## Bulldogs Get Big Homecoming Win

It was just about a perfect football game for all the Tahoka Bulldog fans, especially those ex-students who filled the stands for Friday night's homecoming contest against the Whiteface Antelopes.

The Bulldogs played well. They had no turnovers. The offensive line and the entire defense did a good job. Running back Brian Moore gained 156 yards in 17 carries. With Quarterback Heath Brewer doing most of the throwing, Tahoka gained more than 100 yards passing for the first time in a long while. Cory Whitley intercepted two passes.

And the Bulldogs won the game, 33-7, the first homecoming win in several years. It brought this season's record to 2-3. The celebration should be over by now, though, because the Dogs need to get ready for unbeaten

Ralls, which comes to Tahoka for a district game at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

Last Friday Ralls scored 10 points in the last quarter and beat Crosbyton 23-8 to go up 2-0 in district play and 5-0 for the season. Another common opponent is Roosevelt, which beat Tahoka 25-14 and lost to Ralls by 30-15. The word on Ralls is that they are very big, but not especially fast, and that they are not unbeatable, although no one has done it yet.

Tahoka opened scoring in the first quarter Friday night after Whitley intercepted a pass to put the Dogs in business at the Whiteface 40. Brewer hit René Luna on a 16-yard pass play and then Moore ran 22 yards for a touchdown. Luna's kick made it 7-0 at 7:29 left in the first.

In the second quarter, Luna kicked two 29-yard field goals to give Tahoka a 13-0 halftime lead. The first one

was set up by a 53-yard pass from Brewer to Whitley, who was hauled down by Marcus Perez at the Antelopes 5. The second one came after a fumble recovery by defensive end Donnie Wiseman, who also made numerous tackles and was a leader on defense. Moore, cleared by a good block by Whitley, ran 25 yards. The drive stalled after that and Luna kicked his second field goal.

Tahoka went up 19-0 in the third as Moore ran 52 yards to the 1, then scored on the next play with 8:09 left in the third. Luna's kick was no good, leaving it 19-0.

Tahoka's kickoff after that score went sideways, instead of downfield, and Whiteface took over at the Bulldog 40. The Antelopes then put together a scoring drive, mostly on short runs, ending when QB Cedric Chambers ran 5 yards over the goal

line. Oren Peden kicked the point and it was 19-7, Tahoka, with 5:40 left in the third.

The fourth period was scoreless until Tahoka started a drive from its own 37 with 3:52 left. Good running by Moore, Jace Copeland and Luna moved the ball downfield and then Moore scored from the 5 with just 25 seconds left, and Luna's kick made it 26-7.

After Tahoka's kickoff, Whiteface fumbled and Tahoka recovered inside the Antelopes 20 with only 17 seconds remaining. Moore scored from the 15 with 10 seconds left. Luna kicked the point to make it 33-7.

Copeland gained 63 yards in 11 carries. Whitley caught four passes for 78 yards, and passed once to Copeland for 16. On defense, Whitley, Wiseman, Clayton Laws, Moore and Juan Luna did well.

## Arrests Clear One Of Burglaries Reported

Burglaries of residences were reported during the last week north of Wilson, in the city of Tahoka, and near West Point, with the latter burglary cleared by arrests of three young men, who already have been sentenced.

Betty Garcia of Tahoka reported that a Magnavox 25-inch remote control TV set was stolen from her home

on N. 6th St. between 9:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Sept. 30. Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$100 reward for information clearing the case.

At the home of Charles Smith at West Point, officers were called Friday to take custody of three teenagers who had been caught by Smith and two other men inside Smith's home. They also reportedly took cotton strip-

per belts from the garage at the farm of Sammy Andrews, and had stolen a 1951 Mercury owned by Smith. The car later was found in a ditch south of Lakeview community, with the transmission damaged.

Toby David Ervin, 17, of Seminole, was given a five-year sentenced, probated, by 106th District Judge George Hansard in Tahoka Tuesday on charges of burglary of a habitation and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. The other two boys, age 16 and 14, were processed by juvenile authorities and transported to Lubbock Youth Center.

