# **Sputtering Bulldogs** To Try Tough Post

The Tahoka Bulldogs, who can't Mendoza out of his own end zone. seem to get things going for an entire game, came off their fifth loss in six games last Friday and this week will journey to Post to take on the unbeaten Antelopes, tabbed by most area sports observers as the team most likely to win district and then

Post has been beating everybody. but last week New Deal gave the Antelopes an unexpected good game, losing 34-27 and proving that Post is not unbeatable.

The Bulldogs, meanwhile, didn't do much in the first half against Crosbyton at the Tahoka homecoming game Friday, falling behind 21-0 at the half, and finally coming back in the last half to cut the margin to 21-6.

Unable to mount any sustained drives, Tahoka had the ball for only 46 plays in the game, compared to 67 for Crosbyton, but the Dogs did show a few flashes of offense, especially in the last half. The defense couldn't hang onto Crosbyton's 220-pound Jerome Lang in the first half, and Lang scored two touchdowns in the first period, one of them on a 90-yard run. One of the extra points was good and the Chiefs led 13-0 at the quarter.

The highlight for Tahoka in the second period was a 34-yard run by Billy Wilborn, but that was about all the offense of the first half, except for a first-quarter run of 18 yards by QB Trey Nance. Crosbyton scored another TD in the second period after a long drive, missed the point, and then got two points on a safety when a bad snap on a punt sent kicker Albert

In the third quarter, Bulldog running back Joey Stone broke for 34 yards, but this drive was thwarted. A Crosbyton drive was halted by Mike Burleson's interception. In the third quarter, Tahoka did mount one drive, starting from the Bulldog 21 after Tahoka held Crosbyton on downs. Stone and Wilborn made runs of 12 and 8, and then Stone escaped for 39 yards to the Crosbyton 15. From there, QB Rene Luna passed 15 yards to Daniel Garvin in the end zone for a Tahoka touchdown. A pass try for points failed, and it was 21-6.

Tahoka almost scored again later in the final period when Stone threw the halfback option pass to Cody Bailey, who made a great catch and wound up 57 yards downfield at the Chiefs' 21. But Luna's pass was intercepted at the 7 to end that hope.

Stone gained 88 yards in 9 carries and Wilborn had 43 yards in two efforts. Garvin caught three passes. With 14 tackles, Garvin also did well on defense, as did Stone and Jay Forsythe with 13 each, Michael Jackson with 12 and Brian Moore with 11, including five solo tackles. Wilborn and Mendoza had 9 tackles each and Ray Mulanax 8.



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(Editor's Note: Mabel Gurley of Tahoka, a frequent contributor to The Lynn County News of articles about the early days of Lynn County, died unexpectedly last week, only a few days after she had brought in the following story which, as always, demonstrated a knowledge and keen sense of humor about past events. The story was not published last week because of space limitations, but is being printed this week in tribute to Mrs. Gurley, whose presence and contributions to the newspaper will be missed.)

About the year 1930 B.T. (Before Television), local people to a great extent focused their attention on sports for entertainment. There was no "couch potato" pallor then, for even the senior citizens 40 to 50 years of age (our conception of old age then) engaged in soft ball, baseball, tennis, golf, etc. There were indeed some outstanding athletes. Hall Robinson played baseball with the notable Fort Worth Cats. Some old timers will remember when "Lefty" Squires was challenged to throw a baseball over the courthouse, and with his mighty left arm was said to have collected the bet. Later he joined the St. Louis Cardinals.

Locally a baseball team, with players such as Wade Holland, Ivan Cathcart, and Jack Wells had a following as they challenged teams over West Texas and New Mexico. A softball team composed of business men and farmers had rooters who never missed a game. Occasionally a man would come to town with a trailer of donkeys to amuse the crowd with a donkey ball game. On one occasion a batter had what appeared to be a two base hit, and with diligent urging and prodding managed to get the donkey almost to first base, but before reaching the base the beast literally sat down, and since the batter was not permitted to dismount and run, it was a rather easy out. Donkeys are not dumb. They lift nothing too heavy for their backs to carry. Excessive weight activates their brake system, and no doubt that batter was overweight.

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During the period of about 1933-34 a golf club was organized with Truett Smith as president and Borden Davis as secretary. The course was laid out, so to speak south of Tahoka in a pasture. The "greens" were sand. This course remains rather vivid to us, as it was at that location that a bad case of mumps developed.

Astuteness as to the technicalities of some sports was not one of our qualities then nor now. To our credit, however, we did know a "homer" pertained to baseball, and a forward pass implied football. Too, we learned right off that a "wide receiver" didn't necessarily pertain to obesity.

In early days two-car families were virtually non-existent. Only teachers' cars were seen at the high school campus, with perhaps a few cars driven by students who lived in the country. Town kids either walked or rode bicycles to school. The football team in 1932, however, had a very sophisticated means of transportation. Taylor White, the agriculture teacher, obliged by taking the entire squad to and from out of town games on a flat bed trailer, already

dressed in their uniforms before leaving school. Perhaps the jolts and bumps conditioned the boys for the hard dirt fields they played on, some of which contained more grass burrs than grass.

