Christmas Gift Bargains, Free Prizes Offered Here

Free gifts of merchandise, turkeys and other foodstuffs, rides on a horse-drawn surrey, plus the presence of Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus and a lot of special prices on Christmas gift items will be featured during the three-hour Moonlight Madness Sale in Tahoka from 5 to 8 p.m. Friday.

The 16 merchants taking part in the sale will offer their special prices for the three-hour period, but the celebration actually will go on for another hour as Santa and Mrs. Claus

and the surrey rides, plus booths for letters to Santa and also letters from Santa to youngsters will be operating until 9 p.m.

Most of the participating businesses will offer a free prize of some kind for persons who must sign up during the three-hour sale period only. No purchase is necessary, but those registering are asked to sign up for themselves only, and only once at each location, and they must be at least 18 to register. Most businesses

will draw the names of their prize winners at 8 p.m., the close of the sale.

The event is sponsored by the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce.

Tahoka Chamberettes will provide free coffee and hot chocolate on the square as Santa and Mrs. Claus visit with the youngsters and give out candy. Also, the horse-drawn surrey ride so popular last year again will be offered by John Edwards of New Home from 7-9 p.m. Young children wanting to ride in the Amish surrey owned by John and Mary Bess Edwards must be accompanied by a parent.

The three-seated surrey is a reproduction of vintage Amish surrey and was purchased by the Edwardses at an Amish sale in Indiana. It will be pulled around the square by a Belgian draft horse.

The Chamber of Commerce will have a booth for parents to sign up their children to receive a personalized letter from Santa, postmarked from the North Pole. A booth will be set up for this purpose next to Hometown Hardware. Santa's mailbox also will be on the square to receive letters to Santa from the kids. These letters will be published in *The Lynn County News*.

The Christmas lights and a Nativity Scene which was new last year will be displayed on the square, and a new display of Christmas angels has been placed high on the balconies of the courthouse, on the east and west sides. Tahoka Chamberettes place the decorations.

Variety Of Crimes Reported In Week

Thefts and accidents were investigated during the last week in the City of Tahoka, and in the county new burglaries of homes were reported, with one cleared by arrest. And a Lubbock man was being sought in the beating and stabbing of a pig in Lynn County.

A 21-year-old Tahoka woman reported to police Sunday that she was assaulted by a 20-year-old Tahoka man. The woman said she was struck in the face and suffered a cut lip as a result of an argument. No charges were filed.

Tahoka Elementary school teacher Debbie Steffens reported Wednesday that someone had stolen her billfold from her classroom while she was in the teachers' lounge. Missing was a brown leather wallet containing \$140 cash and several credit cards. Lynn County Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$200 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person responsible for the crime.

Kenneth Turner of Tahoka reported to police Wednesday, Nov. 21, that someone had stolen a Pioneer cassette stereo, a set of booster cables, a tire pressure gauge, hydraulic jack and a 12-volt drop light from his vehicle which had been loaned to a friend. Total value of the stolen items was set at \$183.

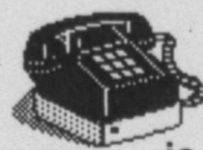

A STORY IN *The Lubbock Landslide-Diary* last Monday helped me to realize that my wife is not the only living person who can sing by shaped notes. Of course, I knew already that there are a lot of folks (mostly pretty mature) who understand singing by shaped notes, but I figured this was old-timey stuff and that pretty soon nobody would know what you mean if you mentioned shaped notes.

Not so, says the A-J in a story from somewhere in Alabama. Lots of folks, especially in the south, still like to sing by shaped notes and there is a revival of the system, with new songs soon to be published with shaped notes.

Those of us who read a little bit of music in the more usual manner have no idea of why some of the notes on older music are shaped like a triangle, or a diamond, a square, or whatever. If I am looking at the music to "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star" I would see, perhaps, these notes: C, C, G, G, A, A, G. . . But the shaped note singer would be thinking Do-do, so-so, la-la, so. Sounds dumb-dumb to me, but that's mostly because I don't know how to do it.

