3, Slaton, reported that between July 7-9 a Miller Welder valued at \$200 and an AM-FM radio/cassette/stereo valued at \$450 were stolen. Also, Pete

Bruedigam reported his home in the same vicinity was burglarized sometime before July 9 and many items of clothing were stolen, plus an air compressor and accessories, a 5-inch black and white TV set, 30-30 Winchester rifle, portable phone, hedge trimmer and an accordion. No total of the items stolen had been compiled by midweek.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated an accident on Thursday at the cemetery overpass on U.S. 87, involving a tractor/trailer rig driven by Wayland Don Anderson of Odessa. Anderson was headed north on U.S. 87 when two 500-gallon barrels of oil he was

hauling on a flatbed trailer struck the bridge due to lack of clearance. The northbound lane of U.S. 87 had to be closed for approximately four hours in order to clean up the obstruction. No injuries were reported.

In jail during the last week were three persons for public intoxication, two for public intoxication plus disorderly conduct, one for Dept. of Public Safety warrants, one for driving while intoxicated, second offense, and one person charged with rider not secured by safety belt, expired drivers license, no liability insurance, and failure to appear on previous charges.

Tahoka school board offered new one-year contracts to three teachers and also offered contracts to a half day teacher, three teaching assistants and an office assistant in the regular monthly meeting of the board at the high school last Tuesday, July 3.

President Delbert McCleskey presided over the meeting attended by all the other five board members, Clint Gardner, Brad Hammonds, Richard Lopez, Gary McCord and Nedra Young.

The board voted to defer until the next meeting any possible action on appointment of a new board member to fill out the term of former member Joe Hays, who resigned in view of his wife's application for a teaching position.

One year teaching contracts were offered to Leslie Gerber, Dana Taylor and Renee Haarmayer. Nancy Kirkland was offered a position as a half day teacher. Two teachers previ-

ously announced as hired for elementary classes, Donna Carter and Vicki Steinhauer, declined the offer of a contract with the Tahoka school system, it was reported.

Business manager Loretta Tekell reported that by June 30, the 1989 tax roll collection was 96.1 per cent complete.

An energy management proposal developed by the W.C. Wesley Co. was explained by Wesley; the board decided to study the proposal before taking any action on it.

The board went into a closed executive session for three hours for discussion of an undisclosed matter under the general heading of "personnel" and took no action on the matter after returning to regular session.

Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent, suggested that the board would need to have a special budget workshop session some time after July 30.

