With two places to fill on the Tahoka City Council, four persons had filed by Tuesday afternoon, including one of the incumbents, Carl Reynolds. The term of Mayor Jim Solomon also is to expire; Solomon was the only candidate to have filed. for the position by late Tuesday.

Filing for the regular terms were Curtis Harvick, David Hale, Mike Rivas and Greg Henley. Filing for the one-year term were Robbie Autry and Juanell Jones. Terms of Nedra Young, Thalia Burks and Richard Lopez are scheduled to expire.

No contest had materialized as of Wednesday morning in the New Home city elections, as incumbent council member Leroy Nettles filed for re-election, and Leon Harmonson filed for the other available seat. Also Mayor Roy Blevins has filed for re-

Two Persons Charged After Drug Raid Here

-Area law enforcement officers department and South Plains Reincluding members of the Tahoka Police Dept., South Plains Regional Narcotics Task Force, Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. and Texas Highway Patrol were successful in completing a drug raid at a North First St. residence in Tahoka about 7:15 p.m. Saturday.

Charged with possession of cocaine with intent to deliver and possession of marijuana were Victor Charo Jr. and Flora Amador of 2229

After a thorough search of the residence by officers and also by a German Shepherd drug-sniffing dog assisted by Lynn County Deputy Elton Childress, officers confiscated approximately 3.5 grams of cocaine (described by officers as worth approximately \$500 in street value) and a small amount of marijuana, along with drug paraphernalia.

Charo, 28, and Ms. Amador, 31, were booked into Lynn County jail and later posted bonds of \$21,000 each and were released Sunday.

Tahoka Police Chief Jerry Webster noted that the raid was effective due to several weeks of investigation and cooperation between the police

gional Task Force and Webster also commented that "Drugs continue to be a problem in Tahoka, and we are working toward elimination of this problem."

Police also investigated two apparently related burglaries of motor vehicles that occurred during the night on Tuesday, March 12. Harry Short of 2509 N. 2nd and Edwin Pebsworth of 2422 N. 3rd reported that pistols had been stolen from the glove boxes of their pickups parked at the residences. Short reported a .380 caliber automatic pistol had been stolen from his Dodge pickup, and Pebsworth reported a .38 caliber Taurus pistol stolen from his 1988 Chevrolet pickup. Lynn County Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$200 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for either crime.

Lynn County sheriff's officers investigated two new burglaries during the week and a heavy influx of 18 new jail inmates were booked in during the week.

Offices of the City of Wilson were burglarized in the Green building on FM 400 in that city between Thursday and Friday, after doors were forced open. Cabinets were forced open also, but nothing was listed as missing.

The home of Gail Faries, Rt. 4. Tahoka, about 7 miles northwest of Tahoka, was burglarized between 9 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. last Saturday, the second time in recent months for the home to be burglarized. Missing. were a 19-inch Magnavox TV and a Panasonic microwave oven. Total value of the stolen items was listed as \$500, plus \$200 damage to a door forced open.

In jail during the week were four persons for public intoxication, three for driving while intoxicated, first offense; two for minor in possession of alcoholic beverage; two for possession of controlled substance with intent to deliver; two for application to revoke probation on DWI charges; and one each on the following charges: possession of marijuana under two ounces and possession of drug paraphernalia, making alcoholic beverage available to a minor, resisting arrest, theft over \$20 but less than \$200, and no drivers license plus defective turn signal plus no liability insurance

Local Group Now Full Owners Of Tahoka Bank

The First National Bank of Tahoka this week announced that full ownership of the bank is once again in local hands for the first time since 1964. In making the announcement, the bank president John Krey said, "This is a goal which a group of local businessmen and farmers have been working toward for several years. Although they all previously held minority interests, the new ownership group, led by Fred B. Hegi Jr., C.T. Louder, Bryan Wright and Natt Park, will now have 100 percent ownership of the bank."

Chartered as a state institution in 1906, the bank obtained its national charter in 1907 and became The First National Bank of Tahoka. During its 84 years of service to Tahoka and Lynn County, the bank has grown from less than \$100,000 in assets in 1907 to more than \$50 million today. Krey stated that the bank "is, and

always has been, one of the most financially secure banks in the United States as indicated by its acapital ratio in excess of 10 percent at the most recent regulatory reporting of Dec. 31, 1990.

