

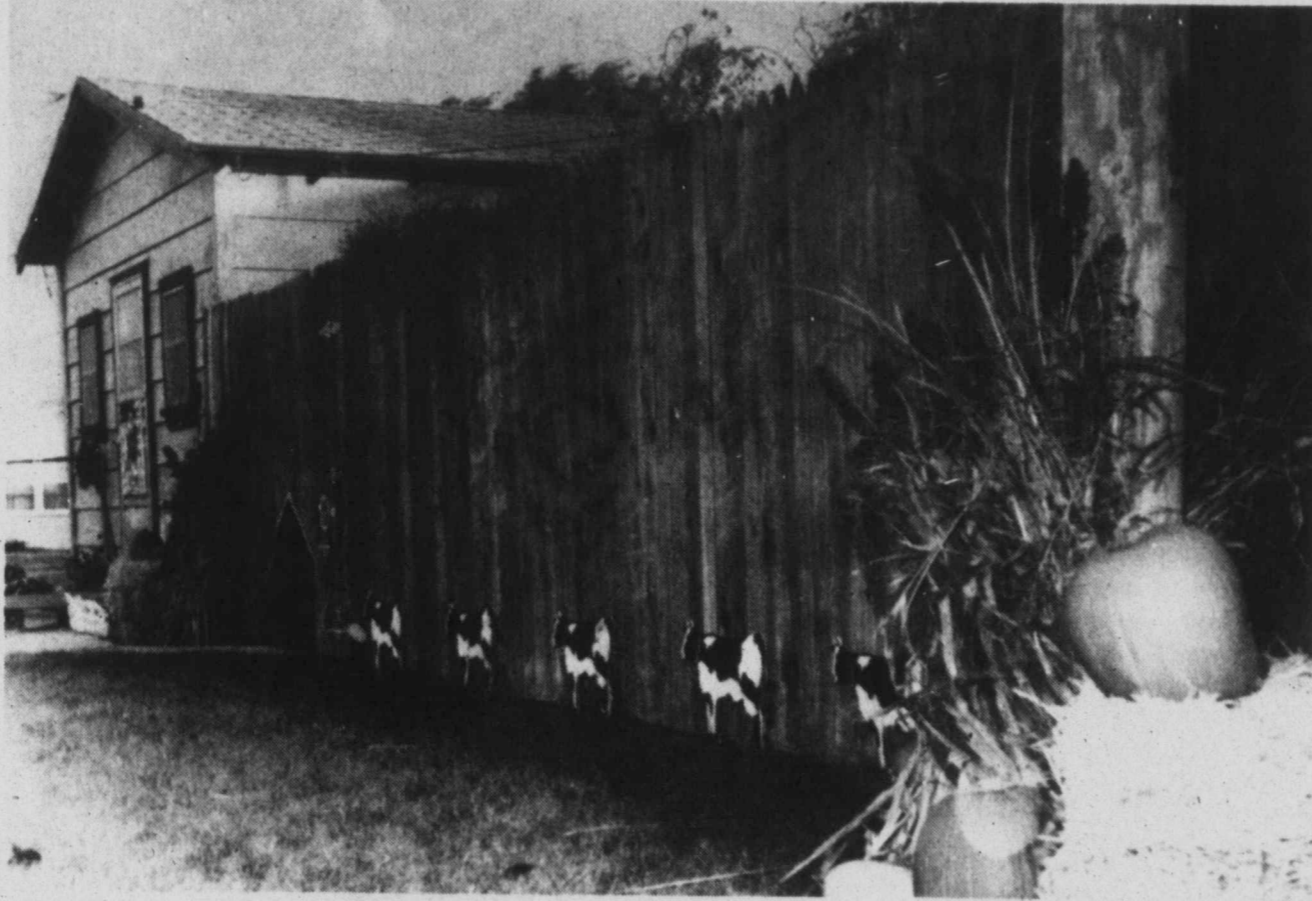
## Turkey Walk Set Saturday

WEIGHT WATCHERS tells us that avoiding temptation to eat really good things is a matter of self-control, will power and attitude, and in a recent release keyed to the upcoming Thanksgiving and Christmas/New Year holidays, some suggestions are offered as to how you can graciously reject the offer of relatives to try "just one little bite" of holiday delicacies.

