Vehicles Collide, Four Indicted By Grand Jury

Four persons were indicted by a 106th District Grand Jury meeting in Tahoka Monday, including one man on a charge of attempted capital murder.

George Casillas Cazares, 28, of Ralls was named in the attempted murder charge, accused of trying to run down a Dept. of Public Safety officer, Gilbert Arredondo, on Feb. 27. Cazares' bond was set at \$50,000.

Others indicted were: burglary, Rogelio T. Bella, 57, of Lubbock, with bond set at \$25,000. Driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense, Troy Dwayne Kirk, 26, of Lubbock, and Joseph Saldaña, 25, of Tahoka. Bond for each was set at \$5,000.

A 1980 Chevrolet Suburban driven by Lonnie Edward Isbell, 17, of Rt. 1, O'Donnell and a 1985 Chevrolet driven by Margie Jester of Tahoka collided at Ave. S and N. 1st St. Saturday morning. Mrs. Jester was taken to Lynn County Hospital emergency room for treatment of apparently minor injuries.

Tahoka Police Dept. also investigated a report that a wrist watch had been stolen from Jesus Lopez, 1621 Ave. M, on Sunday, and a report that a door glass in a trailer home owned by Gladys Kennedy had been broken Tuesday night.

Fourteen persons were booked into Lynn County jail during the week, on the following charges: False imprisonment (from Lubbock County), applications to revoke probation on charges of terroristic threats and driving while intoxicated first offense, DWI first, second and third charges, theft by check, contempt of court in child support, speeding and failure to appear, driving while license suspended plus theft over \$20 and under \$200, public



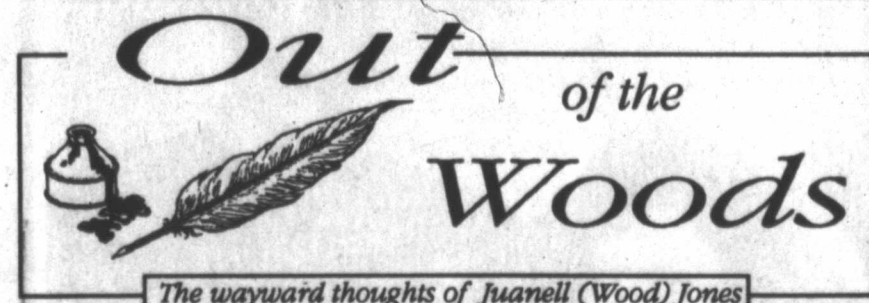

The wayward thoughts of Juanell (Wood) Jones

We finally made it to Spring Break last week, that long-awaited vacation when families can take exciting, expensive fun-filled trips to far-away places, unless your family is like most others I know, and about the most expensive trip you can afford is to grandma's house or any other destination within a 100-mile radius.

We did manage to get away from the house, finally, after a much-delayed start. We had planned to leave on Saturday morning, the day after the kids got out of school. Six File For Places On Hospital Board

As of press time this week, six candidates have filed for places on the Lynn County Hospital Board of Directors. Deadline for filing is April 7.

Three places on the board of directors, all two year terms, are expiring on the board this year. Two incumbents, Billy Tomlinson and Harold Barrett, have filed for re-election, and the term of Dale Zant is also expiring.

Filing this week for the board was Bettye Green, who joins candidates Peggy Morton, William (Bill) Sawyer, and Walter (Wally) Castillon in the race.

Candidates wishing to have their names placed on the ballot must present a petition with 25 signatures when filing.

Tornado Siren Test Set Friday

A tornado warning siren test will be conducted this Friday at 12 noon in the City of Tahoka. City Manager Barry Pitman said the siren will be tested only if the weather is clear, so as not to confuse residents.

The tornado warning siren is a wavering up-and-down sound.

Six More Candidates File For May 2 Elections In County

Six more candidates filed for places in the city and school elections in Lynn County, with a final tally of 27 candidates in the four school district elections in the county, and 20 candidates in the city council elections. Deadline for filing was 5 p.m. last Wednesday.

Three more candidates filed in the Wilson ISD, one in the Tahoka ISD, and one each in the New Home ISD and New Home City Council. All school and city elections in the county will be held Saturday, May 2, with absentee voting from April 13-28.

In the Wilson school district, Lester Gickhorn, John Hernandez and incumbent Woody Follis filed Wednesday, joining candidates Rickie Yowell, Tony Arellano, incumbent Roy Isham and Antonio (Tony) Villarreal for the race for three places. All three places are three-year terms.

Tahoka ISD board of trustees race has a full slate of candidates, with 10 vying for the three places on the board. Mike Rivas was the last to file, joining the slate of other candidates including Marguerite Sawyer, Richard White, Dan Lee Stone, Rex Rash,

Gary Stennett, Myrtle White, John Flynn, Ray Morales, Sr., and incumbent Juanell Jones. All three places are three-year terms.

