Lynn County Commissioners this week hired Mrs. Rebecca Dimak as the new Lynn County Extension Agent to fill the vacancy left by Donna Peters, who resigned her position as Lynn County Agent in August. Mrs. Dimak and her husband, Scott, will be moving here from Bryan, Tx. to begin her duties as Home Ec agent the first of November.

Mrs. Dimak is currently an extension agent in Brazos County, serving the Bryan and College Station area. She has been the county agent there for three years, and taught school in East Texas for three years prior to that.

She is a 1988 graduate of Stephen F. Austin with a bachelor of science degree in vocational home economics and minor in secondary education. She also attended Kilgore Junior College and is currently attending Texas A&M University. She plans to attend Texas Tech University and work on her master's degree while she is living in this area.

"I am excited about coming to work and live in Tahoka, and to serve as Lynn County Agent," said Mrs. Dimak to commissioners Monday morning. She told the court that she grew up in a town smaller than Tahoka, and was looking forward to getting to know the people here and in the surrounding communities. Commissioners voted unanimously to hire Mrs. Dimak as the new county agent.

In other business, commissioners approved SPAG membership dues of \$405, approved county officials reports, and ordered bills paid. In a unanimous vote of approval, commissioners okayed paying the \$3 monthly fire department voluntary donation on the five City of Tahoka water bills for the courthouse, jail, county extension office, showbarn and precinct 2.

Dogs Play Tough, Finally Lose To Ralls, 35-20

Ralls may still be unbeaten and untied, but they are no longer unworried, because the Tahoka Bulldogs gave them some anxious moments here last Friday, playing the heavily favored Jackrabbits on even terms for more than half the game before succumbing grudgingly in the last half.

Tahoka had leads of 7-0 and 14-7 against the huge visitors, and it was not until the fourth quarter that Ralls put the game out of reach.

Ralls was just too big to be stopped entirely, but the Tahoka defense played a great game and managed to contain the Ralls running game in the first half. Tahoka held Ralls to 26 first downs and 317 yards rushing, mostly in the last half, and Brandon Landsdown scored four touchdowns, rushing 214 yards on 21 carries.

The Bulldogs got Ralls' attention in the first period. Tahoka held Ralls on downs around the Bulldog 20 early, with strong defense led by End Donnie Wiseman and Juan Luna, followed by a muffed field goal try by Ralls. QB Heath Brewer ran 24 yards and hit Cory Whitley on a 23-yard pass in a drive which ended by Brian Moore running 17 yards for a touchdown. René Luna kicked the point and Tahoka led 7-0 with 5:40 left in the first quarter.

Ralls answered with a drive for a touchdown as Victor Perez scored from the 3, and Landsdown kicked to tie the game with 2:59 left in the first.

Tahoka then put on another good drive, featuring runs of 26 yards by Jace Copeland and 13 by Moore, but this drive fizzled. However, early in the second, Seth Prince broke loose on a 53-yard run to the Ralls 6, and on the next play, Copeland crashed through for the TD. Luna kicked and Tahoka was in front by 14-7.

Before halftime, Ralls came back with another grinding drive to tie the score at 14 on an 18-yard run by Landsdown.

In the third, a Tahoka fumble near midfield turned the tide toward Ralls, and Landsdown again loped in from 17 yards away, then kicked to make it 21-14. And after Tahoka stopped a long drive by Ralls which ended in another missed field goal, Tahoka gave up a safety when the ball was snapped over the head of the punter into the end zone, bringing the score to 23-14 with just a minute left in the third.

In the fourth, Ralls pulled out to 29-14 on a Landsdown run of a yard with 9:10 left in the game. But the determined Dogs made it close again when Moore ran 2 for a score, closing a drive which included a 19-yard pass from Brewer to Prince and an 11-yard pass from Copeland to Whitley. This made it 29-20 with 3:50 left.

Ralls put it out of reach on a 53-yard run by Landsdown with 3:10 left.

All of Tahoka's defenders did a good job against the heavier Jackrabbits, with especially good defense turned in by Wiseman, René Luna, Clayton Laws, Wes Solomon, Moore, John Quintanilla and Johnny Rodriguez.

