Items Stolen In Burglary In Tahoka Recovered

Trading cards valued at \$1000 which were stolen in a burglary of the home of David Hale, 1801 S. 2nd, in December were recovered, along with other items taken in the burglary reported Christmas Day. Tahoka Police Dept. recovered the articles after talking with a 17-year-old suspect who admitted the burglary and agreed to pay for damages.

Among the damages was that a shotgun which the young man had sawed off. Charges are expected to be filed and the suspect said he would plead before the district judge in the case.

A volt meter, wrenches and a bolt cutter, all valued at a total of \$920, were stolen from a Southwestern Public Service Co. pickup parked

at the residence of Doyle Webb, 2014 N. 4th St., Monday night. Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a reward of \$100 for information clearing the case.

Last Thursday at the intersection of U.S. 380 and U.S. 87 west access road, a 1977 GMC burr truck owned by Louder Gin and driven by Rafael Velez Gomez, 58, of Tahoka, and a 1982 Honda Civic driven by William Preston Howard, 21, of Springerville, AZ collided. Howard was slightly injured.

Sheriff's officers this week were investigating a report that a \$500 cashier's check had been paid at First National Bank of Tahoka in November, and it later was discovered that the endorsement was a forgery. Two

Lubbock men were listed as suspects in the case.

Mrs. Templeton's husband, Tom Templeton, is the Superintendent at New Home.

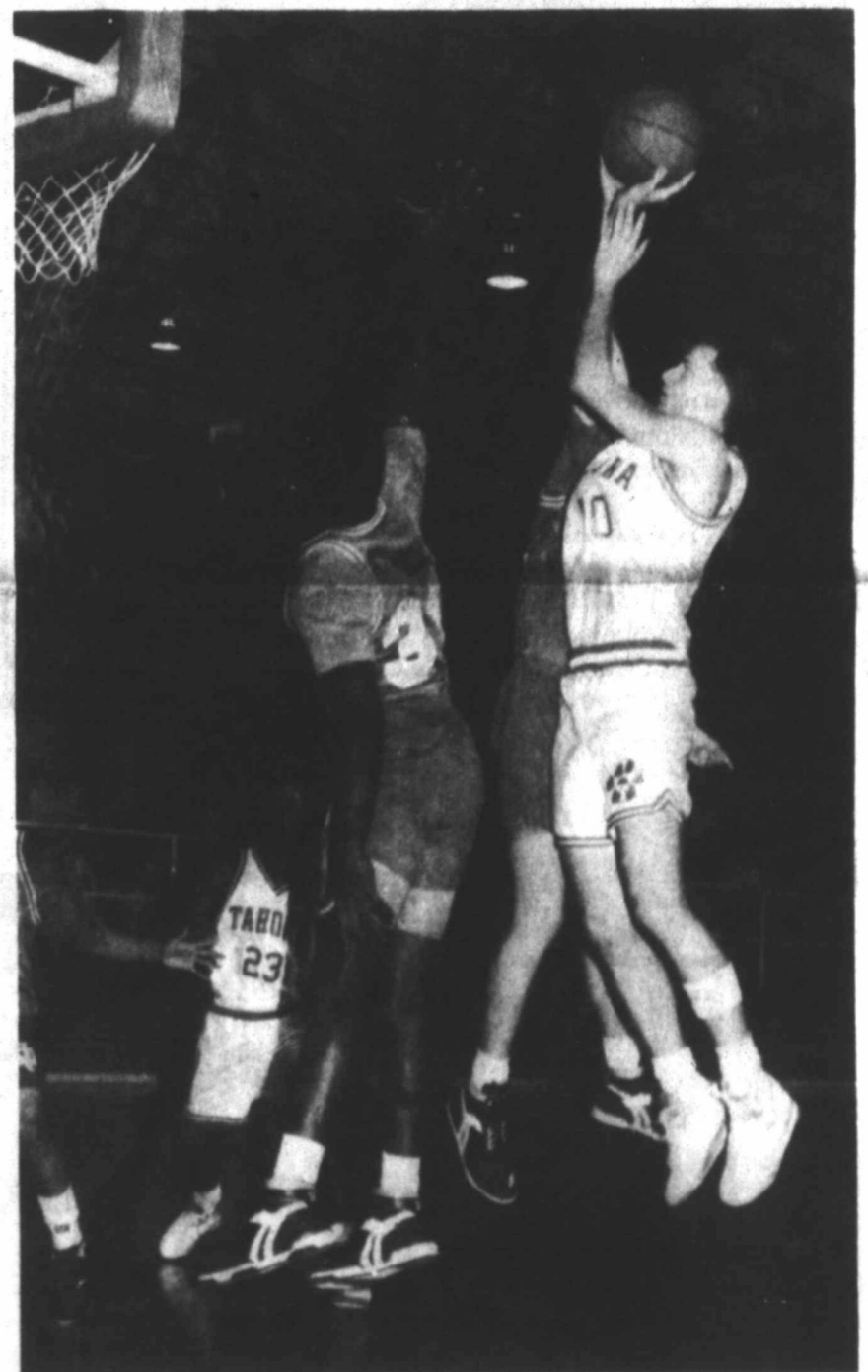
No Local Candidates In Republican Primary

Running for U.S. Representative, District 13, nominee are Beau Boulter, Ernie Houdashell, Ray Powell and Bob Price.

