It was suggested that interested persons just show up with their equipment and follow their noses to the right spot.

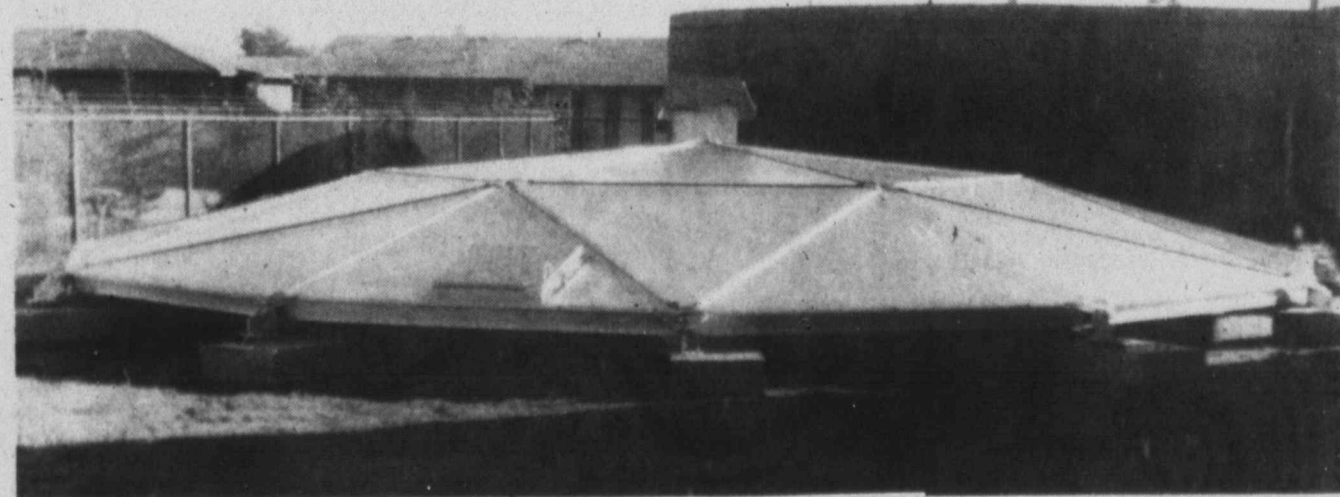
THE SIXTH ST. SAGE says that a friend is a person who knows you and still likes you.

Lynn Backs Losers, Winners

About 40 per cent of Lynn County's eligible voters went to the polls Tuesday and a majority of these supported loser Clayton Williams for governor of Texas, winger Phil Gramm for U.S. Senator and apparent winner Rick Perry for Texas Commissioner of Agriculture.

Total vote from Lynn County's 14 precincts plus absentee votes was 1783; there are about 4500 registered voters in the county.

In the county, Williams received 998 votes for governor and Ann Richards had 663. This pretty well followed the West Texas trend, as this area of the state gave Williams the most votes, but the large cities downstate voted heavily for Mrs. Richards.

Lynn County also voted for incumbent state representative for this district David Counts, with Democrat Counts getting 1045 votes to 524 for Republican challenger John Pennington of Sweetwater. Counts, of Knox City, was the winner throughout the district, which includes several counties east of Lynn.

In Lynn, Gramm had 1049 votes to 612 for Hugh Parmer.

Lynn voters went heavily for Republican Perry, giving him 1284 votes to just 435 for incumbent Democrat Jim Hightower. This was a close race statewide, announced only Wednesday morning as an apparent

victory for Perry.

Mustangs Maul Leopards 56-12

Wilson built up a sizable halftime lead before racking up four more touchdowns in the second half to bury the New Home Leopards, 56-12, in a District 4-A six-man matchup.

Michael Villarreal scored three touchdowns in the second quarter on a 16-yard run, and an 18-yard pass and a 48-yard pass, off of Alwyn Hatchett's sure arm.

Albert Riojas scored three times also - on 12-, 1-c and 42-yard runs. Five other Mustangs would score before the game ended.

The Tahoka Bulldogs will wind up the 1990 football season here Friday night, playing host to New Deal and hoping to punctuate the season with a victory over the Lions.

"New Deal is like us, in that they have been an up-and-down team, playing very well some weeks and not so well on others," said Coach Joe Paradis. "To beat them we will have to play well."

Last Friday night the Bulldogs lost to Idalou 26-7, after the score was tied 7-7 at halftime. It was a little unusual for the 2-7 Bulldogs, who normally play better in the second half than their opponents. Trey Nance scored Tahoka's only touchdown on a 1-yard keeper in the first quarter and Albert Mendoza kicked the extra point. Idalou tied the score just before halftime on a 1-yard play by Freddie Martinez. Martinez

scored twice more in the third quarter

Michael Jackson was Tahoka's leading rusher with 51 yards in 11 carries, averaging 4.6 per carry. Nance gained 37 yards in 9 carries, and René Luna gained 15 in 4 efforts.

Biggest gain of the game for Tahoka was a 44-yard pass from Nance to Mike Burleson.

