### Chamberettes To Decorate Courthouse

Tahoka Chamberettes will meet at 2 p.m. this Sunday, Dec. 1 at the Lynn County Courthouse to put up Christmas decorations. All Chamberettes, and anyone who would like to volunteer to help in putting up the nativity scene, Christmas lights, wreaths, angels, wood cutouts and tree bows, are asked to meet on the courthouse lawn.

"This project takes quite a bit of muscle and time," said Juanell Jones, a member of the Christmas committee. "We need some willing men to give us a helping hand if they could find the time, and the more Chamberettes and other volunteers who come to help, the quicker we will get this accomplished," she added.

New items for the courthouse lawn this year includes a wooden Santa's sleigh and two reindeer, which were made by Lee and Judy Holden and Lenda Wood, and funded by Chamberettes. The sleigh is sturdy enough for small children to sit in for those families wishing to make Christmas photographs.

Lyntegar Electric Cooperative and Southwestern Public Service is co-operating with Chamberettes in replacing the Christmas lights on the trees at the Courthouse, and Chamberettes appreciate their assistance. "We could not do it at all without the help of these generous people," said Mrs. Jones.

### Moonlight Madness Sale, Santa Claus Due Dec. 6

Friday night, Dec. 6 will be Moonlight Madness Sale time again and time for Santa Claus to pay his annual visit to downtown Tahoka to talk with youngsters and those not-so-young.

Participating Tahoka merchants again will offer special buys on Christmas gift items and many free things for those who sign up at most of the businesses during the period from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Merchants joining the sale will start selling their specials and signing up people for free gifts at 5 p.m. and close the sale at 8. Santa and Mrs. Claus will arrive in town riding on a new horse-drawn trolley car of John Edwards of New Home, which will drive by each of the participating

businesses, but not stop until the sur-rey arrives at the south side of Home-town Hardware.

The red-garbed couple will visit with the youngsters there and give out candy. Also, the horse-drawn ride so popular during the last two Moonlight Madness sales will be offered to children and adults free, starting at 6:30 p.m. from the location south of the hardware store. Children under 12 wanting to ride in the new trolley car owned by John and Mary Bess Edwards must be accompanied by a parent. The rides will stop at 8 p.m.

Santa also will have his mailbox set up on the square south of the hardware store to receive letters to Santa from the kids. These letters will be published in *The Lynn County News*.

Those businesses offering free turkeys or other gifts ask that persons who register for the free gifts must do so during the three hour sale and that all registrants be at least 18, with no name entered in a box at any one business more than once. No purchase is necessary to register.

A new lighted sleigh with reindeer will be on display this year as an additional decoration on the courthouse square. The Christmas lights and a Nativity Scene again will be displayed on the square also, and displays of Christmas angels will be in place high on the balconies of the courthouse, on the east and west sides. Tahoka Chamberettes place the decorations.

## Cattle Stolen; Two Men Charged In Burglaries

Twenty-three head of cattle were stolen from two locations southeast of Wilson on Wednesday, Nov. 20. This report and charges filed against two Brownfield men in connection with three Lynn County burglaries highlighted activities of the Lynn County sheriff's department during the last week.

On Nov. 20, two deputies from the department were called to a location two miles southeast of Wilson where a fence had been cut and 15 head of cattle, including an unusual breed of bull, had been stolen from owner Lonnie Donald.

After talking with Donald, the deputies went by to check on cattle owned by one of the deputies, Robbie Roberson, kept at a location less than a mile away, and discovered that eight of Roberson's cattle also had been stolen. Judging from the tracks, officers deduced that two rigs pulling gooseneck trailers were used, one at each location, and that the thieves then met up on a dirt road in the area and went over to U.S. 87 and then probably drove north.

Total value of the stolen cattle was estimated at about \$13,000. An

officer with the Texas-Southwest Cattle Raisers Assn. also is investigating.

