

Thefts, Burglaries Investigated

More thefts and burglaries were investigated during the last week by officers at Lynn County Sheriff's office and Tahoka Police Dept. And Lynn County jail had 13 new inmates during the week.

On July 9 two tires, a Coleman generator and a 100-foot extension cord were reported stolen from a stock trailer parked behind The Cotton Boll on 10th St. in Wilson. The stolen items, valued at a total of \$634, belong to Casey and Cody Donald.

Jim Wells of Tahoka reported theft of a pump from a water trailer at his farm two miles west of Tahoka on July 8.

A garage owned by Melva Armes was burglarized a half mile east of

New Home on June 28. Stolen were an air compressor and battery charger, total value \$400.

An 11-year-old Tahoka youth was killed Friday afternoon as he attempted to cross U.S. 87 near S. 4th St. and was struck by a car.

Kenan Copeland, son of Bob and La Myra Copeland, had been playing with two other youngsters in the area, and one of the three already had crossed the highway from the east side. According to investigating officers, the Copeland youth had reached the median and was attempting to cross the southbound lanes when he was struck by a car driven by Alejandro Rodriguez, 18, of O'Donnell. Officers said this week that it still had not been determined if the boy was trying to cross while riding on a skateboard, or if he was carrying the skateboard.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at Tahoka First Baptist Church, with Dr. Danny

Curry, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

The boy was born Aug. 11, 1978 in Colorado City and moved to Tahoka in 1983 from Roscoe. He had completed the sixth grade at Tahoka Elementary School and was a member of First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his parents; two sisters, Gina and Katy; a brother, Jace; his maternal grandfather, Tom Moore of Anson; and his paternal grandmother, Ruth Copeland of Colorado City.

Woodwork... by Dalton

TEACHERS these days sometimes complain that there are too many rules they have to go by. We always have insisted that our teachers not only instruct children in fields of knowledge but also enforce moral standards, solve social problems and set examples by leading impeccable lives themselves.

Perhaps teachers today can relate to a list of rules of conduct for teachers in 1872 and in 1915, passed on to me by a reader and clipped from the *Meade County Messenger* in Brandenburg, KY. The original source of the rules was not given. Anyway, here they are:

1872 Teachers rules

1. Teachers each day will fill lamps & clean chimneys.
2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water & scuttle of coal for the day's session.
3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of pupils.
4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
5. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
7. Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of their earnings for their benefit during their declining years so that they will not become a burden to society.
8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool halls, or gets shaven in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect their worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in their pay, providing the board of education approves.

1915 Rules for teachers

1. You will not marry during the term of your contract.
2. You are not to keep company with men.
3. You must be home between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. unless attending a school function.
4. You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
5. You may not travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.
6. You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.
7. You may not smoke cigarettes.
8. You may not dress in bright colors.
9. You may under no circumstances dye your hair.
10. You must wear at least two petticoats.
11. Your dresses must not be any shorter than two inches above the ankle.
12. To keep the school room neat and clean, you must: sweep the floor at least once daily; scrub the floor at least once a week with hot, soapy water; clean the blackboards at least once a day and start the fire at 7 a.m. so the room will be warm by 8 a.m.

