Although I am not good at geography, or (sometimes) even which way is north, it never seems to be a problem for me when I'm driving, or even if I'm not, because there always seems to be someone around who's ready to tell me where to go.


New Home High School graduation exercises are scheduled at 8 p.m. today, Thursday, in the school gymnasium, with 12 seniors being honored.

Lyntegar, Billy Davis Receive 4-H Awards

Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc. and Billy Davis of Tahoka, will be recognized at Texas 4-H Roundup next week in College Station. Lyntegar Electric is receiving the citation for outstanding service to 4-H. Davis is receiving the Texas 4-H salute to excellence volunteer leader award. Awards will be presented in conjunction with the state 4-H method demonstration, illustrated talk, and judging event competition.

The citation for outstanding service to 4-H is presented to either individuals, businesses, corporations or others who have contributed to the success and expansion of 4-H in Texas. Only six of these awards are

Lyntegar Electric Cooperative supports the 4-H program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in three ways: educationally, financially, and morally. Lyntegar contributes to 4-H safety and electricity projects by providing training events and research to use with youth and adults in preparing and presenting method demonstrations or educational programs. They have contributed a large financial donation to 4-H programs in Districts 2 and 6 through county and district gold star banquets, scholarship endowments, and livestock shows.

Finally, Lyntegar is morally supportive and promotes all aspects of Extension programming. As a result of Lyntegar's leadership a contribution was made to a scholarship endowment for cooperative donors. It has been awarded to only three students- all of whom were involved as 4-H members at one time. Probably the greatest benefit of all of Lyntegar's work is the recognition they provide for young people over a bi-district region. Lyntegar's investment in 4-H recognizes youth for striving to all levels of excellence. Counties are able to use contributions at county banquets and overall support-like Lyntegar's makes funding of such events possible.

The Texas 4-H Salute to Excel-Ience awards go to two 4-H leaders from each extension district. Therefore, Billy Davis is one of the only 28 to receive this prestigious award and one of two from the South Plains.

Billy W. Davis is the janitor of 4-H. No, it's not because he always gets stuck with sweeping floors and putting up chairs, but for his continued "maintenance" of the Lynn County 4-H program. Billy is the driving force behind recruiting leaders, encouraging the unity among the four competitive towns in the county, and promoting the camaraderie of 4-H and FFA programs in Lynn County.

Billy has been a 4-H leader for the past 20 years and was a 4-H member himself. He currently is an officer of the district adult leader's association. Billy and his wife, Ann, have two daughters raised through the 4-H program. Both are now students at Texas Tech University.

Along with these two volunteer awards, Lynn County 4-H'ers will also compete at Texas 4-H Roundup which is held on the campus of Texas A&M University. Trey Nance will interview for one of 92 scholarships given annually to active 4-H members. Eva Gicklhorn will compete in the State 4-H Food Show and also in the Safety and Accident Prevention contest. Jason Belew and Katy Huffaker will present an illustrated talk in the cooperatives category. Carrie Taylor will present her Promote 4-H demonstration.
