300-Plus Attend Patriotic Program

Over 300 county residents filed into the Tahoka High School Auditorium Saturday evening to attend a patriotic program showing support for the American military. Lynn County VFW Post 4336 was well represented as members turned out to hand out candles for the candlelight service, and to assist in the lighting of the candles. Chamberettes handed out red-white-blue-yellow ribbons to everyone who attended the program.

The 45-minute program began with a welcome from Cal Huffaker, Master of Ceremonies for the evening. He also noted that a list of servicemen and women from Lynn County who are involved in Operation Desert Storm is being compiled at The Lynn County News, and anyone who has addresses should turn them in to the News Office, or to any member of the VFW, who is assisting with the list.

The audience recited the Pledge of Allegiance, led by Rudy Fuentes, Commander of Lynn County VFW Post 4336. W.R. Steen of Wilson then asked members of the audience who had family members in the military forces serving throughout the world to stand and be recognized, and a good portion of the audience rose to their feet. Following that, Lynn County residents who had family involved in Operation Desert Storm were asked to stand, and there were several families who were recognized. One minute of silence was observed in honor of the military in the Persian Gulf, and then a prayer for the military was offered by Wesley Brown, minister of the Methodist Churches in O'Donnell and Draw.

Featured speaker of the evening was Jim Solomon, a former Air Force pilot and currently the mayor of Tahoka. He gave an impassioned plea for supporting the men and women who are in the military, and congratulated the audience for attending the candlelight service as a way to show that support. "We need to let them know, in any way we can, that we support what they are doing, and are proud of them," said Solomon. "We also need to give support to those family members who live here in Tahoka and the surrounding communities, who have loved ones fighting in the Gulf."

"We need to make sure that what happened with the Vietnam war never, ever happens again in this country," he said. "These servicemen and women need our support."

Solomon received a standing ovation after his speech, and then the audience sang a resounding verse of "America The Beautiful," led by Stanley Gill of New Home, and accompanied on the piano by Nelda Murray of Grassland. As the audience was singing, VFW members moved down the aisles and lit the candles, and the audience passed the flame to one another as the group sang "God Bless America."

In the closing ceremony, the lights were dimmed and the audience lifted their candles as Byron Norwood sang "God Bless The USA", and then the crowd was dismissed after a closing prayer by Rev. Brown.

IT WAS IN A TENT set up at Newport, Texas, and the movie being shown to an enthralled group of mostly youngsters mixed with a few adults was a western starring Tom Mix. I don't remember the name of the movie, but it was the first movie I ever saw. (Yes, you young smart-alecs, it was a "talkie").

I was reminded of this the other night when our daughter said the first movie she remembers seeing in a theater was "Blackbeard's Ghost," which she had rented to see again last week. I recalled that the first movie I ever saw was this Tom Mix western, which somebody brought out to the community of Newport (between Bowie and Jacksboro) and set up in a tent with a portable projector. I'm not certain, but it seems to me they charged about a dime admission.

I was probably 6 or 7 years old at the time; later when we moved to Jacksboro, I joined all the other kids at the movie theater every Saturday to see a double feature with a chapter of a 13-part serial in between. The movies were almost all westerns, although I did see quite a few Boston Blackie detective films. In those days, a film often would get too hot and break while it was running, and everybody in the theater would whistle and yell until the projector operator got it patched up and running again, usually about 5 minutes.

From the time I was about age 8 to 15 or so, I must have watched Tim Holt, Ken Maynard, Charles Starrett, Wild Bill Elliott, Randolph Scott, Johnny Mack Brown and Roy Rogers kill about 10 million bad guys and never once get hurt themselves.

Going back to Newport, a very small place, I remember another occasional entertainment was when a medicine show came to town. These people would have little entertainment routines and then sell bottles of cough syrup, liniment rub, or salve, or all kinds of things to make people feel young again. They also had the best taffy candy in the world, and sometimes had really funny puppets.

The good old days? Hardly. Today we'd be bored (and so would the kids) with such things and living was a bit tough at times, although we did have more basic values and a lot fewer bad elements and influences than now. But it would be kind of neat to see an old-fashioned medicine show.

