Texas Farmers Producing Higher State Program Crop Yields

College Station - Census figures reveal that Texas farmers are consistently producing higher per acre crop yields. The use of fertilizers and irrigation has increase, and many farmers now use a soil test to determine the kind and amount of fertilizer to apply. These and other growing conditions, thus resulting in higher production.

There is one problem that increases with this increased yield, however, says Lee Coffey, extension agronomist. Noxious weeds take advantage of the just as do the desired plants.

One way to ease the weed problem, says Coffey, is to read the seed tag before buying. The Texas Seed Act requires that all seed offered for sale at a seed store must be tagged with per pound. This law prohibits bindweed, hedge bindweed, or utgrass seed.

Personnelnewly-trained in radar operation. Alert status at moment of attack-in midst of training exercise, officially alerted only to possible sabotage. No air attack alert in effect. Contact with public information media-none. Warning time between moment of attack and first widespread public warning-50 minutes.

7, the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor caused all Americans to realize "it can happen here."

Dec. 7 this year will mark the third annual National Civil De-fense Day, dedicated to the con-viction that vigilance must be maintained night and day because of enemy threats. Against such threats our Nation's vast warning net is designed to be so reliable that the enemy could not achieve a surprise attack, civil defense officials assert.

Most Americans could be saved by taking simple but adequate civil defense meas-

Director Leo A. Hoegh of the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization points out that "fallout shelter protection is the best single non-military defense measure for the greatest number of our people."

He has called home fallout shelters "the lowest-cost family insurance obtainable." These cost from \$150 for a "do-it-yourself" basement shelter to \$1,500 for a custom-made shelter fixed up to serve as an extra room.

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


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