In New Home school district, David Gandy joined a slate of five other candidates for three places, three-year terms. The other candidates are Todd McAlister, Alan Nettles, Mark Clem, Margaret Correa and incumbent Leland Zant.

O'Donnell ISD has four candidates running for three places, three-year terms. They include incumbents Kenneth Dan Vestal and Mickey Hughes, and Travis Miers and Bruce Vaughn.

In the city council elections, only one additional candidate has filed since last week's edition. Dale Clem added his name to the list of candidates for New Home City Council, joining incumbents Stoney Gill and Louis Rodriguez, and all three are running uncontested races for the three places to be filled. J.A. Evans filed for the position of mayor, in an uncontested race.

Tahoka City Council has seven candidates for three places, all two-year terms. They are Dalton Wood, Mauricio Marez, Joe Calvillo, Dustie

Cook, Wayne Huffaker, and incumbents Dayton Parker and Wayne Tekell.

All three incumbents whose terms are expiring in the Wilson City election have filed for re-election. Mayor Jackie Bishop has filed for re-election, and Lynda L. Williams is also running for that position. Incumbents David Cook and Oscar Follis have filed for re-election, and Angela Young is also vying for one of the two places to be filled. All are two year terms.

In O'Donnell, Mayor David Smith is running unopposed for re-election. Council members Bill Clopton and Stella Sanchez are also seeking re-election, along with candidate Lou Deane Mansell for two places on the council, both two-year terms.

Two Candidates Vie For Spot In Special Election

Only two candidates have agreed to run on the ballot on the special election for one place on the Wilson I.S.D. board of trustees. The special election was called this year after a court order following litigation concerning last year's school board election.

Dan Cook and Lowen Young will vie for the place on the board. Only candidates who were listed on the ballot last year were eligible to participate in the special election, and all but Cook and Young declined to run on this year's special election ballot.

The special election, originally scheduled for April 18, will be held on May 2, at the same time the regular school and city elections will be held. A separate ballot, however, will be given to voters for the special election.

Late in February, State District Court Judge Gene L. Dulaney had ruled that the 1991 election was invalid to the extent that it elected Wilson banker Dan Cook to the board.

In an uncontested law suit filed by another candidate in that election, Lowen Young, the judge found that there were enough improperly cast votes in the election to put Young's finish two votes behind Cook in question.

Keith Weid had finished 41 votes ahead of Cook in the election, and the judge said the invalid votes were insufficient to invalidate his finish. He ordered that the rest of the 1991 election be restaged using a ballot that included all the candidates who were in that election except Weid.

Any candidates who wished to withdraw from the new election were given the opportunity to do so by March 27. The other four candidates withdrew, leaving Cook and Young the only two names on the ballot.

Weather Service To Present Program Here

The National Weather Service will have a representative in Tahoka to present a program Tuesday, March 31 at 7 p.m. in the Lyntegar meeting room. All interested persons are invited to attend the free program.

The program is sponsored by the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept., and will include information on severe weather, tornadoes, the most likely cloud formations to spot tornadoes, and more. A film will be shown, also.

The Borden County Cancer Society will be having their annual Barn Dance, Friday, April 3, at 8:30 p.m. in the County Show Barn in Gail. The music will be provided by Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys. Admission is by donation to the Borden County Cancer Society.

County Commissioners Discuss Concrete Work On Landfill

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning at the courthouse to discuss the county landfill and other county business. The group had also met in a called session the previous week to discuss the concrete work needed for the new landfill containers.

The county contracted with local concrete contractor Mitch Raindl, who reported to commissioners that he would begin work at the end of this week on the concrete ramp needed to access the 8-foot tall landfill containers which will be placed there.

Residents in the county will have access to the containers, but city dumpster collections will be transported to the Lubbock landfill. The City of Tahoka will no longer have any employees connected with the landfill, which will be totally under the jurisdiction of Lynn County Commissioners.

The group also discussed the county contract with D&H Tire & Supply, represented by Jacky Henry, who gave information about how D&H operated with the county. The group agreed to continue with the contract.

In other business, commissioners heard a short presentation by John Weddle on Resource Conservation and Development Area, Inc., (RC&D), an organization dedicated to rural development for rural com-

munities. The corporation is to be operated for the benefit of residents of a 16-county area, including Lynn, for the purpose of acting as the coordinating organization to plan and implement measures to accelerate the conservation development and wise use of natural and related resources.

He invited the group to attend a meeting on Wednesday morning at the Lyntegar meeting room, when the corporation would present a program on the benefits of sponsorship in the group. The cost to the county would be a \$25 annual fee, and would give them access to representation from the corporation in obtaining grants and other special funding for a variety of projects within the county.

