

Burglaries, Thefts Are Reported

Registration For Tahoka Elementary Set Aug. 20

Registration day for previously enrolled students in grades K-6 will be Monday, Aug. 20. The following are times for each grade level:

- Kindergarten, first grade- 8:30 a.m. to 10 a.m.
- Second grade- 10 a.m. to 11 a.m.
- Third grade- 11 a.m. to 12 noon.
- Fourth grade- 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.
- Fifth grade- 2 p.m. to 3 p.m.
- Sixth grade- 3 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Registration will be held in the cafeteria. Parents and students should enter through the back entrance of the cafeteria. (This is the door by the Tubb playground area.) Construction and remodeling is going on in Tubb and Gardner buildings, therefore, these areas should be avoided.

"This day is only for those students that were enrolled at Tahoka Elementary last year or if in kindergarten, pre-registered last spring. It is not for new students," explained Miss Molly Helmlinger, Principal.

Any student enrolling in Tahoka Elementary for the first time should come on Friday, Aug. 17. This registration will be held in the main office between 9 a.m. and noon. No new

student may register without at least one parent or legal guardian being present to enroll the child. Parents will need to bring their child's immunization-health records, birth certificate, and social security card for verification purposes. Parents should also bring any previous school report cards, etc. that will provide assistance in the proper placement of the student. New students should not enroll on Aug. 20.

It is very important that at least one parent or legal guardian accompany the previously enrolled child to registration day. Information from the registration card must be verified, emergency care forms completed, pick-up procedure forms completed, supplies list distributed, SRA results returned, and homebase room assignments announced.

Any family that has moved out of the district should notify the school so that the students may be removed from the class rosters. Any person unable to attend the designated registration days should contact Miss Helmlinger, principal, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. at 998-4350.

Tahoka Man Dies As Pickup Overturns

A 27-year-old Tahoka man was killed early Sunday morning when the pickup he was driving overturned several times on FM 1730 (Slide Road) north of New Home in Lubbock County.

Edward Lee (Waddy) Saldana was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Justice of the Peace Grady Brooke of Wolfforth. A passenger, Joseph Saldana, 23, of Lubbock, was taken to University Medical Center where he remained hospitalized Tuesday in what was described as stable condition for treatment of lacerations.

According to Dept. of Public Safety officials, Edward Saldana was driving a 1989 Toyota pickup south on Slide Rd. about 3 a.m. Sunday when the vehicle failed to negotiate a curve near the intersection with Lubbock County Rd. 76, skidded into a ditch and then overturned several times, throwing both occupants from the pickup.

Funeral services for Edward Saldana were conducted Tuesday morning, Aug. 7, 1990 in St. Jude Catholic

Church with the Rev. Rodney Howell, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Nevels Memorial Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

He was born in Slaton, graduated from Tahoka High School and worked in construction. He was a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Survivors include his parents, Frank and Sally Saldana of Tahoka; a sister, Patty DeLeon of Tahoka; a brother, Michael of Tahoka; and his grandparents, Nick and Rosa Saldana of Tahoka.

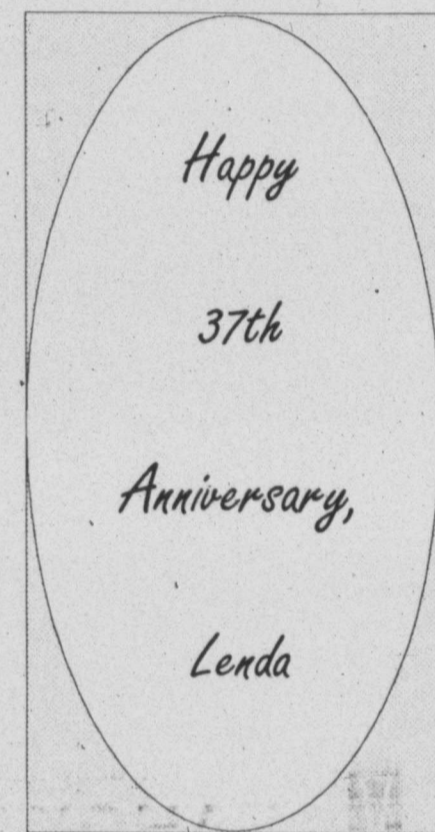
Serving from the groom's table were Pamela Bishop of Wilson, sister of the groom, and Tina Wuensche of Tahoka, cousin of the groom.