Recent burglaries of a boxcar owned by Don Tyler south of West Point, a barn owned by Harold Bessire, 6-7 miles west of O'Donnell, and a barn owned by Preston Reeves, 3.5 miles north of Lakeview community were reportedly cleared up by arrests and charges filed against Micheal Baker, 22, and Earl Lewayne Carouth Jr., 24, both of Brownfield.

Officers said the two men are implicated in possibly more than 100 burglaries in Lynn, Gaines, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum counties.

In jail during the week were five new "guests," on charges as follows: allowing unlicensed driver to operate motor vehicle, burglary of a building, driving while intoxicated second offense, plus possession of marijuana

## Cowboy Christmas Gala To Be Saturday, Dec. 7

The third annual "Cowboy Christmas Gala" barbecue dinner and musical celebration sponsored by Tahoka Junior Chamber of Commerce will be on Saturday, Dec. 7 at the Lynn County Show Barn, starting at 7 p.m. and continuing with a dance to 1 a.m.

Proceeds from the event again will go to the Jaycees "Secret Santa" program, with assistance provided for the elderly and the needy, said Jaycees President Cal Huffaker.

Money raised from the Christmas Gala last year and the previous year helped to make the Secret Santa project a big success, making it possible for about 50 needy families in the county to have a better Christmas than they would have had otherwise. Food, toys for small children and

clothing for the needy, including the elderly, were provided.

Admission for the Cowboy Christmas Gala is \$12 for adults and \$6 for children 13 and under, with tickets available from any Jaycee member.

The meal will be served from 7 to 9 p.m., followed by the music (for dancing or just listening) from 9 to 1. Featured this year will be the band *Branded Country* from South Plains College, Levelland.

Jaycees will decorate the show barn in a western motif for the occasion.

Huffaker said also that anyone knowing of needy families or older persons needing help should contact him or any other Jaycee as soon as possible.

**Eagles To Play In Regional**

The O'Donnell Eagles will journey to Plainview Saturday night for a 7:30 p.m. football game against Memphis, playing the Cyclones for the Regional Class A championship.

Coach Odis Summers' high-flying Eagles, now 10-1 after beating Sanderson 42-26 last week, will play Memphis in the Plainview High School Bulldog Stadium.

The Eagles were behind 20-14 at halftime last week, but came back strong to win the game in Crane. Renee Hernandez scored three touchdowns, Raymond Gonzales two, and Michael Rodriguez scored once. Belino Mecalco kicked six extra points.

O'Donnell's defense held Sanderson to 306 yards total offense, while the Eagles gained a total 418 yards, 406 of it on the ground. Hernandez alone had 206 yards in 29 carries and now has more than 1400 yards for the season. Rodriguez now has more than 1,000 yards.

**Tutors Needed For Literacy Program Here**

Volunteer tutors are needed in an on-going adult literacy program sponsored here by the Tahoka City-County Library, according to Nell Cotter, who spearheads the program.

"We have one active tutor, which is myself, and three active students at the present time," said Mrs. Cotter. "We have had inquiries from several other prospective students and really need some volunteer tutors to help with this project," she added.

A tutor can be anyone who reads or writes, and will be trained by Mrs. Cotter or another qualified training tutor. "There are no special requirements for someone to be a tutor, except to be willing to give of their time," she said. Tutors and students meet for literacy sessions at the library at a schedule agreeable to both.

There will be a training session for tutors offered in Lamesa Dec. 6-7, with sessions from 6-9 p.m. Friday and from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Saturday. Mrs. Cotter said she could also offer a training session in Tahoka if there was enough interest shown.







## Tahoka FHA/Hero Students Attend Conference In Dallas

Four members of the Tahoka chapter of Future Homemakers of America recently participated in a weekend leadership training conference held in Dallas, Nov. 22-24. Local members that participated were Kathy Amador, Crystal Barrientez, Carrie Taylor, and Aimee Wilson.

