At sunrise, about 7:30 a.m., Wednesday, parachute jumpers, Howard Watson, local man, and instructor Chet Saules, boarded the Tri-Pacer, piloted by Morgan Locker, and left for a jump site east of Muleshoe, a locale known as "Horseshoe Bend" hereabouts.

On the scene, first several passes were made over the target, a wind streamer, red and white was tossed from the plane

to test wind drift. After it drifted to earth, they circled the Tri-Pacer, headed into the wind on the jump-run, passing over the target.

Just to the west of the target, Watson exited the craft first, followed by Jumpmaster Chet Saules. Body position for landing was called up to Watson by Instructor Louis Figueroa as he neared the ground. Watson's descent was slow and leisurely, gliding to earth for

a perfect landing. Both Watson and Leon Smith made static line jumps from an altitude of 3,000 feet, making excellent jumps on their first try at skydiving.

Instructors Saules and Figueroa had come here from Holloman AFB, Alamogordo, for the day's jumping practice. Saules expects to join Locker here to give instruction in jumping when he is released in May from the Air Force.

Bond Petition Hearing Is Set

A hearing has been set for March 2 on a petition for the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$85,000 for the "further construction and maintenance" of roads in Road District 1-A of Bailey County.

The hearing will be at a special session of the Commissioners Court in the Commissioners Court Room beginning at 10 a.m.

The petition, signed by James P. Wedel and 148 others, prays the court to order an election to decide whether ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property in the district to pay interest on and provide for redemption of the bonds.

Some time back voters of the district turned down a proposal to issue \$50,000 in bonds to repair and improve the roads which the county maintains, many voters saying they opposed the proposition because they felt the amount would not be sufficient.

MULESHOE MISSED THE WORST Plains Schools Closed, Traffic Halted By Monday's Flash Storm

A traffic stopping snow which covered the South Plains Monday passed the immediate Muleshoe area by R. J. Klump, weather recorder here, said his gauge measured "maybe" 2 inches of snow but it was mostly rain and we had .27 inches of moisture for the day.

It was about the wettest snow seen in these parts lately, it fell slowly and the moisture apparently all soaked into the ground to add to the soil's already fairly moist condition. Low temperature for the unexpected

storm was 27 Monday, and high for the day was 35.

But it was a different story elsewhere in the area. Lubbock's colleges and public schools did not operate Tuesday, and this pattern was followed throughout a vast area south of Muleshoe. A tremendous fall was reported, amounting to as much as 19 inches in places. Sudan, right nearby, had a total of 7 inches of snow. Morton, Denver City, Seminole, and many other schools were dismissed Tuesday.

Two persons killed during the storm, but the snowfall contributed to only one of these mishaps: one man plowed into a freight train while the snow was falling thickest; a little boy was struck and killed near Post shortly after he alighted from his school bus.

Three school buses with their children were unreported for a time but all were found safe at a neighbor's house or at the schools.

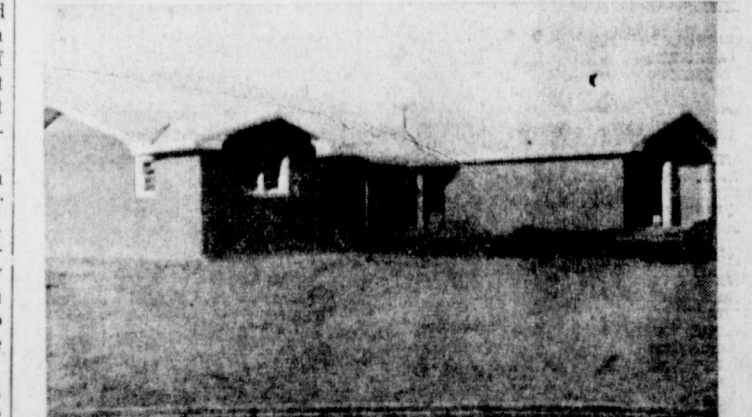
Bright sunshine Tuesday morning must have been a most welcome sight to the people of the hard hit portions of the Plains.