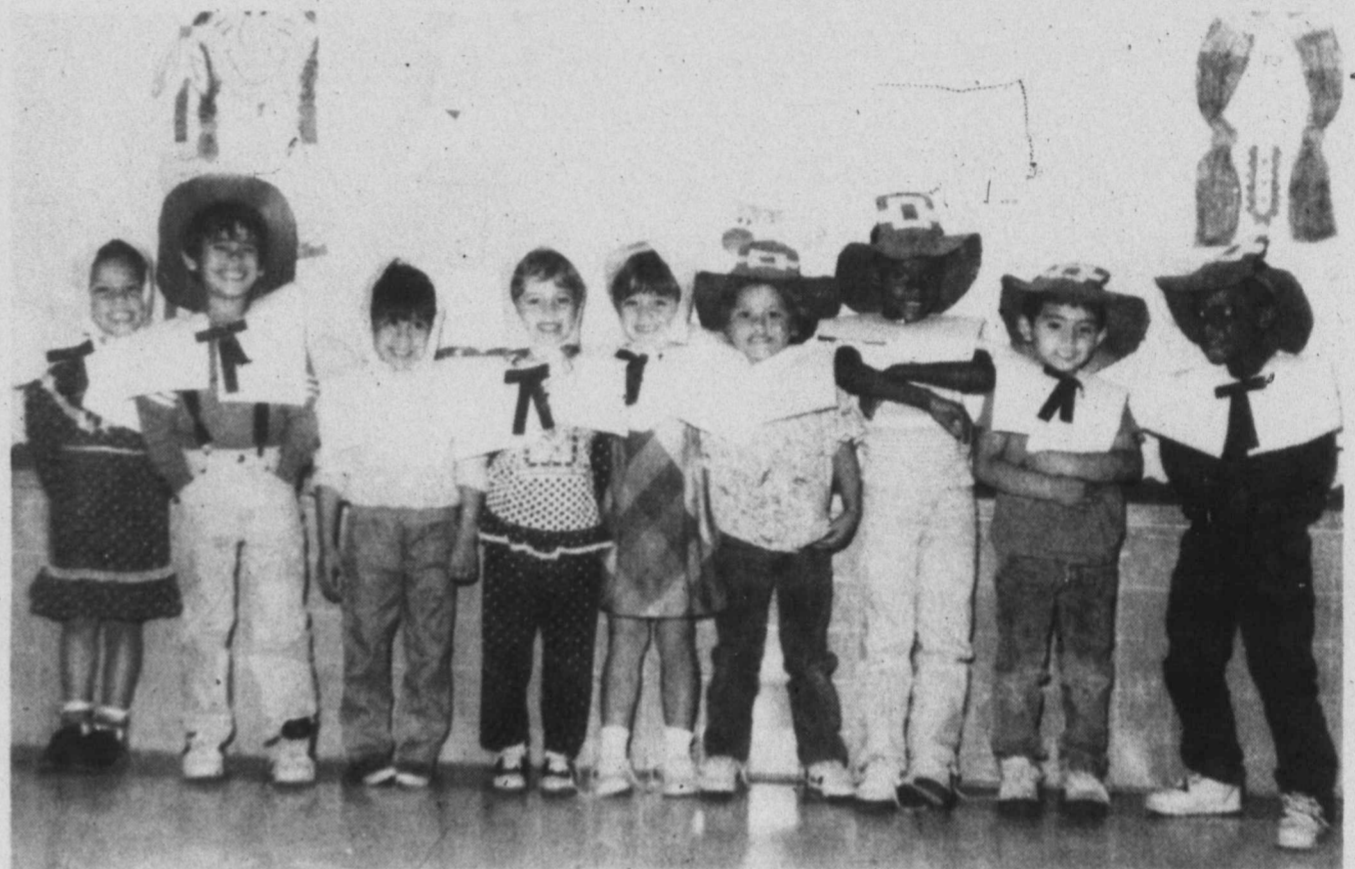

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New "Write-To-Read" Program Is Learning Aid To Students

Students in Kindergarten and first grade at Tahoka Elementary are receiving training on new IBM Personal Computers as they are initiated into the "Write-To-Read" program, which is a multi-media educational system designed to teach children how to write what they can say and to read what they write.

The new computer-based instructional system was installed this year, with first grade students beginning the program on Nov. 5, and Kindergarten students being initiated into the program this week, according to Molly Helmlinger, Principal at Tahoka Elementary. "We're really excited about this program," said Miss Helmlinger. "This is a marvelous curriculum tool which will only help our students," she added.

The program builds on each child's natural language growth, and

students use the program at their own pace. The method builds writing and reading skills before a child has mastered the intricacies of spelling in the English language. Using a phonetic spelling system (spelling a word like it sounds), *Writing To Read* encourages students to focus on how individual letters represent sounds which produce words and how words form sentences. Every student in Kindergarten and first grade spends one hour per day in the Writing To Read lab, according to Mrs. Helmlinger.

The system not only helps students to build writing and reading skills, it also stimulates imagination, encourages a basic desire to learn and helps children build self confidence. or one hour a day, students come to the *Writing To Read* Learning Center where they use a variety of equipment, including IBM Personal Computers with speech capability, and various education materials organized into five learning stations.

