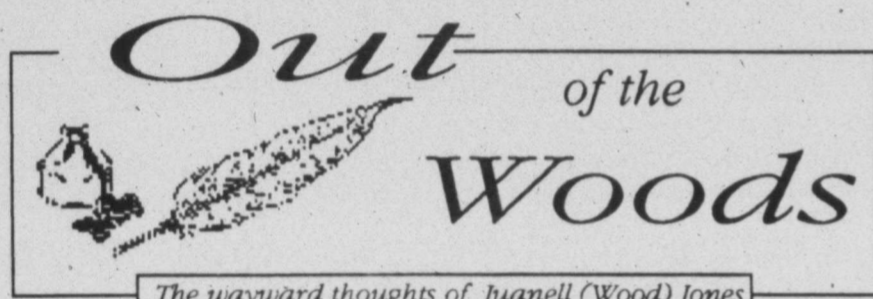

He told police he believed they were taken by a man whom he saw and that he did not notice the items were missing until one hour later.

Also reported stolen between July 17 and July 19 was a portable room air conditioner valued at \$100 and a three-pound Apricot Tiny Toy Poodle valued at \$300, from the home of Francene Broun of the New Home area.

Police investigated a traffic accident last Wednesday, July 24th at 11:30 a.m. involving a pickup owned by Rex Rash and driven by George Morin. Morin was traveling southbound on Avenue P when he said his windshield fogged up and caused him to swerve to the right and hit a trash dumpster. No injuries were reported.

Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. reported a "full house" in the jail this week, with 16 persons booked during the last week, mostly involving DWI charges.

Two were booked on DWI first offense; one for DWI first offense and failure to signal right turn; two for DWI subsequent offense with judgement and sentencing; two for public intoxication; one for DWI felony and driving while license suspended; one for no drivers license and defective equipment; four for ARP (application to revoke probation) and DWI; one for DWI and driving on the wrong side of the road on a divided highway; one for no drivers license and failure to appear; and one for ARP and fleeing.

New Doctor Joins Staff At Lynn County Hospital

Jose O. Allas, M.D. joins the staff of Lynn County Hospital this week, opening his office as a family practitioner today (Thursday) at the Lynn County Clinic building. Dr. Allas (pronounced "Alice") will see patients two days a week, in addition to being on-call for emergencies two nights a week.

The addition of Dr. Allas to the staff will relieve some of the patient-burden on Dr. Richard Wright, who has been the only full-time doctor on staff at Lynn County Hospital since the departure of Dr. Joe Ellis in September of 1990. Dr. Wright has carried the full responsibility of patients and emergency care for almost a year, and hospital administrator Louise Landers has been searching for a doctor to agree to come to Tahoka since that time.

"We're very pleased to have Dr. Allas join our staff here," said Mrs. Landers. "He is a very personable young man, and one who we think area residents will quickly come to like," she added.

Dr. Allas' office will be in the east section of the Lynn County Clinic building, in Suite A, which is the office nearest to the emergency entrance of the hospital. He will see patients from 8 a.m. until noon and 2-6 p.m. Mondays and Thursdays, and will be on-call at the hospital for emergencies on those nights. His receptionist is Jimmie Webster of Tahoka.

"I'm excited about working in Tahoka, and am looking forward to meeting the people here," said Dr. Allas.

Although he lives in Lubbock, and opened a family practice three weeks ago at South Park Medical Center, Dr. Allas says he will remain at Lynn County Hospital on the two nights he is on emergency duty.

In addition to his practice at South Park and Lynn County Hospital, the young (and single) doctor is on the staff of the Substance Abuse Center and Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center in Lubbock, doing research and dealing with the medical problems of in-patients.

The new doctor was born and raised in the Philippines, and completed his pre-med and medical studies there before coming to the United States in 1983. He has a sister who is still there, but the rest of his family is in the U.S.A.

He received his B.S. at the University of the Philippines in 1977, and his M.D. at the University of Santo Tomas in Manila, Philippines

Apartment Fire Claims Life Of O'Donnell Girl

A fire that started late Saturday night in the living room of an O'Donnell apartment claimed the life of 2-year-old Molly Lou Moralez.

The girl was taken by ambulance to Tahoka's Lynn County Hospital, where she was pronounced dead after 1 a.m. by Justice of the Peace Sam Edwards. He ruled the death an accident.

The fire was reported at about 11:30 p.m. at a Ninth Street apartment in O'Donnell, said Volunteer Fire Department Chief Kenneth Vestal.

Firefighters found Molly lying unconscious under a bed in the apartment. Attempts to revive her were unsuccessful, Vestal said, noting that the child was not burned during the blaze.

At least four other children who were in the house at the time escaped without injury, he said.

Pictures and exhibits from the early years of the church will be on display. Anyone interested is invited to join us for this special day.

