Officers Investigate Car Theft, Traffic Accidents

Tahoka City Police investigated two traffic accidents during the last week, while county officers handled cases involving forgery and criminal mischief damage to a tractor and theft of a car. Police investigated an accident on Sunday in the 600-block of Lockwood that involved a 1978 Ford pickup driven by Enrique Oineda of Tahoka and a 1991 Dodge pickup driven by Terry Vance Laws of Rt. 3, Post. No injuries were reported. On Tuesday, police investigated a collision at the intersection of N. 7th and Ave. M between a 1988 Chevrolet pickup driven by Jaime Rodriguez of Sebastian, TX and a 1990 Ford van, a Schwan's truck, driven by Bobby Nelson Durham of Lubbock. No injuries were reported. On Sunday, police were advised that someone had driven over a headstone and sign at the old Tahoka Cemetery. Police also went to the scene of a family disturbance Sunday at a N. 6th St. residence where a Tahoka woman reported she had been assaulted by her ex-husband. No charges were filed. Arturo T. Parra of Haymarket, VA, an employe of Draw Gin, reported he loaned his 1980 Buick Sentra Monday to another gin employe who then apparently took the vehicle to far southwest Texas. The 30-year-old suspect and the car had not been located by Wednesday morning. Moses Hiracheta of New Home reported that a John Deere 4330 tractor had been damaged while located about 2.5 miles west of Petty on Nov. 24. The windshield and headlights had been broken, and belts and hoses cut. Emma Sotello of O'Donnell reported her red 1988 Pontiac Lemans had been stolen from her driveway on 11th St. in O'Donnell sometime Sunday night or early Monday. Little's Grocery in O'Donnell reported receiving a forged check in the amount of \$14 Nov. 27. Officers were seeking an O'Donnell woman for questioning. Ten persons were jailed on various charges during the last week, including one 35-year-old Tahoka woman who faces nine charges after a chase in the city. The woman was charged with driving while intoxicated, driving while license suspended, subsequent offense of no liability insurance, disregarding stop sign at Ave. J and S. 1st, disregarding stop sign at Loop 472 and Ave. J, exhibition of acceleration, failure to signal right turn, and no seat belt. Charges against the other nine persons included burglary and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, DWI first offense, public intoxication, DWI second offense, DWI first offense plus possession of marijuana under two ounces, theft by taking and possession of drug paraphernalia, theft by taking, alias capias for failure to comply with stipulation of bond agreement, and DWI third offense.

Paper's News Stand Price Increased To 35 Cents

Price of a single copy of *The Lynn County News* has been increased to 35 cents effective with this issue, a raise from the former price of 25 cents for each copy on the news stand. Publisher Dalton Wood said that the single-copy price increase had to be made to cover increased costs of printing the newspaper, as newsprint prices have recently been increased. He observed that most weekly newspapers in West Texas are priced at 35 or 50 cents per copy already. *The Lynn County News* is one of the last to increase its news stand price. Wood said mail subscription prices for the newspaper will not be increased at this time. PUBLIC NOTICE

On July 19, 1990, GTE Southwest Incorporated ("GTE-SW") filed revisions to the company's tariff pertaining to the features and associated equipment for providing emergency number services (9-1-1).

In this filing, GTE-SW proposes to modify its existing 9-1-1 tariff and to add more than 200 new service offerings. The new items of service and equipment in this application have been added to meet the company's increasing 9-1-1 customer demands and to allow GTE-SW to compete more effectively in the 9-1-1 equipment market.

The product line in the new offerings consists of a mini-computer and specialized console package for larger communities, as well as a personal computer with Automatic Number Identification (ANI) display for smaller communities. (ANI displays a caller's telephone number on the emergency dispatcher's computer screen.) In addition, the product line will include ANI and Automatic Location Information (ALI) display units compatible with, and similar to, those offered by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and other local exchange carriers in Texas. (The ALI feature displays a caller's address on the computer screen.) The rate charged existing 9-1-1 customers may be revised at the expiration of their contracts with GTE-SW if the proposed tariff is approved.

This filing has been assigned Docket No 9667. The hearing on the merits is scheduled for February 25, 1991, at the offices of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The deadline to intervene in this docket is December 31, 1990.