The home of Wanda Stegemoeller, about 6 miles northeast of Wilson, was burglarized between 8:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. Sept. 30. Missing were a Zenith color TV valued at \$310 and a Maytag microwave valued at \$275.

A 6-year-old Wilson boy suffered facial cuts and a broken collarbone Monday evening when a car was being moved at the family residence in Wilson, and the boy ran into the path of the slow-moving vehicle while chasing a ball. He was treated at Lynn County Hospital and released.

Judge Hansard also sentenced four persons on pleas of guilty here on Sept. 30. Given three years probation each on charges of driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense, were Joseph Saldana, 25, of Tahoka, Blas Gutierrez, 54, of O'Donnell, and Troy Dewayne Kirk, 26, of Lubbock. Victor Galindo Charo Jr., 30, of Tahoka, was given 10 years probation on charges of delivery of cocaine.

In jail during the week were two persons for DWI second offense, one for DWI first offense, one for DWI subsequent and the Seminole youth later sentenced.

## Harvest Festival Draws Crowd Here Saturday

The 17th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival drew a good crowd to Tahoka's downtown square Saturday, following one of the best Homecoming games the Bulldogs have played in the last few years. Booths offered games, crafts and food for the crowd, and children's games and contests were held during the morning hours.

Merchant drawings and other giveaways were held throughout the day, with the big winners being Eunice Stephens, who won the trip for two to Mexico, and Sherry Tilley, who won the \$500 first place prize in Cow Patty Bingo.

Tahoka High School sophomore Katy Huffaker was crowned 1992 Harvest Festival Queen, and also named Miss Congeniality by her peers in the Queen's contest. Sophomore Crystal Barrientez was first runnerup in the contest, and Misti Norwood, representing the Speech Club, was named second runnerup. Miss Norwood was also named Queen of Sales, selling 586 tickets to capture that title. Altogether, the queen contestants sold 2200 Mexico trip tickets.

Princess contestants sold 3,532 tickets for a Tech weekend and bicycles, and Tahoka third grader Carla Jolly sold over 600 tickets to capture the 1992 Harvest Festival Princess title. First runnerup was third grader Stefanie Dotson, and second runnerup was fourth grader Amy Henry.

The Tahoka Chamber of Commerce presented plaques to the 1992 Man and Woman of the Year, naming Steve Sanders and Glo Hays for these honors. Sanders, manager of Thriftway grocery store, is involved in many organizations including Lynn County EMT, Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept., Little League, and

church activities.

Mrs. Hays, Tahoka High School DECA teacher, is a 15-year resident of Tahoka who "hit the town running and hasn't slowed down," involved in many activities involving the youth of Tahoka. She was an instigator in the school's innovative Jammin' January program for junior/senior high youth, and can be found behind the scenes in many other activities.

The first annual J.J. Jackson Memorial Scholarship Bike-a-Thon was held in the afternoon, with approximately 35 riders raising funds for a scholarship fund.

The Arts and Crafts Fair was held in the Courthouse basement, with Lacye Scott's intricate cross-stitch depicting a village winning Best of Show. Mrs. Scott said the cross-stitch took about a year to complete.

Activities and booths closed at 5 p.m., with the Rotary Club sausage booth opening again for the Street Dance from 8 p.m. until midnight. Bill Craig also brought his telescope for interested viewers to look through, showing a very clear image of the moon that night.

### Fire Dept. Finance Committee Named By City, Fire Dept.

Two members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. and two representatives of the City Council were named to the newly-organized Fire Department Finance Committee this week during a regular session of the City Council. Firemen Steve Miller and Math Bartley, and Councilmen Carl Reynolds and Mike Mensch will serve on the committee which will be chaired by Mayor Jim Solomon. City Manager Barry Pittman will also sit in on the committee meetings.

The Fire Dept. Finance Committee will determine how funds raised through the \$3 donations from city water bills will be used within the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. This restricted fund is for fire department use only, and all money donated by area citizens will be directed to the fund.

In other business, councilmen passed a resolution providing for the public sale of property acquired by the Lynn County Appraisal District from delinquent tax sales, and appointed Love, Hays & Co. as auditors for the city.