## Eagles Clinch Playoffs, Defeat Hornets, 27-21

The O'Donnell Eagles moved one step closer to a District 6-1A championship Friday with a 27-21 win over the Sudan Hornets at O'Donnell.

The Eagles trailed 21-6 with 9:45 left in the third quarter when Sudan's Michael Williams broke loose and scored on a 23-yard run and a two-point conversion run by Darren Collins. O'Donnell's Mike Rodriguez ran for a 21-yard TD late in the third quarter and a two-point conversion pass to Eddie Torres from Joe Castillo made it 21-14.

The Eagles tied the game early in the fourth quarter on a 35-yard pass from Chris Bolanos to Chad Summers. Rodriguez put the Eagles ahead for good late in the fourth quarter on a 6-yard TD run. The PAT kick was blocked.

The Eagles can clinch the outright district title with a win Friday at Petersburg. O'Donnell holds a half-game lead over Plains and a one-game lead over both Anton and Whiteface.

If O'Donnell wins this Friday, Whiteface can clinch the other spot by beating Anton.

## Nitrate Level No Problem, Says Mayor

Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon, visibly upset by a story in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Wednesday morning about a Tahoka water well having a higher nitrate level than the Environmental Protection Agency's suggested levels, said Wednesday that there is no problem with Tahoka's water, and that the story dealt with a one-time report 20 months ago which was immediately corrected at the time.

"The (A-J) story implies that our water is not safe, and that just isn't true," the mayor said. He noted that the water wells are tested for nitrate monthly and that since the April 1989 report involving one well, that well and all the others have been far below the EPA advisory level of 10 milligrams per liter.

Water consumed by Tahoka residents from the system is mostly piped in from the Canadian River.

## Dogs End Season With 19-8 Loss To New Deal

The Tahoka Bulldogs closed out the 1990 football season here last Friday night with an uninspired game against the New Deal Lions, losing 19-8.

The loss left the Bulldogs with a 2-8 season mark, an improvement over the previous year, when the team was 1-9.

New Deal scored two touchdowns in the second quarter, driving 62 yards on their second possession, with Jason Nuss going in from the 4 early in the second quarter. Chris Villegas kicked the point to make it 7-0 with 10:23 left in the half.

A subsequent New Deal drive was halted when Bryan Patterson intercepted a Lions pass, but New Deal later scored again as quarterback Abel Rameriz ran 32 yards. A kick was wide and it was 13-0 at halftime.

Tahoka had the ball only about 10 plays in the first half, and the only move resembling any offense was an 18-yard run by Michael Jackson just as the half ended.

The Bulldogs woke up for awhile in the third quarter, starting out with a drive which carried to the New Deal 15 before a pass by René Luna was intercepted. In that drive, Billy Wilborn broke free on a 25-yard run and QB Trey Nance hit Cody Bailey on a 20-yard pass to the 15.

On Tahoka's next possession, a couple of penalties against the Lions and some good running by Jackson

brought the Dogs to a first and goal at the 4, from where Luna ran in for the touchdown. Jackson had a run of 23 yards in the drive. Nance ran for two points after the touchdown to make the score 13-8 at the end of the third period.

