Bulldogs Unable To Stop Brantley

The good news Friday night in Tahoka High School's season football opener was that the Bulldogs obviously are a lot better than they were last year. The bad news was they lost again, as state-ranked Spur won going away in the last quarter and a half, 55-21, mainly on the efforts of a big, fast running back named Terrell Brantley.

Brantley, 225-pound senior, gained 343 yards rushing and receiving and scored five touchdowns. But although the defense couldn't stop him, they did well against all the others until they tired in the last quarter. And the Bulldogs offense was much more productive, gaining 192 yards and getting 12 first downs, more than in any game last season.

Spur scored first in the opening period as Brantley ran 19 yards. On the extra point, Spur faked a kick and ran for points, but Daniel Garvin stopped the runner short to leave it at 6-0. A bad snap on a punt effort gave Spur a safety a bit later, and still in the first, Brantley ran 15 to score, making it 14-0.

It was 21-0 midway of the second as Brantley ran 6 yards. After the kickoff, Tahoka started moving the ball, mainly on the passing arm of QB Trey Nance and aided by penalties against Spur. The drive was climaxed by a 2-yard scoring run by Joey Stone, and Albert Mendoza kicked the point to make it 21-7. This was the score at halftime.

Tahoka came out strong in the second half, driving to another touchdown with Stone going in from the 1. Nance then passed to Mike Burleson for two points to bring the

Dogs to within 6 points of Spur at 9:10.

The other Bulldogs came back quickly and often after that, scoring two touchdowns in the third and three more in the final period to quell any Tahoka hopes of an upset.

Tahoka fans got another chance to cheer with about nine minutes left in the game when Spur was leading 48-15 and kicked off after a touchdown. Burleson took the kickoff, found an opening in the middle and raced 80 yards for a Tahoka score. A kick failed, and it was 48-21, with Spur adding a final score later in the period.

Stone gained 31 yards in 10 carries, scored two touchdowns and caught a pass for 59 yards. Nance completed 8 of 20 passes for 120 yards, suffering one interception. Billy Wilborn gained 15 yards in 6 carries. Wilborn was busiest on defense, with 14 tackle assists and one solo tackle. Close behind in numbers of tackles were Nance and Brian Moore. Also doing well on defense were Burleson, Michael Tipton and Mendoza. Guard Jace Copeland recovered a Spur fumble.

This week the Bulldogs will travel to Friona for an 8 p.m. game against the Chieftains, who battered River Road last week, 39-23.

CELEBRATING FIRST ALBUM BY 'OFF LIMITZ' Tahokans To Be Featured In Park Concert Saturday

"Off Limitz," a rising young contemporary rock band led by three Tahoka young men, will present a free concert in Tahoka City Park starting at 7 p.m. Saturday, a day designated as "Off Limitz Day" in Tahoka by Mayor Jim Solomon, in honor of the achievements of the group and in celebration of the band's first album release.

The Tahoka members of the five-piece band are Arron Miller, Corey McCleskey and Mike Rameriz, and their biggest step toward the dream of success came by way of a short phone call last spring.

Earlier in the year the group went in to Audio Chain Studios to record a demo tape. All the material on the tape is written by both Miller and McCleskey. Soon afterwards, Miller received a call one evening from the recording engineer, who said, "Arron, I've been listening to your song, 'Don't Know If It's Love' all day. There's nothing wrong with it; you have a perfect song. You guys need to come in so we can talk about making an album."

The group then began the process of decisions about financing, goal-setting and future direction for the band. After the decision to follow through with production of the album, the band soon was exposed to the lengthy and tedious process of

multi-track recording. Miller said the process took about eight weeks to record 10 songs.

All of the songs on the album, entitled *Dreams*, will be played at the free concert in the Mini Park, plus about an hour and a half of other Off Limitz favorites. The public is invited to bring lawn chairs and enjoy the free concert sponsored by the band, Tahoka Jaycees and the Cystic Fibrosis Assn., which will get all proceeds from a concession stand operated by the Jaycees.

"We're very proud to debut our first album in Tahoka," said Miller. "We truly appreciate everybody who supports and encourages us—there's a simple reason: they don't have to, they do it because they care about us...these are the people that we will remember all our lives."

The band, whose other two members are from Lubbock, chose 1989 Tahoka High School graduate Tony Pena to design the cover for their new album.

The band won second in the 1989 statewide FFA Talent Competition, with 7,000 spectators on hand. This year they were winners of the "Battle of the Bands" competition at a festival sponsored by Slaton Chamber of Commerce, and this month the band was featured in the 1990 Labor Day "Riverfest" at Buddy Holly Park

in Lubbock. They also have performed at many civic, private and public events.