Copeland led Tahoka runners with 82 yards on 16 carries. Moore gained 76 in 12 efforts and Prince gained 53 in two carries.

Local School Trustees Discuss DECA Project, Accreditation Visit

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session last Thursday night, Oct. 8, discussing, among other business, a local DECA civic consciousness project and an impending accreditation visit by Texas Education

Agency (TEA) due to low student test results on the Texas Academic Assessment Skills (TAAS) tests given to students in the district.

The board raised concerns over the safety of students who would be involved in a proposed DECA project, where students would work inside the dilapidated Lankford Variety building in downtown Tahoka, cleaning out debris in preparation for the owner to tear down the building.

"The roof of this building, already collapsed in places, could go at any time, according to an engineering report from the City's architectural engineering firm," said trustee Juanell Jones. "I, for one, don't want

to take the chance of any our students being inside that building when, and if, that happens," she added.

Although the board took no official action on the matter, Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter and THS Principal Charles Cate told trustees they would reconsider the proposed project, and in fact did cancel the DECA project later that week.

Glo Hays, DECA Coordinator, told *The News* that DECA agrees with the school board in that nothing should be done that would jeopardize the health of THS students. "We appreciate the tough position the board took in order to ensure student safety," said Mrs. Hays.

"DECA apologizes for any concern this project caused the school. See SCHOOL Page 3

CECD Child Care Facility Open House Scheduled Today

Quality child care for low income families in Lynn County is now available through a pilot project funded by South Plains Child Care Management Systems and Head Start.

The Lynn County Comprehensive Early Childhood Development Center (CECD) has been open in Tahoka since Aug. 31. Located at 1304 Ave. J in Tahoka, the center invites area resident to attend Open House today (Thursday, Oct. 15) from 3:30 until 5:30 p.m.

Kelly Doherty of Lubbock is the center director and lead teacher. Ginger Hughes of Tahoka is the assistant teacher, while Kelli Ferguson of Tahoka serves as alternate teacher and cook for the facility.

The goal of the CECD program is to provide a holistic, comprehensive child care program to rural families.

"Initially, the CECD program was designed to set up a child care facility with emphasis on education and good child care," says Zan Moore, family social service coordinator at the CECD office in Lubbock. This "model" program will be examined closely and if it works well in Tahoka, then it will be duplicated elsewhere.

To be eligible for participation in the center, children must be between the ages of 3 and 5 years. Parents of the child must either be working, in training or in school. The family income must fall below guidelines set by the federal government.

A sliding fee scale may be assessed based on the family income. "The beauty of this program is

that I can help the parents open doors they may not know exist," says Moore. He said the program also has resources for employment, employment training and continued educational opportunities.

"Our programs are very structured," said Moore. "Children involved in our program have better number and color recognition, better reading skills and are much more socially interactive because they are learning through fun."

"We do our best to be totally community-oriented. We try to purchase products and services from the community before we look elsewhere. Our food, supplies and contract services are all from Tahoka," says Moore.

He added that the search for teachers and employees for the center began in Tahoka. "We began looking for people to fill our staff positions from the Tahoka area. Of the three positions, two of our personnel are from Tahoka," says Moore.

"We have 10 students enrolled now, and we have the potential to increase our enrollment to 16," said Doherty.

The children attending the center have a structured program of learning shapes and colors. In addition, a great deal of time is devoted to free time playing in various activity centers.

Hot meals and snacks are provided throughout the day.

