Bulldogs Get Big Homecoming Win

It was just about a perfect football game for all the Tahoka Bulldog fans, especially those ex-students who filled the stands for Friday night's Whiteface Antelopes.

The Bulldogs played well. They had no turnovers. The offensive line and the entire defense did a good job. Running back Brian Moore gained 156 yards in 17 carries. With Quarterback Heath Brewer doing most of the throwing, Tahoka gained more than 100 yards passing for the first time in a long while. Cory Whitley intercepted two passes.

And the Bulldogs won the game, 33-7, the first homecoming win in several years. It brought this season's record to 2-3. The celebration should be over by now, though, because the Dogs need to get ready for unbeaten

Harvest Festival Draws Crowd Here Saturday

The 17th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival drew a good crowd to Tahoka's downtown square Saturday, following one of the best Homecoming games the Bulldogs have played in the last few years. Booths offered games, crafts and food for the crowd, and children's games and contests were held during the morning hours.

Merchant drawings and other giveaways were held throughout the day, with the big winners being Eunice Stephens, who won the trip for two to Mexico, and Sherry Tilley, who won the \$500 first place prize in Cow Patty Bingo.

Tahoka High School sophomore Katy Huffaker was crowned 1992 Harvest Festival Queen, and also named Miss Congeniality by her peers in the Queen's contest. Sophomore Crystal Barrientez was first runnerup in the contest, and Misti Norwood, representing the Speech Club, was named second runnerup. Miss Norwood was also named Queen of Sales, selling 586 tickets to capture that title. Altogether, the queen contestants sold 2200 Mexico trip tickets.

Princess contestants sold 3,532 tickets for a Tech weekend and bicycles, and Tahoka third grader Carla Jolly sold over 600 tickets to capture the 1992 Harvest Festival Princess title. First runnerup was third grader Stefanie Dotson, and second runnerup was fourth grader Amy Henry.

Fire Dept. Finance Committee Named By City, Fire Dept.

Two members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. and two representatives of the City Council were named to the newly-organized Fire Department Finance Committee this week during a regular session of the City Council. Firemen Steve Miller and Math Bartley, and Councilmen Carl Reynolds and Mike Mensch will serve on the committee which will be chaired by Mayor Jim Solomon. City Manager Barry Pittman will also sit in on the committee meetings.

The Fire Dept. Finance Committee will determine how funds raised through the \$3 donations from city water bills will be used within the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. This restricted fund is for fire department use only, and all money donated by area citizens will be directed to the fund.

In other business, councilmen passed a resolution providing for the public sale of property acquired by the Lynn County Appraisal District from delinquent tax sales, and appointed Love, Hays & Co. as auditors for the city.

An ordinance concerning fire hazard protection and prevention was tabled until next month, and a proposal for a sprinkler system for the baseball park was discussed and then tabled indefinitely.

A representative of General Telephone company addressed the council, and the council pressed for new telephone service equipment for Tahoka, saying that Tahoka has been in need of updated equipment for over ten years. The GTE representative agreed that the need was real, and that he would work with the city in regards to this matter.

Police Chief Jerry Webster reported 236 calls to the police department for the month of September, as well as four arrests, eight tickets issued, 12 warning tickets issued, and two burglaries and a theft investigated. No accidents were reported in the city for the month.

On the informal agenda, personal equipment for the fire department was discussed. It was noted that Fire Chief Steve Miller informed the city that the equipment is antiquated and that the fire department would not be able to participate in any more training sessions until new updated equipment was provided for the firemen. This information was discussed and the item will be placed on next month's formal agenda.

Council members voted to pay the bills, and finished the meeting with a budget discussion.

All council members, the mayor, and city manager were present for the meeting, which adjourned at 8:30



1993 Feed Grains nut Butter Dreams; Ruby Flores, Honor-**Program Detailed** The child development class is involved in some "hands on" experience

Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan has announced a 1993 acreage reduction program (ARP) of 10 percent for corn, 5 percent for grain sorghum and zero percent for barley and oats.

The 1993 corn crop set aside is up from the 5 percent 1992 level. Corn stocks going into the 1993/94 marketing year are expected to be about 745 million bushels higher than the previous year's levels because of the prospects for a large 1992 crop, Madigan said.

The secretary used his discretionary authority under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade trigger provisions to waive the legal minimum 7.5 percent set aside levels for grain sorghum and barley. The 1992 set aside levels for serghum and barley are 5 percent.

Madigan also announced that established target prices and the price support and purchase rates for the 1993 crops of corn, sorghum, barley and oats and the loan level for rye are unchanged from 1992. For grain sorghum, the target price is \$2.61 per bushel and price support rate is \$1.63.



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