Arron is the son of Pam and B.L. Miller of Tahoka, and was valedictorian of the 1990 graduating class of Tahoka High School, receiving several scholarships. He currently attends South Plains College in Levelland, majoring in Sound Technology. He is looking forward to pursuing a career in the music industry, using his own music to advance. He sings and plays keyboard.

Corey is the son of Delbert and Brenda McCleskey of Grassland. He co-authors the music with Arron and is a self-taught bass guitarist. He also is majoring in Sound Technology at SPC, and plans to produce recordings in the future.

Mike Rameriz is the son of Janie Rameriz of Tahoka and Mike Rameriz of Lubbock. He is a drug and alcohol counselor at the Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center in Lubbock, and also currently attends SPC. He plays drums and sings backup to Miller in live performances.

One admirer of the group commented this week that this is "a group of talented young men who are determined to play and sing music with a positive influence and...these guys are striving to do it right."

Lynn County Population Plummet

Lynn County's population has declined a whopping 21.6 per cent in the last 10 years, according to preliminary figures of the U.S. Census Bureau as reported by State Comptroller Bob Bullock this week.

The early report shows 6,746 persons living in Lynn County in 1990 as compared to 8,605 residents in the 1980 Census. This means the county, which includes four incorporated cities and the rural area, has lost 1,859 persons in the decade. No figures have been released for the individual cities, and the figure for the county is not the official final count.

"I believe the Bureau's preliminary tally is low and will require an adjustment to accurately reflect the size of the state's population, particularly minorities," said Bullock.

The Bureau has calculated that Texas has grown by 2.6 million—18.2 percent—since 1980, compared to the national growth rate of 8.5 percent. The population of the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolplex climbed 29.7 percent, East Texas gained 10.4 percent, but the Plains area of West Texas gained only 1 per cent.

The figures show Texas has grown from 14,229,191 persons in 1980 to 16,824,665 in 1990.