Mendoza played an outstanding game on defense, and was in on 14 tackles, including 6 unassisted. Ray Mulanax and Jackson had 11 tackles each and Nance 9.

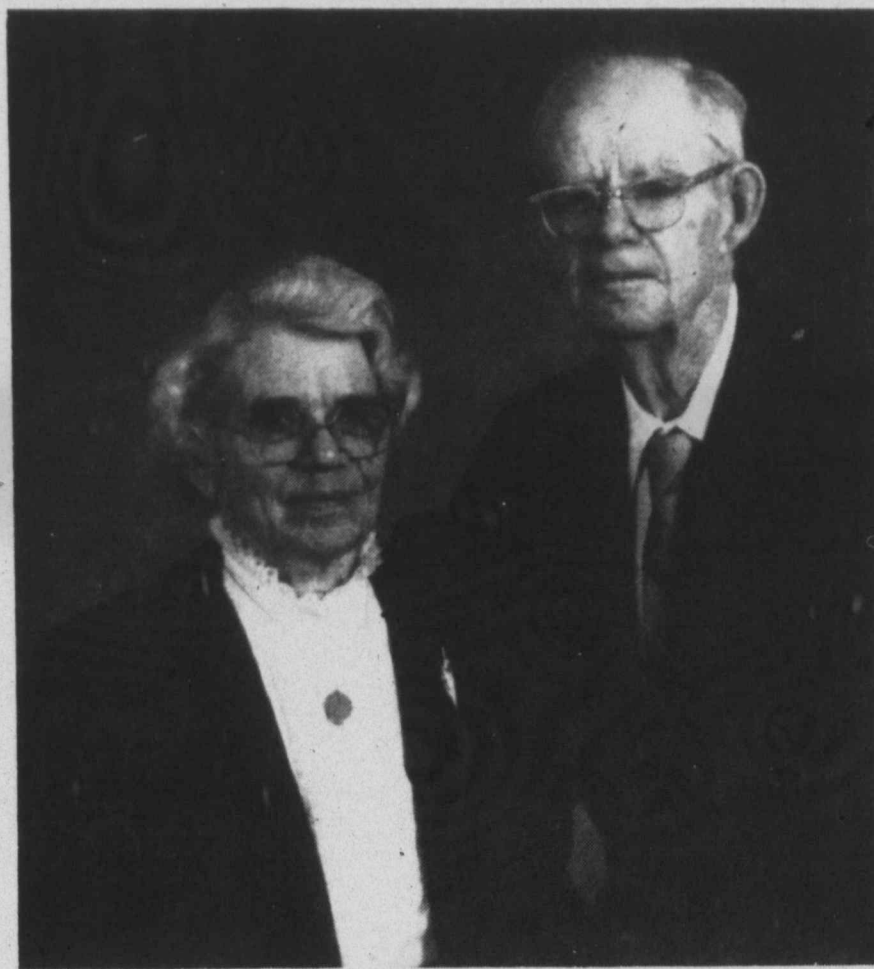

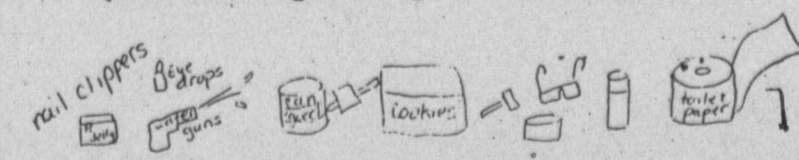

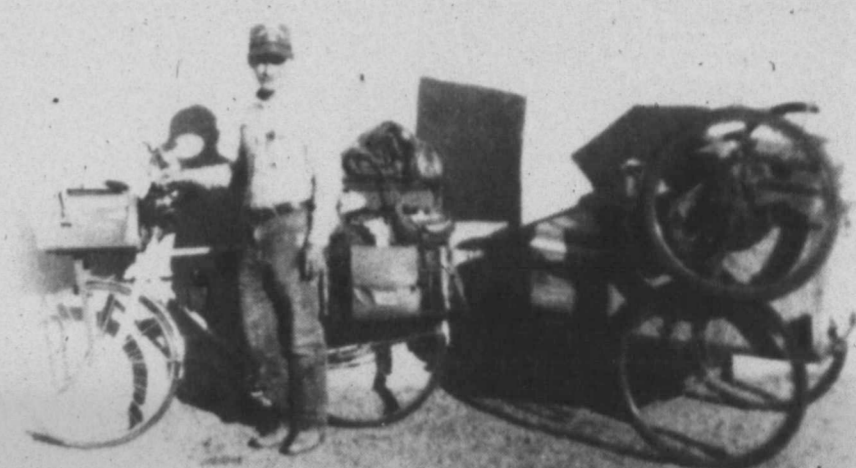
Eagles Clip Antelopes 25-7

The family suggests memorials to the Bailey County Ministerial Alliance Prescription Fund, care of First United Methodist Church in Muleshoe.

