They hide in places where spraying and blasting won't touch them, then they crawl out defiantly and make idiotic sounds before scurrying back into their holes.

Burglary Loss Set At \$3,000

Lynn County sheriff's department this week continued investigation of a burglary Feb. 4 or early Feb. 5 at New Home Oil Co. About \$3,000 cash was reported missing from a safe and cash register.

Most of the money stolen was taken from the safe which was forced open. Tools first were taken from the pickup of the owner, Surpy Benavidez, and used to break into the building. About \$100 was stolen from the cash register, and four tires also were stolen.

THS Bulldogs Trip Chiefs, Have Chance For Playoffs

Friday, Feb. 8, the Dogs traveled to Post to meet the Antelopes coming out on top 63-48.

Leading scoring for the Dogs was Bruce Burleson with 21. Others in double digits were Mike Burleson with 17 and Trey Nance 10.

The JV Lady Dogs went to Post Feb. 8 and lost 19-64.

"I was proud of the improvement that the JV showed from the end of last year to the end of this year," said Coach Steve Qualls. "Next year should be the big payoff for these girls."

Jill DeLeon, Jennifer Patterson, Renae Williams each had six points. Darla Willis made one point.

Feb. 8 the 10-18 Lady Bulldogs ended their season with a loss to the Post Lady Lopes 51-54.

"The Post game was one of many close games that we've played this year but it was the best total team effort that I've seen here at Tahoka," said Coach Qualls. "The only thing missing was the winning."

E.B. Gaither of Tahoka was honored in a special ceremony at Tahoka Scout Community Center Sunday afternoon for his 50 years of service to the community as a leader of Scouting.

Letters from former scouts, including some of the 27 former Boy Scouts who became Eagle Scouts during the half century of Gaither's service, were read. Many of the 27 Eagle Scouts and other former Scouts in Troop 721 were present in person. About 70 persons were on hand for the tribute.

Gaither became a member of the troop committee in 1941. After two years on the committee, he became scoutmaster for 10 years, and later again served on the committee for many years. He was an Explorer advisor, member at large on the committee council nomination committee, served as district commis-

sioner and as district assistant chairman. He also helped form a Spanish Scout troop in Tahoka.

In 1957 he went to the National Jamboree with a group of Tahoka scouts. That same year he earned the Silver Beaver award; the highest honor bestowed on a volunteer in scouting.

Area Residents Buy Special Bicycle For Cody Harvick

Small town people take care of their own. In the case of a young Tahoka boy named Cody Harvick, area residents and organizations pooled their resources to purchase a specially-designed bicycle for the young boy with cerebral palsy.

"We are very thankful for the support that was given to Cody, when his teachers found a bicycle he could ride," said Cody's mother, Mrs. Curtis (Janet) Harvick. She said that for several years now, she had tried to figure out a way for Cody to ride a bicycle, trying training wheels and other devices, but nothing seemed to work well for him. "He always felt he would fall off the bicycle, because they always leaned to one side or another," his mother explained.

Mrs. Harvick said that one of Cody's teachers saw this bicycle in Lubbock, and told her about it. "I took Cody to see if he could ride it, and he just took off on it right away," she said. "He was really pleased with it," she added.

The bicycle has a chair-type seat, with a seat-belt, and foot straps on the pedals. The best thing, however, is the handle-bars which move forward and backward to propel a small gear pulley attached to the front wheel, allowing Cody to propel the bicycle with his arms instead of his feet. "The bicycle not only provides him with pleasure, but gives him more independence, exercise and physical therapy," said his mother. "It exercises his heart, lungs, and back muscles, and strengthens his arms. When he learns to pedal it will help strengthen his legs also."

