

Sales Tax Rebate Checks Received

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said his office sent checks totaling \$93 million in monthly local sales tax rebates to cities and counties in Texas.

"Sales are staying strong throughout Texas and that means sales tax collections keep increasing at a steady pace", Bullock said.

Checks to cities totaled almost \$84 million, an increase of 16 percent over last October's rebates. So far this year, rebates to cities are running almost 9 percent ahead of last year.

Tahoka received \$3,724.83 this period compared to \$3,390.79 paid last year. Payments to date for 1990 were \$48,364.71 compared to \$52,100.16 for the same period last year.

O'Donnell received \$9,645.50 for the 1990 payments to date compared to \$10,332.86 for the same period in 1989.

Wilson received \$3,768.99 payments to date for 1990 compared to \$4,592.87 for the same period last year.

Bulldogs Play Tough At Post

Before this year's football season started, there were rumors that Post

Antelope supporters who come into regular contact with Tahoka residents were talking about how the Antelopes would beat Tahoka by at least 40 or 50 points this season. And Tahoka Football Coach Joe Paradis commented on this before the season started, saying "I think we may have some surprises for them."

Coach Paradis was right, and the Tahoka Bulldogs did put up a good fight against the talented and unbeaten Antelopes last Friday night, losing 18-6 but gaining some respect, especially with a stiff defense. The Bulldogs couldn't pull off an upset, but "they played very well, and I am proud of them," said Coach Paradis.

This week the Bulldogs return to their home field to play against Sunday in a district contest in which the Dogs should have the unusual role of favorite. But they will have to play well again to beat the Roughnecks, who last week won their first game of the year, surprising New Deal in a 26-21 game.

Post's Michael Radle passed for all three Antelope touchdowns, hitting B.J. Funk for 3 yards in the first period, Floyd Slay for 17 in the second and 31 yards to Danny Leach in the third. All PAT efforts failed.

Post then hung on as Tahoka spent most of the last quarter deep in Post territory, but could only manage one score, a 4-yard pass from QB Trey Nance to Cody Bailey with less than a minute remaining. Tahoka had threatened twice earlier in the fourth, losing the ball on downs at the 2 once after having a first and goal at the 5 following a good run by Joey Stone. Brian Moore's 50-yard reception

of a Nance pass was the longest gainer for Tahoka in the game, and Moore also had a 30-yard kickoff return. Stone gained 48 yards in 15 carries and Michael Jackson gained 20 yards in 10 efforts. But it was on defense that Tahoka did best, with Stone the busiest tackler with 3 solo tackles and 13 assists. Ray Mulanax and Bryan Patterson were in on 9 tackles each and Billy Wilborn and Moore had 8 each, Wilborn having 3 solo tackles.

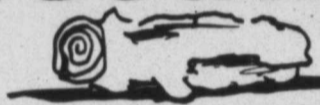

He said that the disorder I described, of dropping off to sleep at any time, often without even being aware of it a few seconds later, is called "narcolepsy."