The Kindergarten and first grade teachers, after receiving in-service training and with the assistance of center aide Connie Barnes, monitor each student's progress and assist with individual learning needs. These needs are determined as students progress at their own pace.

At the beginning of the *Writing To Read* instruction, students are told the distinction between two types of spellings: "sound" (phonemes) and "book" (standard English). The students begin the program by spelling words like they sound when they work on the computers, which is accompanied by standard "book" spelling which is taught in regular classrooms.

Five Stations

The program utilizes five stations where students manage their own learning activities and teachers can move about and address individual problems. These five stations are the Computer Station, Work Journal Station, Listening Library Station, Writing/Typing Station, and Make Words Station.

At the Computer Station children

work in pairs with an IBM Personal Computer equipped with a Speech Attachment that enables the computer to "talk" to them, enabling each student self-paced instruction. The students spend about 15 minutes at the computer, interacting with their partners and responding to instructions given by the computer. Students are given exercises to acquaint them with writing and reading the sounds that make up spoken English.

At the Work Journal Station, students listen to a taped lesson for reinforcement of the sounds they learned at the computer. They mark their progress on the back page of the work journals, and take the completed work journals home for discussion of their development with parents.

At the Listening Library Station, students listen to recordings of carefully selected children's literature, following the text in books. The Listening Library is designed to familiarize students with words and to give them a chance to match speech with written English.

The Writing/Typing Station has two learning areas - writing and typing. The writing area is a special place where students know their task is to write. IBM Personal Computers are used at the typing area, giving young learners a faster, easier means of writing than hand lettering. Without fretting over creating each symbol by hand, they build speed in letter recognition and work formation through the use of the keyboard. At this station, many students progress to the level of actually writing stories.

After hearing and seeing words in print and at the computer, students discover they can recombine letters to form new words. Through games and hands-on use of materials, like clay, crayons and chalk, students investigate new combinations of letters and words at the Make Words Station.

"When the students finish writing a story, they bring it to me and read it out loud," says Miss Helmlinger. "It is very important for the students to be able to read their own stories, and we want to encourage them in their efforts," she concluded.

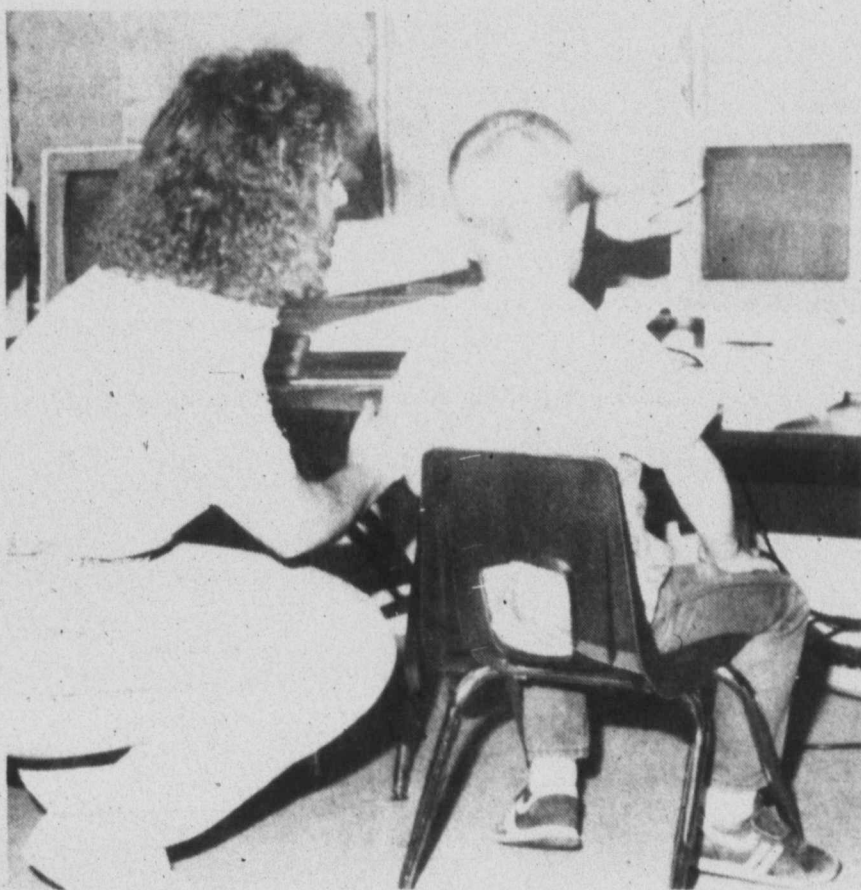
