City Okays Purchase Of New Police Car

Tahoka City Council approved the purchase of a new police car and discussed seal coating of city street during their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The group accepted a bid from McCord Motor Co. for a 1992 Lumina police vehicle package, with a trade-in of a pickup which was a forfeiture to the City after involvement in criminal activity. City Manager Barry Pittman said the new vehicle will be available to the City in about two months.

Roger Gras, a representative of Oller Engineering, presented a proposal for seal coating of City streets. Council members voted to have Pittman and council member Carl Reynolds put together bid specifications for a \$55,000-\$60,000 seal coating project and to make a study of City streets to determine which streets should have priority in the project. Pittman said the group expects to open and award bids by mid-March.

Mayor Jim Solomon opened discussion on City garbage collection options. City officials are facing the closing of the city dump grounds in the near future and are considering

several options for city garbage collection and disposal. Denny Graham of BFI, a national firm, gave a proposal to the group, but city officials plan to hear several other proposals and took no action on the project.

In other action, council members voted unanimously to pass Ordinance 2-92A to establish a four-way stop sign at the corner of Ave. P and North 2nd Street.

The group reviewed a list of four dilapidated buildings in town and will hear property owners' intentions of those buildings at the next regular session of the council.

Another item concerning the purchase of a pickup for the City was tabled until the next meeting.

Police Chief Jerry Webster gave a report of the police department's activities for the previous month.

Present at the meeting was Mayor Solomon, councilmen Dayton Parker, Wayne Tekell, Carl Reynolds and Mike Mensch; City Manager Barry Pittman; Police Chief Jerry Webster; Denny Graham of BFI; Roger Gras of Oller Engineering; and Dick Jensen, who addressed the council during the meeting.

Burglaries In City Are Cleared

Two burglaries in the city of Tahoka were cleared during the last week, according to Police Chief Jerry Webster, who said one of the burglaries was cleared by a Crime Line phone call.

A large quantity of articles were taken from a house on S. 1st St. which is owned by Rudy Tejada, and which had been used to store miscellaneous items. Most of the articles were recovered after police officers talked with three suspects, Tahoka men age 16, 20 and 20. Charges against the three were pending, officers said.

Among the items taken from the house were cameras, toys, clothing, ammunition, a TV set and boom box.

A Midland woman left her 1976 Chevrolet on the shoulder of U.S. 87 near S. 2nd St. Saturday after the car had mechanical problems. Later, a Tahoka police officer checking out the vehicle noticed a window glass had been broken and after questioning two boys in the vicinity, recovered some items which had been stolen out of the car. Officers said the actual burglary of the car was by one young man alone, who just a couple of weeks earlier had been charged in another vehicle burglary.

In jail during the week were 11 new defendants, on the following charges:

Application to revoke probation on reckless conduct charges; judgment and sentencing for driving while intoxicated first offense; bond forfeiture; DWI; parole violation; burglary of a vehicle; felony DWI; public intoxication; public intoxication plus failure to identify to a peace officer plus DPS outstanding warrant for no drivers license, no inspection sticker and failure to appear; public intoxication plus no liability insurance plus illegal parking plus wrong registration on a vehicle; and application to revoke probation on DWI charges.

THS DECA Students Win District, Set Sights On State Conference

Out of the Woods

The wayward thoughts of Juanell (Wood) Jones

I saw about a dozen alien spacecrafts this week in town. They were all on top of the high school gym building one night, glowing like crazy.

Actually, what was glowing were the domed skylights in the roof, but from a distance they looked just like little spaceships hovering over the roof, possibly with all the aliens craning their long slimy necks for a glimpse of some hot basketball action. Aliens never get to play basketball - they're too busy shooting their laser beams around the world and beaming up ships in the Bermuda Triangle.

I would really have preferred to see a spaceship, just for grins, except I have a real aversion to slimy tentacles with eyeballs at the ends of them. Also I don't like the color pea green, as anybody knows is the color of any self-respecting alien.

The point is, sometimes we see what isn't really there, and sometimes we don't see what is really there. Let me explain.

My father at one time taught a journalism class at Wayland Baptist University, and had a sure-fire method of testing their powers of observation. He would greet his class, standing in front, and then move behind his desk and sit down, and say, "Okay, I want everybody to get a piece of paper and write down which one of my legs is shorter."