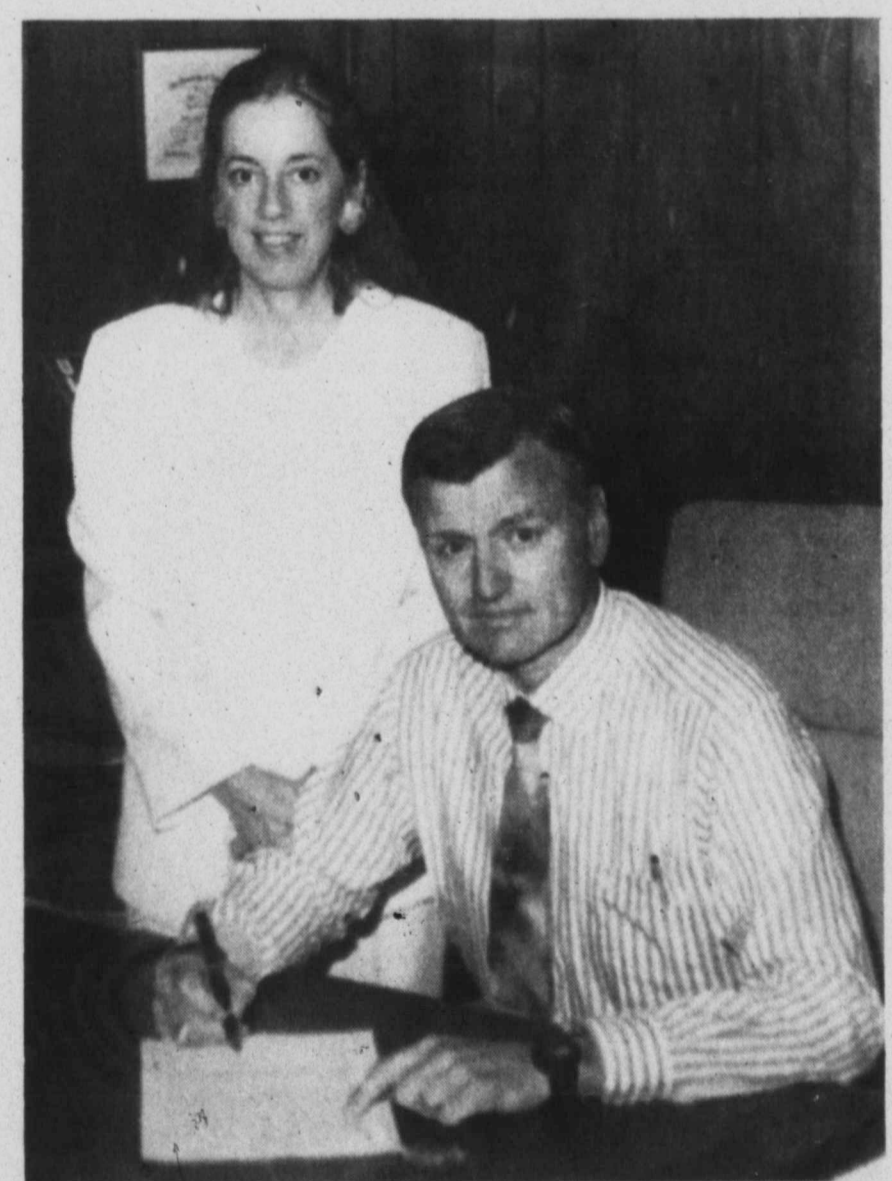
I thought that was a rash you get from being too closely associated with undercover drug enforcement officers.

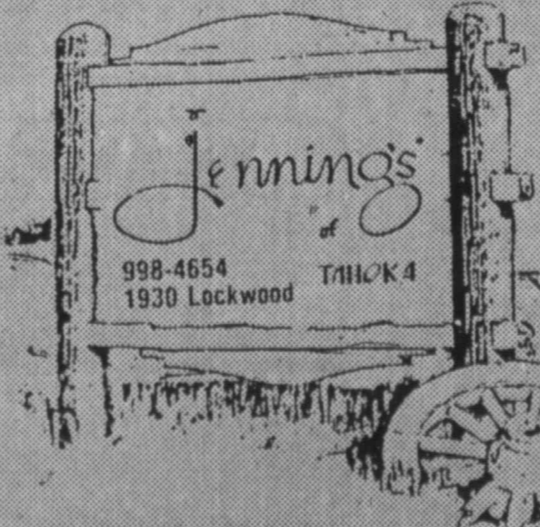

One of the students, Stephanie Thomas, added these comments: "The men shared with us about their experiences in the various wars and told us about what is happening in the Middle East."

"One main point they stressed was the importance of writing to our service men and women. Many service men do not receive any mail or very little at all. Mail call is a very important part of their day. The men have a lot of time on their hands and become very bored and lonely."

"The men then introduced themselves and told what their jobs were in the war."

