A county-wide candlelight ceremony honoring American military forces is scheduled this Saturday, Feb. 2 at 6:30 p.m. in the Tahoka High School Auditorium, with representatives from Tahoka, New Home, O'Donnell, Wilson, Grassland and Draw participating in a patriotic program. This event is sponsored by concerned citizens of the area, with help from Lynn County VFW Post 4336, Tahoka Chamberettes and Lynn County Jaycees, and the cooperation of Tahoka ISD Superintendent, Dr. Duane Carter.

Residents throughout Lynn County are encouraged to attend this ceremony which is geared to show love and support for the American military forces, not only in Saudi Arabia but throughout the world. Those with family in the military are invited to wear yellow ribbons around their arms, and will be invited to stand and be recognized during the program. Candles will be provided at the door for everyone, except small children.

The ceremony will include group singing of "America The Beautiful" and "God Bless America," and a solo rendition of "God Bless The USA" by Byron Norwood.

Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon, who is a former Air Force pilot, will be the featured speaker. Raised in Burley, Idaho, Solomon joined the USAF in 1969 and received his pilot training at Laredo AF Base, graduating in 1970. He became an instructor pilot, and flew 2000 hours in a T-38 Talon Jet at Columbus, Mississippi. He was assigned to the F-4 Fighter in 1972, and served with the 35th Tactical Fighter Squadron in Kunsan, Korea from 1972-73.

He attended advance nuclear weapons academy in Albuquerque, N.M. While overseas, he served as Fighter Weapons Officer and won Top Gun 314th Wing in April 1973. He returned to George AFB and served as instructor pilot for Air to Air Combat, 20th Tactical Fighter Squadron, training German Luftwaffe until 1976. In June of 1976, he came to Tahoka to join Clint Walker in the insurance business, and has served as mayor of Tahoka since 1985.

The program should be about 30 to 45 minutes in length. After the ceremony, the audience will be asked to give addresses of Lynn County men and women who are now serving in U.S. forces in Operation Desert Storm. These addresses can be given to any member of the VFW, or turned in to the Lynn County News, who will then compile a list for the benefit of anyone seeking such information.

Selma Arrizo of New Home Future Homemakers of America baked the grand champion winner in the baked goods division, while Angela Young of Wilson FFA had the reserve grand champion.

Brewer's lightweight Yorkshire won the huge barrow division grand champion banner, and the reserve grand champion barrow, also a light York, was exhibited by Corey Gass of O'Donnell FFA.

Belew had the both the grand champion lamb, a Southdown heavyweight, and the reserve grand champion lamb, a Suffolk heavy, in the county show.

Hogg's steer won the grand championship of the Lynn County show. The reserve grand champion steer was shown by Lanny Zant of New Home. Both are heavyweight cross steers.

Money from the auction sale and the add-ons had not been totaled as of Wednesday, but one show worker said it appeared that the total from the two would be about the same as last year. The total should be available by next week.

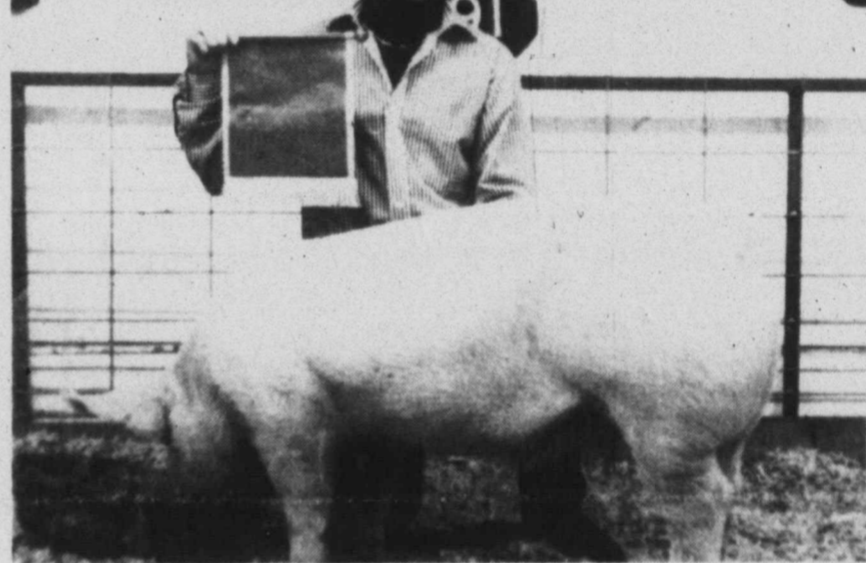

Four More Burglaries Are Cleared

Four more recent burglaries in Lynn County were reported as cleared this week after arrest of a Lamesa man who admitted the burglaries, explaining to officers how he broke into each place and what he took.