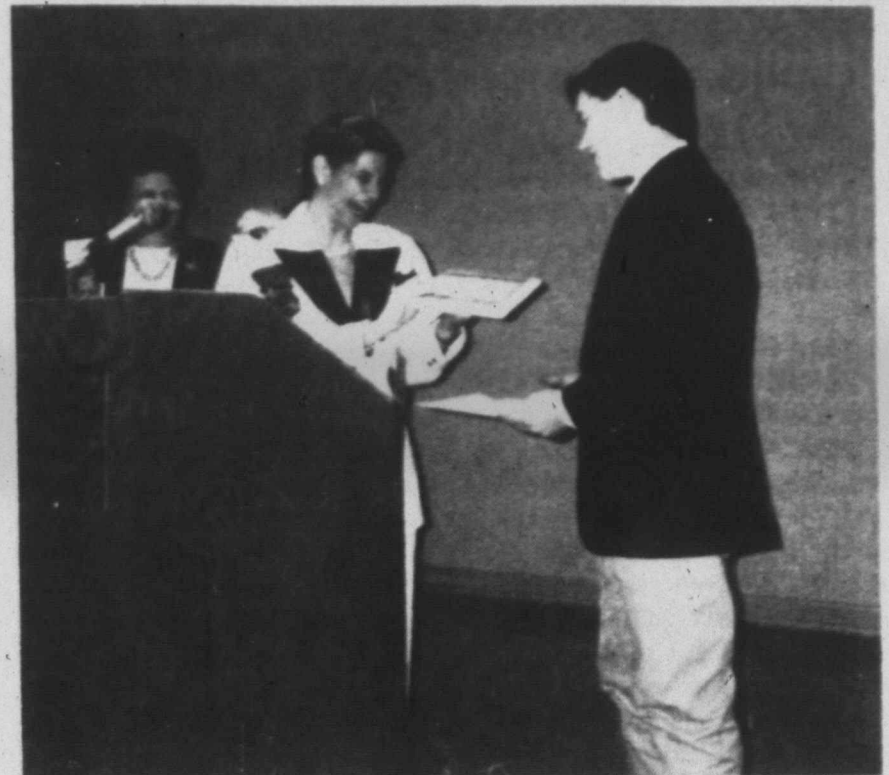
Cody can walk with the aid of a walker, but the up-and-down rhythm involved in pedaling a bicycle is

something he will have to practice, according to Mrs. Harvick. "I feel like he will eventually be able to pedal this bicycle," she said.

The Harvick family wants to express their deepest thanks and appreciation to the people and organizations for finding and helping Cody get his bicycle, which cost several hundred dollars. "And last but not least," said Mrs. Harvick, "I want to say thank you to the founders and makers of this bicycle, Mr. Joe Tarver and Rock 'n' Roll, Inc. of Lubbock." After the bicycle was purchased, and the Harvicks had brought it home, Cody tried it out on a Sunday afternoon. "He couldn't get it to go as easily as he could when he tried it in Lubbock," his mother explained. "We called Mr. Tarver, and he came out that afternoon to see how he could help us. He re-positioned the chair and some other adjustments, so that Cody could ride it. We really appreciate his help and concern for Cody," she added.

Cody got his bicycle at the beginning of February. He can be seen on warm days riding it with a smile on his face. He even wants to ride it to school, according to his mother. So when you're out on the streets and you see this young boy on his bicycle, wave at him and give him a smile... that's what small towns are for.

State Program Offers Loans To Students In Health Profession

A new state program to attract rural students into the health professions is offering interest-free, forgivable loans to participants who return to their communities to practice.

Applicants for the competitive program must show that a community agent—governmental agency, a hospital or an organization—will pay up to half their educational costs. The state will match the local contribution with interest free loans to the student. After the student graduates, a year of the loan will be forgiven for

every year the student works in the sponsoring community.

Deadline for this year's applications is April 1. The program is open to students interested in becoming physicians, nurses and allied health professionals.

Budget Bill Is Passed By House Committee

As a member of the House Committee on Appropriations Rep. David Counts of Knox City, whose district includes Lynn County, supported and voted for CSSB III. Representative Counts said, "This is good legislation; I was glad to be able to vote for legislation that saves the taxpayers of this state millions of dollars. In this bill every state agency will be looked at to determine their efficiency level without creating a new bureaucracy."