Tahoka High was fortunate to secure a good football coach who also served in the capacity of biology teacher. Wendy Nichols came to Tahoka just out of Texas Tech, where he was Tech's first quarterback. Though a very likable man and good teacher, it was apparent that his interest lay with football rather than in persuading reluctant female students to dissect frogs.

Through the years Tahoka had some outstanding quarterbacks who led their teams to championships. To name a few, there were Eddie Edwards, Gordon Smith, Lynn Carl Halamichek, and Karl Prohl. The Minor boys were literally born running the 50 yard dash. Jack, James and Joe Don Minor were excellent athletes, all of them starring on Tahoka's football teams. Their athletic prowess enabled them to select a college of their choice for scholarships. Max Minor ultimately received a scholarship to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, where during the war years he played in the backfield with the nationally famous Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis. And it was while playing with this distinguished company that his teammates elected Max "Most Valuable Player". We were excited to see Max make a touchdown at our local theater on the newsreel. (There was no television at that time, remember.) After the war the American Legion held an exhibition football game with a team made up of Tahoka High exes, and the backfield consisted of Jack. James and Joe Don Minor. The game would have been a great success except for the fact that another ex, Bill Barham, sustained a broken leg

during the game. In the post-war years much rivalry existed between Tahoka, Post, Slaton, O'Donnell, and Denver City. A special train, "The Blueweed Special" always ran between Tahoka and Slaton for their games. Citizens in each town met the trains, carrying the spectators to the playing fields. Our social life was sometimes disturbed when there was dating with rival team members.

Tahoka was privileged to get Jake Jacobs as its basketball coach. While attending West Texas State, he was on the team which was invited by the N.I.T. to play in Madison Square Garden in New York. Terminology has changed in many sports areas, but it seems basketball experienced the greatest change. Until the players became taller and taller, a "slamdunk" was unheard of. On the other

hand small players such as Lynn Carl Halamicek had the leaping ability to bound over three or four players—or under, whatever was necessary. Placid Jake not only taught the boys

basketball,. but also instilled values

that are everlasting.

The Harvick boys enlivened sports both as players and spectators. Rufus Slover had the unparalleled record of never missing a game as a supporter. Maurice Bray was an avid sports fan and supporter who had played football for the Pittsburgh Steelers prior to coming to Tahoka. In later years, Britt Robinson received national recognition as a champion skeet shooter. Bill Chancy has carried the chain for more than 40 years at football games.

Clint Walker, for more than 30 years, with his articulate and descriptive ability, announced every local football game, making the game so much more enjoyable for the fans. Howard Cosell missed a learning lesson by not hearing him.

But returning to the 1930's: girls' volleyball became a spectator sport, and we were permitted to wear "discreet" shorts rather than the black bloomers the girls' basketball players wore in earlier years. Some fine tennis players emerged in those days, the dirt courts not being a deterrent, since what we'd never had we didn't

On a personal note, the almost 50 year marriage to Jess Gurley was almost terminated the first year when his bride decided to bleach his cherished white wool, "T" sweater with the sleeve stripes and star denoting the captain of the basketball team. A dip in hot water in the old Maytag did indeed whiten the wool, but the sweater's size would have been skimpy on a dwarf.

As time has a tendency to slow down the active, some fellows sought the recreation of dominoes. An arbor-like construction with benches and tables was erected west of the old Guaranty State Bank. As muscles became less taught, some walked day after day to this outdoor haven, still inhaling fresh air and engaging buddies in heated competi-

Bridge, to some of us, became a stimulating mental exercise of mind and judgement. The opportunity of forming new friends and the competitive instinct prevails. Boredom is absent when there are games, whether they be mental or physical.

Much can be said for small towns. Sports enabled many a local student to get an education and learn to compete in various fields. We're quite proud of these athletes and their many achievements. Too, they afforded us and others many hours of enjoyment as spectators.


Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding -Don't Answer are optional call management services that will automatically forward a customer's incoming calls to a pre-designated number whenever that incoming call encounters a busy or don't answer condition. These services are for both business and residence customers. The company proposes that the services, be available beginning November 19, 1990.

The monthly rates for Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are \$1.00 for residence customers and \$3.00 for business customers. The monthly rate for subscribing to both services is \$1.75 for residence customers and \$4.00 for business customers. During this experimental offering period the installation charges will be waived.

area, and especially Tahoka, have the opportunity to provide foster homes for children, a need that county child welfare officials say is acute.

"The foster parent, along with caseworkers, must be willing to provide the best possible care to children who have no other place to go. Foster parents are very special people who possess a tremendous amount of patience, understanding and love," said Aneda DeLeon, representing the child welfare organization.

There are no strict limitations on who can be a foster parent. Some have natural children of their own, others have none. Both parents may work, as long as licensed day care is provided. Some foster parents are

single adults or single parents. The only income requirement is that foster parents be able to meet their own financial obligations. Foster parents are reimbursed a standard 2367."

Residents of communities in this rate of \$14 per day per child in their home. Most of the children's medical expenses are covered by Medicaid.

Foster parents may care for more than one child but no more than six children under the age of 18 may be in the home, including the foster parents' natural children. "Every effort is made to keep sibling groups in the same home," said Ms. DeLeon. "If this is not possible, it is important to have them in the same town. The length of stay depends on the particular needs of the child at the time."

Foster parents are greatly needed right now. Foster parenting is not an easy job, and for this reason, there is a shortage of homes.