None of the stolen items were recovered, since the man apparently had "fenced" the merchandise.

Charged with burglary of a habitation and jailed in Lynn County jail at Tahoka last Thursday was Robert Hernandez Cervantes, 31. According to the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept., Cervantes admitted responsibility for burglaries last October of homes of the following:

Charles McAuley, 6 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87, Oct. 8, 1990.

Craig Wilke, 2 miles north of FM 211 on FM 2192, Oct. 10.

Gail Faires, about 7 miles northwest of Tahoka, Oct. 15.

Martin Hammonds, about 9 miles southwest of Tahoka, near intersection of FM 3332 and FM 2956, Oct. 16.

The suspect in the burglaries has been to prison twice, and reportedly is on parole from a conviction on a burglary charge.

County, city and Dept. of Public Safety officers were all working to resolve a stolen car case, and a 25-year-old Lubbock man is being sought in the case. A DPS trooper stopped a 1984 Cadillac early Saturday morning just north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 and while he was questioning

Census Shows Population Of County, Cities All Down

The 1990 Census figures mailed to Lynn County and officials of the cities in Lynn County indicate the county has lost 1,542 people in the last decade. And population of all the cities in the county except Wilson are down by high percentages. Wilson lost just 10 people in the time between the official count in 1980 and the 1990 Census.

Although most of the cities and the county officials think the Census takers missed some people, the figures apparently will be accepted by most entities. The City of Tahoka

wrote earlier in protest of the preliminary figures, but was advised that any formal challenge to the figure would virtually require that the city conduct its own count, rather than going on a formula of average number of persons per utility connection.

Tahoka's new total according to the Census Bureau is 2,868, down 394 from the 1980 total of 3,262. City Manager Barry Pittman said Monday that a formula developed by the city related to utility connections had indicated the city's population is 3,002.

Questioned as to whether the lower population figure will hurt the city in regard to money received from federal programs, Pittman said "Not at the present time, since we're not getting any federal money right now."

The City of New Home has protested the total given by the Census Bureau, and has written a letter advising the Bureau that New Home officials have actually counted all the people in the city limits and come up

with a total of 209. City secretary Radene Turner said the Bureau had

divided the city into sections, and, for example, in one section had listed eight houses, "but there actually are 26 houses in that section." The Bureau has advised the City of New Home and Mayor Roy Blevins that the letter has been received. Adjustments in the official total may be made before the April deadline for changes in the totals.

The City of O'Donnell plans no contest of the figures given by the Census.

PBS Tax Clinic To Air Sunday

A special one-hour program featuring income tax filing information will be on Public Broadcasting Service stations nationwide on Sunday, Feb. 3, from 1 to 2 p.m. CST. "Taxbreak '91: Raising Your Tax IQ" will be hosted by Today Show co-anchor Deborah Norville. Internal Revenue Service personnel and other tax experts will be featured. Viewers may join the studio audience in a tax quiz during the program. Aimed at easing the task of tax return filing, the program highlights tax information for various groups of taxpayers, such as married couples, single parents, and the elderly. Program discussions include 1990 tax law changes, deductibility of medical expenses, electronic filing of tax