Volunteers Trained To Help With Vision Screening Here

Eight women in Tahoka have consistently and generously given of their time to volunteer assistance to school nurse Joan Knox in carrying out vision and hearing screening for students at Tahoka I.S.D. These women are Kandy Jay, Cheryl Krey, Karen Kelln, Cindy Hawthorne, Alecia Curry, Jo Ella Rash, Carol Miller and Charlsie Tekell.

Every year, students at Tahoka I.S.D. receive vision screening to test their eyesight, and hearing screening to determine if there is a hearing problem. Under the guidance of Mrs. Knox, these volunteer women coordinate their efforts to complete this screening as early as possible in the school year, so that students with these special needs may be identified. Any student who the volunteers feel may have a possible vision or hearing problem is referred to the school nurse, who then tests the child again to determine if there is a question of vision or hearing problems.

These eight volunteers have been trained by a director at Lubbock Dept. of Health for the use of visual screening equipment and an audiometer for hearing screening. Most of these volunteers have given several days of their time to the school for the last few years. Having credentialed volunteers allows the screening for all grades to be completed earlier in the school year, which helps identify students with special needs and helps meet these needs sooner. The students and teachers both have a more successful year if everyone is aware of a particular problem.

"These ladies are just great," says Mrs. Knox. "It is such a help to me to have them come and provide this service. They don't have to do it - they are simply volunteering out of the generosity of their hearts, and a commitment to the needs of children," she added.

Volunteers do not have to be credentialed or trained to assist in the screening process. "We can use anyone who wants to help," says Mrs. Knox. "There is always a need for other volunteers to assist in bringing the students to and from their class-

rooms, to see that these students are in the correct place for testing, and to see that they return to their classrooms when the screening is complete. A volunteer does not have to be trained or take special classes to help," she adds.

For those who would like to get their credentials to assist in using the equipment for visual and hearing screening, several more opportunities to do so are being arranged by Cheryl Krey and Kandy Jay. Mrs. Krey organized a class last spring in preparation for this fall's screening and arranged for a director from the Lubbock Health Dept. to spend a day in Tahoka training volunteers. There will be a training session for the use of vision screening equipment, scoliosis determination, and using an audiometer for hearing screening.

1. Young persons are more likely to be victims than older persons.
2. Crime is essentially interracial - 84 percent of black victims said their attackers were black; 80 percent of white victims identified their attackers as white.
3. Three percent of Americans (6 million) are the victims of violent crimes each year.
4. Although women of all ages, races, and income levels are victims

Huffaker said, "Most growers don't understand the difference between Cotton Incorporated and the National Cotton Council. CI promotes cotton through research, marketing and advertising, whereas NCC sets policy, determines standards and represents the cotton industry in Washington, D.C."

Suggestions Given On Harvest Safety

Harvest is always a busy time of the year. And, it is also one of the most hazardous times for farm families.

"There are many causes of harvest-related accidents," said Sammy Sims of Taylor Tractor and Equipment Co., Inc. in Tahoka. "But there are ways to reduce the potential for accidents."

"Equipment operators who have been in harvesting accidents usually have several reasons why the accident occurred," said Sims. "Hurrying to meet harvest deadlines or beat the weather usually tops the list."

Harvest accidents also occur when operators are making adjustments or repairs to equipment. "Disengage the power to all equipment, and shut off the engine, before working on it," said Sims. "Also properly support any raised equipment before

going under it to make adjustments or repairs.

"The operator's manual contains vital safety information. Make it a standard practice to review the manual every year before starting harvest or other activities."

Accidents are not limited to the equipment operator. Helpers are also susceptible to injury. "When working with a helper, always be sure of where that person is and avoid doing things that will put them at risk," noted Sims. "Make sure helpers know the dangers of all equipment, especially harvest equipment like combines, augers, trucks and wagons."