An ordinance concerning fire hazard protection and prevention was tabled until next month, and a proposal for a sprinkler system for the baseball park was discussed and then tabled indefinitely.

A representative of General Telephone company addressed the council, and the council pressed for new telephone service equipment for Tahoka, saying that Tahoka has been in need of updated equipment for over ten years. The GTE representative agreed that the need was real, and that he would work with the city in regards to this matter.

Police Chief Jerry Webster reported 236 calls to the police department for the month of September, as well as four arrests, eight tickets issued, 12 warning tickets issued, and two burglaries and a theft investigated. No accidents were reported in the city for the month.

On the informal agenda, personal equipment for the fire department was discussed. It was noted that Fire Chief Steve Miller informed the city that the equipment is antiquated and that the fire department would not be able to participate in any more training sessions until new updated equipment was provided for the firemen. This information was discussed and the item will be placed on next month's formal agenda.

Council members voted to pay the bills, and finished the meeting with a budget discussion.

All council members, the mayor, and city manager were present for the meeting, which adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

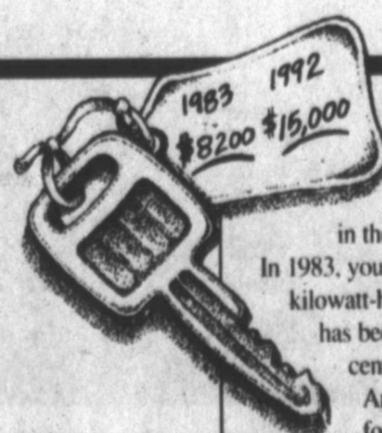
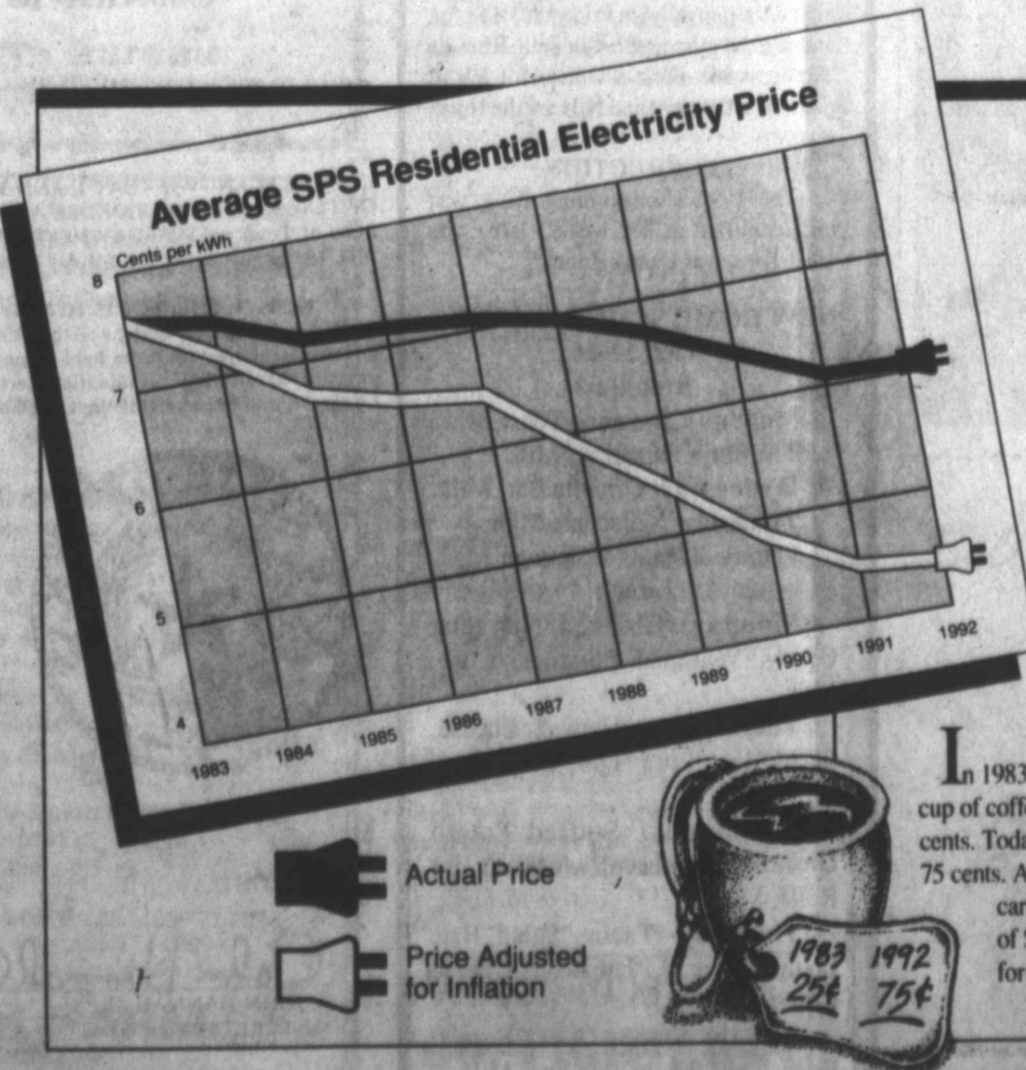