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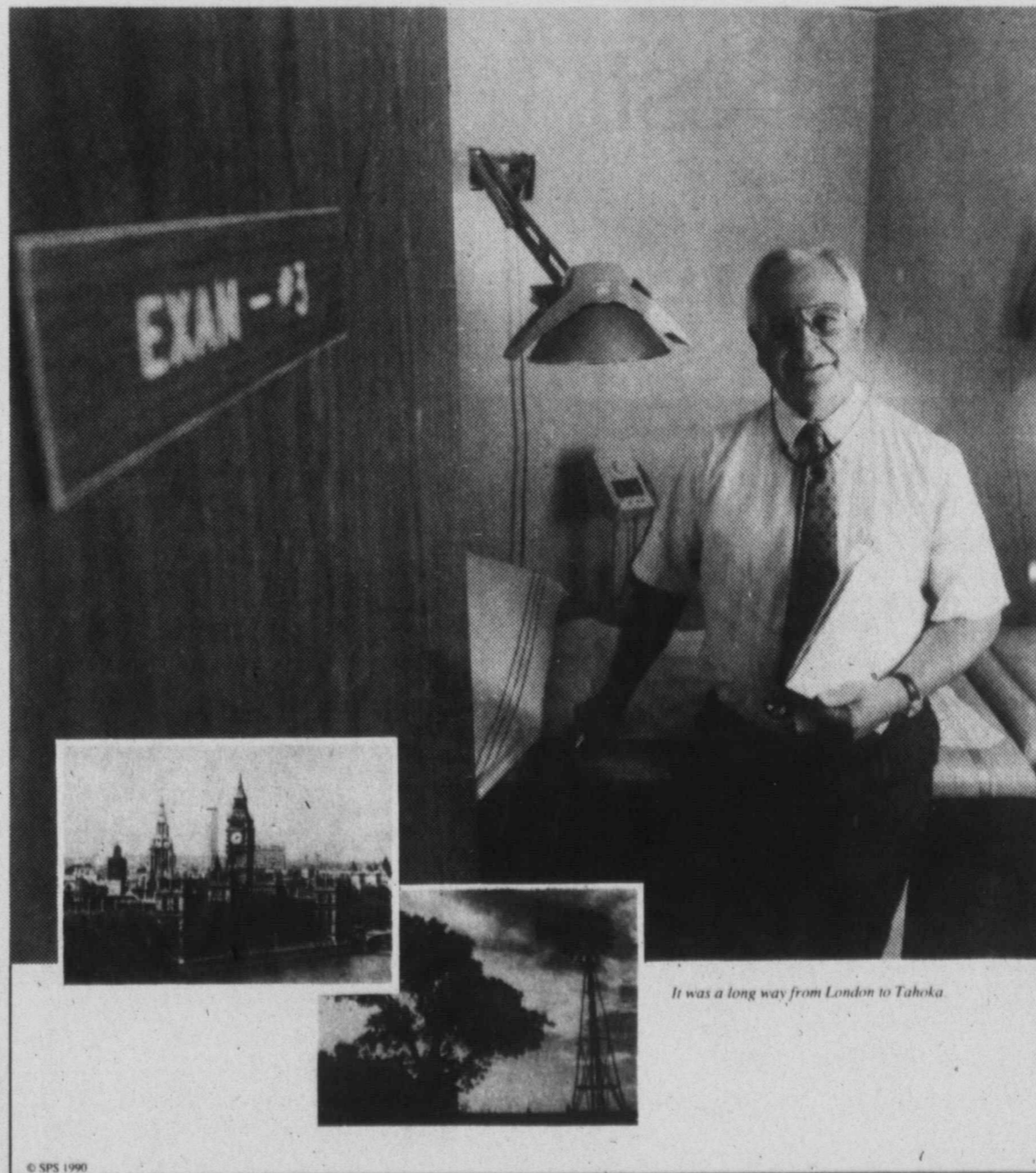
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"Moving here from England was a cultural shock, but it was more than offset by the charm and friendliness of the people."

114 County FFA, 4-H Members Enter Houston Livestock Show

Eighty-three FFA members and 31 4-H Club members from Lynn County will be joining 4-H and other FFA members from throughout the state for showing competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show, Feb. 16 through March 3 at the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H Exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show - the junior division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry, primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Representing 862 Texas 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters, the junior show is expected to exceed 13,000 entries this year. A variety of animals are shown in the junior show division: market steers, market swine, market sheep, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers, and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories represent animals raised by the exhibitor as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. Total money paid in 1990 at the four junior show auctions exceeded \$2.7 million.

