Lottery Ticket Sales Start Friday In Tahoka, O'Donnell

The Texas Lottery begins Friday, and four convenience stores in Lynn County will begin selling tickets on scratch-off/instant-win tickets. Online games will start later this year. Fina and Allsup's stores in Tahoka and O'Donnell will be selling lottery tickets for \$1. Those purchasing the tickets scratch off the latex covering the entire play area. If three dollar amounts match, then the ticket holder wins that amount of money. For example, if three \$5 symbols are uncov-

ered, then the ticket holder wins \$5. Tickets are to be sold only to persons 18 or older.

For each dollar spent on a lottery ticket, 45 cents goes to prizes, 40 cents to the state's general revenue fund, 10 cents to lottery administrative expenses and a nickel to the retailer.

Instant prizes range from \$2 to \$10,000 or the chance to enter the weekly million-dollar drawing.

County Commissioners Discuss Insurance; Employ Overseer For Collection Station

Lynn County Commissioners met last Friday in regular session to discuss liability insurance, paint for the senior citizens buildings in Tahoka and O'Donnell, and employment of an overseer at the County Sanitation Collection Station (formerly the landfill).

The group voted to hire Domingo Saldana to work three days a week at the Sanitation Station during the hours of operation. Commissioners had previously set hours of operation for the station to be open from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Commissioners opened two bids for general liability and heavy equipment, and accepted a bid from Walker-Solomon Insurance Agency for \$5,101. Bills for the county were presented and approved.

In other action, commissioners approved paying the cost of painting the two senior citizens buildings in Tahoka and O'Donnell. The local VFW Post 4336 volunteered to paint the buildings. Commissioners agreed to pay for the paint out of the county road and bridges fund.

Cost sharing for the landfill for the previous year was discussed, with

the county's operational expense from April 1, 1992 to March 31, 1992 set at \$14,304.63, which is 28% of the total \$51,087.99. The group voted for the county to pay that amount. Cost-sharing with the City of O'Donnell was 22% for \$11,239.36; City of Wilson was 6% for \$3,065.28; and City of Tahoka was 44% for \$22,478.72.

Some discussion was held on relocating Voting Box Precinct 6 to another location, but no action was taken.

All commissioners were present at the meeting, along with County Judge J.F. Brandon and other county officials, and visitors Jim Solomon and Domingo Saldana.

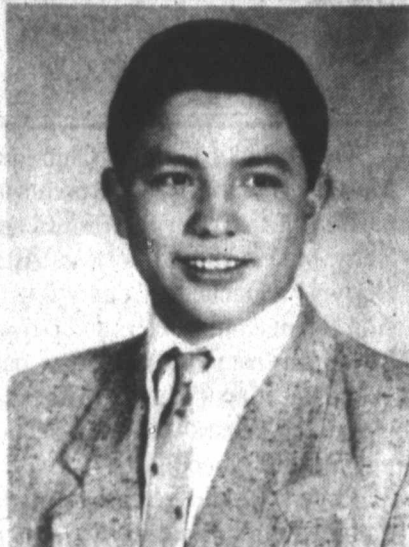

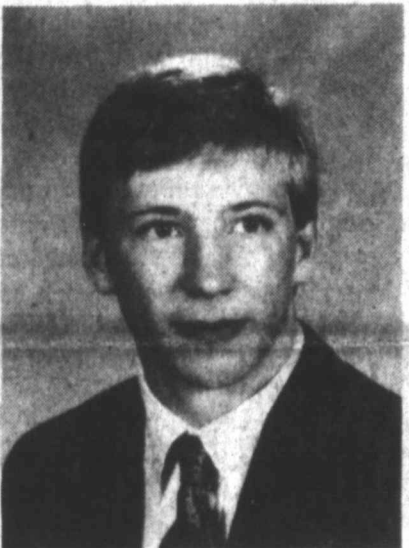

Area residents who missed their opportunity to view Jupiter through Bill Craig's telescope will have several more opportunities to do so, according to Craig. Cloudy, rainy weather obscured the view last Saturday night, when Craig had his telescope out, although he said several people came by just to look at the telescope.

"Jupiter and its four moons will be visible for several more weeks," said Craig, "and I'll have the telescope out every Saturday evening at dark (about 9 p.m.) for anyone who wants to come take a look." The scope will be set up at 1824 South 8th in Tahoka, every Saturday night through June.

Craig made the telescope himself in his spare time, saying it took about a year to complete the project.

