## Bulldogs Bop Sundown For 20-6 District Win

The Tahoka Bulldogs generated more offense than in any other game this season last Friday night, and the defense continued to play well as Tahoka downed Sundown 20-6 in a district game here.

Quarterback Trey Nance passed for two touchdowns and ran for an-

other to lead the way offensively. And the Bulldogs' running game, even playing most of the time without top runner Joey Stone, who carried just four times because of an injury, turned in respectable numbers—173 yards, with Michael Jackson getting 87 of that, averaging

5.8 per carry.

Nance passed to Brian Moore 23 yards for the first Tahoka touchdown, as the Dogs drove 65 yards on their first possession of the game. The drive featured running by Jackson and Albert Mendoza, who kicked the point after Moore's touch-

down. Sundown toughened up in the second period, blocking a Tahoka punt and taking over at the Bulldog 12. But this drive was stopped when lineman Jay Forsythe recovered a Roughneck fumble at the 8. However, after a Tahoka punt out to the Bulldog 43, Sundown scored, on a fourth down play from the 35, with Jeff Streetman breaking through the middle for the score. An attempted pass for two points was knocked down by Nance, and the score was 7-6 in favor of Tahoka at halftime.

Opening the second half, Tahoka drove to a touchdown on a series which included passes of 10 and 14 to Mike Burleson, both from Nance, who capped the drive with a 10-yard jaunt around left end into the end zone. A running try for points was stopped, and Tahoka had a 13-6 lead.

Lineman Billy Wilborn gave the Sundown offense a hard time, sacking the quarterback twice, and Daniel Garvin intercepted a Sundown pass to keep the Roughnecks from generating any success in the last period. After Garvin intercepted and returned to the Sundown 19, Nance hit Burleson for 15 and a touchdown. René Luna kicked the extra point.

After that, the biggest play was a 39-yard run by Mendoza which was called back on a clipping penalty. Late in the game Tahoka held on downs at the Bulldog 21 to insure the 20-6 victory, second in the win column for Tahoka this season, which

## Burglars Strike At Wilson

Burglars struck four places in Wilson during the last week, breaking into the Cotton Boll, the Country Store, Wilson High School and Wilson city hall.

## Lynn Voters To Make Their Choices Tuesday

Voters in Lynn County will join other Texas voters Tuesday in putting a stop to what to many has seemed a long and unpleasant governor's race, plus other statewide races which have featured some vigorous campaigning by both Republicans and Democrats.

One of the choices Lynn County voters will have to make is between the incumbent state representative for this district, Democrat David Counts of Knox City, and his Republican challenger, insurance man John Pennington of Sweetwater. Both have campaigned hard and both have been in Lynn County, the west end of District 78, in the last couple of weeks.

There is major interest in the governor's race between Democrat Ann Richards and Republican Clayton Williams, with Libertarian candidate Jeff Daiell also on the ballot.

There also are about 17 registered write-in candidates for governor, with a list of these candidates supposed to be available at polling places. Their names are not on the ballot, but they may be written in.

There also is much interest in this agricultural area in the race for Texas Agriculture Commissioner between the man who now holds the office, Democrat Jim Hightower, and his challenger, Rick Perry, a state legislator and farmer/rancher from Haskell.

Several county and district officials are on the ballot without opposition, having won the nominations of the Democratic party in the primary.

There also is one proposed constitutional amendment on the ballot, relating to the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices.

## Community Thanksgiving Dinner Set

The annual Community Thanksgiving Dinner will be held in Tahoka on Sunday, Nov. 11 in the school cafeteria. The traditional turkey and dressing meal is sponsored by Tahoka Chamberettes, with table decorations made by Tahoka Elementary students.

Cost of the meal is \$5 per plate for adults, and \$2.50 per plate for children under 12 years of age. Carry-out plates will be available.

The meal will consist of turkey, dressing, giblet gravy, green beans, sweet potatoes, fruit salad with whipping cream, cranberry sauce, homemade cheese rolls and dessert.

All proceeds from the meal will go to Chamberettes, who are a non-profit organization of women whose goal is to promote Tahoka. The group used funds from last year's dinner to purchase Christmas decorations for the courthouse square, and some of this year's funds will also go for Christmas decorations, as several new items will be added at the downtown square.

## Traffic By School Goes Other Way Starting Today

Starting today, Thursday, Nov. 1, the one-way traffic along Ave. O just east of Tahoka Elementary Schools will be going the opposite direction from what it has been.