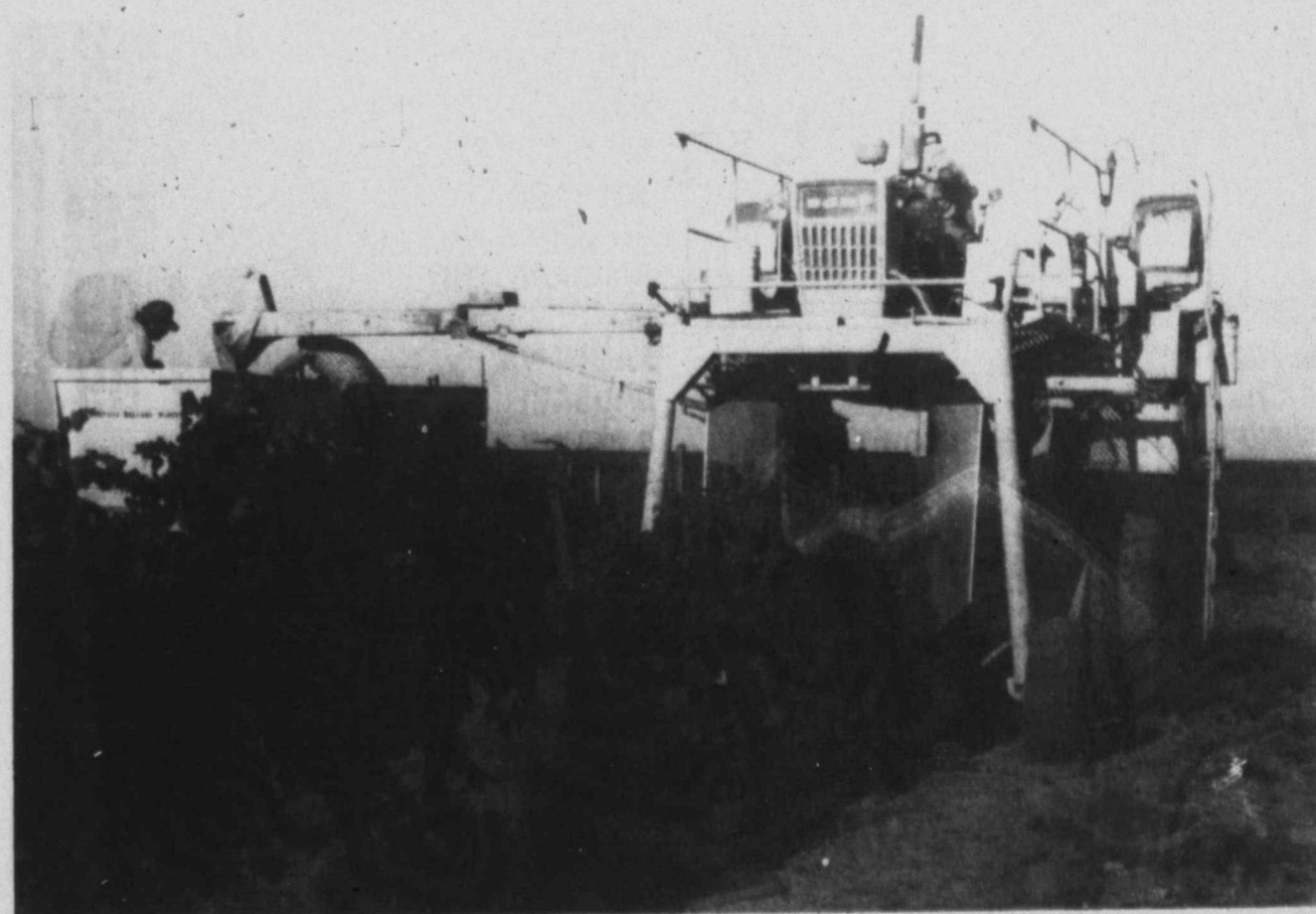

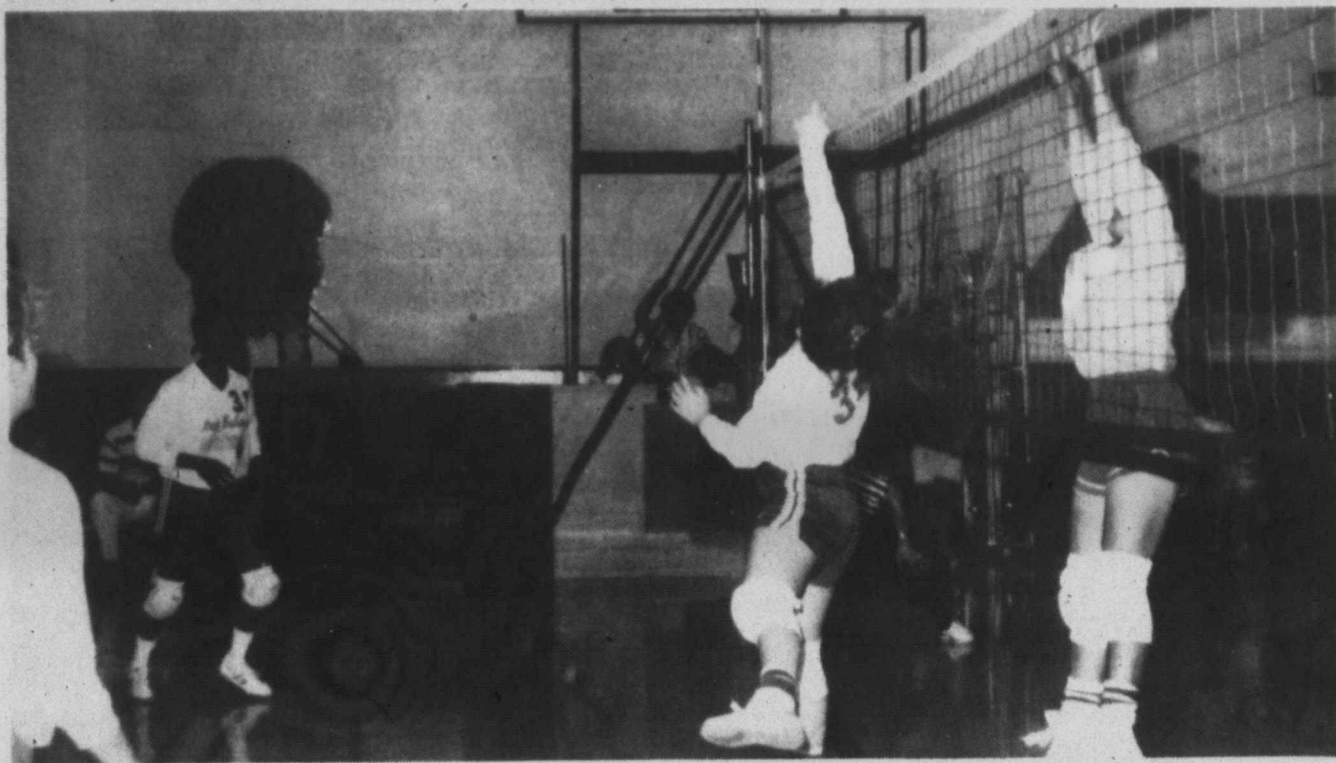

Cotton Crop Estimated At 1.8 to 2.2 Million Bales

Cotton farmers here in the South Plains region, where half the state's crop is grown, are keeping an eye on the sky and sweating out the critical 10 weeks left until harvest, hoping to make the best of an already bad situation.