"Youth Action" was the theme chosen to highlight the activities and programs of this year's regional Cluster Meetings. The four thousand young men and women and their adult advisors dealt with such issues as the environment, volunteerism, professionalism, homeless, self-esteem and peer pressure.

The meeting's program emphasis was on examining how teens can take action and make a difference. The "Youth Action" theme was reinforced by Friday's powerful general session multimedia presentation. The program, called "Harmony," dealt with teenagers' difficulties with conflict. Learning the value of acceptance and concern of others, peaceful conflict resolution and building unity were the main themes in this production.

Following Saturday morning's workshops, teens discussed contemporary youth issues and learned how to take action. In the afternoon they chose from approximately 12 different workshops designed to expand their personal leadership capabilities. Participants were shown how to use national programs to build support

and enthusiasm and increase participation in their local chapters.

Leadership workshops covered such areas as quality chapter programs, community service, peer education, financial management, career exploration and communication.

In addition to motivational speaker Sandy Queen's keynote address, "Lighten Up!", Sunday's activities concentrated on officer training and use of the organization's highly successful Champions membership campaign.

The Dallas meeting was the last (and largest in history) in a series of nationally sponsored training conferences, called Cluster Meetings, held this fall. Patti Rambo, FHA/HERO chapter adviser accompanied the members to the Dallas meeting.

FHA/HERO is a national vocational student organization and has involved over eight million youth since its founding in 1945. It is the only in-school student organization with the family as its central focus and is unique among youth organizations because its programs are planned and run by members.

Through its programs, the organization helps today's young men and women prepare for multiple roles as wage earners, community leaders and caring family members. Participation in national projects and chapter activities helps members develop "skills for life".

## Little Dribblers To Offer Changes, Participation For Grades K-7 Here

This year, the Little Dribblers organization will be growing. In the past, grades 3-6 have been the only ones allowed to participate. This year K-7 will be participating. This is a larger scale than before.

This exciting program was presented at the first organizational meeting by Coach Steve Qualls. He learned about this program from a fellow coach at last summer's coaching clinic in Austin. The same type of program has been run at Schulenburg, Texas by Larry Tidwell for the past seven years.

"With the addition of the lower grades, the lowering of the baskets, the numbers that are expected to participate, and the success that will be experienced by all, will make this year's Little Dribblers season one that will be a lot of fun," said Coach Qualls.

The program will stress the following things:

1. Teaching of the fundamentals of the game;
  2. Teaching of the rules of the game;
  3. Having fun, a lot of it;
  4. Sportsmanship and academic excellence;
  5. Teaching man-to-man defense;
  6. Will not stress winning. No league records will be kept on win/loss record.
- No league champions. Tahoka wins every game!
7. Equal participation - a strict substitution rule mandates equal playing time;
  8. Fantastic awards - all players receive same awards; everyone will feel good about themselves at the conclusion of the season.

There are a few things that must first take place before this program can get off

its feet. We are expecting a large number of teams so we will need a large number of coaches.

There will be four divisions and you can coach more than one team. Only grades 6 and 7 will have organized practices. This should allow a lot of people to coach teams without the excuse of not making practices. Just show up and get excited about the team and make all the substitutions during the game.

The four divisions are K-1, 2-3, 4-5, and 6-7. A free shot and hot shot competition will take place before every game. A free shot and hot shot champion will be crowned at the conclusion of the season.

"If your child will be playing this year it might be helpful to know what height their goal will be so you can start adjusting the one in the driveway for practice," said Qualls. For grades K-1, the goal will be set at 6'6" and the ball will be the next size under the women's regulation ball. Grades 2-5 will be playing at a height of 8' and use the women's size ball. Grades 6-7 will play with regulation height and basketballs. Grades K-5 will be a four on four type format and Grades 6-7 will be five on five.