He has one leg that is quite noticeably shorter than the other, and he would get a kick out of seeing how many students answered correctly. He asked me that one day, and I said, "That's easy, it's your left ... I mean your right ... no, left ...". How do I know, I only lived with him for 18 years. It's his left leg, I think.

It's the same theory when you ask 20 witnesses to describe the same scene - they were all there at the same time, but to hear them tell it you'd think they were seeing 20 different scenes. The way you perceive certain scenes has a great deal to do with your reaction to them. Let me explain.

When I returned 30 minutes later with six sacks of groceries, they were hopping up and down, ready to go, so I just deposited the sacks on the counter, grabbed my billfold from my purse, and the three of us took off for the video store.

When we returned 15 minutes later, it was to a very worried sister (mine) and mother (mine), who had happened to come by the house while we were gone. They had gone in, and seen what was to them evidence of a panicky exit, with sacks of groceries still left out on the counter, my purse gaping open, the television set on, and no one there.

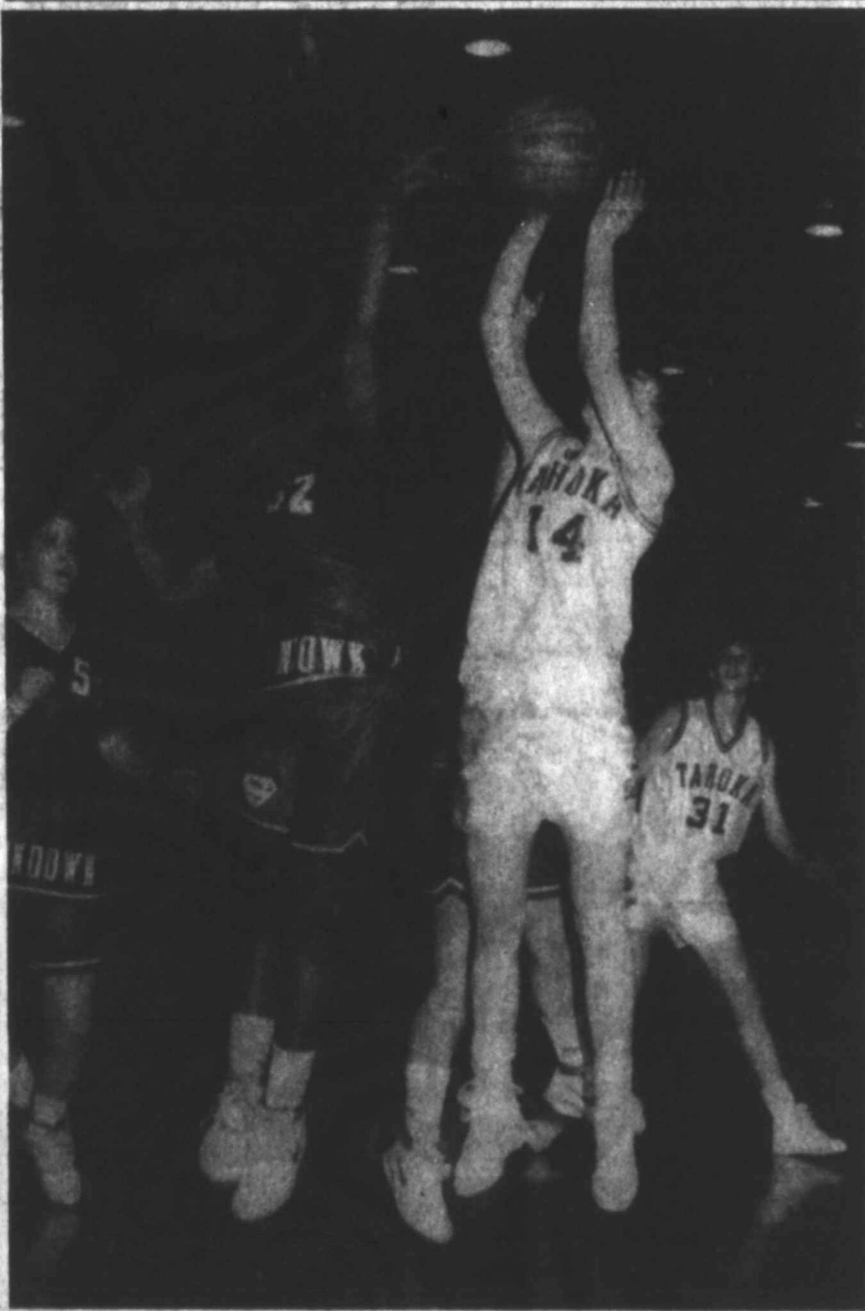
When we pulled up into the driveway, I saw two worried faces pop up in the window, and they gave me a drilling when I got in the house. "What was the big emergency, did you have to take one of the kids to the hospital?" they wanted to know. "Did somebody get hurt?" said the anxious grandmother, eyeing me critically, as if I wasn't taking good care of her grandchildren.