There are several other nominee races being contested at the national and state levels.

Bob Price Campaigns For U.S. Congress Seat

Bob Price of Pampa, candidate for U.S. Congress from the 13th District in the Republican Primary, brought his campaign here this week and pledged to work with local officials to create jobs.

Price emphasized that during his tenure in Congress, the region enjoyed a period of unprecedented

growth and job creation.

He cited meat packing plants, educational and training institutions, medical facilities and the Bell Helicopter plant as industries that he helped attract to the district.

In addition, he pointed to the development or expansion of airports, lakes, and parks as examples of other successful projects in which he was involved as a Congressman.

He challenged incumbent Congressman, Bill Sarpalus, and Republican hopeful, Beau Boulter, to produce their record of job creation.

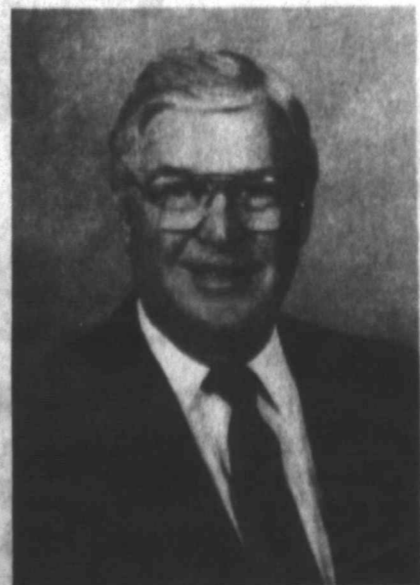
"What industries have Bill Sarpalus and Beau Boulter created during their terms in Congress?" asked Price.

"When we examine their history, it is a history of economic loss for the region.

"Almost every community has lost businesses or industries," Price said.

The former Congressman said he will take aggressive steps to assist in revitalizing agriculture and the oil

ABOUT THE SAME time as some of the weather guessers on TV were saying we would have a nice warm weekend, we had a mini-blizzard. I could have done that next day's (Sunday) weather report for those people on the Lubbock TV stations, if they had just asked me. Of course, I don't know what they are talking about with their meteorological terminology half the time, but I suspect they don't know what all that stuff means either.

"I would just have said this: An upper level jet stream high-low system is tracking (nothing ever moves, it just 'tracks' in weatherperson terminology) into the Plains area from the southwest quadrant of Tombstone, Arizona. You can see where the clouds go round and round in little circles and track across the lower-upper trough which feeds into the vernal equinox.

"What this means is that the system has dumped millions of tons of snow onto regions south of Lubbock, most of it on a driveway in the 2100-block of N. 8th St. in Tahoka." (Mine).

I shoveled snow for about half a day (actually about 30 minutes) before deciding that what the heck, it probably will melt off around April 1. Besides, I had just read in the paper that there are twice as many people dying of heart attacks in winter as in summer, and I figure snow-shoveling may contribute to that.

Mrs. Rambo Earns CHE Credential

The Council for Certification at the American Home Economics Association has announced that Patricia Rambo of Tahoka I.S.D. has earned the Certified Home Economist (CHE) credential. As one of 8,500 CHEs across the United States, Mrs. Rambo demonstrates continuing commitment to maintaining a current level of knowledge in the field of home economics.

CHEs work in diverse roles internationally. A CHE might be found in San Francisco conducting research, in New York managing a hotel staff, in Dallas advising viewers how to invest, in Atlanta using a state-of-the-art computer to design a bank lobby, in Paris buying anew fall line for retail, or in Omaha teaching family living courses. The common link of all these people is the multi-dimensional profession of home economics and a commitment to continuing education.

By becoming a CHE, a practitioner validates attainment of a measurable level of knowledge in home economics and a commitment to expanding that knowledge-base. Certification requires a minimum of a bachelor's degree from a regionally-accredited college or university and a passing score on the national home economics examination. Mrs. Rambo completes 75 Professional Development Units (PDU) every three years to remain certified.

The American Home Economics Association, which serves as an advocate for home economists and represents the field to external constituencies, was founded in 1909.

and gas business and to create job producing industry for the 13th District.

Returning profit incentives to those willing to invest in business and freeing business from restrictive regulation were among steps Price recommended for stimulating job creation.