return, the earned income credit, child care expenses, and itemized deductions. The importance of accuracy in filing tax returns is stressed in the program. "Taxbreak '91" also tells viewers how they can get a variety of free assistance with their 1990 tax returns. By videotaping the program, IRS says, viewers can use it as a guide when completing their tax returns. 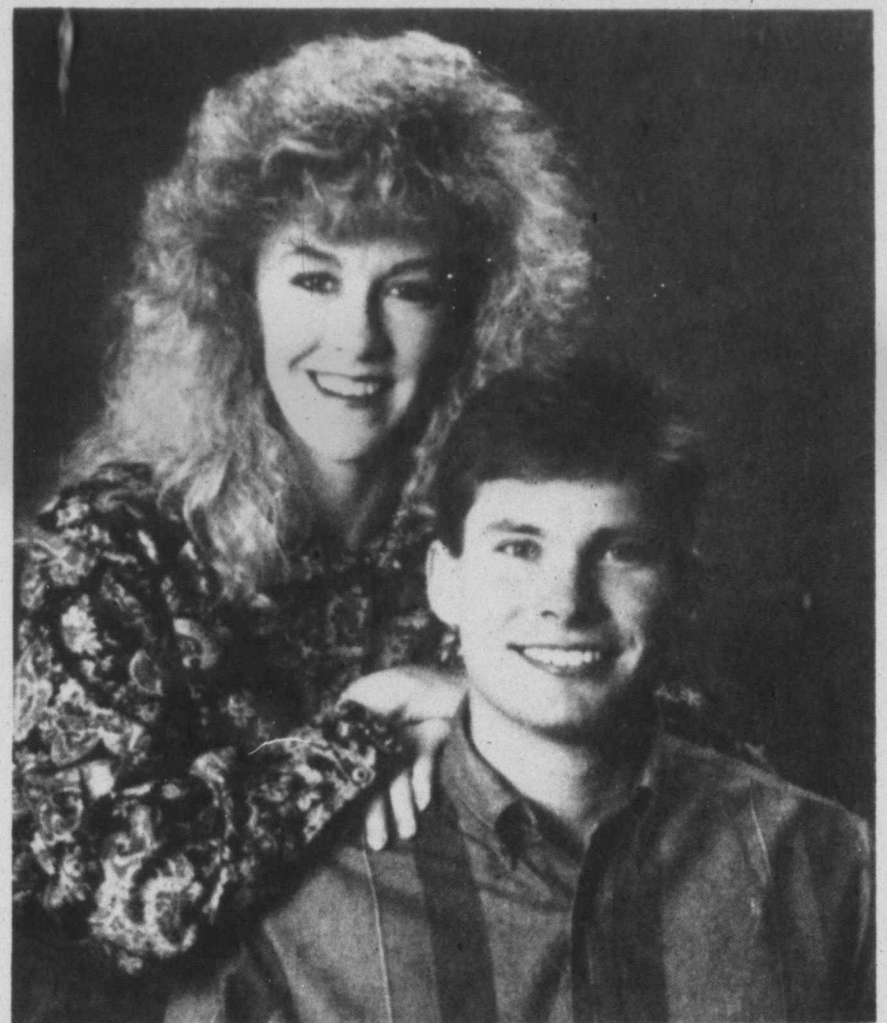

New 29-Cent Postage Stamps Now On Sale

Increases in postage rates from 25 cents to 29 cents for a first-class letter will go into effect on Feb. 3, but the new 29-cent stamps and another for 4 extra cents on either stamps or post cards already are on sale at postoffices.

For the time being, new stamps will not have the amount printed on them, but a "flower stamp" which serves as 29-cent postage and sells for 29 cents is available, as is another make-up non-denominated stamp bearing text describing its value, worth 4 cents.

Postmaster Leonard Dunn said the new rates will be 29 cents for the first ounce, first class mail, and 23 more cents for any additional ounces up to 10 ounces. "Any first class mail over 10 ounces will be \$2.90 up to 2 pounds anywhere in the United States," he said. "Mail going to Mexico will be 35 cents a half ounce; first class mail to Canada will be 40 cents per ounce."

Next-day delivery mail (Express Mail) will be \$9.95 up to 8 ounces. Any Express Mail over 8 ounces will be \$13.95 up to 2 pounds.

Lynn County Pioneer Belton Howell Dies At Age 104

Funeral services for H.B. "Belton" Howell, 104, of Odessa were held Wednesday, Jan. 30 at 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Tahoka, with Dr. Danny Curry, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery, under the direction of White Funeral Home.