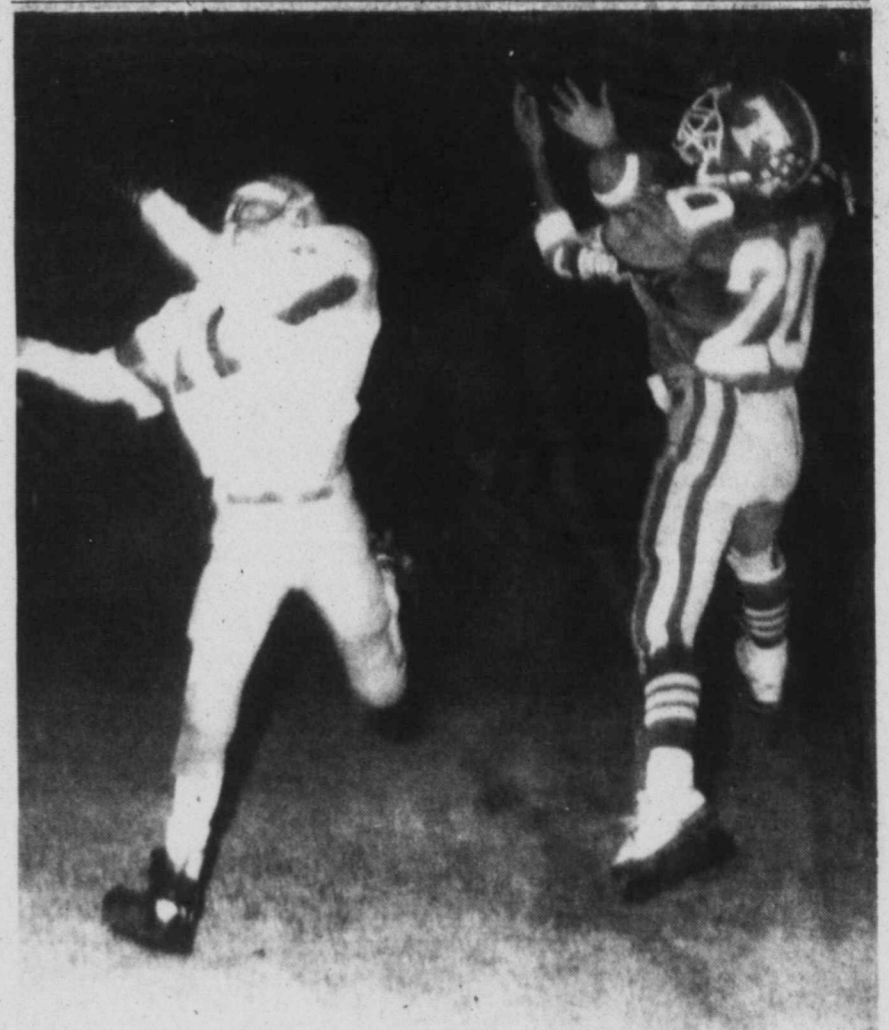
Tahoka lost any chance to win on a fourth down punting try with the snap bobbled and New Deal taking over on the Tahoka 16 in the fourth quarter. Nuss capped the short drive with a 3-yard scoring run, and this made it 19-8 with 7:44 left in the game. Tahoka never mounted any serious threat to score after that.

Wilborn averaged 7.9 yards per carry, gaining 55 yards in just 7 efforts, while Jackson ran the ball 11 times for 63 yards, an average of 5.7 per carry. Nance completed 4 of 9 passes for 67 yards, including a 26-yarder to Brian Moore, with the other passes caught by Bailey, Steve Rangel and Wilborn.

On defense, Moore and Wilborn each had 11 tackles, with Moore having 5 solo tackles. Joey Stone had 10 tackles to go over 100 for the season.

## 9-1-1 Phone System To Be Started In Lynn Next Fall

The 9-1-1 emergency telephone system is supposed to be operating for Lynn County starting in October 1991, according to information from the 9-1-1 staff at South Plains Assn. of Governments (SPAG), which said that Lynn and nine other South Plains counties are to go on the system next year, joining Hale and Terry Counties, which already are using the emergency number.

In order to receive 9-1-1 services, the 9-1-1 Commission requires the telephone companies to start collecting an equalization fee of 50 cents per month from each telephone customer, 18 to 24 months before the

system goes into effect. The fee is used to pay for the cost of the system, and Lynn County telephone customers already are being charged the fee.

