

# **Golf Clubs**, Door **Knob Get Law Officers' Scrutiny**



# **Old Tahoka Depot Remodeled As Country Home Near Winters**

The old Santa Fe depot at Tahoka, and checked into buying one to be built in 1910, now has been remodeled into a comfortable country home in Runnels County, and was the subject of a recent article in the Ballinger Ledger.

IN THE MAIL I received this release from Baylor College of Medicine about Tourette syndrome, which I thought was a tendency to take two or three short trips every week.

Reading a bit further, I learned that it is a central nervous disorder, and that symptoms range from excessive blinking to uncontrolled outbursts of obscenities.

That last one is also associated with April 15, when people have to get their income tax returns finished and in the mail.

Actually, there's nothing funny about Tourette's syndrome, because it can affect people seriously, especially young boys. The story said the affliction usually starts between the ages of 5 and 8 and is more common in boys. Also, it was noted that the disease is frequently misdiagnosed because physicians may believe that the early, relatively mild symptoms are just mannerisms peculiar to a specific patient.

Researchers at Baylor are seeking to find the generesponsible for Tourette syndrome in families, indicating that the condition may be hereditary. A primary feature of all the symptoms are a loss of inhibitions.


Motor and vocal tics are the most obvious signs of Tourette. Vocal tics may include excessive throat clearing, sniffing, grunting and repetition of words and sentences. Motor tics include repetitious eye blinking, shoulder shrugging and head jerking.

The uninhibited behavior of some patients frequently leads to the assumption, even by physicians, that the children are hyperactive.

More disabling symptoms include obsessive behavior, panic attacks and short attention span.

The story said that many Tourette patients are musically talented; Mozart is believed to have suffered from the syndrome.

I know a cornet player who has many of these symptoms. I don't think he has Tourette's syndrome, though. I think he is just a jerk.



# **City Council Gets Update On Water Desalination Plan**

Tahoka City Council Monday night heard a representative of the Canadian River Municipal Water Assn., John Williams, give a status report on plans to reduce the amount of salt content in Lake Meredith water.

The association for several years has been studying various plans to reduce the sodium chloride level, which engineers say is building up in the reservoir which supplies many cities on the South Plains, including Tahoka. Cost of the project will be borne on a pro-rated share by members of the association. However, Williams said several plans are being considered, as well as some alternate financing plans.

With all council members present except Milt Uzzle, the council authorized City Manager Barry Pittman to purchase a new riding lawnmower for use in the city park, with the cost to be about \$1900.

Also discussed was the need for new street signs in the city. It was voted to start with replacement of signs at intersections on the main thoroughfares of Main/S. Ave. J and Lockwood.

Presiding at the meeting was Mayor Jim Solomon; others present included Pittman and Danny Ammons of GTE Southwest.

If there are any questions, contact the Elementary School Office for details.


## Mrs. Lynn Cook **Recovering From Kidney Transplant**

# **Program To Identify Risk Factors Of Drug Abuse Scheduled Here**

A five-week course called "Preparing for the Drug (Free) Years" will be offered in Tahoka beginning Tuesday, April 9. The program is being sponsored by Tahoka ISD and presented by District Counselor, Sherri McCord.

"Preparing for the Drug (Free) Years" is a program for parents of children in grades 4-6. The program teaches parents to identify the risk factors associated with teenage drug abuse and to practice skills which will promote family bonding and reduce those risks.

Workshops will be held at the Learning Resource Center (LRC) in Tahoka Elementary on April 9, 16, 23, 30, and May 7, at 7 p.m. There will be no charge for the workshops and childcare will be available.

Surveys conducted for the National Institute of Drug Abuse show •that most teenagers today will use alcohol or marijuana before leaving high school. Nearly one in 20 high school seniors uses alcohol on a daily basis. In 1988; eighteen percent of the high school seniors in the U.S. had used marijuana in the past month.

"Preparing for the Drug (Free) Years", from Developmental Research and Programs of Seattle, is based on research which has identified the risk factors associated with teenage drug abuse and the protective factors which can help teenagers develop into healthy adults. The

•A family history of alcoholism. •Family management problems. ·Parental drug use or positive parental attitudes toward use.

·Early antisocial behavior Academic failure

•A low degree of commitment to school

•A low degree of social bonding ·Antisocial behavior in early adolescence

•Friends who use drugs

·Favorable attitudes toward the drug use

•Early first use of drugs

"Preparing for the Drug (Free) Years" teaches parents to reduce five of these risk factors which may often be present during the late elementary and middle school grades. The risk factors addressed in this program are positive parental attitudes toward drug use, family management prob-'lems, low degree of social bonding, friends who use drugs and early first use of drugs.

Workshop activities are based on Hawkins and Catalano's Social Development Strategy, a theory of human behavior that identifies the factors which promote social bonding and positive behavior. Their research has shown that children who are bonded to their parents, school, non-drug-using peers and to the community are less likely to become involved in negative behavior, such as drug use, that may threaten those







# **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed two separate applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to introduce two new optional directory services. One service is Directory Assistance Call Completion (DACC) and the other service is Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA).

DACC is an optional service that provides customers the option of having their Directory Assistance call completed to the requested number (when they call Directory Assistance for a number) by either the Directory Assistance operator or a mechanized audio response system.


The proposed rates\* for fully-automated DACC calls are: \$.30 if the call is sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.00 if the call is collect or billed to a third number and \$.25 from a coin telephone

The proposed rates \* for semi-automated (operator assisted) DACC calls are: \$.85 for calls that are sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.20 if the call is collect or billed to a third number. and \$2.60 for a person-to-person call

Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA) allows the customer to request more than two listing requests per call to Directory Assistance. Customers can either call on "demand" and receive up to 10 listings, or schedule an "appointment" and receive the assistance of a Directory Assistance operator for as long as required. The rates for "demand" MLDA are \$.30 per listing request (after applicable allowances), with a maximum of 10 listing requests per call. The rates for "appointment" MLDA are \$1.00 per minute, with a 15-minute minimum.

The optional services DACC and MLDA are intended for use by both residence and business customers. Those persons who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps will be able to use DACC and "demand" MLDA free of charge. If approved by the commission, DACC and MLDA will be available beginning May 13, 1991. Firstyear projected revenues for DACC are approximately \$9.6 million. First-year projected revenues for MLDA are approximately \$1.7 million.

tion is launching a new program to help local farmers obtain credit from local lenders, according to Neal Sox Johnson, FmHA State Director for Texas.

Known as the Interest Assistance Program, it provides strong incentives for commercial lenders to make loans to farmers who otherwise could not qualify.

Under the new program, FmHA will pay up to 4 percentage points of interest for farmers to help them

The Farmers Home Administra- qualify for FmHA guaranteed loans. "If a creditworthy farmer can't

cash flow with a guaranteed bank loan at regular interest rates, we can pay part of that interest for him until he can," Johnson said.

The percentage of interest FmHA will pay depends on the financial condition of the farmer. FmHA will pay only the number of points necessary to help the farmer cash flow with a small reserve.