"If we continue the Boulter/Sarpalius brand of leadership, then the unemployment office may be the only growth industry in town," Price charged.

Price pointed to his lifetime of farming and ranching experience, his involvement in the oil and gas business, and his military record as a combat fighter pilot as credentials for public service.

Price was born in 1927 in Reading, Kan., and graduated from Oklahoma State University in 1951 with a B.S. degree. He married Martha Ann White in 1951 and they have three children. A Baptist, he has been involved in Farm and Ranch Business Management since 1955 and in oil and gas production. Price was a 1st Lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force, serving from 1951 to 1955. During that time his assignments included Test Pilot and Gunnery Instructor at Luke AFB in 1954, and he tested and flew jet fighter aircraft. He flew 27 combat missions during the Korean War. He was honorably discharged from USAF in 1955 with over 6,000 hours of single seat jet fighter flying time and received various citations for distinguished service.

Price was the first Republican elected to U.S. Congress from the Texas Panhandle (13th District) and served in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1967-1974. He served eight years on House Agriculture Committee, six years on the House Armed Services Committee, six years on the House Committee for Science and Astronautics during the development of the Apollo space program. Price was also the first Republican elected to the Texas State Senate from the Texas Panhandle (31st District) and served from 1979-1981. During that time he served on the Senate Finance, Human Resources, Natural Resources, and Economic Development committees.

Billie Katherine Davis of Tahoka has been awarded the Jean McLaughlin Kahle Scholarship from the College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University. She is a junior clothing and textiles major, and is the daughter of Billy and Ann Davis of Tahoka.

Elementary Students Recognized With Physical Fitness Awards

Several Tahoka Elementary students recently received certificates from the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports for their accomplishments in physical fitness testing. Four students were awarded the prestigious President's Award, and 30 students received National Award patches for their achievements.

Two fourth grade students, Brad Pebsworth and Brady Raindl, fifth grader Jeremy Vega, and sixth grader Porfirio Vargas attained the President's Physical Fitness Award and received certificates signed by President George Bush, and blue patches.

The certificates read, in part, "In recognition of outstanding physical achievement and exceptional dedication to the ideal of a sound mind in a strong body," and were signed by the President.

All students in grades 2-6 were eligible to participate in the program. To achieve the President's Award, students were tested on five items including curl-ups, shuttle run, one mile run/walk, sit and reach, and pull-ups. Winners must attain 85% or above on all five items tested.

Tahoka Elementary Physical Education instructor Lynn Lankford commended the four boys who achieved

the top award. "They had to work hard to get this award," she said. "It was not just given to them."

Thirty elementary students were National winners, reaching 50% or above on five events including curl-ups, shuttle run, one mile run/walk, sit and reach, and flexed-arm hang. They received red patches from the President's Council on Physical Fitness.

National winners included, in the second grade, Cory Gardner and Blandon Hancock. Third grade winners were Stephen Brown, Ryan Curry, Phillip DeLeon, Jason Jaquess, Michael Qualls, Rebecca Resendez, Matt Sanders and Kellie Whitley.

Students are tested each year in physical education in the fall with the President's Physical Fitness Test and in the spring with the Chrysler Fitness Test.