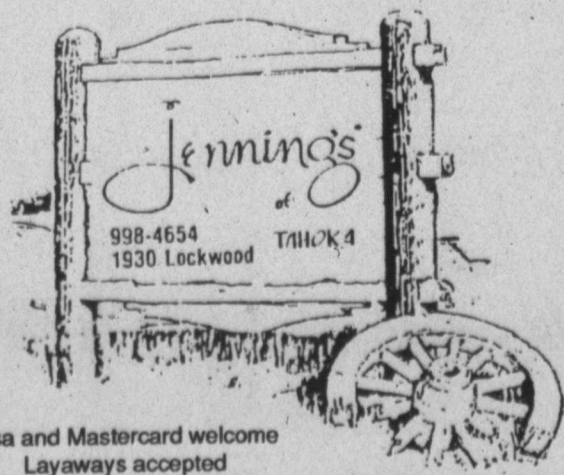

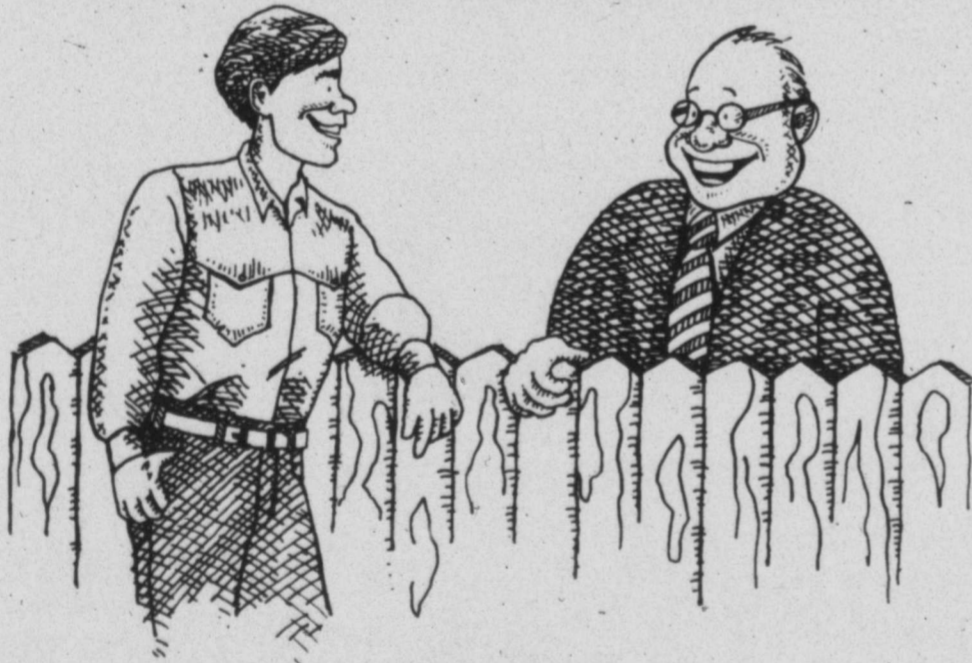

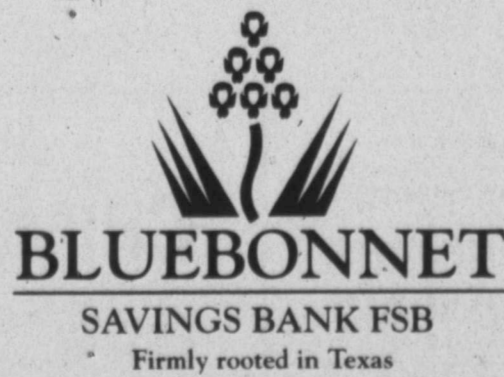

CRP Acres Increase Threat Of Virus In Early Wheat

West Texas wheat growers should avoid planting in August and early September to reduce the threat of infection with the devastating wheat streak mosaic virus, cautions a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some counties in the South Plains and Texas Panhandle have been hit hard by the wheat mosaic virus since 1988, said Dr. Harold E. Kaufman, the Extension Service plant pathologist here.

The disease is spread by a wind-borne wheat curl mite that is most active in warm weather. The mite generally moves in a northeasterly

direction with the prevailing summer winds. Infected plants have yellow, discontinuous streaks on the leaves.

"Fall infection is common and very devastating," Kaufman said, "But symptoms rarely show until temperatures increase in the spring".

Wheat planted north or east of CRP land is most likely to be infested with mosaic-carrying wheat curl mites, Kaufman said. These small insects are active during warm weather and they are usually carried in a northeasterly direction by the warm southwest winds.

Planting in late September or early October, after mite populations usually have declined, may keep the field from becoming infected, or at least delay the time of infection and thus reduce the destructiveness of the virus.