"The SPAG staff has developed a grid mapping system for addressing and locating residents in the rural areas," said Regional Services Specialist Ella O'Neal, adding that the commission now is working on a rural addressing program with a goal of identifying unaddressed rural areas.

The idea of 9-1-1 is to allow citizens to call this one number for emergency assistance from police, fire and ambulance facilities.

Residents are reminded that today, Thursday, Nov. 15, is the deadline for submitting family histories for the Lynn County Family History

Book. Stories may be turned in at the Tahoka Museum from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. or mailed to P.O. Box 296, Tahoka, TX 79737

Another theft of diesel fuel in the county was reported, as Jack Haire of Slaton said someone took about 500 gallons from a location five miles north of U.S. 380 and just off FM 1054 about Nov. 4. The loss was estimated at about \$460.

Crime Line, 998-5145, continues to offer a \$500 reward for information clearing any of the recent thefts of diesel fuel.

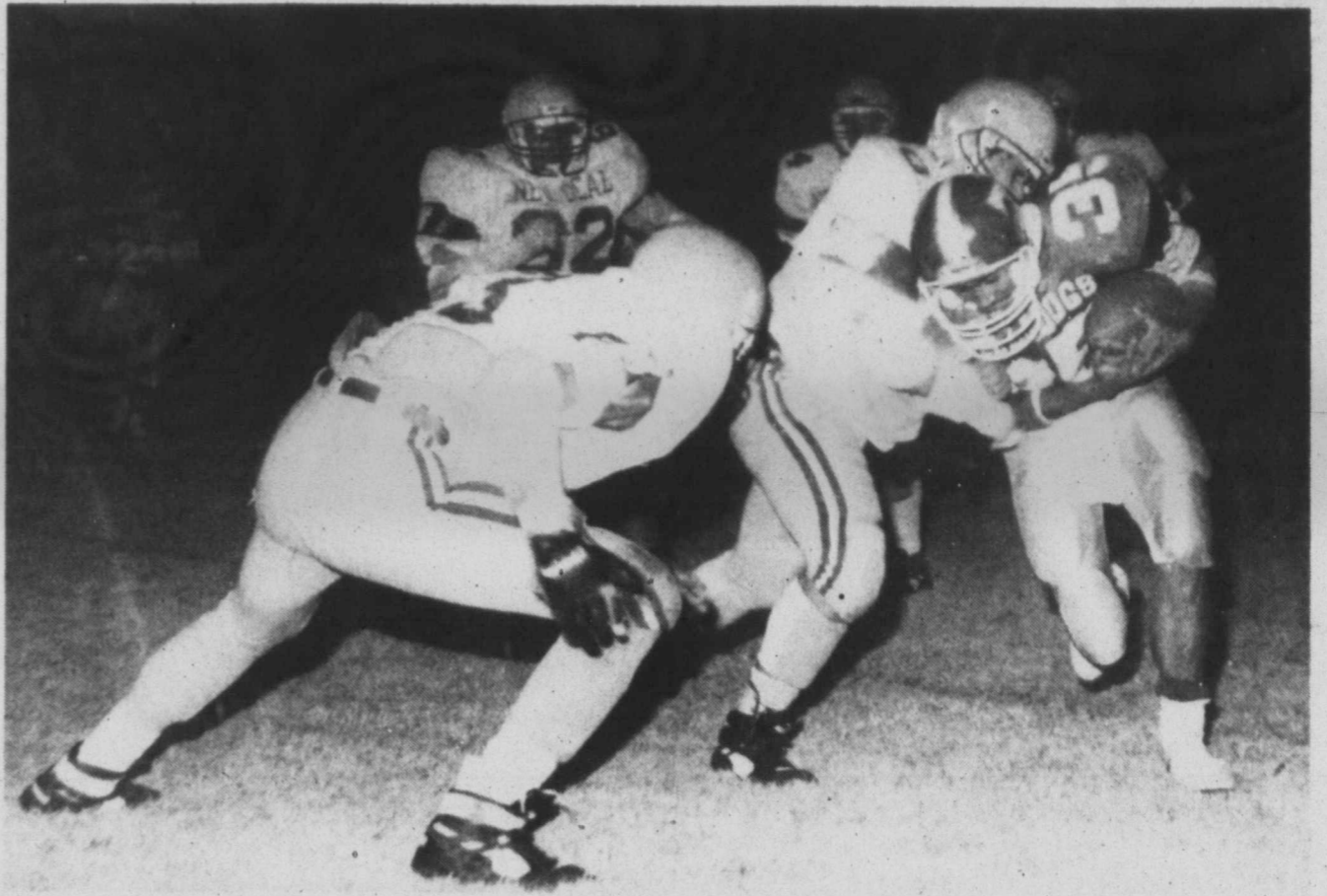

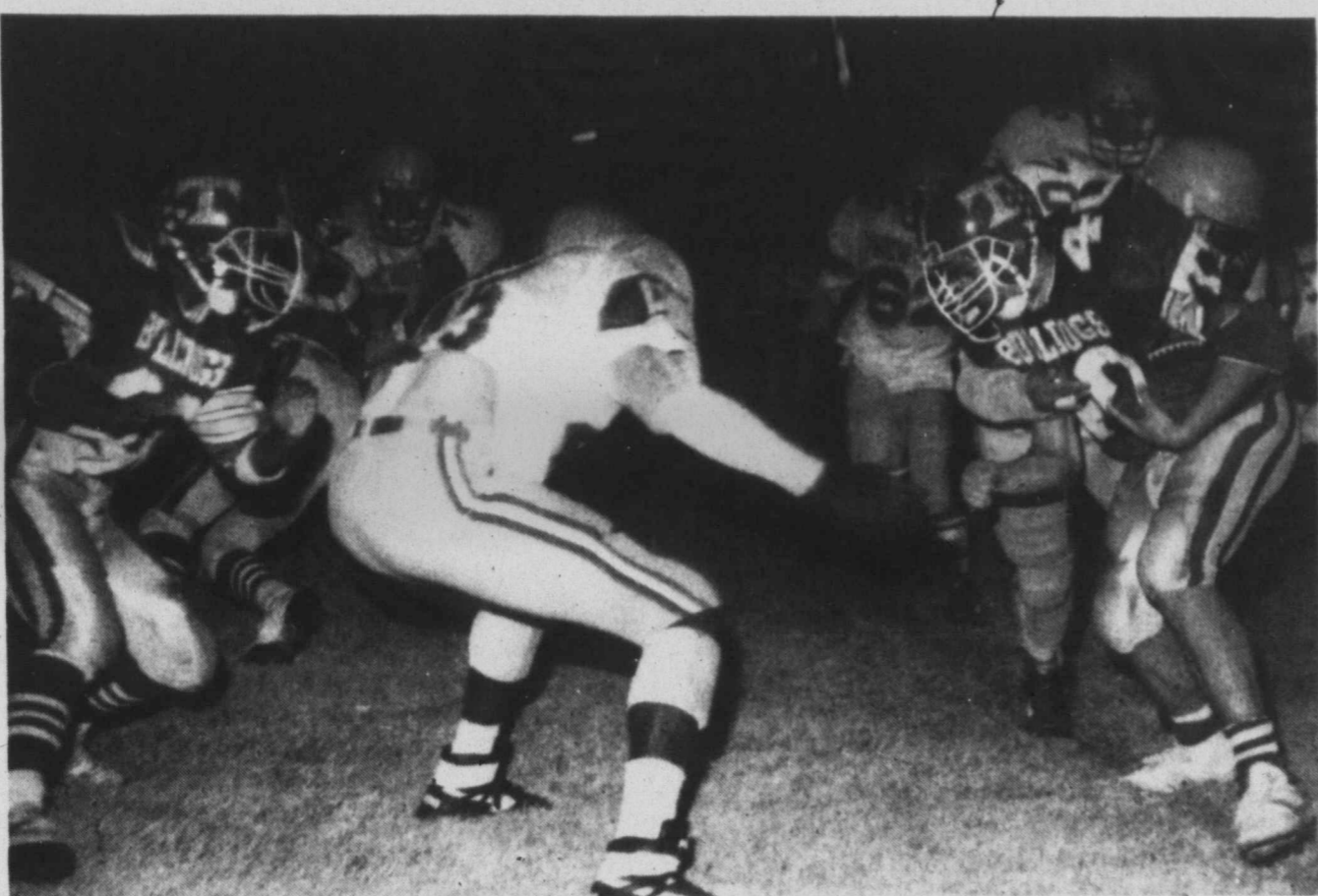