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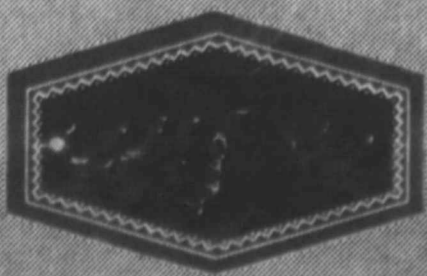

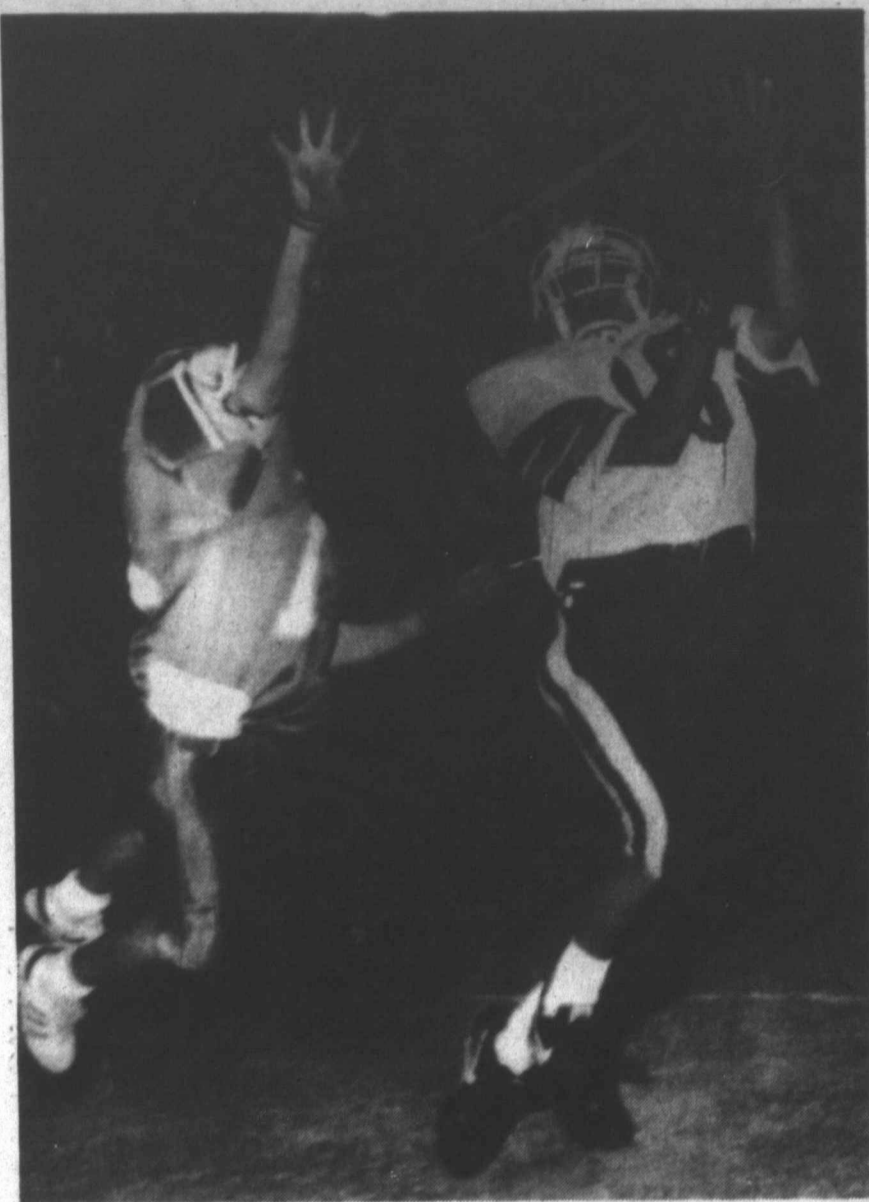

board and administrators of THS," she said. "This decision (to cancel the project) was acceptable to DECA for two reasons: (1) we realize that the school board and administration are able to make decisions based on a view of the whole picture while we are able only to evaluate the issue from an individual standpoint, and (2) DECA's workforce decreased substantially after grades were issued last week, which would have affected the project," she explained.

DECA students won a national award with their group civic consciousness project last year, where they tore down a dilapidated building on Ave. J, and had hoped to enter this year's project as well. However, DECA students still have the opportunity to compete at district, state and national levels this spring in individual projects, although timeliness prohibits entering a different chapter project at this date. "Numerous individual competitive events are available to students who are willing to work hard for the next three months," said Mrs. Hays.