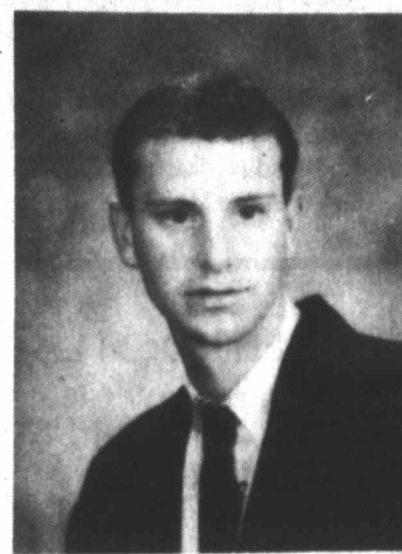
versity next fall and major in biochemistry.

Two Saturday Wrecks Related To Heavy Rains In County

Two one-vehicle rollovers in the county Saturday were related to heavy rains which left water on many highways after more than two inches of rain Friday evening and night, and more rain which totaled 4.59 inches in Tahoka for the week.

About 8:45 a.m. Saturday a 1985 Chevrolet pickup driven by Richard Hunter, 52, of Odessa overturned 12.6 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87. A passenger, Susan Tilson Orwig, 43, also of Odessa, was thrown from the pickup and was treated at Lynn County Hospital and released several hours later.

About 15 minutes later, a 1984 Chevrolet van driven by Jeanette Huie Morris, 48, of Slaton, overturned into a cotton field 9.4 miles northeast of Wilson on FM 212. She was the only occupant of the van, and

was treated and released at University Medical Center in Lubbock.

Mike Lankford of Tahoka reported to the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. that tools valued at a total of \$724 had been stolen from a tool box in a Chevrolet pickup owned by him Saturday or Sunday.

In jail during the week were one person each for no seat belt plus failure to appear, grand jury indictment for theft over \$750 but under \$20,000, and criminal mischief.

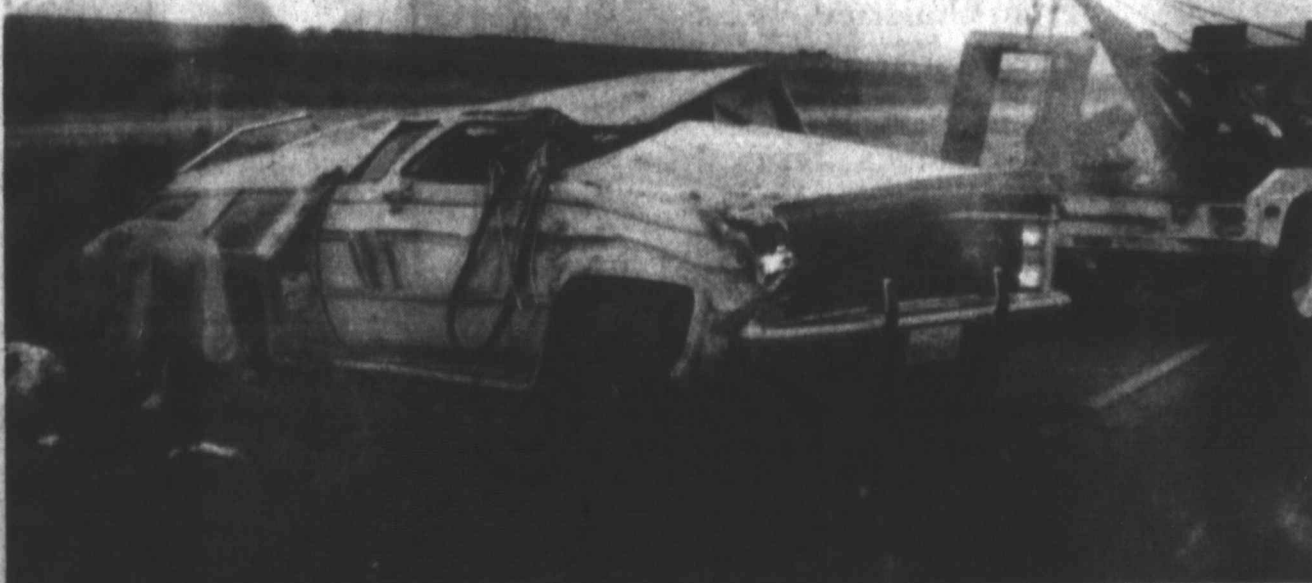

Y.E.S. Program Involves Lynn County Citizens

The President last week recognized Youth Exchanging with Seniors (Y.E.S.) of the South Plains area as the 775th Daily Point of Light for the Nation. The Y.E.S. program, in which many Lynn County adults and youth are involved, is designed to enhance the independence of rural senior citizens while closing the generation gap between the elderly and the young. The Y.E.S. Project is a collaborative effort between the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (Texas A&M University System), Texas Tech University College of Home Economics, and the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center.