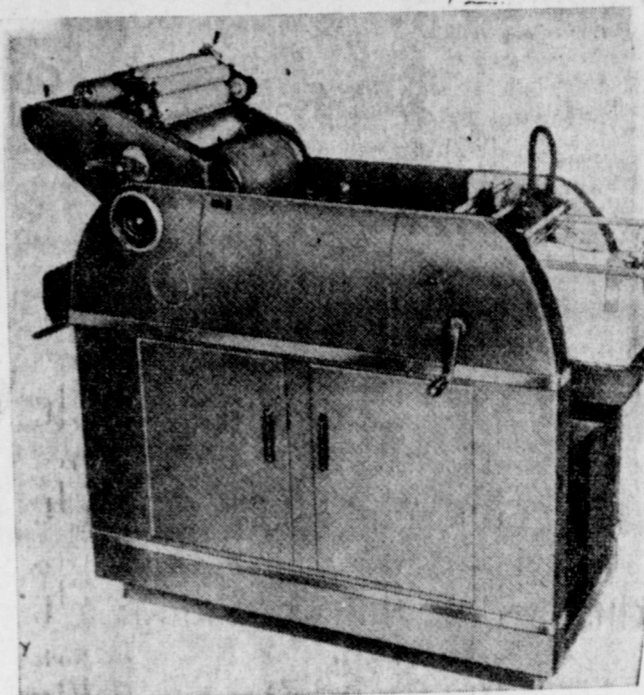

Texas Hybrid Better Than Ever

By J. K. Adams
Texas hybrid grain sorghum seed produced in crossing blocks in Texas fields in 1960 has already been replanted in growing tests in Old Mexico and is mature and has been checked by Gene Culp of the Texas Department of Agriculture for quality as proven by growing to maturity before being sold for planting by Texas farmers.

Mr. Culp reports that our Texas hybrids will be better than ever before and that the few growers that allowed mixing of pollen of undesirable pollens such as sudan or Johnson grass was dealt with in a very strict manner. We can expect only 100 to 150 tall type mutation stalks in Texas hybrid seed for 1961 according to Mr. Culp.

This tall type with the large head is inherent in the breeding of milo and it is something that cannot be reduced by the hybrid seed grower no matter how careful he may be.

Land Bank Loans Said Up 30 Percent

Demand for the type of loans made by The Federal Land Bank of Houston is up 30% over the 1960 requests according to Hal Weatherford, president of the bank. He said the demand, among other things, reflects an adjustment which farmers and ranchers are making in their operations by switching heavy short-term debts to long-term land loans. This gives them a better balanced debt load and more freedom in their operations, Weatherford said.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has more than 237 Million Dollars of loans in force, which is an all-time high. It is one of twelve such banks in the Nation and serves the State of Texas. Its loans are made through 73 Federal Land Bank Associations, and it secures its loan funds through the sale of bonds to the investing public.

Ernest Kerr of Muleshoe is the manager of the local Federal Land Bank Association which serves Farmer and Bailey counties.

BABSON DISCUSSES

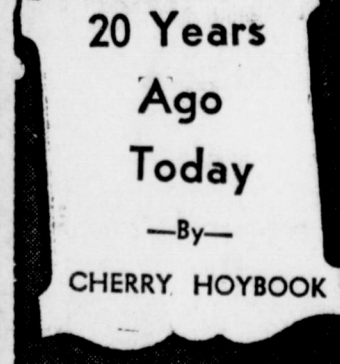

They are convinced that the state has to take some drastic financing steps. And they are ready to foot the bill. Many legislators realize this fact.

Trouble is that a goodly number of them campaigned on a no sales tax, no income tax platform. Many legislators felt at the time that such was a popular campaign theme; that the public did not want either type of tax; that their resentment to either would be bitter.

It is the opinion of a number of the legislators that the people are far ahead of the lawmakers in this type of thinking; that they understand the problem better than the legislators realize; and that they are willing to face the facts.