Traffic has been one-way north on the two blocks of Ave. O between N. 2nd and N. 4th, but now is one-way south. The change was made effective today at the request of the police department, as the city attempts to keep traffic flowing on those streets where congestion is great at the end of the school day when parents go to pick up their children.

The three-deep parking which has halted all traffic no longer will be permitted, police said. The one-way rules are in effect from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. on school days only.

Angle parking spaces have been marked off on the west curb of Ave. O, next to the schools, and no parking will be allowed on the east curb of the two blocks affected. Also, parking no longer will be allowed on either side of the block of N. 4th St. which runs just north of the high school and football stadium, during school hours.

Another candidate is named Lloyd "Alamo" Scott, and you have to admit that "Alamo" would be a great name for a Texas governor.

Some guy named Ira Calkins is on the write-in list for every statewide office. He wants to be governor, lieutenant governor, ag commissioner, U.S. senator, and everything else.

Anyway, if you're in no hurry when you go to vote, you may want to look over the list of qualified write-ins. But even if you don't do that, please vote for somebody.

Actually, I kind of like Bubbles, who says she has nothing to hide in her past.

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## Texans are cheated by Williams' stand on debate

Evidently, the final chapter of the expected debate between state Treasurer Ann Richards and Midland oilman Clayton Williams Jr. was written Wednesday (October 10) when Williams failed to accept a League of Women Voters' invitation to a televised gubernatorial debate. Williams should bear the responsibility for cheating Texans out of a long, live look at the candidates.

Richards at least appeared ready when she declared at a news conference Wednesday (October 10) she would debate Williams anywhere, anytime. But Williams remained absent. All he's done so

far is to insist on a pointless precondition - that Richards promise not to engage in negative advertising - and then he'll debate. The bet here is that if Richards said OK, Williams would find another excuse to duck facing Richards and Texans.

Having hired crafty television managers to construct an image of himself as a knowledgeable, crime-fighting, tax-cutting candidate, Williams will now ride out the rest of the campaign hiding behind that image. It is a sorry day for Texas when the leading candidate for governor does not feel secure enough to debate the issues, especially when the state faces yet an-

other budgetary shortfall and must again go to court to try to figure out the school finance mess.

Having catapulted to front-runner status with a cagey use of television and millions of dollars to bury his opponents, Williams now refuses to go on television live - opting instead to present himself to thousands of Texas households in the safest way possible.

Williams' decision not to debate Richards live on television makes Richards' claim that Williams is scared of her and scared to reveal what - if anything - he knows about state government ring true. Williams' refusal should make voters

think twice about the man who faces down the criminals he features on his catchy new commercials that look like advertisements for this season's latest television cop shows.

The millions of dollars Williams spent on television creating a manly image, an image that was reinforced by macho slips of the tongue. The ads were designed to picture a tough, secure Texan. But the voters need to consider whether they have a claim of false advertising. How tough and secure is someone who refuses to join in a debate?

What a shot in the arm it would

have been for the public's ailing faith in government if the two candidates for governor could have met face to face with only a moderator and engaged in a conversation about their vision of Texas.

But could that be the problem? - that Williams is running for governor with no clue about what state government is or what he could do with it. All he has said so far in neat commercials is: That he is against drugs. Who isn't? He is against taxes. Who isn't? He wants criminals to pay for their crimes. Who doesn't? He wants Texas to be prosperous. Who wouldn't?

The people ought to be given an

opportunity to see and hear how the candidates for governor would go about fighting drugs, reducing or raising taxes, making criminals pay for their crimes, cutting waste in government and making Texas prosperous again. What Williams has done is to cheat people out of an opportunity to assess both candidates in a neutral setting and not in the slanted presentation of television commercials.

## Poka Lambro Urges Caution When Using AOS Companies

Consumers should be cautious before placing long distance or local calls away from home, urges Poka Lambro Telephone Cooperative, Inc.

Many telephones today are associated with alternate operator services or AOS companies. AOS companies resell telecommunications services and provide various forms of operator services, often at higher rates than other long distance companies providing operator services. They set their own rates, which local telephone companies have no control over.

As a result, customers have been billed for calls at rates two to three times that of other long distance companies. Often, customers are not aware of the charges before they place the calls.

