This activity will take place in some 40 towns within the South Plains Council. Also there will be a Scout Speakers Bureau in action during Scout Week where outstanding volunteer adult Scouters will present Scout programs to various Civic and Service Clubs throughout the Council area.

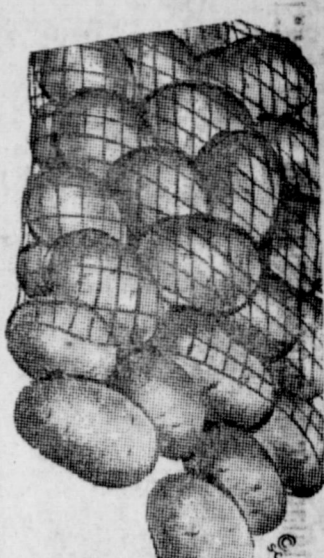

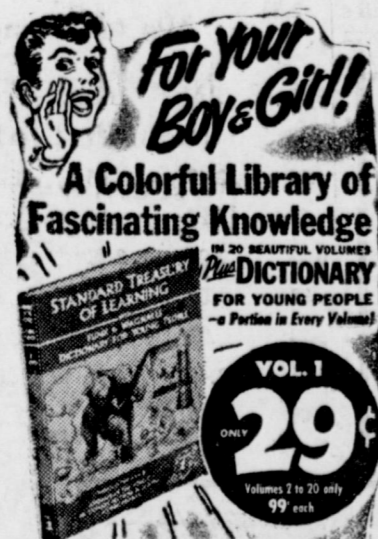
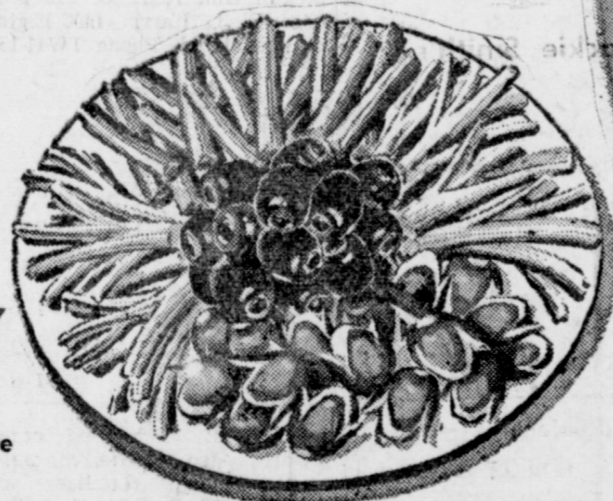

As the pictures at the top of this page indicate there are lots of strange sounds around the Journal office these days.

Cherry Hoybrook's corner sounds like a digital computer center when she gets a yen to punch tape. The tape she is punching is actually a code tape which is then fed into the Intertype which sets the type automatically.

The sounds in the backshop are H. B. Flanagan giving three cheers for the Teletype-setter and our old Intertype working faster than it ever has automatically.

The whole affair in the backshop is just like a player piano. The tape runs through the machine and the type falls with no fingers involved.

Another new sound brings hurrahs from yours truly and that is our new Fairchild Scan-A-Graver. With this device we put a picture on a drum which revolves while an electric eye scans the picture and a needle on another drum engraves the picture on plastic. All of this carrying on accompanied by some buzzing of varying pitch results in an engraving from which we can print pictures in the paper immediately. This also means we can get a picture in right up to the last minute.

The whole idea is that all these new sounds will combine to bring you a lot better Muleshoe Journal from now on.