Farm equipment operators are also exposed to dangers which may be beyond their control. "Harvest time usually means transporting equipment and the harvested crop on public roads, often after darkness falls," explains Sims. "Make sure all equipment safety lighting and reflectors are in working condition and use them, even during daylight hours. Extra lighting during daylight will attract the attention of other drivers and alert them to the equipment."

Shannon Lawson Now Ladyjack

Shannon Lawson, former star basketball player for the Tahoka Lady Bulldogs and then for the Howard College Hawks, now is a member of the Stephen F. Austin Ladyjack basketball team, having finished junior college and going to the SFA team as a junior post.

The team opens its season Nov. 19 against the Spanish Olympic team. SFA is a member of the Southland Conference.

According to an SFA news release, Lawson averaged 12 points and 8.8 rebounds last season.

Cotton Plant Opens At Post

"We are going to wrap the world in West Texas cotton," Joe B. Pate Jr., warehouseman and cotton farmer, said Friday at the grand opening of the new Cotton Unlimited, Inc., manufacturing plant in Post.

Working with Paul Muncrief, a Post inventor, Pate and other investors have spent the past few months retrofitting a former textile mill to manufacture an insulation product made principally from cotton fibers. Research and development of the product and organization of the start-up company have been in progress for more than four years.

The aims of the project are to capture a share of the United States' \$20 billion-a-year insulation market and to create a new market for Texas cotton.

The insulation product, manufactured on a combination of conventional textile equipment and a new type of bonding oven developed by Muncrief, will have similar insulation properties to fiberglass but will require far less energy to manufacture.

Unlike fiberglass, Cotton Unlimited's insulation, made from a blend of 80 percent cotton fibers and 20 percent polyester, will not require that installers wear respirators or protective clothing. This will help to reduce costs to contractors who use the cotton insulation instead of fiberglass.

Cotton Unlimited's basic product, a non-woven textile blanket of insulating material, will be fire retarded and can be adapted for use as insulation in homes, commercial structures, automobiles, airplanes and appliances.

"Cotton is a natural, renewable resource material and is better for the environment. We hope this new product will make us an industry leader in the effort to protect the environment," Pate said.

The Cotton Unlimited manufacturing plant is housed in a former textile mill that closed several years ago. The equipment is laid out according to the latest modular manufacturing techniques, with a single production line that can be expanded to as many as six production lines or "modules", as product demand increases.

"Our plant can consume 12,000 bales of cotton a year with the present line of equipment. If we gain a significant share of the insulation market, we could consume as much as 500,000 bales a year by the turn of the century," said W.D. Martin, company spokesman.

Remember Servicemen Overseas With Care Packages, Says Supporter

"Have any of you thought about the upcoming holidays? Two important dates — Thanksgiving and Christmas are coming up," says Mrs. Janie Isbell, who is urging area citizens to remember the U.S. servicemen who are currently with the Desert Shield Operation in Saudi Arabia.

Mrs. Isbell is trying to start a support group in Tahoka to send letters and care packages to the American military in the Persian Gulf. She has a son, Scott, who has been on standby for deployment to the Gulf area for some time now, and knows of many local men and women who are already involved in the crisis.

"Thanksgiving and Christmas are times we all consider as having family, good times, lots of good food and remember people that we have forgotten or maybe just let slide most of the year. There are good feelings in our hearts, thanking the Good Lord for our many blessings, and asking for guidance for those who are away from home, and world peace!" said Mrs. Isbell.

"Scott was in Turkey (in the serv-

ice) last year at Thanksgiving and Christmas. We had all of the above feelings, but yet there was also an empty place in our hearts. Although he has not yet been shipped over to Saudi Arabia and some of your loved ones are still waiting to receive the dreaded news that they are moving out to the Persian Gulf — we have to remember there are someone's loved ones already there. Many of them are from Lynn County, and we need to write letters, send newspapers on current happenings, games, cards, any kind of care packages," she urges.