AOS companies provide services through negotiated contracts with hotels, hospitals, universities and privately owned pay phones in malls, restaurants and convenience stores. AOS companies began as a result of deregulation in the telephone industry. Their rates are not regulated by state and federal commissions.

"We're seeing a lot of folks with bills for calls that are twice that of other long distance companies. Customers may not know that they're using an AOS company. As a result, customers are very upset and angry when they get their bill," says a Poka-Lambro representative.

Before placing a call, Poka-Lambro advises customers to ask the operator the following questions:

Which operator service company are you with?

What rates will I be charged?

How will I be billed for the call?

Depending upon the information received, customers may ask the operator to complete the call, or ask to be connected to a different long distance company.

Customers should keep in mind that they can access directly a different long distance company even if they are using a phone that is serviced by an AOS provider. To reach a different company, customers should dial their access number (for example, 10288 for AT&T, 10333 for US Sprint, 10222 for MCI) followed by 0 and the number they are calling.

If customers have questions regarding charges on their bill from AOS companies, they should call the number for the AOS company listed on their bill. Regulations require AOS companies to provide a toll-free number for inquiries.

"Unfortunately, Poka-Lambro does not have any control over these AOS companies. If customers have complaints, they should contact the AOS company. If the customer isn't satisfied after contacting the AOS company, they should contact the Texas Public Utility Commission," a Poka-Lambro representative said.

## Police Chief, Sheriff Endorse Gramm

Tahoka Police Chief Jerry Webster and Lynn County Sheriff Jack Miller have endorsed U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm for re-election, according to a release from Gramm headquarters.

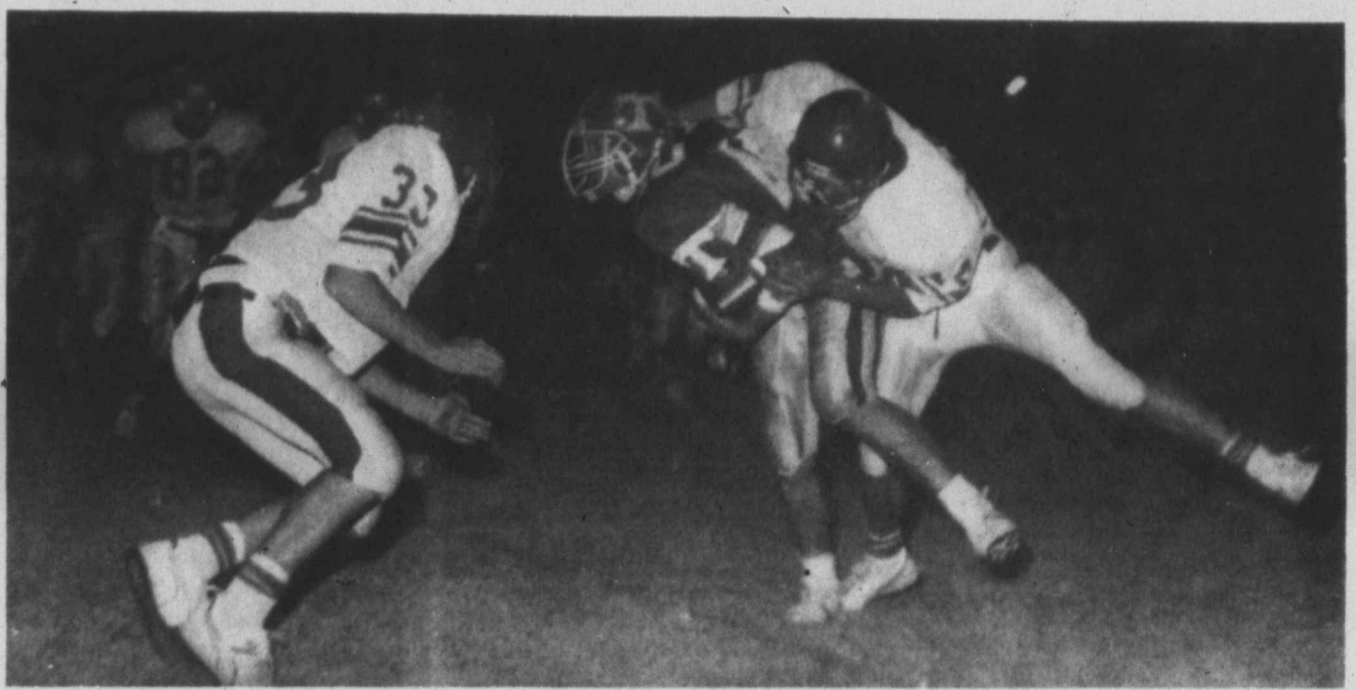

Corky is suffering from a rare form of cancer and is being treated with the new Interferon treatments. He is doing well at this time.