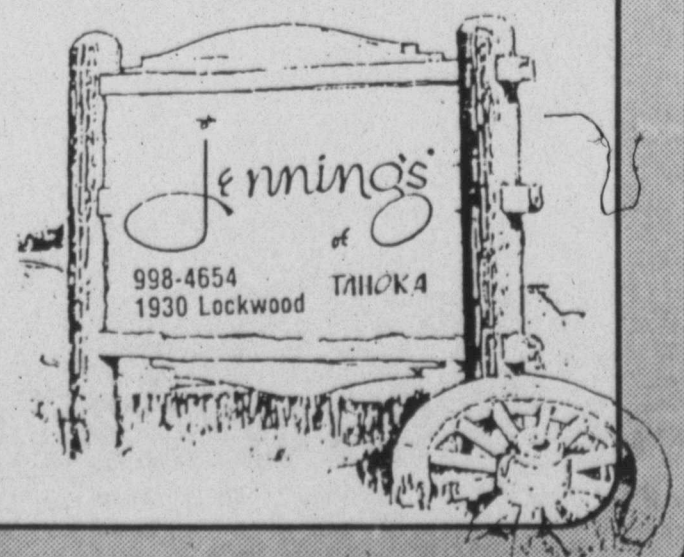

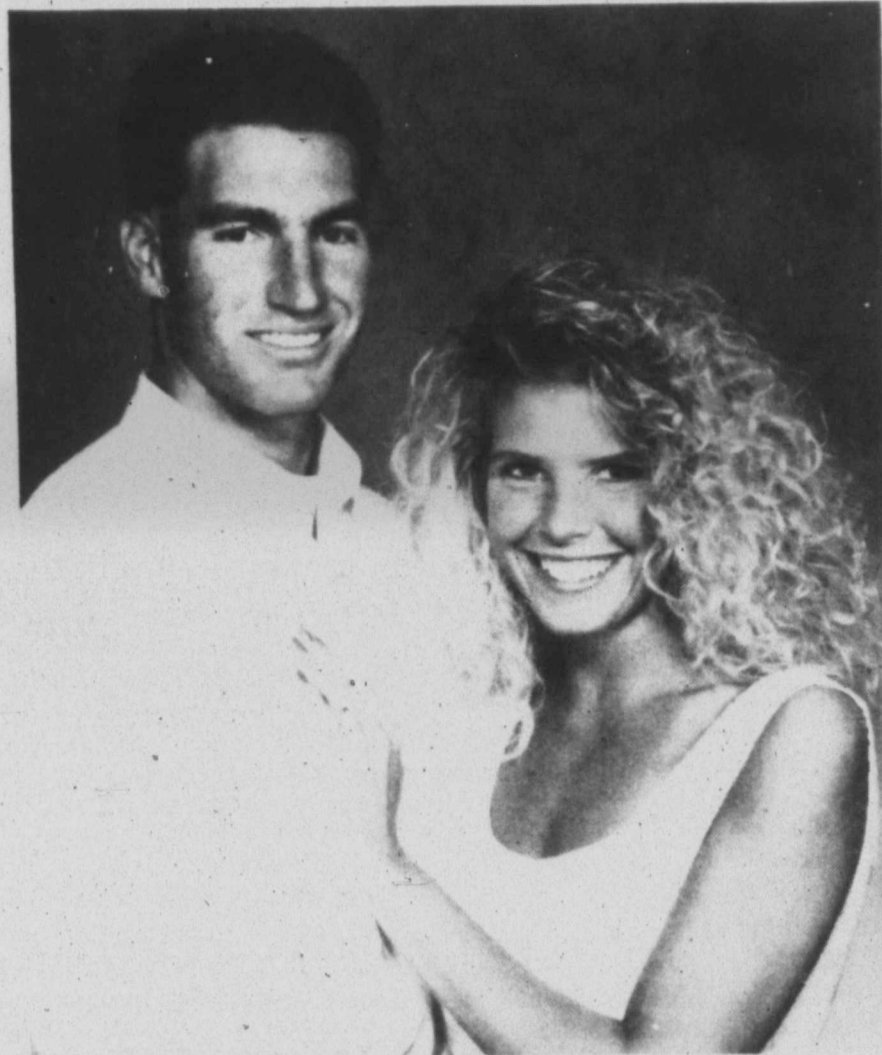

White Re-Elected To State Board Of Farm Bureau

Voting delegates to the 57th annual Texas Farm Bureau convention demonstrated their strong support for protection of the environment by adopting resolutions relative to that end as the 4-day meeting concluded Nov. 28.