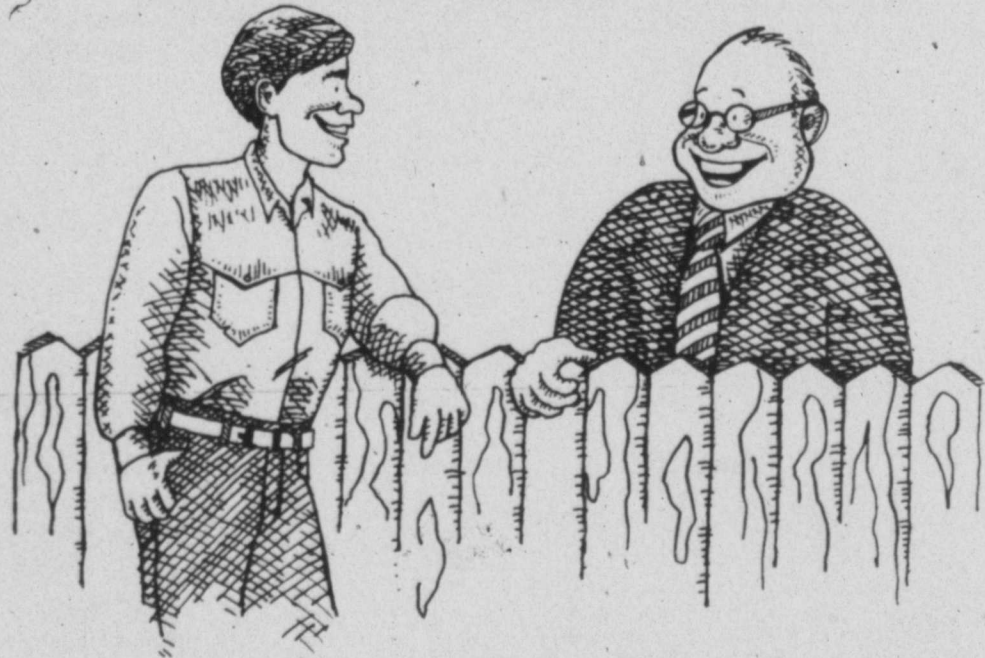

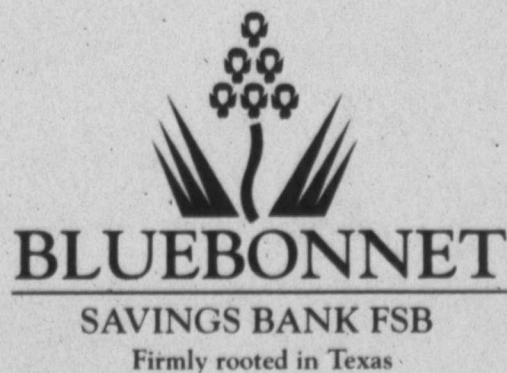

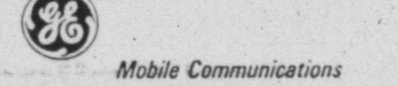

Senior Citizens Groups Offered Insurance Videos

The film was produced by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners to explain the changes in Medicare Supplement Insurance resulting from the repeal

of the Medicare Catastrophic Care Act.

Also available is a video entitled "Insurance Tips for Senior Citizens: Buying Medicare Supplement Insurance," which was produced by the Senior Concerns and Issues Section of the State Board of Insurance. Tractor Safety Tips Offered

Even though today's tractors are equipped with numerous safety innovations, practicing good safety habits around tractors is still important.

"No matter how many safety features are installed on the tractor, improper use of the tractor can still result in an accident," said Sammy Sims of Taylor Tractor & Equipment Co., Inc.

"Combining safe tractor operating skills with the knowledge of what causes tractor accidents and how to avoid them should be the goal of every tractor operator. The operator really needs to be 'in tune' with the tractor.

"Generally, a safe operator assumes several basic responsibilities. The first is performing proper maintenance. 'This helps assure that the tractor is in top operating condition and reduces the possibility of mechanical failure,' said Sims.

"There's always the possibility at one time or another that a tractor won't start," said Sims. "Bypass starting is a very dangerous way to deal with the problem. A tractor that is bypass started in gear may move suddenly and run over anyone or anything in its path.

"Never bypass star," stressed Sims. "Always place the transmission in 'neutral' or 'park', and follow the correct procedure of starting the

tractor from the seat. Keeping the starter system in proper repair will reduce the chances of starting difficulties."

A safe operator also needs to make pre-operation checks of the entire tractor and minimize the chance of a fire or explosion when refueling.

"Make sure all of the original manufacture's safety features are still in place and in good operating condition," urged Sims. "If items such as PTO shields are missing or if lights, the SMV, and safety signs are in poor condition, replace them."

The ROPS, or roll-over protective structure, is another important safety feature. "Make sure each of your tractors is equipped with a roll over protective structure, and wear the seat belt," said Sims. "Do not remove or modify the manufacturer's original ROPS. If the ROPS has been damaged, or you have an older tractor that was ordered without "ROPS, see your dealer for a replacement or information about how to get a new ROPS for your older tractor."