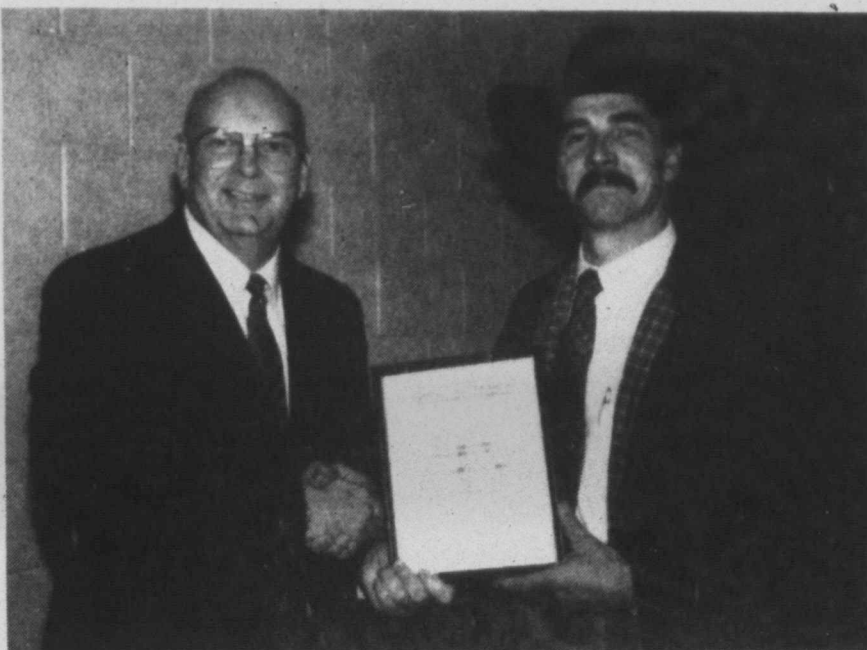
## O'Donnell Chalks Up 34-3 Win Over Anton

## Farm, Ranch Surveys To Begin In November

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1990 acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

"Extreme weather conditions have certainly had an impact on Texas agriculture this year. From the heavy rains and flooding in East Texas last spring to this summer's prolonged hot, dry conditions, weather has been a major factor in Texas production this year. These surveys should help us summarize where the industry stands at the end of 1990," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Information from these confidential surveys conducted by mail, telephone or in person will also help producers make their plans for the coming year", added Findley.

## Watch For Brown Patch On Lawns

If lawns have been infected with brown patch in prior years, get ready to treat again, says a plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Moist conditions with cooler night temperatures are ideal for the development of brown patch disease," said Dr. George Philley, plant pathologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. "San Augustine is the most common lawn grass affected, but centipede and bermuda grass are also susceptible under certain conditions. Early infections can go unnoticed unless regular inspections of the lawn are made. Late September and October are when symptoms are most apparent."

"We have found that heavily fertilized, well watered lawns are very

susceptible to brown patch," Philley said. "Lush, moist grass creates an ideal environment for disease development."

The lawn-devastating disease appears in patches as large as 30 feet in diameter. The leaves turn yellow and are easily pulled from the stolon or stem. As the affected areas age, new green growth may develop toward the center of the patch, causing a donut-shaped appearance.

"A number of fungicides are available to prevent or treat brown patch," Philley said. "For the fungicides to be most effective, it is best to apply them before the disease develops. In lawns where treatment is limited, be sure to first treat the areas that were previously infected because the disease has a tendency to reappear in the same areas."

## Poka-Lambro Moving Toward Cellular Service

With only minor electronic adjustments remaining, Digital Cellular of Texas, a division of Poka-Lambro Telecommunications, is rapidly approaching the date for its cellular signal activation, bringing cellular service to this area of West Texas for the first time, said Mickey L. Sims, general manager of Poka-Lambro.

"Basically, the physical plant is in place and we're ready to go right

now," said Sims. "We already have the fiber optics cable laid, the cellular equipment is installed and the four towers are all built or leased." Digital Cellular of Texas plans to initiate service on a market-by-market basis, beginning with Lamesa. The tentative operational date is late November.

