I have joined the ranks of mothers the world over who sit in agony on sidelines and watch their sons and daughters play in organized sports events. I don't know why I said 'play' because there is nothing playful about these things ... these are serious all-out competitive events.

Our son is involved in a youth basketball league, and he is loving every minute of it. I loved it, too, when I watched them practice in the gym a few times. It was during the actual games that I found myself tense and anxious, muttering to the gods of the gym to please, please, please let my son make just one goal.

I guess it is a natural tendency for parents, especially mothers, to want their children to be perfect. I mean, nobody is going to make the goal every time he shoots (except this one kid on the other team who must have been shooting baskets in his crib because he made two points every time he got near the basketball). He is a sweet kid, too. I just hate that.

The kids never seem to get upset when one kid is better than the others. They play their games, and when they meet at school the next day they are the best of buddies once again. It's the parents who get themselves all in a tizzy over sports. Just ask any referee - they'll tell you to leave the parents at home.

I should say at this point, however, that all of the games I have attended this year have shown the kids and the parents to have excellent sportsmanship. It must be because we are all mature, responsible people who are above any petty squabbles. Right. I'm sure that must be it.

Actually, we are all mature, responsible 'coaches' sitting on the sidelines. You never heard so many instructions coming from all different directions. I even found myself shouting orders to my son's team, and I have never played organized basketball in my life. The only game I know how to play involving a basketball is 'Horse' and I don't recall ever winning those games, either.

We are halfway through the season now, and our team is down 0-4. But we are out there playing our little hearts out. I may make it, too.

Do you notice how it is always your childhood you recall when you think of "the best of times"? I remember climbing trees and walking the fence at my grandparents' house when we were young. They had a wooden fence with a board just wide enough on top for a kid to walk on, assuming you had good balance. My twin sister and I walked many a mile on that fence, until it fell apart (I wonder why?). watching our brother and grandparents play croquet in their back yard.

I also remember my grandmother's neighbor having the best ice cream in the world at that time. I don't know why we went begging for ice cream at her house - it just seemed like a good idea at the time, I guess.

We played a jillion games of Monopoly with my grandmother, and I don't believe she ever won a game. I do remember that she always had a smile on her face, even when she landed on Park Avenue with a hotel on it. That never seemed to bother her like it did us.

She always had a drawer in her kitchen that was filled with bubblegum. All the kids in the neighborhood knew where that drawer was, and in all the years we were growing up she must have bought a thousand dollars worth of gum. She thought it was money well spent.

I remember, too, that she taught my sister and I how to do the Charleston and the Watoosi (I don't even begin to know how to spell that) when we were about eight years old. She was the most fun person that we knew, and she continued to be fun until we were grown.

A few years ago, her health began to deteriorate, and the family had to put her in a nursing home. Her husband died in 1988, but she was not able to know it. In the last year, she did not speak, or move on her own. She died this past week, not having spoken a word to her family in the last year. That's okay. We don't need any more words. We remember her like she was in the best of times.

I'll miss her, but I'm glad she is 'home' now. She watched over me when I was a child. I like to think of her watching over me now as my guardian angel. It's a nice thought.

Eloise Chamblee Retiring After 18 Years As Dr. Wright's Nurse

Eloise Chamblee will hang up her nursing uniforms for good after this Friday, March 15, after 41 years of working in the medical profession. She has been the office nurse for Dr. Richard Wright at Lynn County Clinic for the past 18 years, ever since he came to Tahoka from England to start his medical practice.

"She is a very loyal and lovely

person," said Dr. Wright. "and I am sad to lose her. But I am glad, also, that she will have some time for herself now. She has earned it."

Known to all who visit the clinic as simply "Eloise," Mrs. Chamblee married her husband Pat on July 19, 1948. They have two daughters, Linda Olson and Trina Sones, and six grandchildren. She and her husband live in Tahoka, as do all six of their grandchildren, "who I'm going to spend my time with when I quit working," said Eloise. She says she is retiring so she can join her husband in retirement, and to have time to enjoy her family.