Howell died at his home in Odessa on Jan. 28, 1991.

He was born Sept. 9, 1886 in Comanche County. He moved to Lynn County in 1902 where he made his home until 1980. He was one of the original settlers of Lynn County, and was a rancher and a farmer. As a young man, Howell operated a freight wagon from the railhead in Big Spring to Tahoka. He had also been a cowboy, a mechanic, and an early automobile dealer.

He served on the Tahoka City Council on the early years of the city, and served on the Tahoka school board in the 1930s. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Tahoka.

Howell moved to Odessa for health reasons in 1980. In 1982, the First National Bank of Tahoka recognized Howell as being their earliest depositor, having had a continuous account since 1907.

The Ector County Commissioners Court declared *Henry Belton "Grandpa" Howell Day* on his 103rd birthday, Sept. 9, 1989. In September



BELTON HOWELL of 1990, the Odessa American reported Howell to be the oldest known resident of Ector County.

He married Birdie Walters in Brownfield on Nov. 28, 1915, and they were married for 71 years. She preceded him in death in 1986.

He is survived by his son, Samuel Wade Howell of Odessa; three grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

The family requests memorials to the First Baptist Church of Tahoka, American Cancer Society, or a favorite charity.

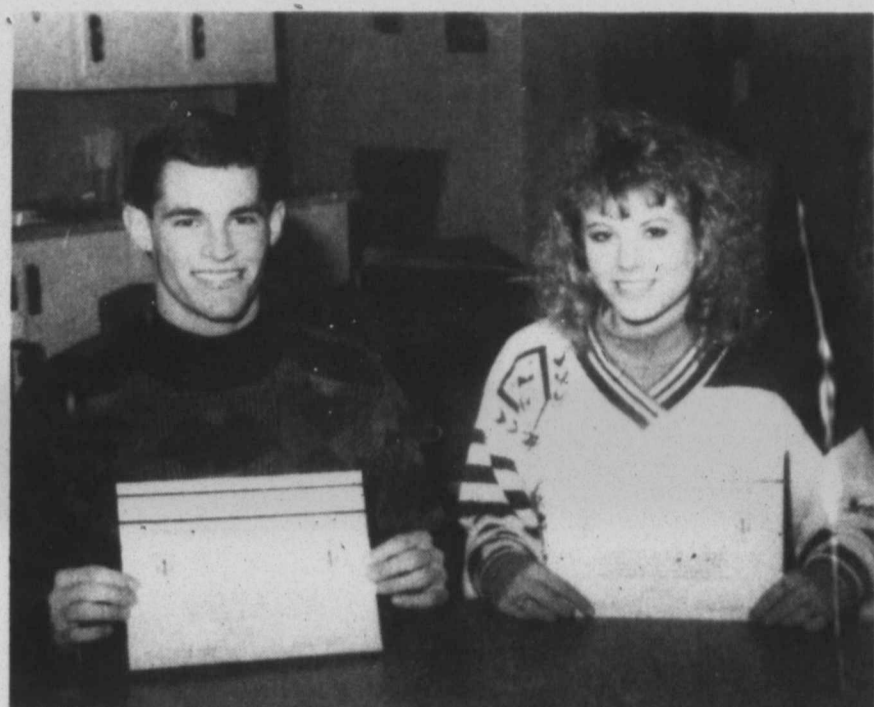

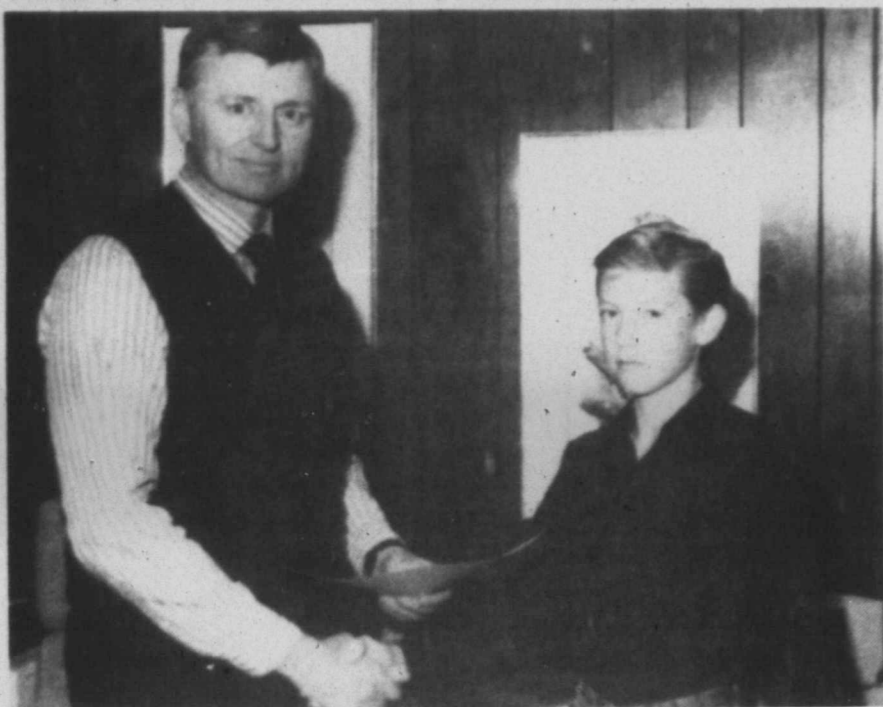

Lynn County Irrigators Increase Center Pivot Use

The use of center pivot sprinkler systems continues to increase within Lynn County, according to a recent center pivot system inventory update conducted by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock.

In the portion of Lynn County within the Water District's service area, approximately 37 additional center pivot systems have been installed between 1986 and 1990, according to the Water District's inventory. This brings the total number of center pivot systems in use within Lynn County to 61.

The previous 1986 center pivot inventory indicated 24 center pivots in operation within the county.

The 37 additional center pivot systems represent a \$1,220,000 investment in water conservation by Lynn County irrigators during the past four years, at an average cost of \$30,000 per system.