## Stone Leads Defensive Stats In Bulldog Season

Despite seeing only very limited duty because of injuries in the last three football games, senior Joey Stone led all tacklers on the Tahoka Bulldogs team in the season just ended, getting 10 tackles in the final game against New Deal to bring his season total to 108. Of this number, 26 unassisted tackles were recorded. Stone also topped the list of running backs for Tahoka, gaining a total of 344 yards on 86 carries, an average of 4 yards per carry. Junior running back Michael Jackson had fewer carries, 57, but a better average, as his 259 yards figures out to 4.5 per carry.

Junior Billy Wilborn also averaged 4 yards a carry, getting 175

yards on just 44 efforts. Wilborn also was second on the defensive list, being counted in on 78 tackles, 15 of these unassisted.

Albert Mendoza was third on the season tackling list, with 67, followed by Brian Moore with 65, Trey Nance with 64, Jackson with 63, Daniel Garvin 62, Jay Forsythe 61 and Ray Mulanax 60.

Nance led in all-purpose yards and in passing, where he completed 37 of 120 passes for 705 yards and seven touchdowns, with four interceptions. He also had 84 yards rushing for an all-purpose total of 789.

Daniel Garvin and Mike Burlerson, both juniors, caught 13 passes each, Burlerson for 241 yards and two

touchdowns, and Garvin for 184 and three touchdowns. Brian Moore also caught two touchdown passes.

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# National Farm Week Is November 16-22

