

TEACHERS these days sometimes complain that there are too many rules they have to go by. We always have insisted that our teachers not only instruct children in fields of knowledge but also enforce moral standards, solve social problems and set examples by leading impeccable lives themselves.

Perhaps teachers today can relate to a list of rules of conduct for teachers in 1872 and in 1915, passed on to me by a reader and clipped form the Meade County Messenger in Brandenburg, KY. The original source of the rules was not given. Anyway, here they are:

1872 Teachers rules

1. Teachers each day will fill lamps & clean chimneys. 2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water & scuttle of coal for the day's session.

3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of pupils.

4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.

5. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the re-

maining time reading the Bible or other good books. 6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.

7. Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of their earnings for their benefit during their declining years so that they will not become a burden to society.

8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool halls, or gets shaven in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect their worth, intention, integrity and honesty

9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in their pay, providing the board of education. approves.

1915 Rules for teachers

1. You will not marry during the term of your contract.

2. You are not to keep company with men.

3. You must be home between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. unless attending a school function.

4. You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.

5. You may not travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.

6. You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.

7. You may not smoke cigarettes.

8. You may not dress in bright colors.

9. You may under no circumstances dye your hair.

10. You must wear at least two petticoats.

11. Your dresses must not be any shorter than two inches above the ankle.

12. To keep the school room neat and clean, you must: sweep the floor at least once daily; scrub the floor at least once a week with hot, soapy water; clean the blackboards at least once a day and start the fire at 7 a.m. so the room will be warm by 8 a.m.



Medical and hospital care costs (averaging two years) for 105 motorcyclists' at a major trauama center were over \$2,700,000 - nearly \$26,000 per patient. Two-thirds was paid by public funds, mostly by Medicaid. Researchers at the U. of Washington urge that wearing motorcycle helmets be mandated by law, especially as 67% of the cost is borne by taxpayers. This law is effective in Texas, but not all states.

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





Cutting Calories At Picnics

Nothing could be greater than to enjoy a summertime picnic of Southwestern foods in one of the beautiful state parks. With summertime already upon us, picnics conjure up thoughts of all-American favorite foods, such as fried chicken, hot dogs, hamburgers, fajitas, potato salad, cakes, cookies, etc. How can you eat according to the dietary guidelines when so many picnic foods are high in fat, sodium, sugars, and calories? Here are some suggestions:

·Grill chicken instead of frying it; remove the skin. If fried chicken is served, skip the skin.

•Grill hamburgers, fajitas, and steaks so the fat runs off during cooking.

•Trim visible fat from steaks. ·Go easy on salt and butter or margarine added to corn-on-the-cob,

baked potatoes or other vegetables. ·Load up on mixed green salad or vegetable relishes. Eat smaller helpings of coleslaw, potato salad, and macaroni salad made with lots of mayonnaise or prepare lighter versions of the salads by substituting light mayonnaise.

•Liven up your lean hamburger with lettuce, tomatoes, onions, or other vegetables. Go easy on the barbecue sauce, catsup, mustard, relishes and pickles.

•Enjoy fresh melons, bananas, grapes, cherries, peaches, plums, berries, and other fresh fruits.

•Choose fruit juices or unsweetened iced tea rather than soft drinks.

In addition to keeping the picnics healthy, also keep them safe. Keep hot foods hot, cold foods cold and keep them covered until eaten. Use ice chests, thermos bottles and airtight containers for food safety.

· Blood testing for glucose and cholesterol levels.

For maximum 'enefits of any physical exercise program, older people should exercise in such a way that reaches 65-75 percent of their maximum heart rate (number of beats per minute). This is determined by subtracting the person's age from 220. Three to five 20- to 40-minute exercise sessions a week are ideal for increasing cardiovascular fitness.