No action was taken on the information, but several commissioners agreed to attend the Wednesday meeting to learn more about the RC&D.

All commissioners and County Judge J.F. Brandon were present at the meeting, as well as the county treasurer, county clerk, and guests Jacky Henry, John Weddle, Mitch Raindl and Juanell Jones.

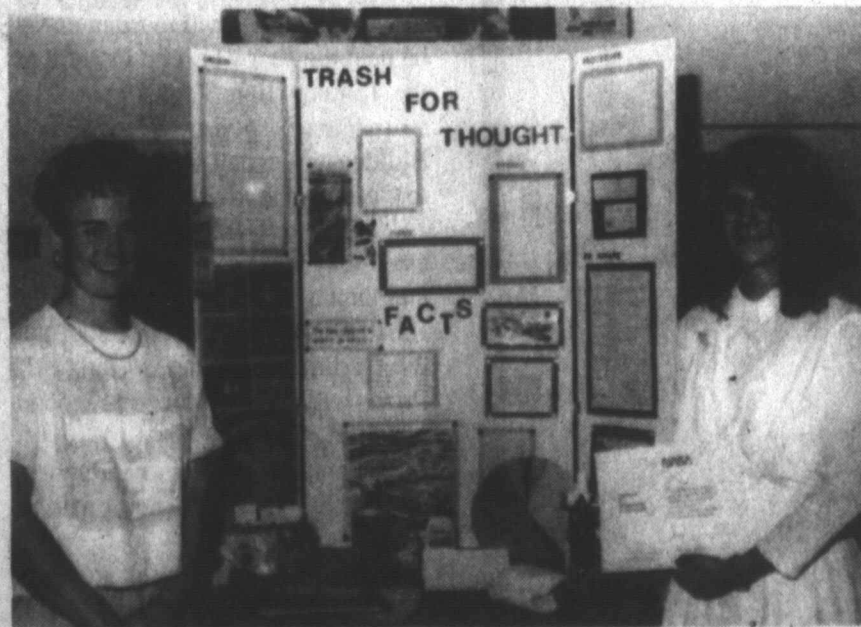
Fun/Food Fest Slated April 25

Kathy Davis Taking 4-H Exchange Trip To Costa Rica

Seeing the Panama Canal is one of the goals that Kathy Davis has during her upcoming trip to Costa Rica. Kathy, the 21-year-old daughter of Billy and Ann Davis of Tahoka, is one of four Texas delegates selected to participate in the International 4-H Youth Exchange (IFYE) Representative program.

As an IFYE Representative, Miss Davis will serve as a goodwill ambassador for Tahoka, Lynn County, Texas Tech University, Texas, and the United States. Basically, this is a cultural program in which Kathy teaches about the American culture, 4-H, agriculture, and reciprocates by bringing back to the States what she has learned about Costa Rica and its residents. The mission of international 4-H programs is to further cross-cultural understanding and to foster international interdependence. In other words, Kathy will learn more about how the entire world functions together and how each country is dependent upon others for one thing or another. Of course, too, this interdependence contributes to world peace.

In June, Kathy will spend two days at the National 4-H Center in Chevy Chase, MD, for a consultation program before departing to her host country of Costa Rica. In Costa Rica, she will live with various host families—learning how they function on the most basic level. The exchange is a six month trip and Kathy will return to the states just in time to share Thanksgiving with her family.

The expense of the trip is partially funded by corporate donors to the Texas 4-H Foundation. The other portion is dependant upon community sponsors, civic groups, businesses, or individuals. For that reason, anyone who has an interest in international programs, 4-H, or oth-

erwise who would like can contribute to a fund for the trip. To make a donation (which may be tax deductible), persons can contact the Lynn County Extension Office or Kathy.

Miss Davis will make history in Lynn County as she becomes the first IFYE representative. That is quite an honor as only an elite group is selected each year. On top of that, this may be the final year for the IFYE program because of lack of financial support on the state level.

Many IFYE representatives from other countries will be living in the United States during the time that Kathy is abroad. Host families are needed and applications are available if anyone would like to participate.

From now until June, Kathy will be busy completing her semester at Texas Tech University, securing a passport, brushing up on her Spanish (She had two years in high school), obtaining proper immunizations, learning as much as she can about Costa Rica, among many various other tasks. Then, she will begin her trip to the hot and tropical host country. Because of proximity, Kathy hopes to include at least a visit to Panama.

Pre-Registration For Kindergarten Set March 31 At Tahoka Elementary

Pre-registration for children who will be kindergarten students for the 1992-93 school year will be held Tuesday, March 31, at 1:30 p.m. in the Tahoka School Cafeteria.

"It is very, very important that parents pre-register their incoming kindergarten student on this date," stated Miss Molly Helmlinger, elementary principal.