"It was a very hard decision to make," said Eloise of her choice to retire. "I will miss all the staff at the clinic and the hospital, the lab men and all the girls. I enjoyed my work, and got very attached to the people I worked with, as well as the patients."

Eloise was raised in Tahoka, moving here with her parents when she was just over a year old. As a child, she was a patient of Dr. Emil Prohl and recalls telling him that when she grew up she wanted to be a nurse and work for him. When she was 19 years old, she did just that, becoming his office nurse and assisting in surgery and infant deliveries. "It took some getting used to, especially the surgical aspect," said Eloise, "but I learned to live with it."

She worked for Dr. Prohl for 19 years, and then worked as a nurse for people in their homes for a couple of years. When Dr. Richard Wright opened his practice in Tahoka in August, 1974, she became his assistant. "He (Dr. Wright) had just moved here from England, and his English accent was very heavy," recalls Eloise with a smile. "I spent a lot of my time translating the first few weeks of his practice. He spoke very proper English, and we Texans have a hard time with that," she laughed.

Few Signing Up For School, City Jobs In County

Available positions on city councils and school boards in Lynn County are short of candidates with less than a week to the filing deadline next Wednesday, a check of six entities revealed Wednesday morning. Apparently few people are eager to run for the school and city jobs which pay no money but sometimes draw considerable criticism.

Nobody had signed up for Tahoka school board, where the terms of Richard Lopez, Thalia Burks and Nedra Young are scheduled to expire. Incumbent Lester Gickhorn has signed up for Wilson school board; the term of Surpy Benavides also will expire. At New Home, school board incumbent David Forester has applied for re-election; term of Stacy Gill also is up, and there is an additional vacancy on the board.

Carl Reynolds has signed for re-election to the Tahoka city council. Another candidate who has filed is Joe Calvillo. The terms of Mayor Jim Solomon and councilman Milt Uzzle are to expire; no candidates for mayor have filed.

No one has signed for the City of Wilson election, or for the New Home city election, where terms of Mayor Roy Blevins and councilmen LeRoy Nettles and Cecil Kieth are to expire.

Burglaries, Wreck, Theft Investigated

A burglary in which an expensive front door of a new house was damaged to the extent of \$1685 was among reports investigated by officers in Lynn County and Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week. Officers also had reports of a wreck and thefts turned in during the last week.

The home of Bruce Angell of Rt. 2, Slaton, about 8 miles north on Wilson on FM 400 was burglarized on Saturday, when the damage was done to the door. A Magnavox television set and VCR and an Oscar de la Rente man's watch were among the items stolen. Total loss was estimated at about \$2700.

St. Pius Catholic Church in O'Donnell was reported burglarized on March 1, about 10:30 a.m., after a window was broken. Missing were a Mitsubishi TV and VCR.

Milt Draper reported tires, cylinders and a length of hose stolen from a farm located about eight miles

northwest of the Tahoka sometime in the last two months.

State officers investigated a wreck on U.S. 380 in Lynn County Tuesday involving a 1984 Oldsmobile driven by Scott Vincent Farris, 17, of Rt. 3, Post, and a 1987 Peterbilt truck driven by Benny J. King, 47, of Choudrant, LA. According to the investigating highway patrolman, the Oldsmobile turned in front of the truck while attempting to turn onto a dirt road. No injuries were listed in the wreck.

Tahoka Police Dept. Wednesday morning was in the process of investigating multiple reports of breakins of pickups parked at homes in the city Tuesday night. No information as to the loss was immediately available.

Police also took a report from a 21-year-old Tahoka woman that a male companion had bitten her on the face at a dance Sunday. No charges were filed.

Rev. Hazel House

Rev. Hazel House of Tahoka died in Lynn County Hospital Thursday evening, March 7, 1991, following a long illness.

Mrs. House, 80, was a retired Methodist minister who had pastored churches at Bula-Enochs, Estelline, Amherst, Colorado City (St. Luke's-Dorn), Andrews and Sundown-Whiteface.

She and her husband, J.W. (Jay) House were married in June 1946 in Jacksboro and moved to Newburgh, Ind., where they operated a weekly newspaper. Later they operated newspapers in Sudan and Amherst from 1959 to the mid-1970s. They moved to Tahoka from Sundown in 1983. Her husband died in July of 1988.