"Sponsors, we need you," said Qualls. "You do not have to be a business to sponsor a team. Mothers, fathers, uncles, aunts, grandmothers, grandpas, as well as businesses, can sponsor teams," he added. "Give me a call at 998-5020 if you would like to coach a team (or two) or become a sponsor for your children or grandchildren," he added.

### Baffling Bladder Disease Often Not Diagnosed

Interstitial Cystitis (IC) is a baffling and incurable bladder disease which affects over 500,000 people (90%) women and which causes economic devastation and major life style changes in its victims. Symptoms include urinary urgency, voiding up to 70 times a day and chronic pain with the intensity of cancer pain. It cuts short promising careers and makes life unbearable.

In a proclamation this month, Gov.

Ann Richards has described the details of this misdiagnosed and under-diagnosed disease. Patients have been known to go from doctor to doctor for 20 years spending fortunes on useless treatments. The average time it takes to get diagnosed is four and one half years. Patients frequently diagnose themselves after recognizing their symptoms through the media.

Why has this happened to an estimated 500,000 Americans? Because until 1984 the text for urologists stated that unidentified pelvic pain and frequent urination were psychosomatic. It was not until 1991 that the textbook used to educate gynecologists was changed. Also, IC mimics the symptoms of bladder infections and other

### Conservation Structures Part Of Conservation Compliance

The 1985 and 1990 farm bills require farmers who farm highly erodible land, to implement conservation plans on their highly erodible acre-

and maintenance of erosion control structures.

Actively applying a plan, for land requiring conservation structures will include maintaining these new and existing structures. Farms with waterways will require that these structures be cleaned out periodically and be drilled to an annual small grain or permanent grass. On farms requiring terraces, all terraces and blocks will need to be constructed and maintained in accordance with specifications set forth in SCS technical guides.

SCS personnel are available to review conservation plans and discuss concerns or answer questions about what is actually required in the plans. SCS personnel will also be available to provide technical assistance with layout, construction, and maintenance of these structures.

Producers are reminded that the deadline established by the two pieces of legislation, for completing construction of new structures is Dec. 31, 1994. This is also the deadline for completing any required maintenance on existing structures.

Annually SCS personnel are carrying out random spot checks on farms requiring conservation plans, to determine if producers are actively applying their plans. Producers who are determined to be not actively applying their plans could lose eligibility for farm program benefits.

### Jr./Sr. High Reading Classes Study Indians

Over the past two weeks in celebration of Thanksgiving, Mrs. Julie Cypert's reading classes at Tahoka Junior/Senior High School have been studying the Indian culture.

The 7th and 8th grade Chapter I reading classes have completed a unit of study on Indian art appreciation, viewing deerskin treasure bags with individual art decor of American Indians. They also studied Indian animal folk tales and matching "button blankets," according to Mrs. Cypert. "To help pass on our oral language tradition, each student reviewed and wrote their own animal folktale," she said, "and designed and made animal button blankets to match their folktales."

Students read various Indian literature, and read "The Legend of the Bluebonnet" by Tomie DePaola. As a follow-up activity, the group planted bluebonnet seeds in the school courtyard.

THS Coach Charlie Holland visited the classroom and spoke about his ancestral Caddo Indian heritage, which was a Texas dwelling tribe.

To finish the unit of study, the class prepared, cooked and ate an authentic Indian recipe of corn fried bread.

Mrs. Cypert's high school reading classes read, studied and researched self-selected American Indian tribes. Each student transformed their own whole body silhouettes into an Indian squaw or warrior, depicting their researched Indian tribe.

Students also studied Indian dress, dwellings, customs, and survival techniques. Like the junior high classes, they also read Indian literature and planted bluebonnet seeds in the school courtyard, and prepared and ate an Indian recipe.

### Look What's Happening At T.H.S.

Parents are continually encouraged to support this endeavor by providing a home atmosphere where students can study. Parents can help their children succeed at school by asking about their schoolwork and helping their student remember to take assignments and supplies to school daily.