"Center pivots, and especially low energy precision application (LEPA) systems are the wave of the future," says Ken Carver, assistant manager of the High Plains Water District.

"Center pivot systems continue to be installed because increased crop production, significant water savings, and reduced fuels and labor costs makes investments in these irrigation systems cost-effective," he added.

two passengers, the driver escaped on foot. Later, the car was reported stolen from the residence of Carl Griffing, just north of Tahoka.

The passengers were released after questioning, as they apparently were unaware that the car had been stolen. The vehicle was returned to the owner, with some damage to the steering column where the ignition was tampered with, and the suspect was being sought in Midland.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated an accident on Jan. 23 in which a 1987 Dodge driven by Margaret Miller Norwood of Tahoka backed into the body of a man who was lying in the edge of her driveway about 7 a.m. The man, who police reports named as Luis Alvarez, but who was later identified in a funeral report as Luis Laureles, died the next day at Lynn County Hospital. An autopsy later revealed that the man died of a heart attack which occurred before the accident, police said.

Police investigated an accident Saturday at Lockwood and East Ave. G involving a 1988 Buick driven by Marvin Lee Browning of San Antonio and a 1972 Ford pickup driven by Antonio Gutierrez of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Another accident investigated Tuesday in the 1000-block of Lockwood involved a 1985 Chevrolet driven by William D. Dollar of Breckenridge and a 1986 Chevrolet Suburban driven by Karen Meeks Kellin of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

In jail during the week were four persons for driving while intoxicated, with one of these also charged with no drivers license and no belt restraints for a child under age 2, and another also charged with no drivers license. Also in jail were one person for no liability insurance, failure to appear and failure to yield right-of-way, one for simple assault, and one for burglary of a habitation.