"Well, no," I said. "We just went to the video store."

That sent them into orbit. "You mean you left groceries out, and didn't even put up your meat, just to go to the video store?" they said, quite forcefully. "We thought all kinds of things might have happened. We were just about to call the emergency room to see if you were there," they said disgustingly.

Meekly, I said the kids were in a hurry to get their videos. They stomped around the kitchen for a while, muttering something about irresponsible mothers, until I told them they could leave now if they wanted to. I mean, if they were so worried about an emergency, wouldn't they at least have had the decency to put up my groceries for me while I was gone? Huh? That's what I thought.

They thought "disaster" when they saw my kitchen. Come to think of it, that's usually what I see when I go in there, too.

Michael and Bruce Bursleson led scoring for the Dogs Tuesday night, with 15 and 12 points respectively. Daniel Garvin also scored in double figures, tossing in 10 points for the team.

The undefeated Seagraves Eagles bested the varsity boys last Friday night, 80-91. Three players scored in double figures, with Brandon Cate leading the pack with 24 points and the Bursleson brothers close behind, Mike with 18, and Bruce with 10.

"We are right where we want to

be," said THS Principal Charles Cate. "We control our own future. All we have to do is win the remaining games and we will end up in second place in district and go into the playoffs," he said.

"The team knows that they can do it, now all they have to do is go out and show the rest of the district that we can," he added.

South Plains Community Action Association JTPA Staff can help those who, for various reasons, need to find a job. JTPA Title III is a non-fee service, which means there is no fee for helping persons find a job.

Locally, the telephone number for more information on this free service is 998-5094, for help in finding a job in Lynn County. The head office, located in Levelland, may be contacted at (806) 894-6104.

The circumstances of each individual may vary. Some may have been laid off because of the closure of a plant, or partial plant layoffs. Others have exhausted their unemployment compensation and others have been unemployed for an extended period of time and are experiencing difficulties in finding employment or re-employment.

The JTPA service also helps people who were self-employed, including farmers and ranchers, who find themselves unemployed because of generally unfavorable economic conditions or even natural disasters in their community. Family members of a self-employed person who is in the process of going out of business are eligible for the services of JTPA Title III.

The JTPA Title III program can offer the participant several training options: On the job training, vocational training, customized skill training, and certain academic training.

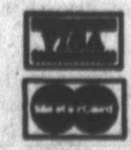
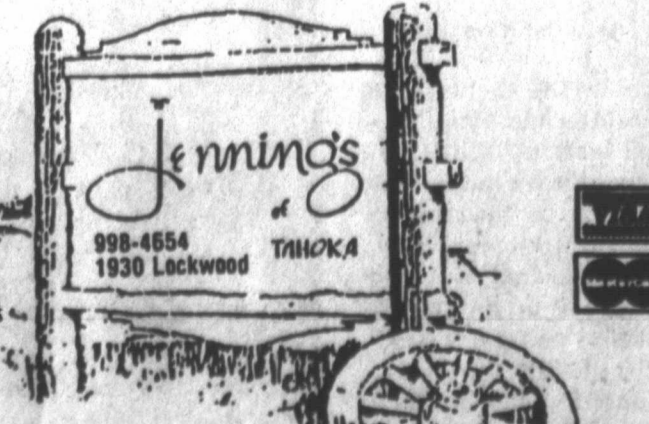