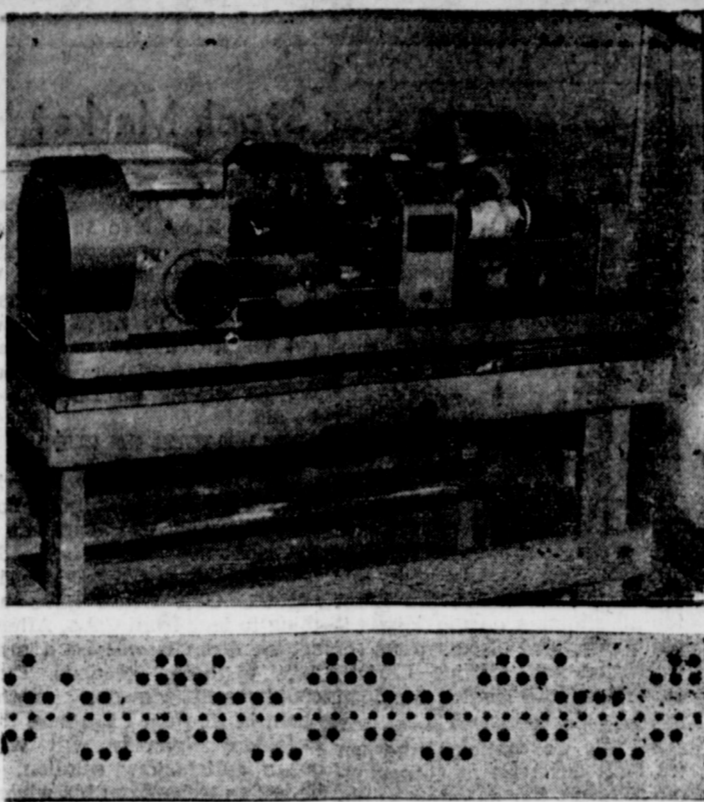
In addition to all this equipment to print a better paper the Journal's job shop has some new stuff too.

# GREEN IS MY THUMB Secrets of Rose Pruning Revealed

Cutting back woody shrubs and trees provides good January and February leisure gardening on the West Plains.

All dead wood and unsightly or snarled branches should be pruned from your trees and shrubs before spring growth starts. After spring growth begins sucker growth must be held in check.

In cutting rose bushes, remove all weak or diseased branches completely. It is a general practice to cut the strong rose canes one-third of their length. Take care to make a sharp cut when pruning roses. Rough and uneven cuts provide areas for disease. If you cut rose canes just above a leaf bud, leaving a short stem. You stand a better chance of eliminating disease than by merely cutting half way between joints and leaving a long stem.

There are some types of trees and shrubs which should be planted before spring arrives. It would be advisable to ask the nurseryman you trade with about planting dates of your favorite trees, shrubs, and flowers. If you plant roses now, it is advisable to "hill up" your