"Last year we had 70 students pre-register. When school opened in the fall, we had approximately that number. This was wonderful because it helped us prepare staffing and facilities. We determine the number of teachers for each grade level based on the pre-registration and current enrollments," said the principal.

"Parents or a legal guardian must enroll their child at pre-registration. We must have an accurate figure this year," explained Miss Helmlinger.

A parent or legal guardian must pre-register the child. It is not necessary for the child to attend pre-registration. Registration by a friend or relative is not permissible.

The child's original birth certificate, current immunization shot/health record and social security card

must be present at this time. State law requires that school districts validate proof of all this information.

There will be an important meeting at the time of pre-registration. Parents will receive a "Kindergarten Handbook", supply list, and general information on what will be required of the child in kindergarten.

A child must be at least five years old as of Sept. 1 to be eligible to be enrolled in kindergarten for the 1992-93 school year.

county residents during the banquet. Approximately 110 attended the event.

Top award winners included Carlton Wilke of Wilson, Conservation Farmer of the Year; Patty Hamilton of Wilson, Conservation Teacher of the Year; and Gwen Bessire of O'Donnell, Conservation Homemaker of the Year.

Outstanding Ag students included Jason Belew of Tahoka, Daniel Clark of Wilson, Lanny Zant of New Home and Clint Bray of O'Donnell. Eva Gickhorn of Wilson was named Outstanding 4-H member of Lynn County.

Poster contest winners included Stephen Brookshire, 1st grade, Tahoka; Cory Jolly, 2nd grade, Tahoka; Lorenzo Martinez, 3rd grade, O'Donnell; Kassidi Andrews, 4th grade, Tahoka; William Bell, 5th grade, Wilson; and Abbie Gill, 6th grade, New Home.

Carlton Wilke was lauded for his efforts in protecting natural resources, in being named the Conservation Farmer of the Year. He has been a cooperater with the district since 1973, but says conservation has been a way of life for the Wilke family for several generations.

Although currently Wilke only farms 441.6 acres, at one time he farmed nearly 2000 acres. The remaining acres are now farmed by his sons, Wes and Kendall. Together, Wilke and his sons have installed 189,446 feet of parallel terraces, 1,954 cubic yards of diversions, and three acres of waterways.

Because of her interest in promoting conservation education in the classroom, Patty Hamilton was named Outstanding Conservation Teacher of the Year by the district. Although Mrs. Hamilton lives in Lubbock, she has been with the Wilson Independent School District for 11 years, currently teaching fourth grade.

Representatives from the local Soil and Water Conservation District have visited her classroom on many occasions, to present slides on conservation practices and to provide information to her students. Art classes have been used in the past years to motivate her students in preparing posters for the district's poster contest.

Gwen Bessire of O'Donnell was also praised for her conservation efforts, and was awarded Outstanding Conservation Homemaker. She was born and reared in O'Donnell, and is married to Weldon, and they operate approximately 1260 acres of cropland and 72 acres of wildlife land.

Mrs. Bessire works the land with her husband, operating much of the equipment and hauling cotton seed at planting time. She can run a sand fighter, and she and her daughters

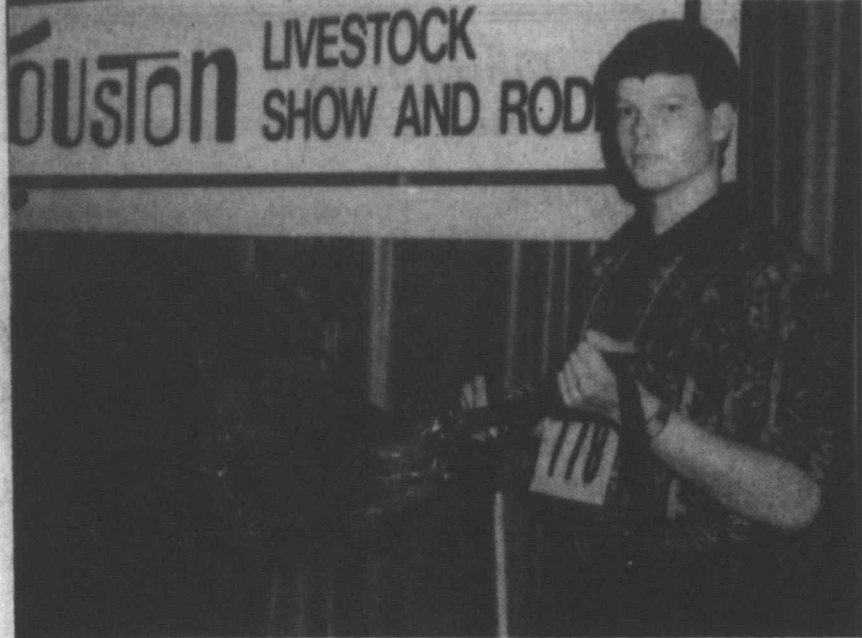