## 1993 Feed Grains Program Detailed

Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan has announced a 1993 acreage reduction program (ARP) of 10 percent for corn, 5 percent for grain sorghum and zero percent for barley and oats.

The 1993 corn crop set aside is up from the 5 percent 1992 level. Corn stocks going into the 1993/94 marketing year are expected to be about 745 million bushels higher than the previous year's levels because of the prospects for a large 1992 crop, Madigan said.

The secretary used his discretionary authority under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade trigger provisions to waive the legal minimum 7.5 percent set aside levels for grain sorghum and barley. The 1992 set aside levels for sorghum and barley are 5 percent.

Madigan also announced that established target prices and the price support and purchase rates for the 1993 crops of corn, sorghum, barley and oats and the loan level for rye are unchanged from 1992. For grain sorghum, the target price is \$2.61 per bushel and price support rate is \$1.63.

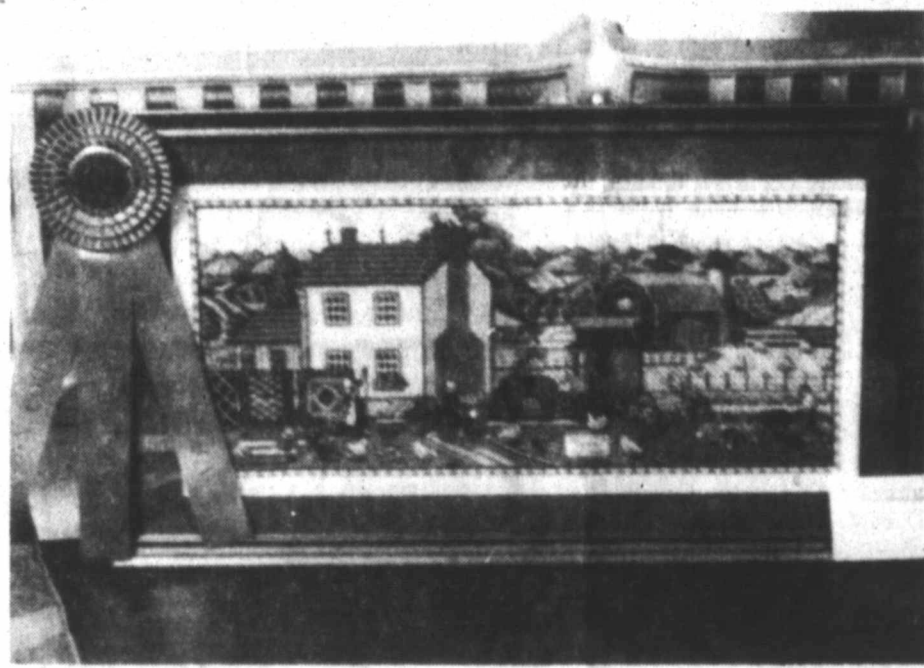