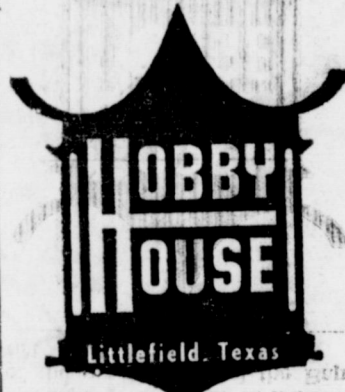

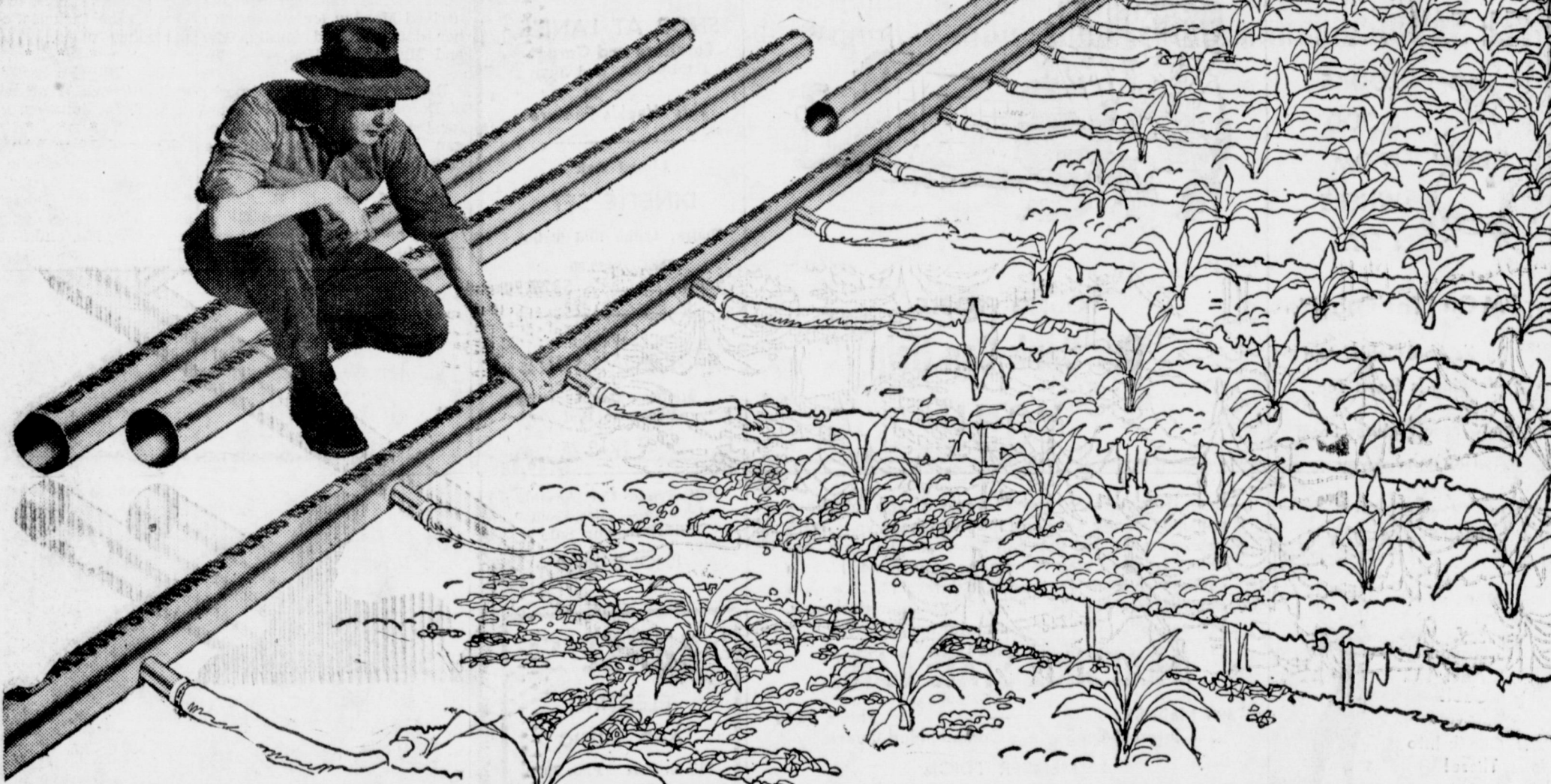

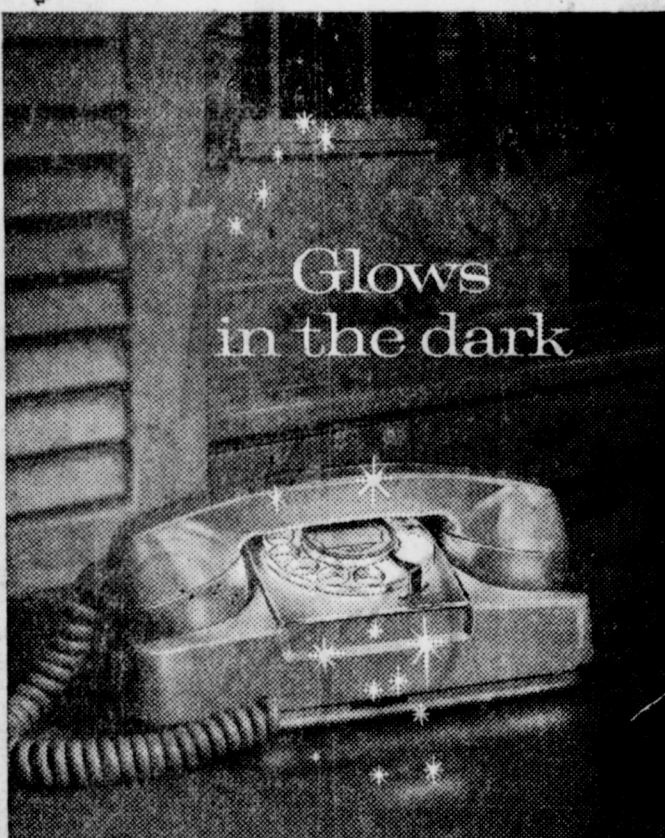