Beacher Brandon

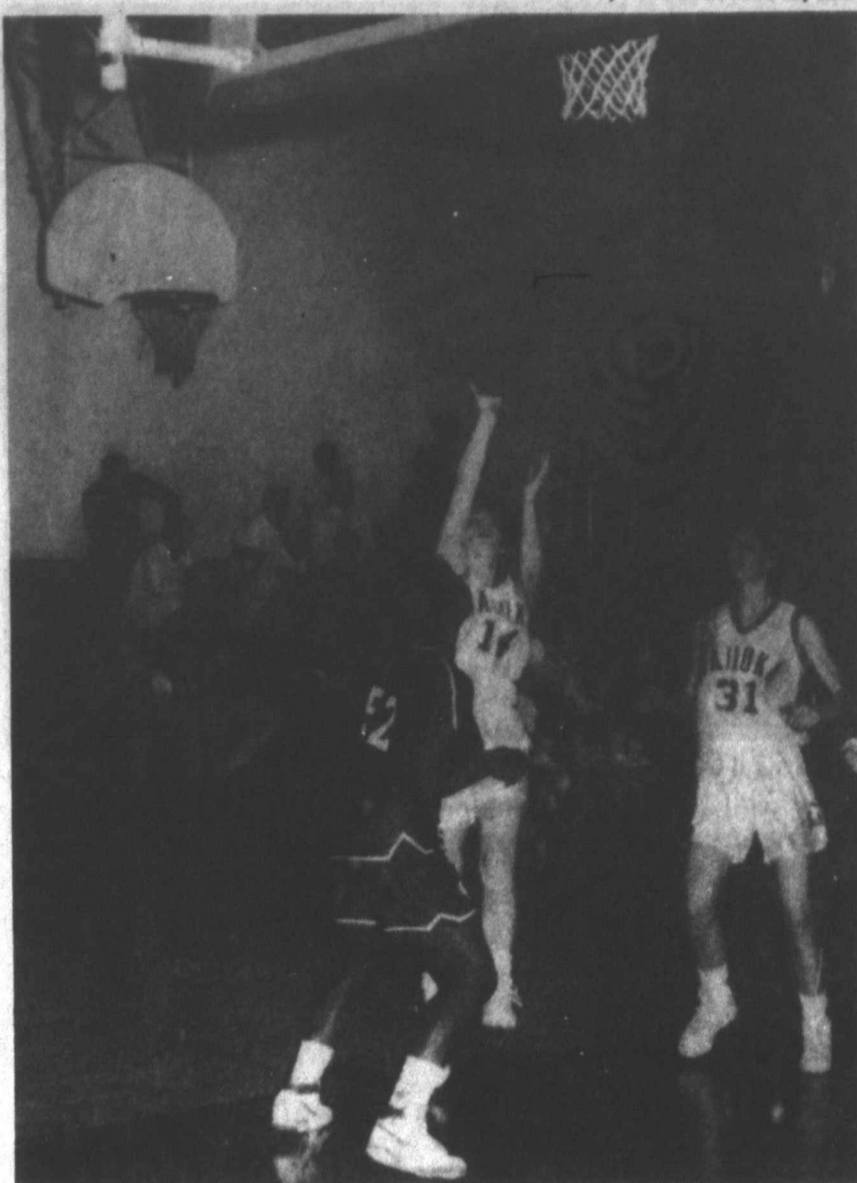

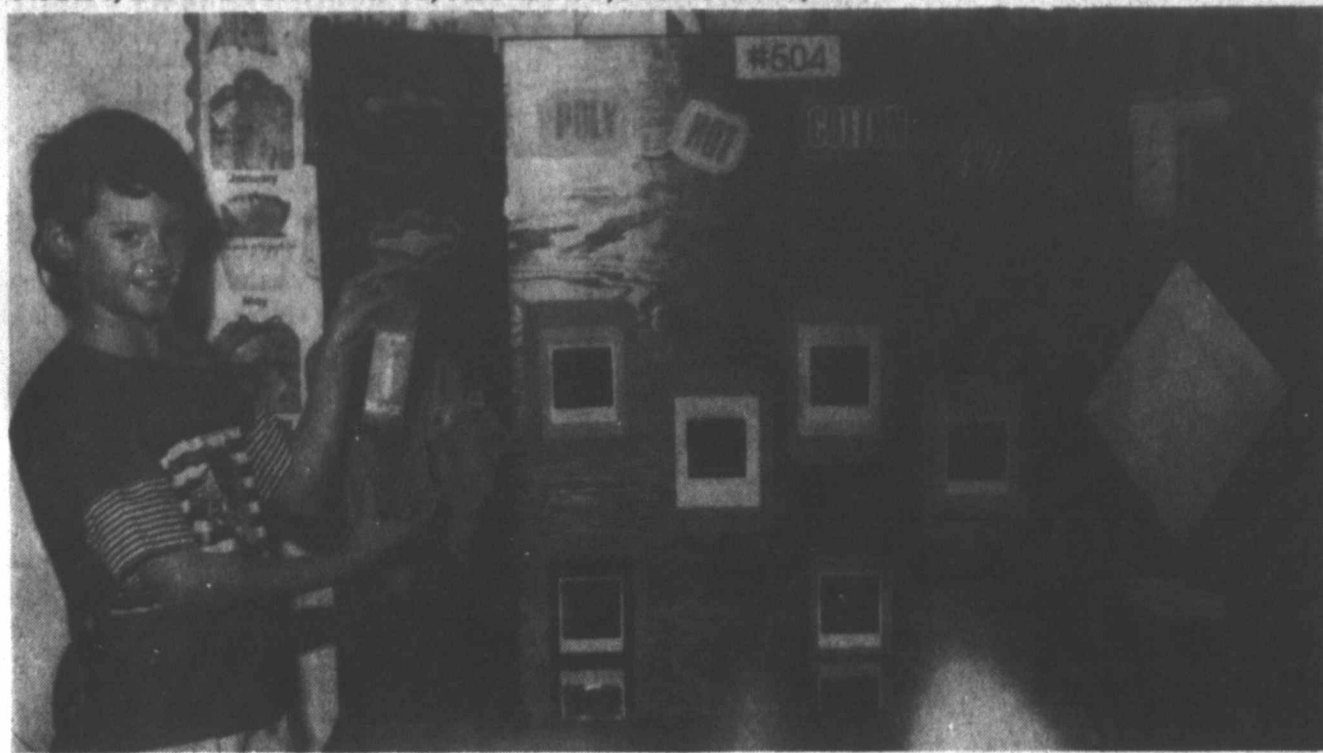

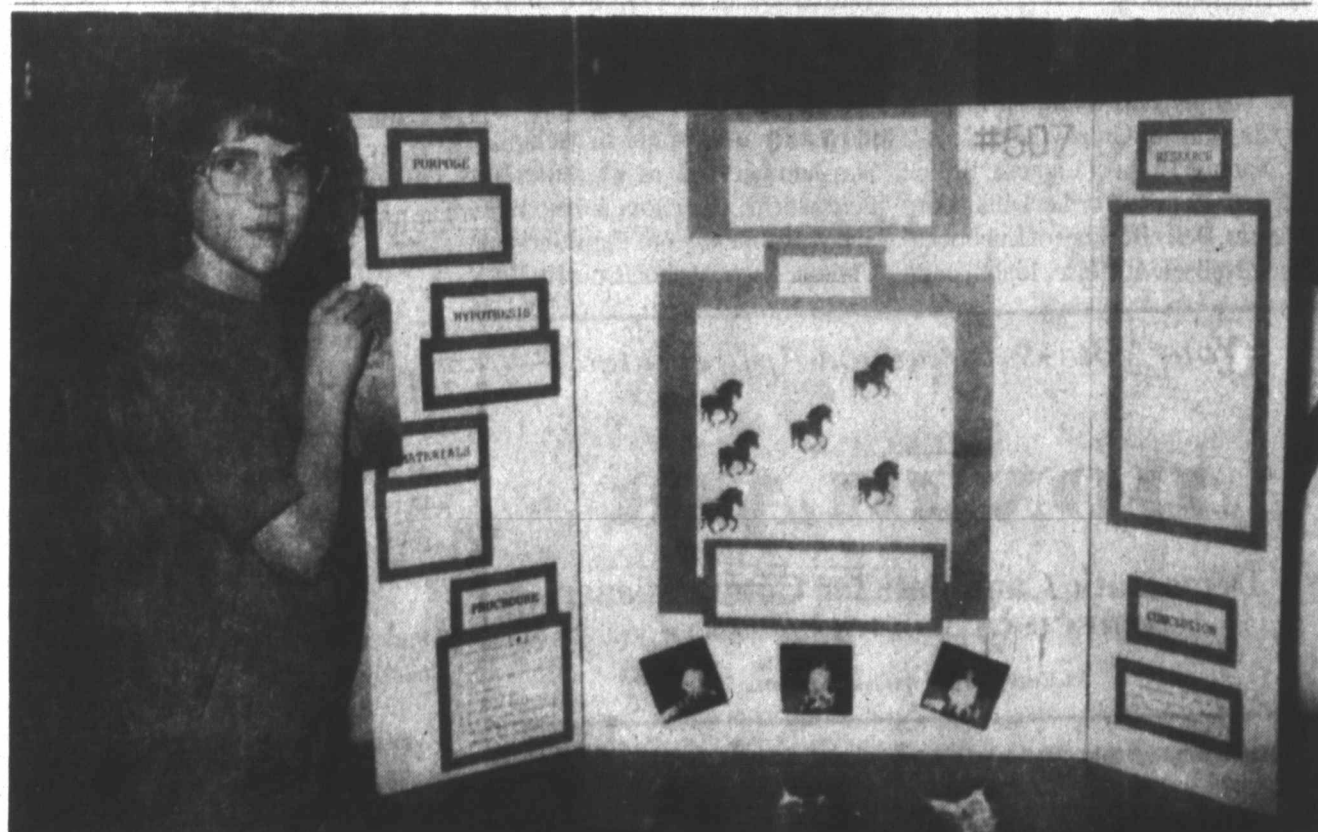

Local Farmers To Benefit From New, Lower Rates

Interest rates will go down Feb. 1 for nearly 30,000 farmers, ranchers and rural homeowners in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas who do business with local Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs).

The variable interest rate for agricultural, rural housing and farm related business loans will fall to 8.95%, down from the current 9.50% rate. Michael R. Davis, president of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas, estimated the reduction could save borrowers in the four states more than \$10 million in one year. The new rate applies to both existing and new variable rate loans.

Interest rates for new fixed-rate loans of 3,5,10, and 15 years will drop also Feb. 1. Since these rates are priced weekly, Davis recommended borrowers contact their local FLBA offices for the rates in effect after Feb. 1.

"These rate reductions translate into improved cash flow for FLBA borrowers and, in turn, a better bottom line for their agricultural opera-

It increases body temperature, quickly floods the bloodstream with the nutrient, and seems to boost the immune system's resistance to infections, so indicates a study at Arizona State U. "Turning up the heat" is one way a body fights invading disease germs. The heat rise triggered by the large dose of vitamin C seems to protect some persons from the common cold, say researchers. However, 1000 mg vitamin C is too high as a regular daily dosage.