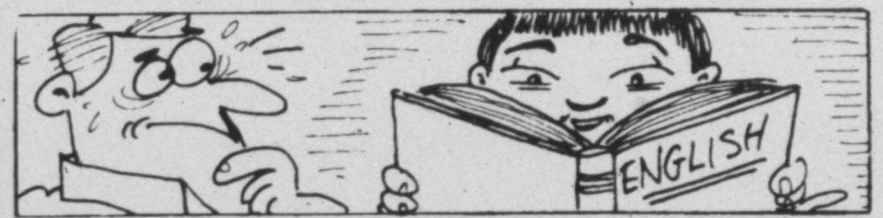
"God's Country" Production Set

Tickets are \$7 for adults and \$3 for students six to 12 years old.



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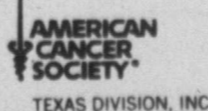

'Carelessness' Leads To Lawn Mower Accidents

"Carelessness" is the main factor in the more than 50,000 people injured each year in accidents involving power lawn mowers.

Proper mower servicing, observing standard operating precautions, and picking up rocks and other objects from the lawn prior to mowing will help eliminate most accidents.

The lawn mower should be routinely serviced before each use. A properly operating mower is safer to use and performs better than one in poor shape.

Routine service includes sharpening the blade, checking the blade to be sure it is securely attached to the shaft, and checking the crankcase oil level in 4-cycle engines.

Always disconnect the spark plug wire before examining the blade. The condition of the blade is critical to the mower's operation and safety. Remove, sharpen and balance the blade several times during the mowing season. Replace damaged blades.

Service the carburetor air cleaner and change the crankcase oil after every 25 hours of operation, or at the manufacturer's recommendation. Also, clean the mower after each use to reduce rust and corrosion and to prevent overheating, both of which reduce the life of the mower. Cleaning the mower regularly will extend

its life and will also aid in detecting worn or broken parts before they cause extensive damage.

Also, remember that safety devices such as engine cut-offs and discharge shields are there for your protection. Do not remove or bypass these devices. If they are broken, get them fixed. Your safety and the safety of bystanders depend on them.

Before mowing, scout the lawn closely and remove any objects that might be picked up by the mower's blade.

While operating the mower, follow these precautions:

Never allow children to play in the area where you are mowing since the blade can pick up and throw rocks and other objects.

Always push rather than pull the mower.

Avoid mowing up and down slopes—always mow across the slope to prevent slipping under the mower housing.

Never leave a mower running while unattended.

When starting the mower, put your foot on its housing to pull the starter cord.

Caution and common sense will prevent most lawn mower-related accidents. That means keeping your lawn mower in good condition and using good judgement.

Tahoka DECA Students Available For Job Training

The Marketing Education Vocational Training Program at Tahoka High School has begun preparation for the 1991-92 school year. Students enrolled in this program will attend school at the THS campus until 1:30 p.m. daily. Their education will continue weekday afternoons, evenings, and on weekends at employment training stations. Glo Hays, Marketing Education Coordinator at THS, has been contacting employers in Tahoka in an effort to locate suitable training stations for the marketing students.

Hiring a Marketing Education student is advantageous for everyone involved. An employer benefits because the cost of training a vocational education student is considerably less than training any other employee due to the targeted jobs tax credit program. Even though the students are initially paid a minimum wage of \$4.25/hour, an employer is allowed to claim a tax credit of 40% of the wage paid; therefore, the cost to the employer is approximately \$2.75/

hour (including matching FICA taxes).

A student benefits from the on-job training program because skills learned through this program provide excellent future economic opportunities. In addition, students receive classroom instruction regarding general and specific business practices.

The community and school benefit from this program because students learn job skills that enable them to complete high school and encourage them to become productive adults.

DECA, an organization for marketing education students, is planning numerous projects for the upcoming school year. DECA students will again maintain the highway between the two roadside parks. DECA students are planning a large community service project that will benefit Tahoka in the future.

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. Beef Selections Abound For Summer Grilling Season

Summer in the city means grilling season. The same goes for a day at the lake, a week at the beach or an hour in the country.

Wherever you are when the weather gets hot, nothing satisfies hunger more than a tender, juicy steak. Combine that steak with a Texan's easy access to aromatic woods like mesquite, oak or hickory and a barbecue grill, and you've covered all the basics of a perfect summertime meal.

There are beef cuts that go straight on the grill to combine the subtle flavor of wood smoke with the great taste of today's lean beef. There also cuts that benefit from a marinade to enhance flavor or tenderness or both before grilling.

For instance, top blade, which comes from the chuck, often sells for \$6 to \$7 per pound less than a comparably sized tenderloin. Many other cuts are also good buys during July when supermarkets traditionally feature beef for grilling.

Some consumers may enjoy complementing beef's flavor by marinating it in spices, herbs, vinegars, oils or other ingredients. Consumers

who enjoy marinades can literally shop the entire beef case at the supermarket for the best buy. The reason is that all marinades that include acid from vinegar, lemon or lime juice, wine or salsa also tenderize the cuts.