Richard Morehead of the Austin bureau of the Dallas News suggests that legislators feel the public pulse by ordering a referendum on the April 4 ballot. Voters will be going to the polls anyway to vote for a new U. S. Senator.

Morehead's proposed referendum would point out the state's need for at least \$100,000,000 a year in new revenue. Each voter would be asked to check which of the three tax proposals he preferred. . . a payroll tax to be paid equally by employer and employee, a general sales tax, or an income tax.

Such a referendum would give the voters a voice in the tax program. . . an opportunity to express their own preference in the matter. And at the same time it would lift the problem off the shoulders of the legislators.

As Morehead points out, there are other ways to raise money but informed people generally agree that some variation or combination of the three methods outlined herein is going to be passed by the legislature. And by April 4 the voters will have heard many sides of all proposals.

OTHER TAX PLANS ADVOCATED Lawmakers have proposed numerous methods for raising additional money. Rep. W. W. Glass of Jacksonville suggests a constitutional amendment authorizing a one per cent levy on the gross income of all businesses. He estimated it would bring in \$100,000,000 a year.

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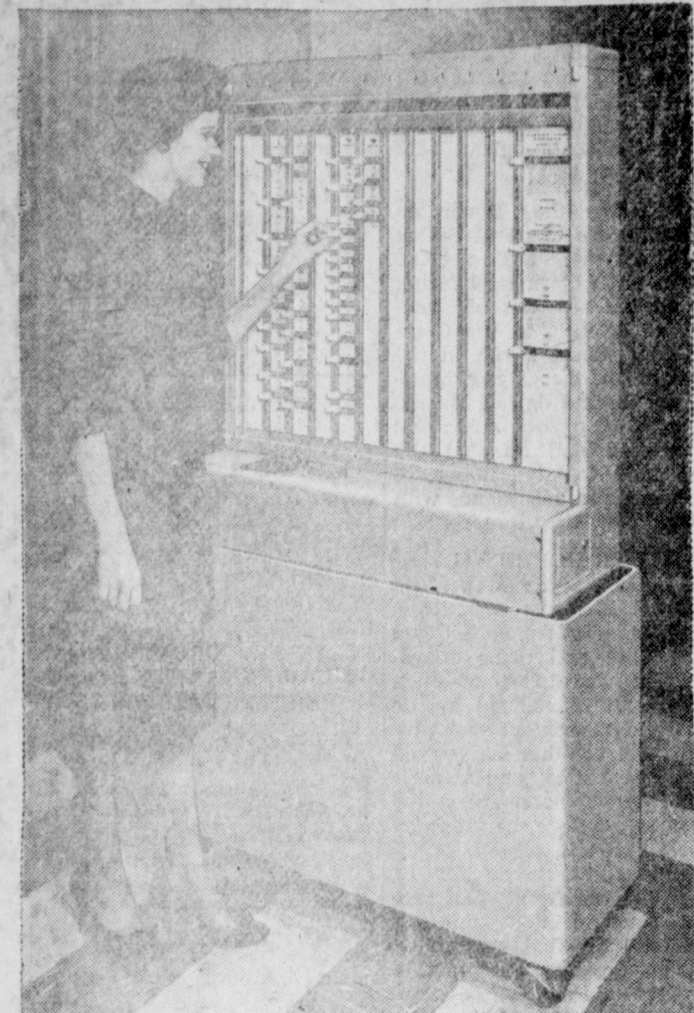
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TULSA, Okla. — Start of production of a new compact, light weight voting machine has been announced by the Seisecor Division of Seismograph Service Corporation.

Joseph L. Hull, Jr., project manager for the Seisecor Voting Machine, said the company already has sold some of the machines, and that demonstrations have been requested by several other cities and counties.

The machine was field-tested by the Tulsa County Election Board in the November, 1959, general elections.

The Seisecor machine was developed by SSC, which has 30 years experience in the design and manufacture of precision equipment, in an effort to reduce the size, weight, and cost of voting machines.