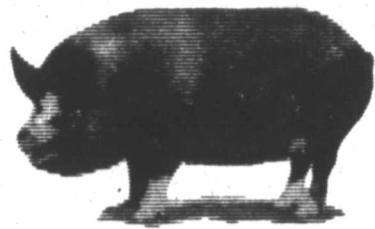

FACTS ABOUT YOUR MAIL

BOX NUMBERS

Dear Postal Customer:
This post office is getting more and more mail every day (coming in from out of town) without box numbers. It has street addresses on it.

Please, please, when you go out of Tahoka to another town, Lubbock for example, and you fill out applications or forms, use your box number, not your street address. Tell those people that we do not have city delivery; and do not give them your street address. *Always give them your mailing address (box numbers).*

Well, I keep hearing people say, "You know where it goes, I have lived here 40 or 50 years. And the Postmaster has been here 30 years." But people, these postal employees won't be here forever, and your mail needs to have the correct box number on it, so that in the future new postal employees will know where it goes.

All of the businesses here in Tahoka are doing a super, super job on addressing their mail. Hats off to them!

The reason for the importance of having box numbers on all your mail is that the Postal Service is going to automation. All mail is worked by machine. One of the machines will sort 60,000 letters per hour; another

machine works 40,000 pieces per hour. A person can only work 700-800 pieces of mail per hour. This is why we need box numbers on all mail coming in from out of town. It all will have been worked by machine when it comes into Tahoka. We can't stop progress - all this helps move the mail faster nation-wide.

Customers on our two rural routes also need to use their route number and box number. If the rural customers do not know their box numbers, they should ask their carrier.

To the customer who gets mail that has a street address on it, we will use a rubber stamp on your mail in red that says "Advise your correspondents or publishers of your correct address. Please use box number." The post office has plenty of address correction cards, that we will have available to you so that you can correct these addresses. TEXAS WATER COMMISSION NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON APPLICATION FOR WEATHER MODIFICATION PERMIT

Notice is given that COLORADO RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT
P.O. Box 869
Big Spring, TX 79721-0869

has filed an application, pursuant to Chapter 18, Texas Water Code, and Texas Water Commission (TWC) Rule §289 for a State Permit to conduct weather modification (cloud-seeding) activities within the watersheds of its three reservoirs in west central Texas. The permit is being requested for the purpose of increasing rainfall during the period of March 1 - November 30, during the years 1992, 1993, 1994, and 1995. (The project will not involve hail suppression at any time.)