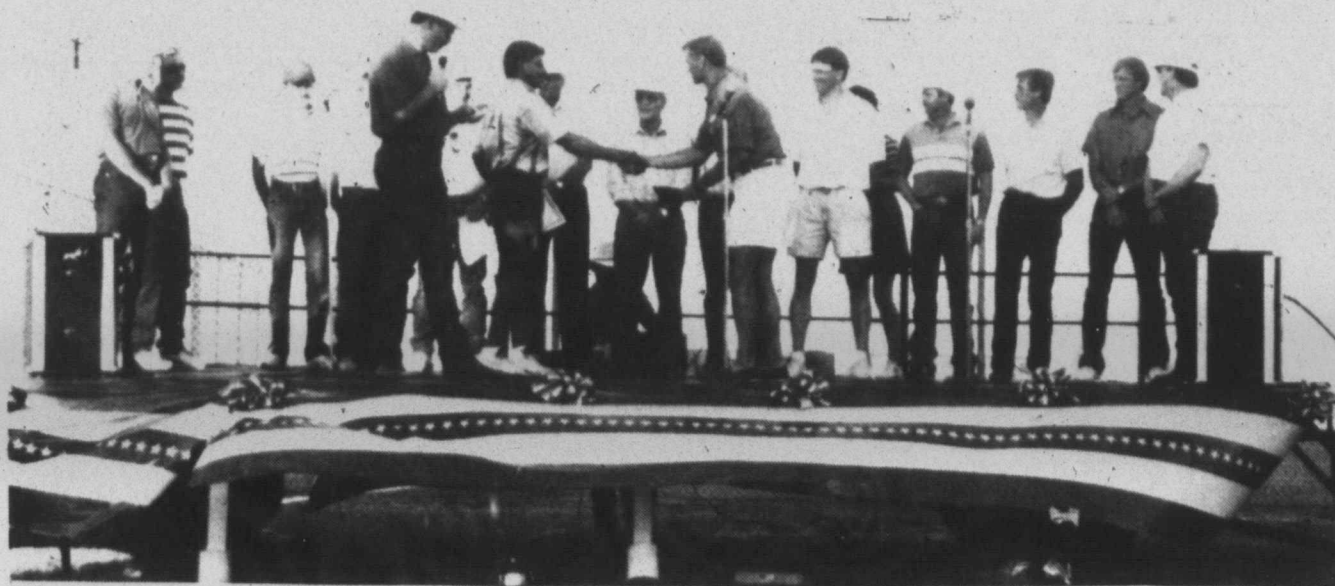

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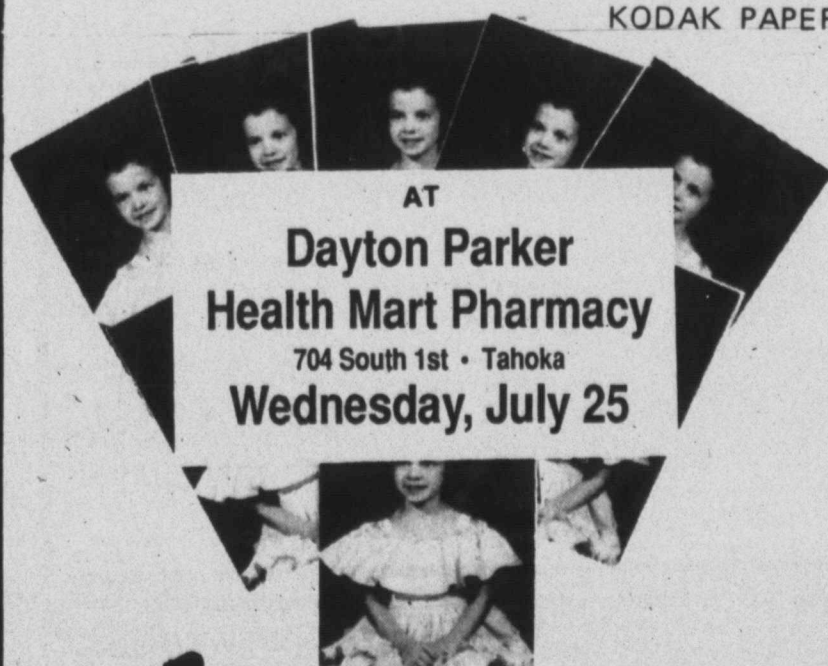
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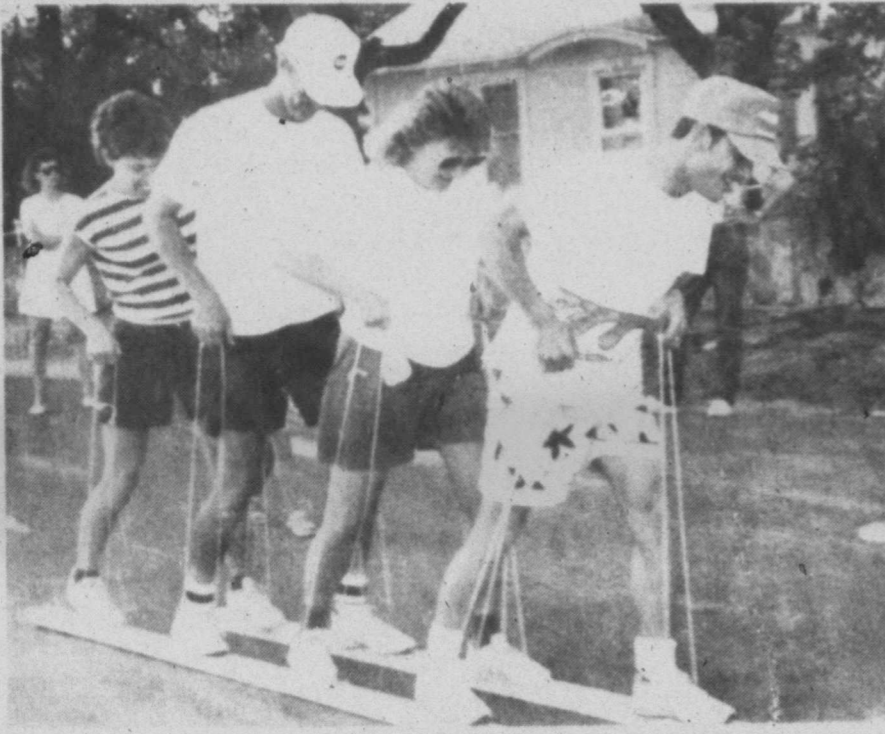

Lynn County Veterans Urged To Attend Benefits Seminar

Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon today urged all Lynn County veterans to attend an upcoming seminar in Lubbock to learn more about the special low-interest loan programs available to them through the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB). The free seminar will be held at the Lubbock Civic Center on Wednesday, July 18 at 6 p.m.

Hosted by Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, the seminar is open to the public. Texas veterans, real estate professionals and home repair contractors will be able to receive the most up-to-date information available on the state's three loan programs.

The VLB offers a \$57,500 total low-interest loan package that enables Texas veterans to buy and, a house or make home improvements. Statewide, the VLB has made more than 120,000 loans to Texas veterans totaling more than \$1.67 billion.

Texas veterans can receive up to \$20,000 at 8.75 percent interest to buy five or more acres of land and they can also borrow up to \$20,000 at 8.5 percent interest to use toward the purchase of a home.

In addition, Texas veterans can

receive up to \$17,500 at 10.5 percent interest (plus FHA insurance) to make home improvements.

Eligible Texas veterans can use all three loan programs one time.

Sales Tax Now 7-1/4 %

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has reminded everyone who collects or pays sales tax that there is an additional quarter percent sales tax collected on all taxable purchases which went into effect Sunday, July 1.

"The change means we'll all be paying a little bit more to help fund education and human services in Texas," Bullock said.

The new rate of 6-1/4 % was approved by the Texas Legislature after a fourth special session on the

issue ended in early June. The increase brings the maximum sales tax rate in Texas to 8-1/4 percent when optional local sales taxes are included.

Sales tax for Tahoka is now 7-1/4 percent, including 1 percent collected for the city.

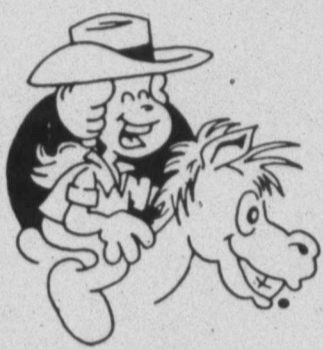