"It's a good feeling to have our hometown bank once again controlled by hometown folks," he said. "It can only lead to better service to our community".

Krey invited everyone to come by "and have a cup of coffee" and says, "you'll find your friends at the 'new' First National Bank of Tahoka."

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

Dear Dink and EL,

I want to say again how much I enjoy the letters and news clippings you send. This event in history is winding down. And history I guess will be the judge of whether it was right or wrong and whether it was over oil or freedom. Those of us here will always believe it was freedom. We must always believe that for those who have died must not have German Shepherds on earth. A transbeen sacrificed for anything less; theirs was a noble cause. I received the Lynn County News

that had Clay's picture at the Patriotic Program. I guess that reflects best what we are here for and the support we have received has been moving. The nation I guess is rejoicing and the re-election of George Bush would seem certain.

Oh! Thanks for the swim suit issue of Sports Illustrated. I use it as a means to get more work out of soldiers. A good effort is rewarded by a five minute review of that issue. There is lots of good efforts going here since that issue arrived. Seriously, issues of SI do make soldiers days better and I've handed out each one so folks can see what is going on. The Super Bowl issue is on everyone likes to read. Viv sent old issues of Texas Highways and those were given to people from Texas, made everybody a little homesick.

I told Vivian but the last day of the fight was eerie. There are some 500 wells on fire in Kuwait. All that smoke and haze hung in the air at noon it was pitch black; you couldn't



Agriculture Week Honors America's Providers

National Agriculture Week, March 17-23, honors America's providers - the farmers and ranchers who provide food and fiber for domestic and global needs.

Farmers are efficient producers. U.S. farmers today produce more than 80 percent more crop output on one acre of land than did their fathers. One hour of farm labor today also produces 16 times as much food and other crops as it did 70 years ago.

New technology has made these gains possible. The productivity of the land now depends on the skill and knowledge with which capital is applied. The larger the volume that farmers can raise and sell, the lower the product cost per item. Thus, consumers gain from the increase in farm production efficiency.

The productivity level of U.S. farmers and ranchers, when compared with those of other countries, also illustrates their high efficiency

For example, one American farmer provides food and fiber for 114 people. This compares with one farmer who provides food and fiber for 3.5 people in China, 3 people in Japan, 8 in Argentina, 4 in Brazil and 11 in the Soviet Union.

Consumers spent \$361 billion for foods produced on U.S. farms last year, about 4.5 percent more than in 1985. This amount includes purchases of farm foods in food stores, or roughly two-thirds of the total, and at away-from-home eating places.

About 25 percent of last year's food spending went back to farmers, who received about \$89 billion. The remaining \$272 billion, the marketing bill, went to the food industry for handling, processing and retailing foodstuffs after they left the farm. Direct labor costs for food marketing

represented 45 percent of the marketing bill, and all labor costs were about two-fifths larger than the farm value of food commodities.

For each dollar's worth of food bought in food stores, 31 cents was paid for processing. Retailing charges added 23 cents. Another 10 cents was spent for wholesaling and 6 cents for intercity transportation. The farm share was about 25 cents. These shares of the food dollar have been relatively constant over the years because costs of each function have risen at roughly similar rates.

In food-away-from -home purchases, 16 cents of each dollar covered the farm value. Processing costs accounted for 15 cents, transportation charges for 3 cents and wholesaling for 6 cents, or a total of 40 cents. Thus, 60 cents was paid for food service, or the preparation and serving of food eaten away from

Moisture Needed In Lynn County For Spring Planting Season

the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 need about four to eight inches of water to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before the start of 1991 spring planting, according to soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS).

"The annual soil moisture survey results are meant to inform irrigators about general soil moisture availability and deficit conditions across the Water District's 15-county service area," says. Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist. "Using this information, irrigators can estimate the amount of water needed during the pre-plant irrigation to bring their soil to field capacity without over-irrigating or underirrigating."

Soil moisture conditions within the Water District were tested from Nov. 12, 1990, through Jan. 15, 1991 at 249 soil moisture monitoring sites. Soil moisture readings are taken by

Any precipitation received and/ or irrigation applied between now and planting season will improve soil moisture conditions and enhance crop yield prospects.

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

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
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