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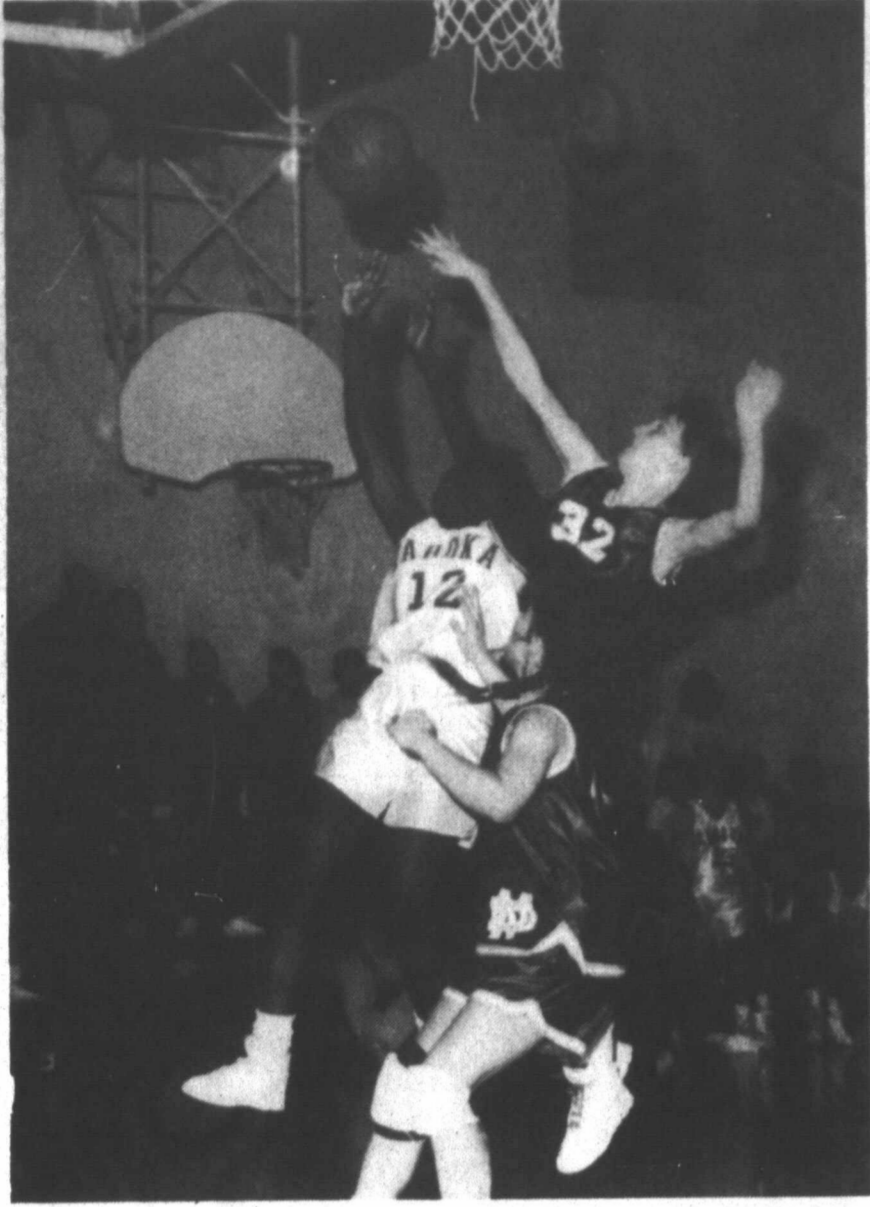

The seventh and eighth grade girls will play Post here on Monday, Jan. 27.

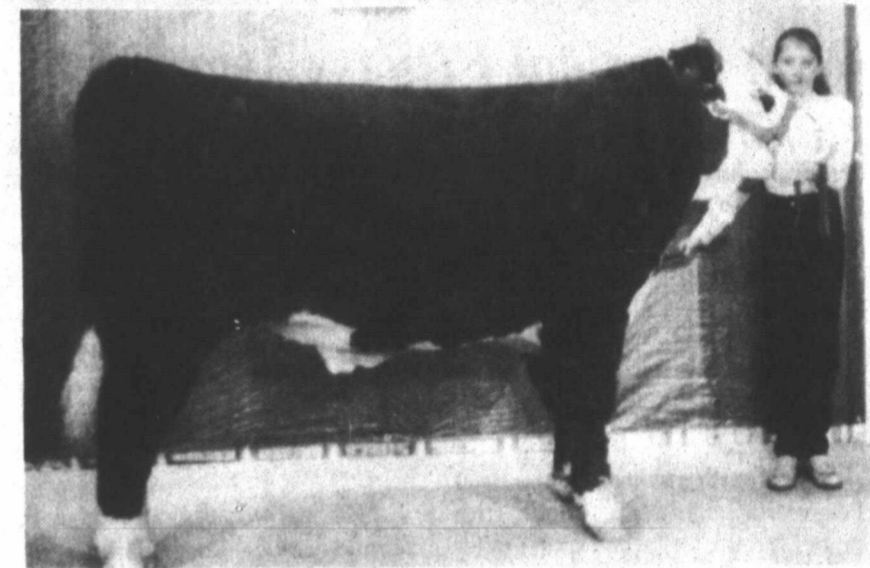
Farm Loan Applications Now Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought between January 1, 1991, and July 19, 1991, are being accepted at the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA) office in Tahoka, FmHA County Supervisor, Curtis Barlow said.

Lynn County is one of 43 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual pro-

duction losses resulting from the drought.

Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Barlow said. Farmers participating in the ASCS Disaster program or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 31, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Barlow said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for

a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Tahoka is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applied depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

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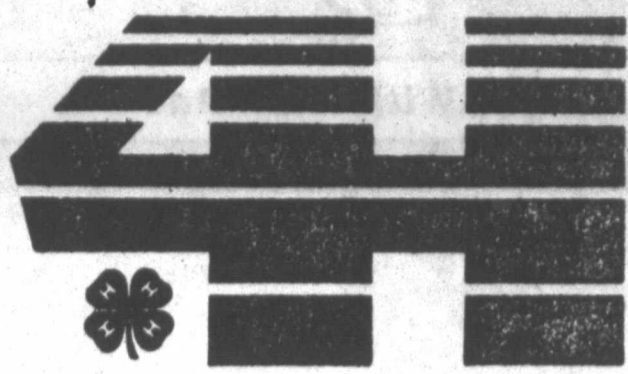
