Accidents, Burglary Reported In County

of Tahoka and a burglary near New Home were among incidents investigated by law enforcement officers in the county during the last week.

Last Thursday at the intersection of S. 2nd and Ave. L. a 1988 Buick driven by Delia Marie Torres of Tahoka and a 1987 Ford Escort driven by Jerri Beth McKibben of Tahoka, were involved in a collision. There were no injuries.

On Sunday a 1975 Ford pickup driven by Johnny M. Gutierrez, 16, went out of control after turning a corner and struck a fence and storage house in the 1800-block of Ave. P. Owner of the storage house and fence, Earlon Shirley, said a lawnmower also was damaged. Total damage was estimated at more than \$300.

Richard Holder of Rt. 4, Tahoka, reported Tuesday that a garage/workshop at his residence about six miles northwest of New Home had been burglarized. A list of missing items was to be supplied to the sheriff's department by the owner.

Norma Smith, near the Lakeview Community, advised that sometime in late July, someone had shot the · windshield of a tractor and caused other damage to the tractor, with damage estimated at \$293.

Vote On County Tax Increase Set For Friday

Lynn County commissioners will have a public hearing at 10 a.m. Friday followed by a vote on whether to increase county taxes by 5.7 cents per \$100 valuation. The county had a public hearing on the tax increase Aug. 30, and no citizens showed up.

Currently the county tax rate is 34.2 cents per \$100 valuation, and the proposed new rate is 39.9 cents. This amounts to an increase of almost 17 per cent.

Bulldogs Open Play At Spur

Tahoka's 1991 model Bulldog football team will begin the season Friday night by traveling to Spur for. a game starting at 8 p.m. Last year, the Spur Bulldogs bombed the Tahoka Bulldogs 55-21 as big, bruising senior running back Terrell Brantley scored five touchdowns for Spur.

Fortunately, Brantley is gone this year-probably to the National Football League-but Spur still is expected to be a stiff test for new Coach Tim Smith and his young Tahoka Dogs. Last year's Tahoka team was 2-8.

Coach Smith said this week that Heath Brewer would start at quarterback for Tahoka, with René Luna, who played some at quarterback last season, shifting to running back, at least for this game. Although Luna has been doing the punting and placekicking in pre-season, Troy Hurley, a senior transfer from Fort Worth Diamond Hill, will do some kicking for Tahoka, as well as anchor a spot in the line.

Several players who normally would see action at Spur will not be available until the second game of the year because of training rules violations, Coach Smith said.

Woodwork... by Dalton

A FEW OBSERVATIONS made while driving on interstates and plain old highways over the Labor Day weekend:

• Many drivers still turn their lights on while driving in the daytime, especially on holidays, although it has been 30 years or more since I've read or heard any suggestions that holiday drivers should do that to remind other motorists to drive safely. I do recall the state highway patrol publicists suggesting that, years ago, and now I'm wondering if there are that many oldtimers around who still continue the practice, or if the DPS has suggested more recently that motorists turn on their lights, or if the lights now are supposed to mean something else (like "I've got a good set of headlights and a good battery, and I'm turning on these lights just for the heck of it.").

Of course, if the lights blink at you, there's a highway patrolmen somewhere up ahead of you, and you need to cut it back to about 75 and let those college kids in their sports cars go on ahead and get the first ticket.

 No matter how fast you're going, some dummy will always pass you, so-although you really don't want to go that fast, you can't allow that-you have to speed up to show him that by golly, he can't pass you.

On no interstate highway I've ever been on do drivers go faster than they do on I-20 around Abilene.

Often there is a highway patrol car passing out tickets within the last mile of U.S. 84 before you reach I-20 (if you're headed southeast).

Before all the construction started, there was no more dangerous intersection than coming off Loop 289 in Lubbock and trying to get onto U.S. 87 to go to Tahoka. Now that they have worked on it, it's still a very dangerous move. Traffic coming from the north is funnelled into traffic coming off the loop and headed south, and every time you accomplish it without getting hit is another triumph.

CED Sets Tax Rate At **78.2 Cents**

County Education District No. 6 adopted a 78.2-cent tax rate for fiscal 1991-92 by a 13-10 vote Tuesday night. All schools in Lynn County are included in the CED-6.

That rate is calculated to raise \$102.8 million for the new taxing entity, which will then funnel back funds to the 26 school districts in its jurisdiction.

CED taxpayers, however, will receive a tax break through homestead exemptions, which voters passed in an election last month.

Clint Gardner, a member of the Tahoka I.S.D. board of trustees who serves on the CED-6 board, said that the rate was figured on \$13,792,028,681 certified tax value in CED-6. "Figuring in early payment discounts, exemptions and a collection rate of 95.14 percent, the numbers just added up to a 78-cent tax rate," he said.

"We (the CED governing board) had a formula from the state which we had to follow. The only numbers we had to 'play with' was the collection rate, which is just an estimate anyway. Everything else was cut and dried," he said. "We had a constitutional obligation to raise \$102 million - if we had set a 72-cent tax rate then it would not have fulfilled that obligation," Gardner added.

The Tahoka school trustees are meeting this week to discuss setting a local tax rate. With the CED tax rate set at 78.2 cents, the budget which was passed recently is a deficit budget, if the total rate (both CED and local) is kept at the current 80-cents. That only leaves 2-cents for a local tax rate, which will not generate enough funds to cover the budget.

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket

Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$445 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line termina-tions, plus \$5 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.

As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the

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
Donna Hopkins Selected Finalist For UIL Award