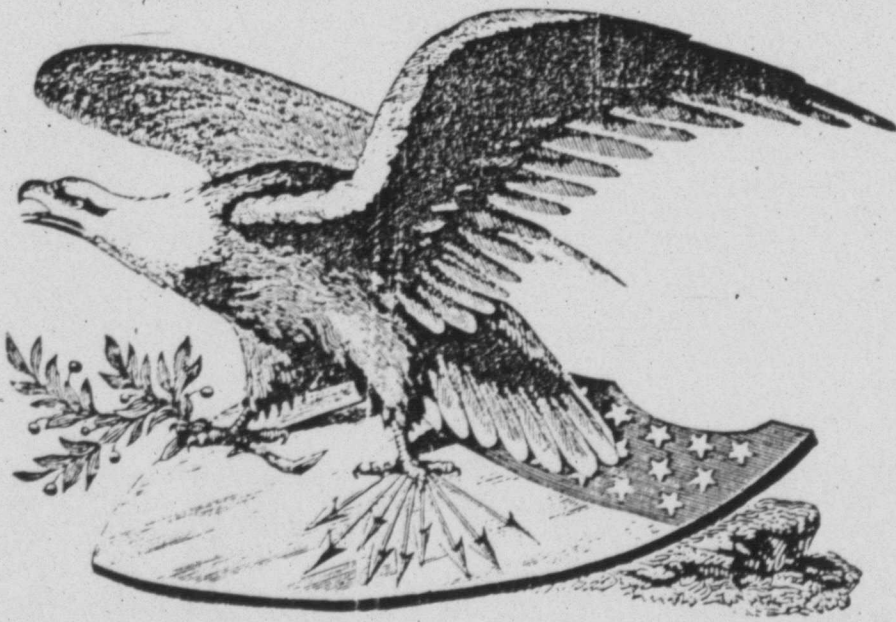

Tahoka Children Write Folktales

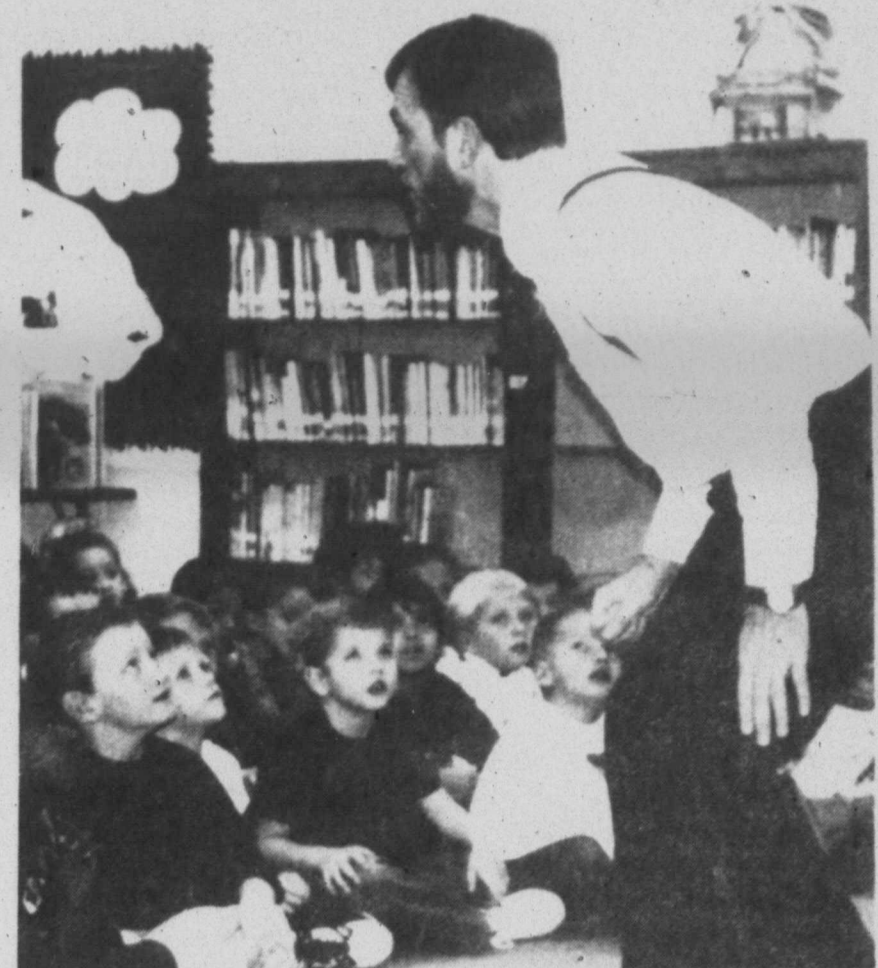