Sims added that tractors are not designed to carry passengers. "It's probably one of the most difficult things to practice, but just say 'no' to someone who wants to ride on the tractor with you."

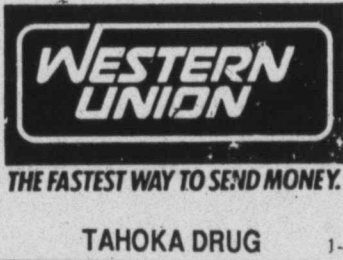

Cutting Calories At Picnics

Nothing could be greater than to enjoy a summertime picnic of Southwestern foods in one of the beautiful state parks. With summertime already upon us, picnics conjure up thoughts of all-American favorite foods, such as fried chicken, hot dogs, hamburgers, fajitas, potato salad, cakes, cookies, etc. How can you eat according to the dietary guidelines when so many picnic foods are high in fat, sodium, sugars, and calories? Here are some suggestions:

- Grill chicken instead of frying it; remove the skin. If fried chicken is served, skip the skin.
- Grill hamburgers, fajitas, and steaks so the fat runs off during cooking.
- Trim visible fat from steaks.
- Go easy on salt and butter or margarine added to corn-on-the-cob, baked potatoes or other vegetables.
- Load up on mixed green salad or vegetable relishes. Eat smaller helpings of coleslaw, potato salad, and macaroni salad made with lots of mayonnaise or prepare lighter versions of the salads by substituting light mayonnaise.
- Liven up your lean hamburger with lettuce, tomatoes, onions, or other vegetables. Go easy on the barbecue sauce, catsup, mustard, relishes and pickles.
- Enjoy fresh melons, bananas, grapes, cherries, peaches, plums, berries, and other fresh fruits.
- Choose fruit juices or unsweetened iced tea rather than soft drinks.

In addition to keeping the picnics healthy, also keep them safe. Keep hot foods hot, cold foods cold and keep them covered until eaten. Use ice chests, thermos bottles and airtight containers for food safety.

Exercise Reverses Physical Decline In Old Age

Some physical decline is inevitable with aging, but as much as 50 percent of physical limitations can be blamed on inactivity. Even low levels of activity such as walking can lead to improvement in health and general well being. And even severely impaired elders can regain strength and independence.

In one nursing home in Connecticut, 20 disabled residents walked daily for four months. Several people became more sociable as their walking improved and they were able to attend meals and activities. One incontinent resident resumed independent trips to the bathroom and eventually regained continence.

For safe and enjoyable exercise with older persons:

- Exercise in pairs and groups.
 - Exercise at the same time daily.
 - Stop exercise if severe pain, dizziness or other unpleasant physical symptoms occur.
 - Wear comfortable clothing and good athletic shoes.
 - Drink extra water before and after activity to avoid dehydration.
- Before starting on an exercise program, older people need a complete physical examination from their doctor which includes:
- A complete medical history.
 - Evaluation of medication levels to determine if adjustments are indicated for increased activity levels.

- Blood testing for glucose and cholesterol levels.
- An exercise tolerance or stress test to determine current level of fitness.

For maximum benefits of any physical exercise program, older people should exercise in such a way that reaches 65-75 percent of their maximum heart rate (number of beats per minute). This is determined by subtracting the person's age from 220. Three to five 20- to 40-minute exercise sessions a week are ideal for increasing cardiovascular fitness.

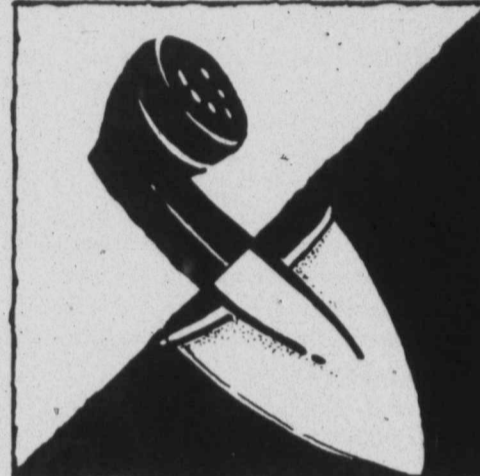
Blind Offered Services