The bill as passed and signed by the governor will cut state spending by \$139.5 million and scrutinize the budget for other savings, Counts said. The Legislative Budget Board can now launch a complete review of state spending. Auditors from the public and private sector will assist the LBB. The board will report findings to the House Appropriations and Senate Finance committees within

60 days.

Also, the act will reduce general revenue funds by \$62.5 million in unspent funds from a variety of sources, and "prohibit merit salary increases and bonuses for state employees, and cut general revenues by \$77 million or about one percent between now and Aug. 31. The cuts will not affect the retirement system for teachers or state employees, employees salaries or insurance," he added. Workers compensation payments, and Department of Human Services along with Mental Health and Mental Retardation will not be cut at this time.

Former Tahoka Man Is Deputy At Spearman

"I had been thinking about getting into law enforcement for quite awhile," said Cline. He attended the Panhandle Regional Police Academy at Amarillo last year, and took a 40-hour required training course in Austin recently.

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Counts Named To Appropriations, Insurance Committees Of House

AUSTIN—Speaker Gib Lewis announced Jan. 18, the appointment of Rep. David Counts to the House Committees on Appropriations and Insurance. He will serve as Chairman of Budget and Oversight on the Insurance Committee.

"I am very pleased with these appointments," Counts said, "I couldn't have asked for better appointments to serve my district." The powerful House Committee on Appropriations is responsible for approving the state's budget for the upcoming biennium. All legislative matters dealing with appropriating money from the state treasury are heard by this committee. It is known for its extensive review of the past spending within state agencies.

As Chairman of the Budget and

Oversight Committee, Representative Counts will oversee and look into the budget matters pertaining to the State Board of Insurance for the Insurance Committee. The Insurance Committee has nine members with jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the insurance industry.

"I expect to be extremely busy working with the two committees I have been appointed to. I regret that there is not more time or space to permit me to continue serving on the Elections Committee as well, however this will not lessen my interests in this area of State Government," Counts said. "I look forward to this session and would like to encourage everyone to write my office with any comments you may have on the current legislative issues."