As consumers, we may not give much thought to where our food comes from, other than the supermarket. But perhaps we should, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Carl Anderson said that Nov. 16-22 will be observed as National Farm-City Week.

"This is an appropriate time to recognize achievements of the risk-takers of the nation's food and fiber crops," he said.

Anderson said that farmers, rural townspeople and city residents who work in some phase of agribusiness all help to make the nation's agricultural production system a big success.

"This annual activity marks the seven days leading up to and including Thanksgiving Day and is an observance to honor the country's

greatest resource — its people," Anderson said.

He said the income of about 23 million Americans — roughly, about one job in every five — depends on efficient production on farms and ranches.

"This makes agriculture and agribusiness the nation's number one employer," Anderson said. "Together, these people comprise the agribusiness complex, which reaches far beyond the farm gate to impact all consumers."

Anderson said U.S. Department of Agriculture figures show that American consumers spend more than \$375 billion annually on foods produced by our nation's farms and ranches.

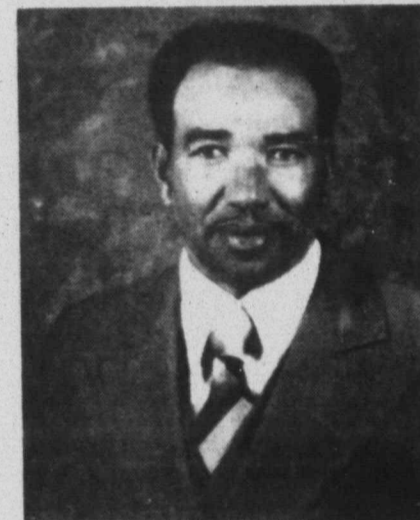