Throughout the past several weeks, the News has listed servicemen who have families in this area. Two names added this week are Moses Tijerina, who is in the Marines, and Andy Telesantos, in the Navy. Some of these listed are now in Saudi Arabia.

There have been many people involved in the ribbon support program, begun here by Mrs. Isbell. benefits. The Soil Conservation Service has been working closely with farmers to ensure that all Lynn County producers stay in compliance with the program.

Producers who chose to overseed wheat into their cotton need to have the seeding done by Nov. 1. Many questions have been raised as to when the wheat can be turned under. There are many factors effecting the date the wheat can be plowed up, such as moisture and wind conditions. According to SCS wind energy reports, February through May are the peak wind erosion months. April 1st is considered to be the day for the highest wind erosion potential. It is very important to do what we can to control soil erosion during this period. Wheat cover should be left in place as close to April 1 as possible.

Producers need to contact the local SCS office before plowing up their winter cover crop. Office personnel will make a field visit to check the cover and to determine if it can be turned under.

"We want to work with the producers of Lynn County to make this program work," stated an SCS spokesman. "Representatives from environmental groups and from Washington are keeping a watchful eye on the Texas South Plains. We want them to see that the present program does reduce soil erosion by wind and water."

The local SCS staff are glad to answer any questions concerning conservation compliance.

Following the breakfast the West Point Club had their monthly meeting. Carol Botkin gave the program on how to "Restraining Beads". Seven club members and two guests were present.





THS Grad Is Pilot As Well As Minister

Rev. Phil McClendon, minister of St. John's United Methodist Church in Stamford for more than five years, recently was the subject of a feature article in the Abilene Reporter-News. Writer Nancy Robinson wrote earlier this month about McClendon's two vocations - as a dedicated minister and as a pilot who uses his own plane in his church work.

McClendon, a 1973 graduate of Tahoka High School and son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris McClendon of Rt. 4, Tahoka, told Ms. Robinson he always wanted to be a pilot. "His father was an Army Air Corps instructor who flew P-38s and P-51s in World War II," the article noted.

"His older brother learned to fly in the Navy...Phil never stopped believing he'd be a pilot someday, too...However, unknown to Phil, God had a plan for the Tahoka kid who loved athletics, especially running track. At a Methodist church camp, teenager Phil became a Christian. A year later, he accepted what he knew was a clear-cut call from God to be a preacher."

McClendon then earned a degree from Baylor, a master's of divinity

from Asbury Seminary, married the former Jenny Orson of Lamesa, and they have three children. He pastored some smaller churches, including Amherst, before going to Stamford.


Ms. Robinson's story explained that after Rev. McClendon went to Stamford, his childhood dream became reality after a member of the church was looking for someone to be a partner in a plane, and they bought a Cessna Skylark 175 from McClendon's secretary. The minister then had to go to Abilene for flight

instruction. He said the church members encouraged him, and after he got his private pilot's license, "he has used his aviation skills to make it possible for him to teach retreats, take families to funerals, give tours of the area to new preachers in West Texas, and fulfill a number of duties including all sorts of work on behalf of the Northwest Texas Conference and still be back in the pulpit Sunday morning.

The story noted that his father, Morris McClendon, has renewed his own pilot requirements and that the two enjoy flying together.

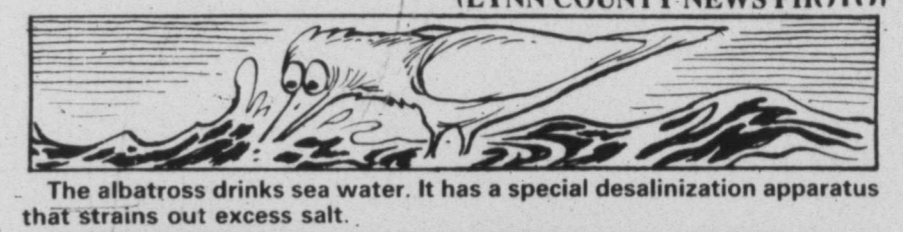