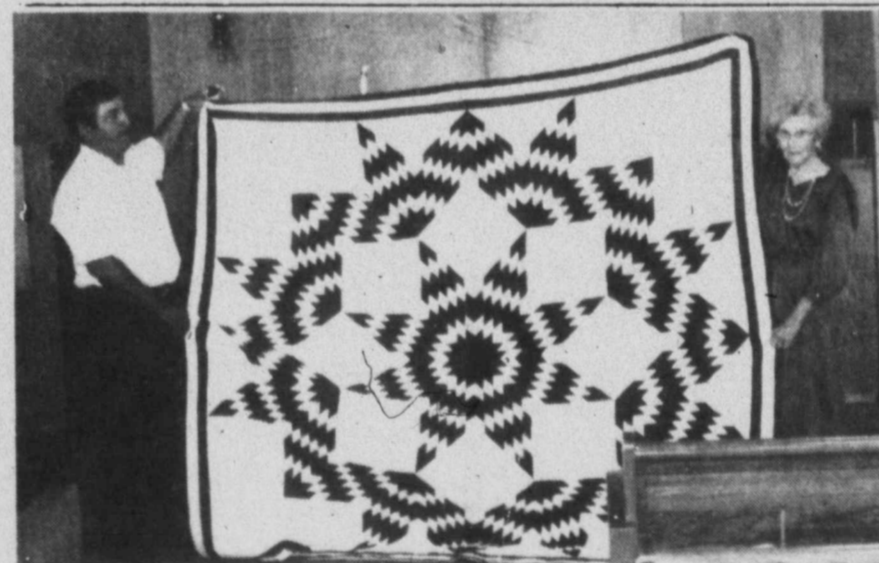

Crop Insurance Move Praised

In the final deliberations on the 1990 Farm Bill, Congress came through with a key waiver regarding emergency loans and crop insurance that has been described as extremely important to Texas farmers and ranchers.

"The Texas Congressional Delegation has displayed its political muscle and willingness to work together. Many Texas producers would have suffered had we not gotten this waiver passed," said S.M. True of Plainview, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

At the recommendation of Congressman Bill Sarpalis (D-Texas), House Agriculture Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Texas) inserted language into the Farm Bill Conference Report to "waive" a crop insurance requirement for Emergency eligibility from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

The waiver insures that producers seeking emergency loan assistance from FmHA will be considered even if they did not purchase crop insurance. A common complaint among producers is that crop insurance has not served as an effective risk management tool for Texas farmers.

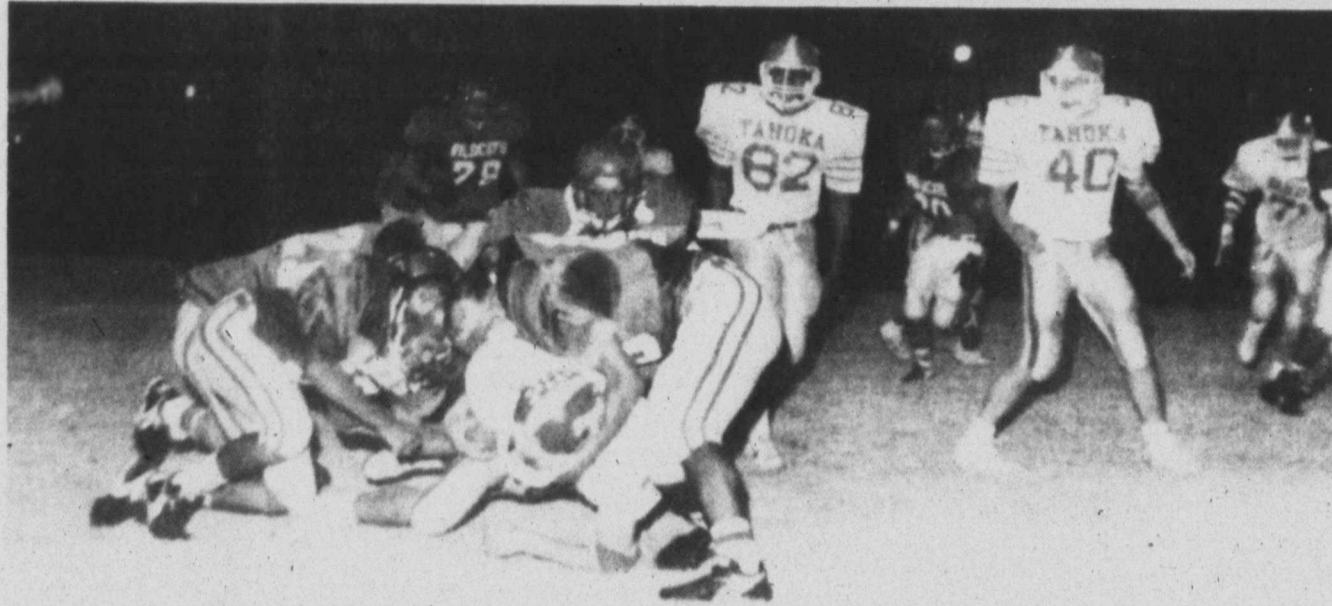

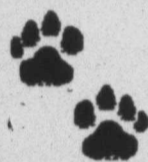