The Y.E.S. program is an intergenerational project piloted for a 20-county area of rural Texas. Since its inception in 1990, nearly 450 4-H Club members and members of Future Homemakers of America have undergone training to be service providers and companions for senior citizens. During a six-hour orientation session, the youth are taught constructive citizenship skills and how to communicate with their elderly friends.

In Lynn County 10 senior citizens in the county have benefited from 120 hours of services from 19 youth service providers (4-H and FHA members). Seven adults have pro-

vided 30 hours of volunteer service to assist in training, recruiting seniors, and assigning jobs.

Youth who were trained in high school home economics classes or in special Y.E.S. trainings are: Eden Williams, Eva Gickhorn, Brandi Gickhorn, Carrie Taylor, Jason Belew, Andrea Sepeda, Myra Williams, Amy Clem, Jason Marshall, Sandy Burleson, Brandy Burleson, Felicia Vega, Troy Hurley, Amy Chandler, Juan Hernandez, Jerry Tew, Crystal Barrientez, Sissy Puentes, and Angel Strickland.

Adults who have assisted include: Nancy Monk, Sheri Gickhorn, Patti Rambo (Tahoka High School Home Economics Coordinator of Y.E.S. Project), Donna Stone, Lora Ann Neill, Catherine Barham, Thalia Burks and County Extension Agent Donna Peters.

The youth service providers enhance the independent life style of rural senior citizens by performing such tasks as basic auto maintenance, gardening, running errands, and small household projects like vacuuming and light bulb replacement. In return, the young people acquire insight into the life experience of their elder friends that helps them to set personal goals such as attending college and career choice.

Extension Office Encourages Nominations For Texas Rural Minister Of The Year

The Lynn County Extension Office is now accepting nominations for the Texas Rural Minister of the Year. The nomination is encouraged to be done by the minister's congregation; however, the nomination will be stronger if the minister is involved in helping supply some of the information. A suggestion for a nomination may be a minister who has been especially supportive toward extension programs.

The only requirements are: 1. The

minister needs to have had at least two years of service with the current congregation (even if the minister is being called elsewhere now), and 2. The congregation be located in open country or in a town of less than 10,000 population. The deadline for applications is Aug. 1, 1992.

Applications for Texas Rural Ministers of the Year may be picked up from the Lynn County Extension Office in Tahoka.

SPS, Tahoka Pioneer Museum Displaying Antique Appliances

The Tahoka Pioneer Museum, through the courtesy of Southwestern Public Service Company, is now featuring a display called "Appliances of Yesteryear."

SPS is providing the museum with a number of historical electrical appliances which will be on long-term loan, said Doyle Webb, SPS manager for Tahoka.

"Electricity has changed life a great deal since the 1800's," he said. "SPS is pleased to demonstrate some of the changes by sharing antiques

which the company has collected through the years."

A few of the historical electrical items on display at the museum are: an 18-pound commercial iron from the 1900's, a 1930 Will Rogers Clock; toasters from the 1920's, a popcorn popper from the 1930's, a pre-1919 light bulb, as well as unusual table and desk lamps and many other items. Some items are so unusual, it would be difficult for many to identify them without the accompanying label cards.

Tahoka Elementary Students Create Environmental Bubble

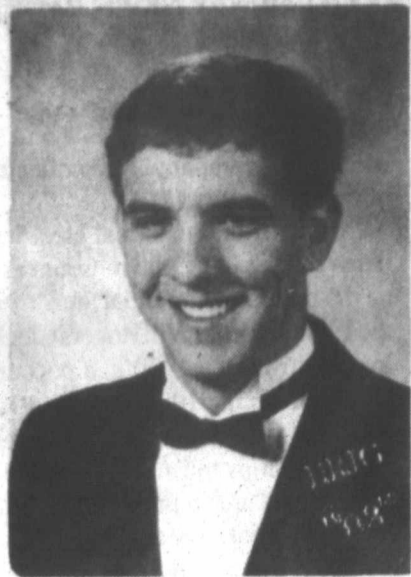

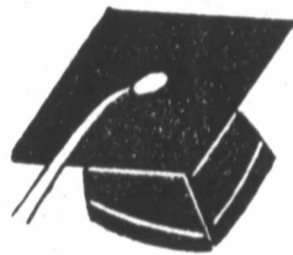

Tenth Farm Credit District Reports Higher Net Income

The Tenth Farm Credit District has reported net income of \$13.9 million for the quarter ended March 31, 1992, an increase of \$2.3 million over the same quarter a year ago.

Chief Executive Officer Arnold Henson attributed the increase to a lower cost of funding and an increase in performing loan volume. The district's net interest income improved \$3.1 million compared to the same quarter one year ago.