Funeral services were at 11 a.m. Saturday, March 9, in First United Methodist Church of Tahoka with Dr. Lloyd Hamilton of Wilson, retired Methodist minister, officiating, assisted by Dr. Bruce Parks, pastor of the Tahoka church.

Burial was in Pioneer Cemetery in Graham under direction of White Funeral Home of Tahoka. Graveside services were conducted by Rev. Charles Cox of Graham.

Born Oct. 18, 1910 in Jack County, Mrs. House was a graduate of South Plains College, Levelland, Wayland Baptist University in Plainview and Perkins School of Theology at SMU. She was a beauty operator at Jacksboro for several years ending in 1946.

Survivors include two sons, Dalton Wood of Tahoka and John Wood of Center Point; a sister, Mrs. Ava Ruthe Hobbs of Sacramento, CA;

four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

March 9, the varsity girls went to Plains. Betsy won second place in the high jump. Miranda and Jennifer also competed in the high jump.

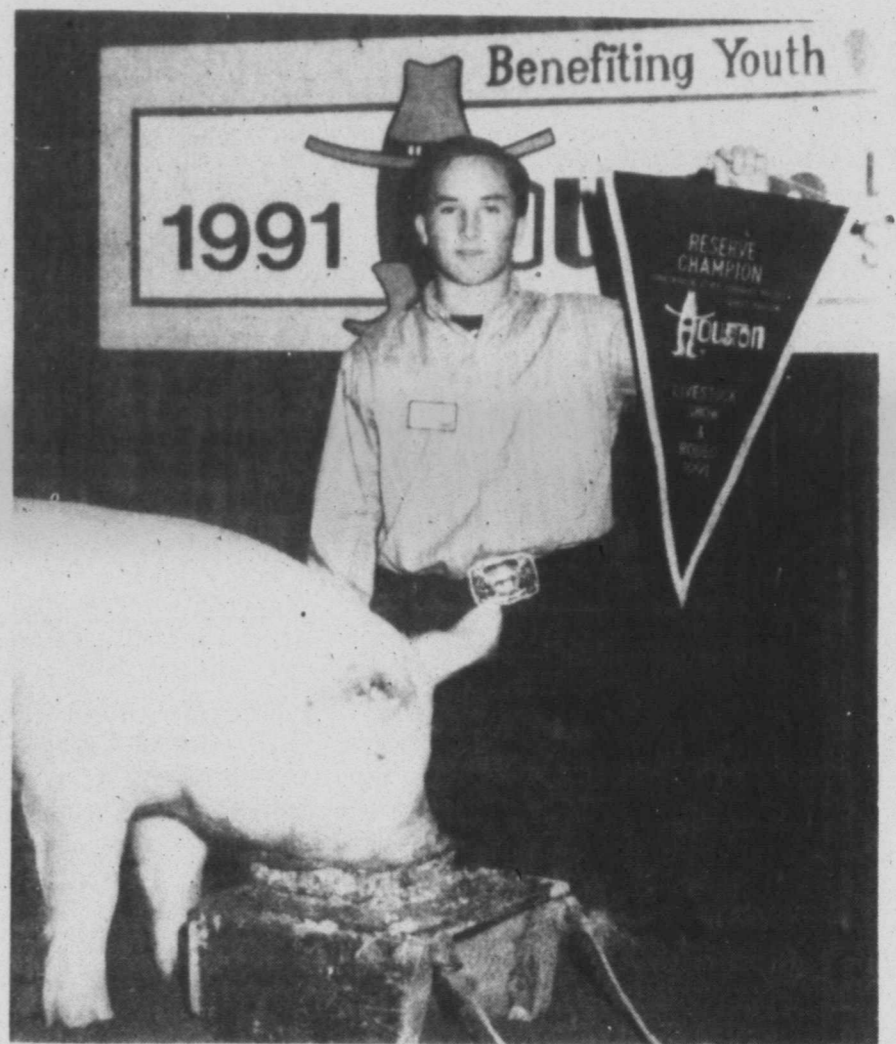