The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Runnels, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.

The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scully Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, east to the Nolan-Taylor County border; thence, south along the eastern Nolan County line to the Runnels County border; thence, east along the northern Runnels County line; thence, south along the eastern Runnels County line; thence, west along the southern Runnels County line; thence, north along the western Runnels County line to a point where the southern Coke County line meets Runnels County; thence, west along the southern Coke County line to a point 13 miles south of Robert Lee in Coke County; thence, north to Robert Lee; thence, west to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

The application by the Colorado River Municipal Water District (CRMWD) was filed on November 15, 1991. The CRMWD has a valid Texas weather modification license which was issued on December 18, 1974 and has been renewed each year since 1976.

TWC Rule §289 states that the Commission shall hold a public hearing on the application prior to the issuance of the permit if 25 eligible persons submit written request for public hearing within 30 days after the first publication of the Notice. A public hearing has been requested by at least 25 eligible persons and Notice of Intent to Conduct Weather Modification Activities has been published as required. A Hearings Examiner of the Texas Water Commission will conduct a public hearing at:

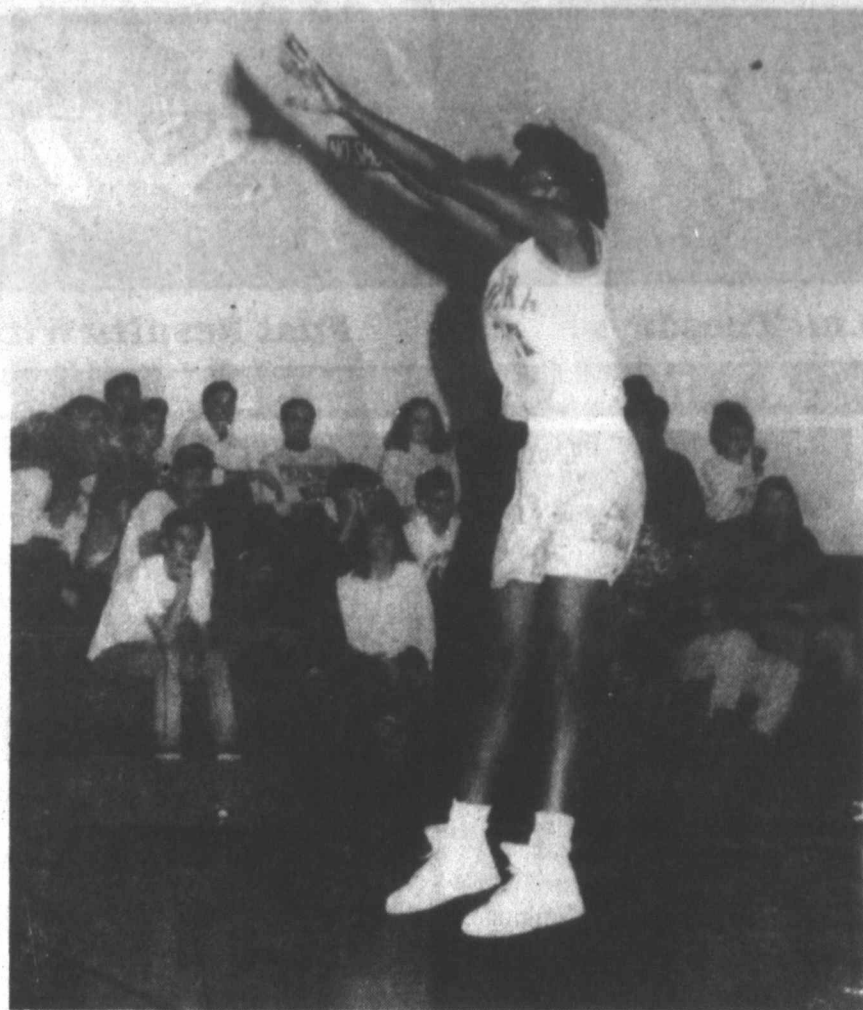