With cell sites located in Andrews, Lamesa, Seminole and Post, the Digital Cellular of Texas system will provide cellular coverage for the entire rural area between Lubbock and Midland/Odessa. An additional cell site for Tahoka is in the planning stages, pending Federal Communications approval.

The new service will be sold through authorized agents in each of the towns covered by the system. Pricing plans have yet to be announced.

Cellular telephones provide high quality mobile communication for transmitting and receiving phone calls "using standardized technology to provide a future nationwide calling scope," said Sims. The cellular system will be instantly compatible with the Southwestern Bell Mobile Systems.

Poka-Lambro currently sells, installs and maintains cellular phones at its headquarters 11 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87.

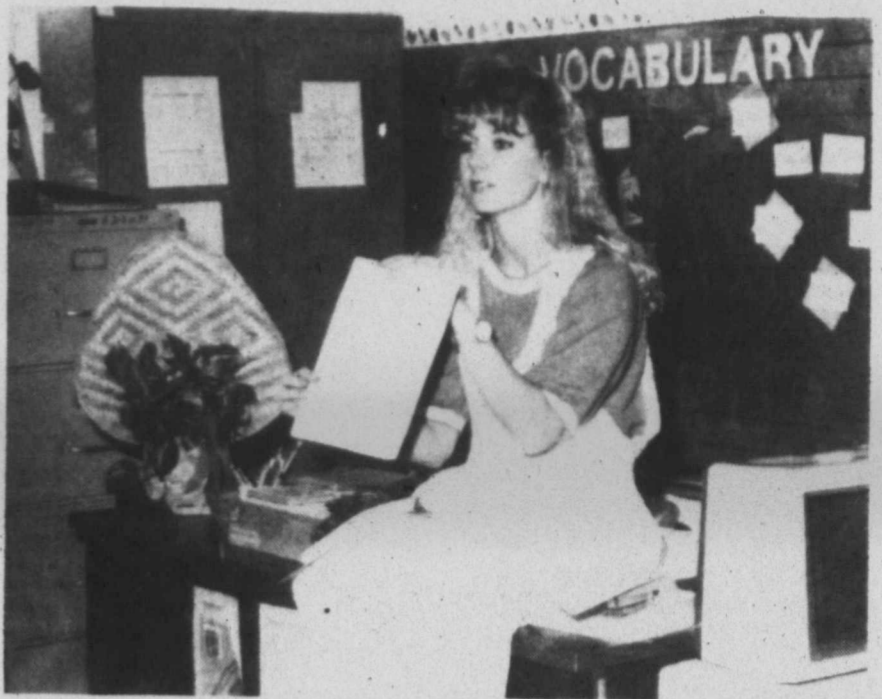

"Every child is capable of reaching and going beyond his/her developmental and cognitive level," she stresses. "It is up to teachers, with the help of parents, to help children develop to his/her full potential," she added.

Teaching involves more than books and lessons, however, which Miss McCracken discovered on her first day of school. She recalls her worst moment happening on that day, when "all the milk and snack money got messed up."

She is enjoying her teaching career, and says she has "one of the best classes (of students) in school."

### Texas 'Orphans' Plan Meeting

Over 4,000 orphaned, abandoned, homeless children were brought to Texas from New York City and Boston orphanages from the mid-1800s until as late as 1929.

Children were brought in groups traveling with two or more adults in charge, and placed out with new families. Since the children came on trains, today this era in history is known as the "Orphan Trains Era" and stands out as the beginning of foster parent care in America.

During the 75 years of this mass movement of children in America, at least 150,000 children were relocated.

Odessa has been chosen as a place

for a one-day gathering Nov. 28, of these children who today are in their 70s and 80s. There will also be a meeting in Austin Dec. 1.

### Accident Report

Capt. L.A. Reinhart, District Supervisor of the Lubbock Highway Patrol District comprised of 21 counties reported that for the month of September the troopers had investigated three fatal accidents, 53 personal injury accidents and 56 property damage accidents.

Sgt. Lamar Beckworth of Brownfield reports that in Lynn County, troopers investigated no fatal accidents, one personal injury accident and no property damage accidents in the month of September.

## Wondering About History Book?

### Here Are Some Answers

Here are some questions and answers about the family stories which will be included in the Lynn County Family History Book.

The deadline for submitting stories is Nov. 15.