The Seisecor machine weighs 260 pounds compared with other machines weighing five times that much.

The new machine, in its case, is only 40 inches high, 38 inches wide and 12 inches deep, opening to six feet height for voting. It requires 66% less storage space than other machines.

Seisecor maintains the machine produces substantial savings in election costs through its list price of \$1,500, plus reduced storage, transportation and printing costs.

Hull said the reduced size and weight have been made possible by the advanced design which reduces the number of parts, and the use of modern weight-saving materials.

The offices and candidates names are displayed vertically in the 480 spaces, and the voter makes his selection by sliding keys into position opposite the candidates' names.

Over-voting is prohibited by restricting the number of keys which the voter may use. For example, where only one candidate is to be selected, only one key is provided.

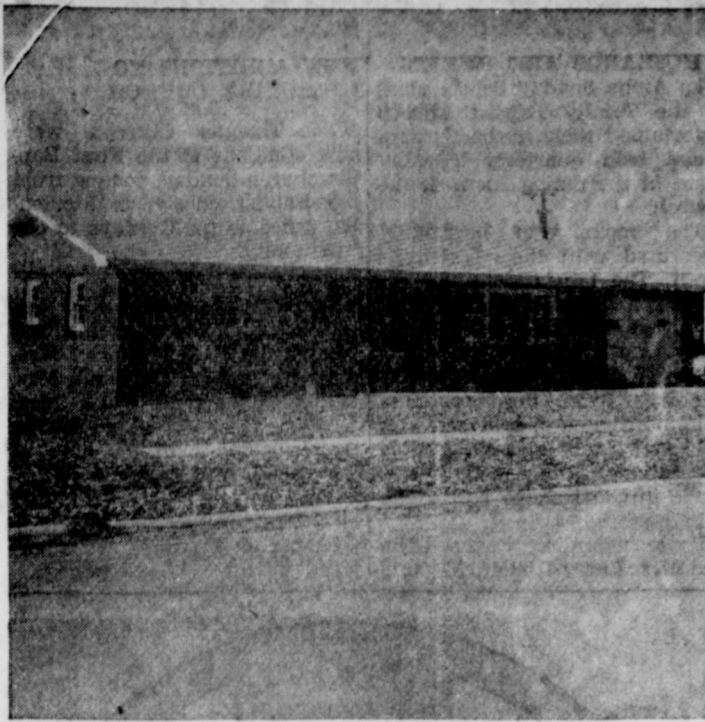

Green Thumb and His Crab Grass

Before you plant roses it may be well to soak the roots a few hours in water. Never allow your roses to remain in water more than one day, however. Oxygen-starved roots under water may induce rot.

Dig a generous-sized hole and deposit some peat moss or old leaves or manure on the bottom of the hole. You should also mix some of this matter into the refill soil.

Extend the roots of your roses in a natural manner. Position the plant in the hole so that the bud union is almost even with the level ground.

Fill the hole half way full of dirt and flood with water. When the water subsides fill the hole full of dirt and hill up just a few inches. The slight hilling will settle when rains come.

Now there's not much that can be done to your roses until growth starts, but there are other yard duties which might gather your attention.

Fruit trees are still in the planting season. The sap is already beginning to circulate forcefully through the twigs of fall planted trees, but spring planted trees will be growing in a few weeks and will be in step next year.

There are things gardeners can do to control crab grass. Most startling success has been made against this lawn nuisance by attacking the dormant seeds. Once the seeds begin to germinate... well, you better try next fall.

ous mixture, ingredients have been added to cut its strength. In this case inert ingredients were tossed aside in favor of something more beneficial—fertilizer and insect control.

Surveys show the dormant seed killer works up to 85 per cent effective on only one application. The application should be done so that there are no misses.

After the temperature has climbed to the 80-degree mark for two or three days, it would be advisable not to apply the dormant seed killer until about November. Meanwhile, fight crab grass with hand and hoe.