New cattle shows scheduled for the open show division of the 1991 Houston Livestock Show are the Texas Longhorn, Piedmontese and

Pinzgauer shows. Horse show activities officially kick off the upcoming Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo beginning Thursday, Feb. 14 with cutting horse competition. The National Cutting Horse Association World's Championship Finals is scheduled for Thursday - Sunday, Feb. 14-17. The 1991 Horse Show also will feature competition from six different breeds.

Barbecue cooking fans can enjoy the World's Championship Bar-B-Que Contest beginning Friday, Feb. 15, at 4 p.m. in the northwest corner of the Astrohall parking lot. Judging for the contest begins on Saturday, Feb. 16 at 7 p.m.

Scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 16, will be a parade in downtown Houston, and horseshoe pitching and washer pitching contests. Winning quilts from the Go Texan quilt contest also will be on display in the Astrohall's west wing through March 3. New to the Show's Go Texan competition will be the dominoes and team penning contests, held Feb. 16 and 18 respectively.

Racing pigs take to the track all week starting Monday, Feb. 18.

All net proceeds from the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo provide funds for scholarships and research projects throughout the state. Currently, more than 1,000 students received some form of Show-sponsored financial assistance, with 30 research projects funded. More than 9,000 volunteers ensure the success of each year's event.

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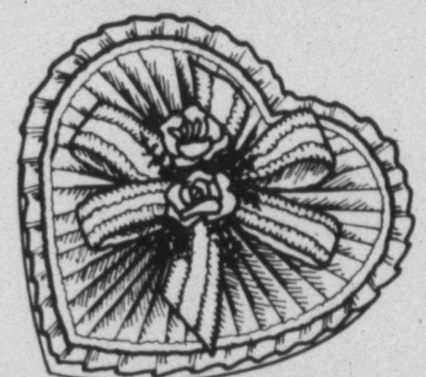

The Lynn County News received copies of two letters this week concerning servicemen in Saudi Arabia. One letter is from Paul Guzman, Jr., originally from Crosbyton, whose squad leader is James Cawman from Tahoka. His letter was sent to the Jackson's Meat Packers in Post, saying how much he and his fellow servicemen enjoyed the beef jerky from their establishment and wanting supporters to send more to Saudi Arabia.

In the other letter, the wife of Guadalupe Saldaña is seeking letters from her husband's former schoolmates in Tahoka to send letters. Both letters follow.

Dear Sir or Mrs.:
My name is Paul Guzman Jr. originally from Crosbyton, Texas. I'm an E-6 or Staff Sergeant in the United States Army. I'm with E-Co. 2nd and the 5th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division out of Fort Hood, Texas. Presently I'm deployed in Saudi Arabia and have been here as of 15 Sept.

The reason for this letter is your product "beef jerky." As a fellow person of the area, I frequently stopped in Post, Texas at your wholesale market, through the side door of your establishment and purchased beef jerky as I would pass to or from Fort Hood.

jerky. Well she did. She sent three pounds to me packaged in the vacuum pack plastic wrapper. When I received it in Saudi Arabia it was just as fresh and tasty 10 days later.

Well I shared it with my whole company, giving each soldier a small portion. I ran out within three days, and received rave comments about how good it was and where did I get such large pieces and who made it?

I gave them the who, what and where, but unfortunately we don't hold any cash, cause we can't spend it. But my squad leader E-5 Sgt. James Cawman from Tahoka also relayed to his wife and parents to ship some jerky from your store. Apparently they too know about the tasty stuff and sent him two pounds. Once again he shared it with the whole company.

At the present we are both out of jerky, and both our wives reside in Fort Hood.

There are many fellow Texans in our unit of 85 personnel, and as a fellow spokesman I would like to ask you and your company with all sincerity if any and at all possible for a little support for your fellow soldiers in Saudi Arabia. A small contribution of beef jerky for 85 people would be greatly appreciated, and it would actually raise the morale of fellow soldiers just knowing there's someone out there who cares.

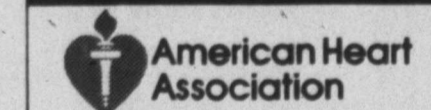