The 1,143 delegates also elected S.M. True, a cotton, grain and cattle producer from Plainview, to a ninth one-year term as president of the state's largest general farm organization.

Following adjournment of the convention, the Board of Directors met and re-elected Don Smith, dairyman at Sulphur Springs, as vice president and selected Billie Ray Huddleston of Celina as secretary-treasurer.

The delegates also re-elected to the board: Leland White of Tahoka (Lynn County); Huddleston: Bill Tullos of San Angelo; Harlan Huffman of McGregor; and Tommy Walker of Uvalde.

Several Lynn County Farm Bureau members and Tahoka Office Manager Pat Green also attended the convention.

Delegates called for a method of waste management services. They urged the Texas Department of Agriculture to recall, collect and dispose of out-dated farm pesticides with no penalty for possession of such chemicals.

In other action, the delegates said: *The primary purpose of the Texas Department of Agriculture

should be to promote the advancement of agriculture and to educate the public on agriculture.

*The provision in the state law forcing local school districts to raise ad valorem taxes to maximize state funding should be disallowed.

Voting delegates, in approving several national recommendations to be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation for consideration at the 72 annual meeting Jan. 6-11 at Phoenix, Ariz. said:

*Target prices should be set at the average cost of production and should not be reduced below their 1990 levels.

*Payment limitation should not be tied to gross income.

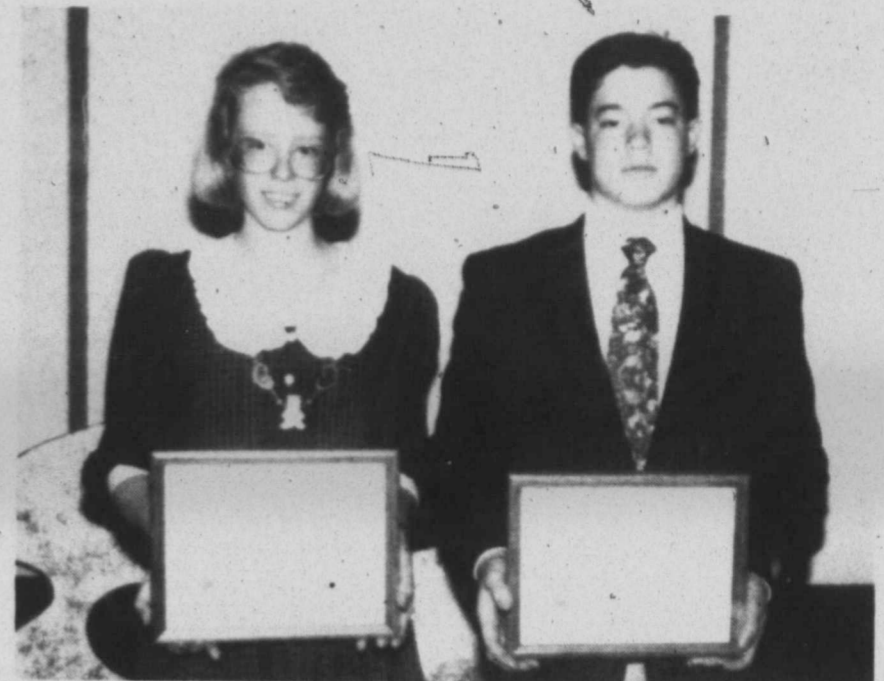

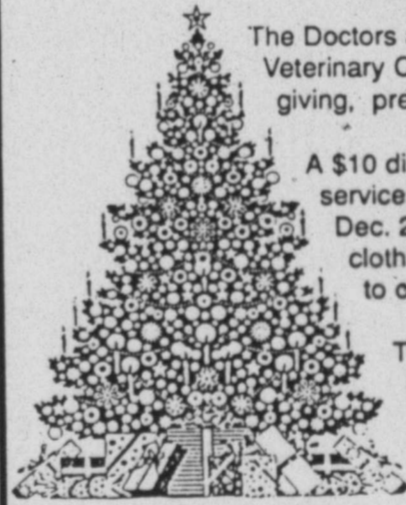