"The district's good financial performance during the first quarter reflects continued improvement and optimism in the agricultural economy," Henson said, noting a decline in non-accrual loans in the district. Non-accrual loan volume declined \$27 million from \$188.3 million at March 31, 1991, to \$161.2 million at March 31, 1992.

Lower funding costs also allowed the district to lower interest rates this past quarter, Henson said. On March 1, the fixed rate for long-term loans made through the district's 49 Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs) was reduced to 8.2 percent.

Henson cited an increase in agribusiness loans as another positive sign of growth in the farm economy. The district has made more than \$58 million in new loans under the bank's new agribusiness program.

The Tenth Farm Credit District consists of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas; 49 FLBAs in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas; three Production Credit Associations (PCAs) in New Mexico; and 14 PCAs in Texas. Loan volume for the district totaled \$3.55 billion at March 31.

Survey Shows Feedlot Industry Growing In Region

Feedlots within the area served by Southwestern Public Service Company are feeding more cattle than ever before. SPS's just-released annual Fed Cattle Survey shows a 1.3% increase in fed cattle from 1991- the third consecutive year of growth.

Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,644,113 head of cattle in 1991. The 1990 total was 5,570,203.

The survey, which includes the Texas panhandle area, showed that the one-time total capacity of area feedlots also posted a slight increase during 1991, from 2,887,275 to 2,904,585.

Another good indicator for the industry from the survey, according to Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agriculture and wholesale marketing, is the increase in the number of cattle

slaughtered at the 13 beef-packing plants in the SPS service area. Fed cattle slaughtered in the area increased 2.7%.

Krupnick pointed out that several packing plants are located just outside the service area. "That accounts for the difference between the number of cattle slaughtered and the number fed," he said.

Information from the Fed Cattle Survey is used across the country by ag-related industries, Krupnick said.

FHMA Issues Regulations

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has released long delayed new loan servicing regulations which will affect all borrowers. The new rules, at 396 pages and weighing in at nearly three pounds, began arriving in FmHA County Offices last week. They are expected to be implemented shortly with a mailing of as many as 40,000 delinquency letters to farmers.

The new rule sharply cut back the terms of servicing to delinquent borrowers. Pending their issuance, FmHA has had a moratorium on servicing since November 1990.

Pete Morrow, Director, Southwest

Farm Advocacy Group, stated "Many farmers behind in payments for reasons beyond their control have been unable to seek refinancing of their loans with FmHA because of this moratorium. At long last, many will be able to address the problem."

"Farmers who need servicing because they have used up their borrowing limit should go to their County Office now and ask for the new application forms," advised Morrow.

Saturday, May 23, the Junior/Senior Banquet was held in Lubbock's Holiday Inn Atrium. The theme was "Forever and Always."

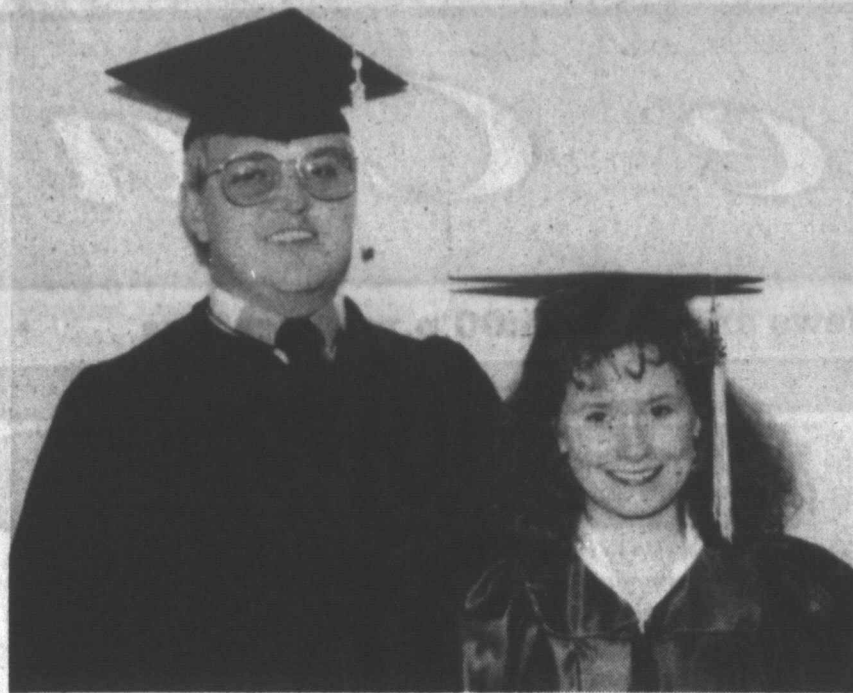