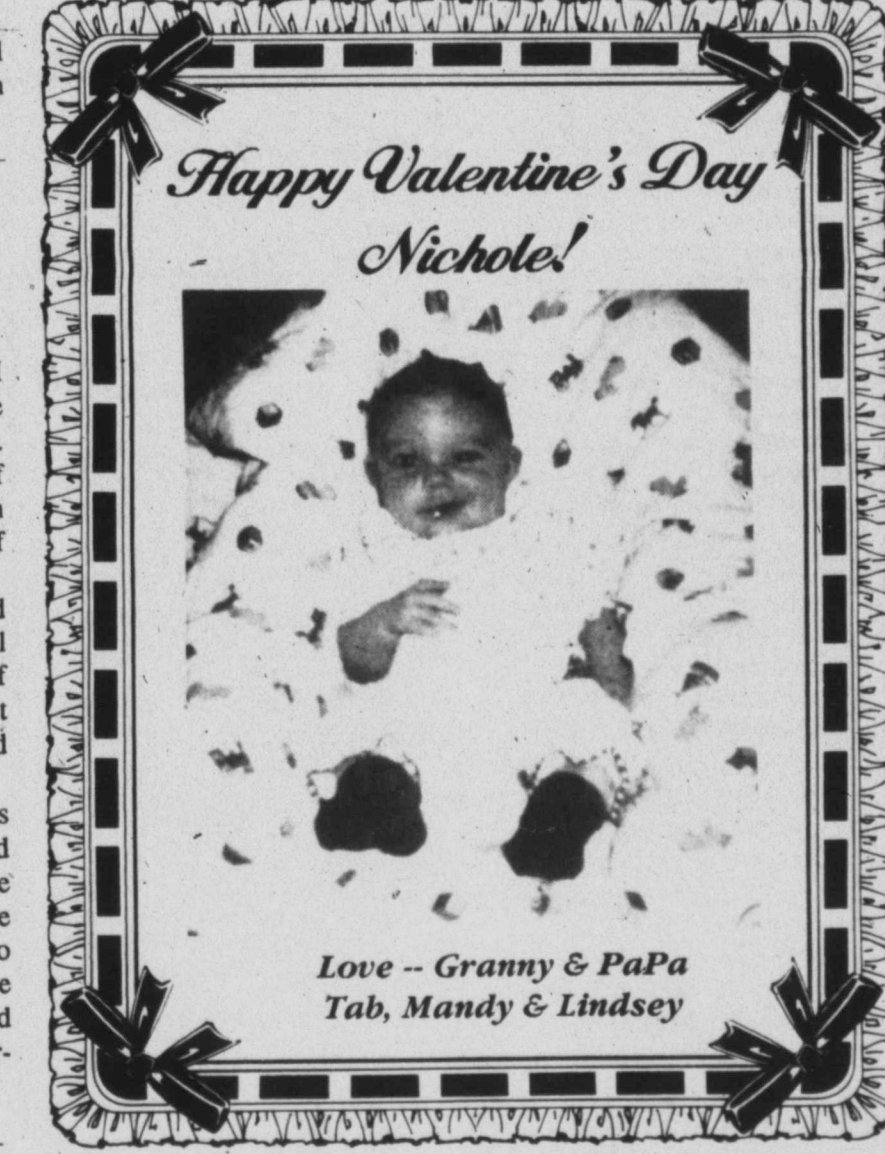
Lynn County 4-H Members In El Paso Show

TWC To Consider High Plains In Critical Area Ground Water Study

The Texas Water Commission has initiated a study of several counties in the Southernmost High Plains area of Texas, including Lynn County, to determine whether the area should be designated as a "critical area" to conserve and protect its ground water.

"A critical area ground water study is used as a tool to identify whether an area's water needs special protection," said Allen Beinke, Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission. "If the Texas Water Commission designates a location as a critical ground water area, we advise and work with the local governments to address the area's problems and find solutions."

The new critical area ground water study, conducted in cooperation with the Texas Water Development Board, will cover all of Lynn, Yoakum, Terry, Gaines, Dawson, Andrews, and Martin counties, as well as parts of Howard, Ector, and Midland counties. Commission staff will contact local officials and organizations for their concerns about ground water problems and issues in the area.

The study will determine if the area is having, or is expected to have in the next 20 years, critical ground water problems such as shortages, land subsidence, or water quality degradation. If such problems are identified, the study also determines whether an underground water conservation district should be created to address them. The study should be completed by mid to late summer of 1991.

If the TWC staff recommends

that the Southernmost High Plains area should be designated a critical ground water area, the three-member Water Commission will rule on the designation. Statewide, 13 critical ground water area studies have been completed. The Commission has ruled on seven of these cases, designating four critical areas and ordering public hearings in three of these areas to consider creation of underground water conservation districts. Gaines, Dawson, Andrews, and Martin counties, as well as parts of Howard, Ector, and Midland counties. Commission staff will contact local officials and organizations for their concerns about ground water problems and issues in the area.

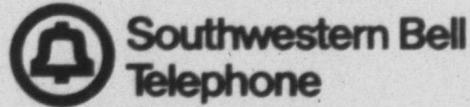

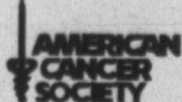

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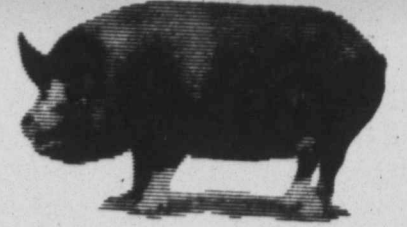