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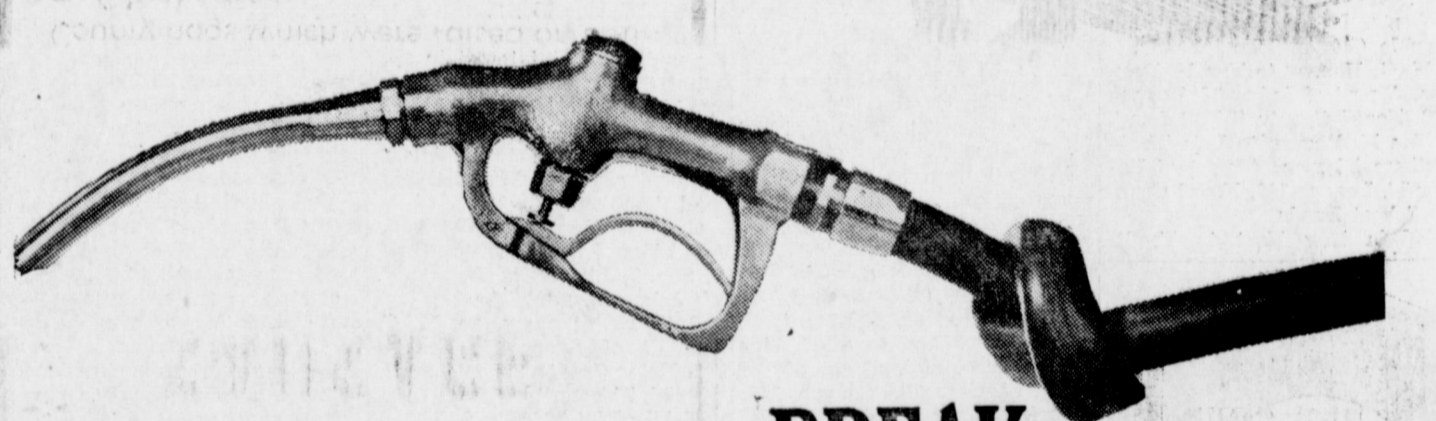
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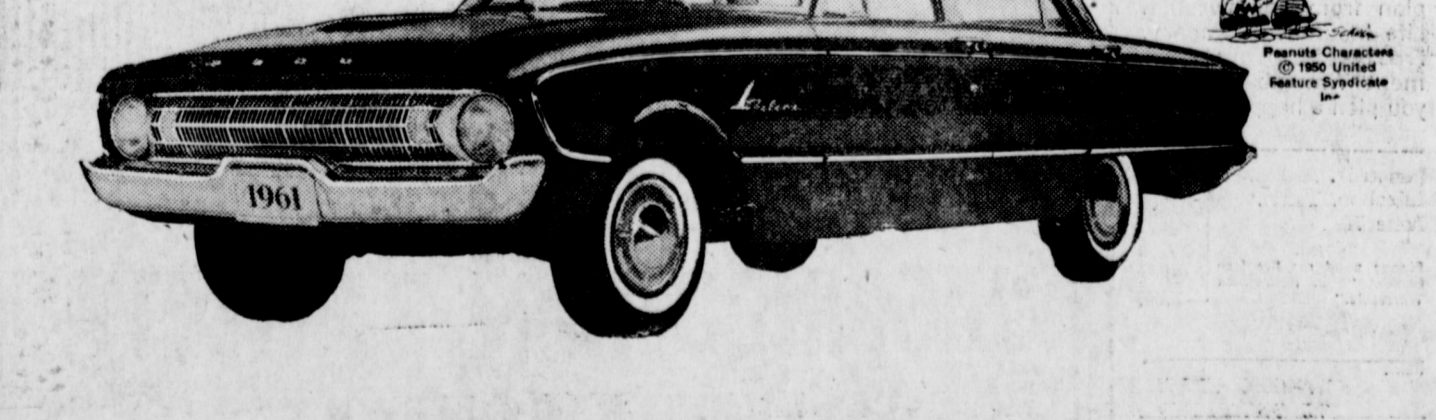


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