When you add tenderizing marinade to many cuts from the chuck and the round, they can be upgraded into an easily grilled steak. When cooked to medium or rare, you have a tender, juicy and delicious steak that was a great buy.



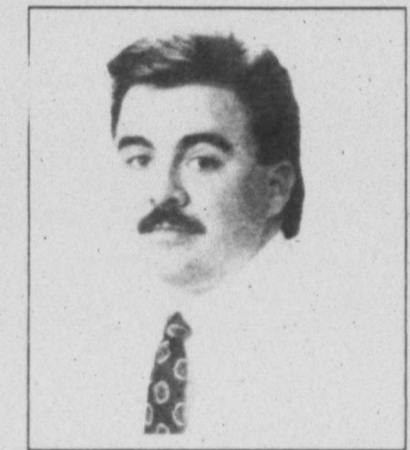

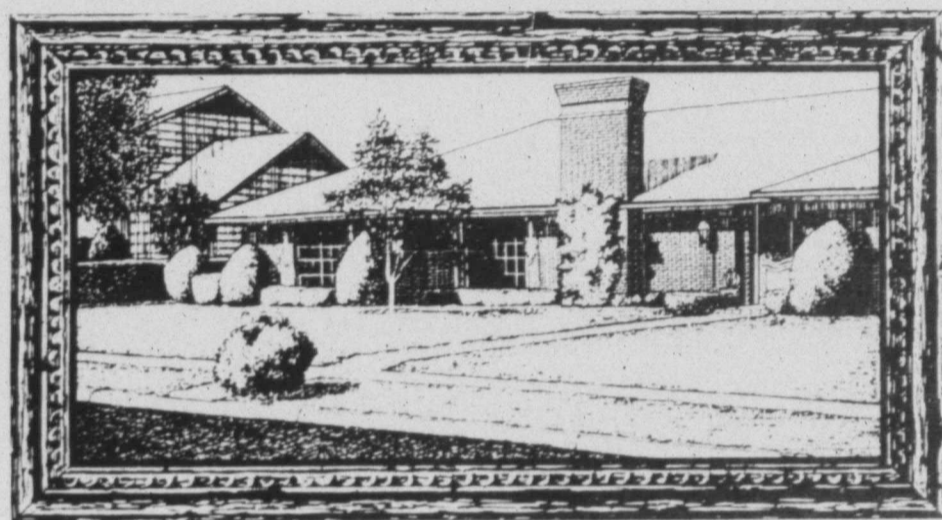

A LIVING TRUST - THREE COMMON MISUNDERSTANDINGS

A "Living Trust" will cut your Estate Taxes.

There is no real "Boiler Plate" form for a Trust because trust are very "Personal" and each tends to be designed to carry out the wish of a grantor (one also puts Funds into Trust).

Citizens Of Tahoka

As of the end of the 1991 fiscal year, we will have paid off a 10 year obligation bond used for 1981 street improvements. We had added approximately 5.35 cents to our tax rate over the last ten years to service that bond. Since the bond is now paid off, we are required to lower our tax rate by that amount. Our current tax rate is .54284 cents/\$100 and by deleting the 5.35 cents, we would reduce the tax rate to approximately .48934 cents/\$100.

The City Council is proposing to raise our tax rate back to current rate of .54284. This will free approximately \$25,000 per year, which we will use to set up an annual program to seal coat our streets. Our engineers tell us this needs to be done at least once every 7 years. Considering the millions of dollars we have tied up in our streets, not taking care of them is a very foolish option.

The public hearing on this matter will be held during the council meeting of August 5th, 1991 at 7:00 p.m.

Lions Clubs Elects 75th International President



Donald E. Banker, of Rolling Hills, California, took office as president of Lions Clubs International on June 21, 1991, during the final session of the Lions 74th International Convention in Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. Banker's election marks the start of the 75th anniversary year of the world's largest service club organization. He will serve a one-year term as the leader of 1.4 million Lions club members in 171 countries. Lions raise hundreds of millions of dollars each year to aid the blind and visually impaired, to sponsor the world's largest drug abuse prevention curriculum, and to support diabetes education and research. His responsibilities include reviewing humanitarian projects, such as the development of the Lions year-old global blindness prevention effort, SightFirst. He will also serve as the association's ambassador in meetings with heads of state and community and business leaders. Active as a Lions club member since 1963, Banker previously served on the Lions Clubs International Board of Directors from 1981-83. He is a charter life member of the West Torrance Lions Club and has received a number of local and international awards for his service. Banker is a past president and current member of the board of the Southern California Lions Eye Institute, and is a founding member of the board of directors of the California/Nevada Wilderness Camp for Deaf Children. Banker, an insurance agency owner, and his wife, Diane, have three sons.