If the weather cooperates, the 25 counties around Lubbock should produce between 1.8 million and 2.2 million bales of cotton this year, said two cotton experts associated with Texas A&M University.

But that's still a major "if," especially if the long hot dry spell continues, causing the cotton plants to shed

many small bolls, agreed Dr. James Supak, a cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dr. John Gannaway, a cotton breeder for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

If farmers can make the high end of the harvest estimate, the 2.2 million bales will just equal the region's average annual cotton production for the 1980s.

That's not the way things started out in the spring, when farmers in the region planted 3.2 million acres and hoped for a yield of almost 3 million bales.

Drought and a prolonged period of hot weather in May and June was the first big setback.

"About 540,000 acres were abandoned due to drought," Supak said. "Another 30,000 acres were lost to hail."

July rains averted outright disaster and offered a glimmer of hope for the remaining crop. But the rains were followed by a period of cool, cloudy days that caused heavy vegetative growth rather than boll development. Then, the last two weeks of August turned dry and scorching hot.

"What we made up in the dryland area (with the rain), we lost in the irrigated crop with the late August weather," Supak said.

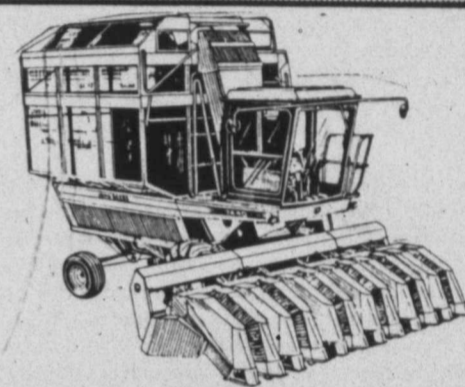

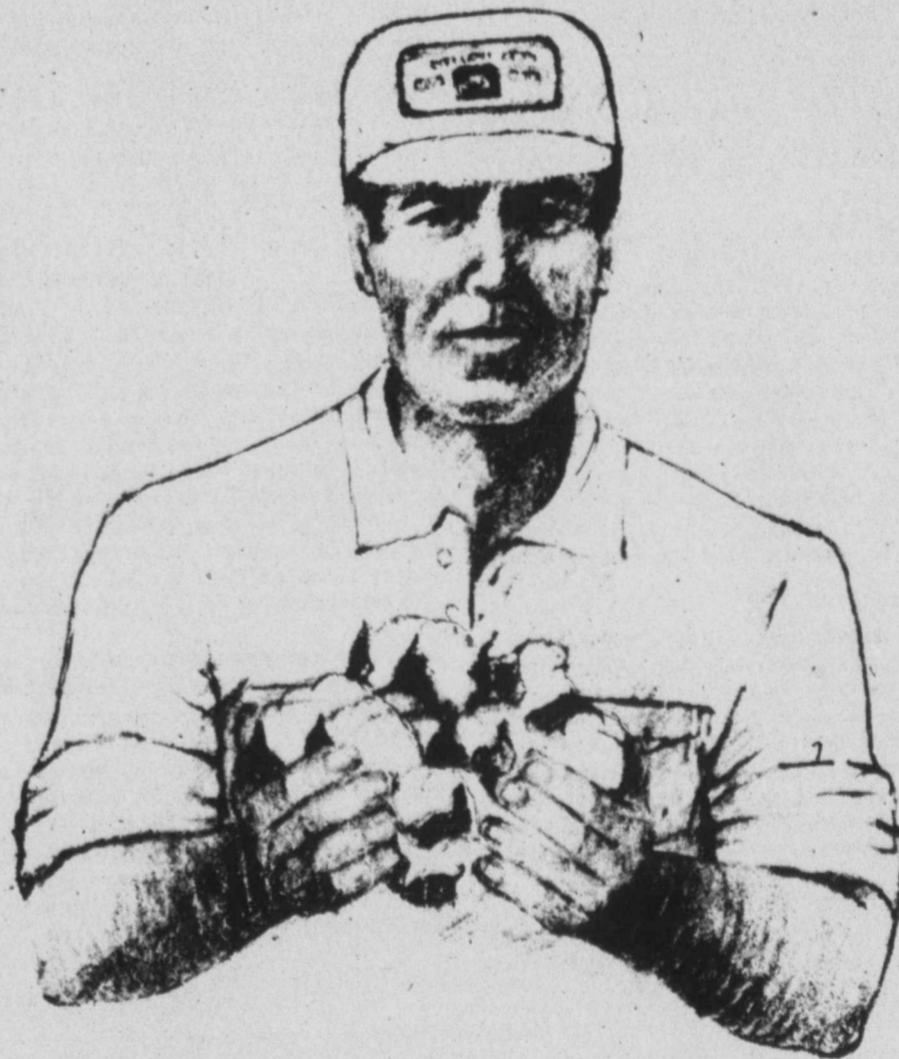

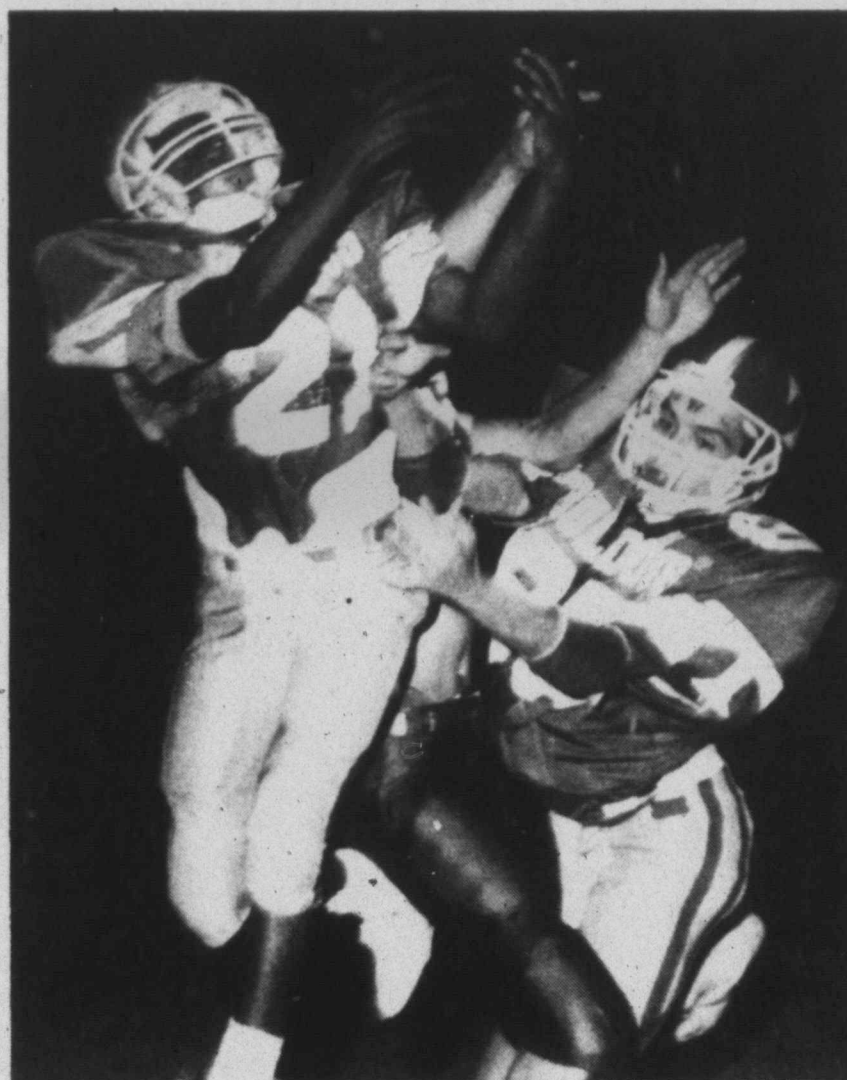

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

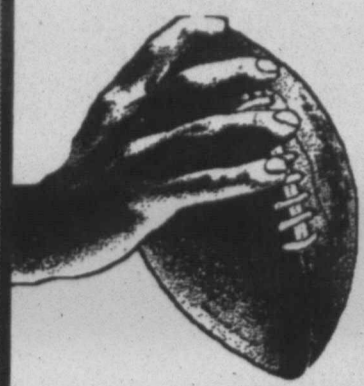