*What should stories include, in addition to the actual story?*

A title or heading (family name) and, at the bottom, the name of the person who wrote it. Also, please put your own word count at the end of the story.

*Can I write a story for my deceased parents and grandparents?*

Each living family unit, one member of which has ever lived in Lynn County, is entitled to 500 words of free (more if you wish to pay \$15 per hundred words). There are different ways you can include your deceased parents and grandparents:

- (1) Weave it into your own story;
- (2) If there are several children, then each of them in telling his family story might include different items of inter-

est about the parents or grandparents; (3) Write a well rounded, full story of the grandparents and/or parents and purchase an additional book for \$49.95 plus tax; (4) purchase space in the memorial/tribute section and tell their story.

Remember, each family unit gets 500 words free. You can put anybody into the story and use whatever name you want at the top.

*If several families combine their stories, do they have to pay for words over 500?*

Each family unit is entitled to its own story of 500 words, but more than one family should write separate stories if they want more than 500 words total.

*How do we count dates in our stories?*

Month, date and year each count as one word except single numbers.

*What words in our stories do not count?*

A, an, I.

*If husband and wife have two individual pictures instead of one single picture, will both be printed?*

It is better to combine the two into one by cutting off the center border and taping them together. The publisher will not cut photos.

*What kind of photos are acceptable?*

Good quality black and white photos are preferred. Good quality color photos are acceptable. Photos clipped from newspapers and copies made on copying machines are not acceptable.

*Do you guarantee that photos will be returned?*

Every effort will be made to return your photos to you, but we cannot absolutely guarantee it. If you want to be sure your photo will not be lost, have a copy made commercially and keep the original yourself.

*What should be put on the back of photos we submit?*

Using a soft pencil so as not to indent the paper, put (1) order of preference if you submit more than one photo, (2) identifying names, places and dates, if you want that listed, (3) your name and address.

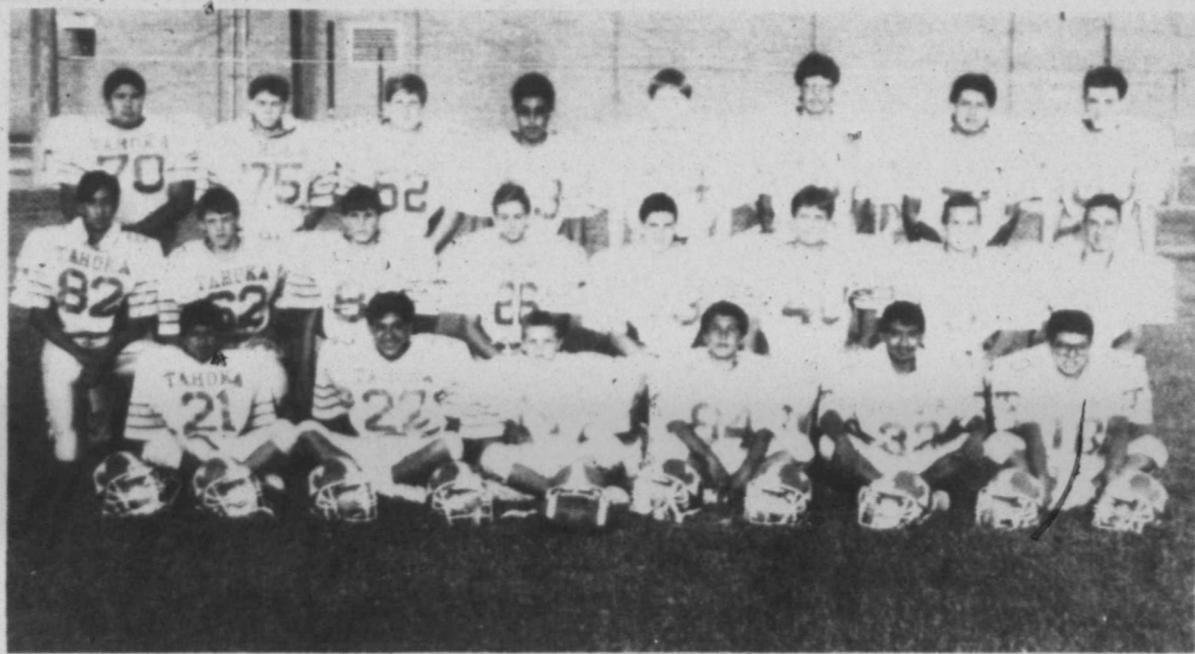