"DECA is thankful to Mike Lankford, Jim Solomon, Barry Pittman, Gerald Craig, and Rotary members for supporting our endeavors to participate in community affairs," added Mrs. Hays, in appreciation for their support in the now-canceled project.

Because of low student test scores on the TAAS test, the district has been selected by TEA for an accreditation visit to determine how the district is striving to meet the needs of students, and what changes, if any, should be made within the district to enable students to meet statewide academic standards.

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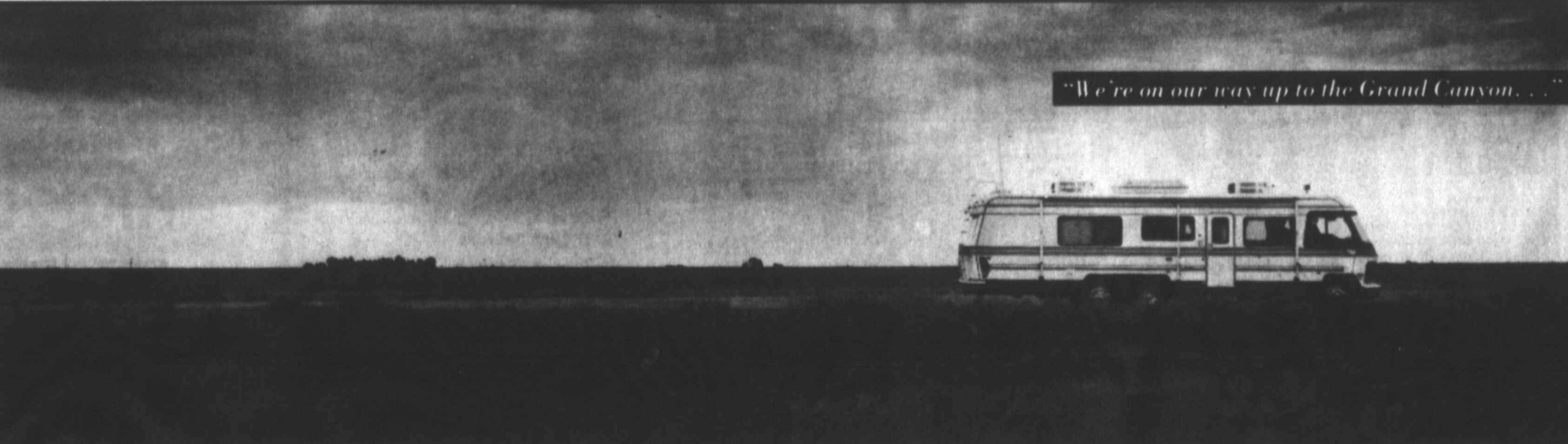

Lynn County received a total of \$4,675.77, with \$771.54 going to O'Donnell and \$3,904.23 to Tahoka. 1992 payments to date show \$11,637.21 to O'Donnell, a 21.07 percent increase over the same time period last year; \$45,503.51 to Tahoka, a 8.58 percent decrease over last year; and \$2,398.54 to Wilson, a 23.17 percent increase over last year.

Friday night the Wilson Mustangs travel to Smyer with hopes to ruin the Bobcats' Homecoming.

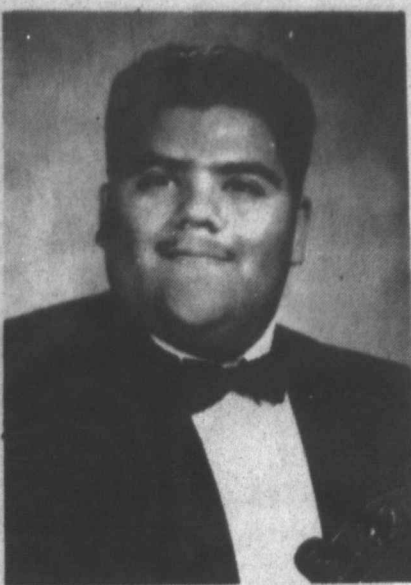

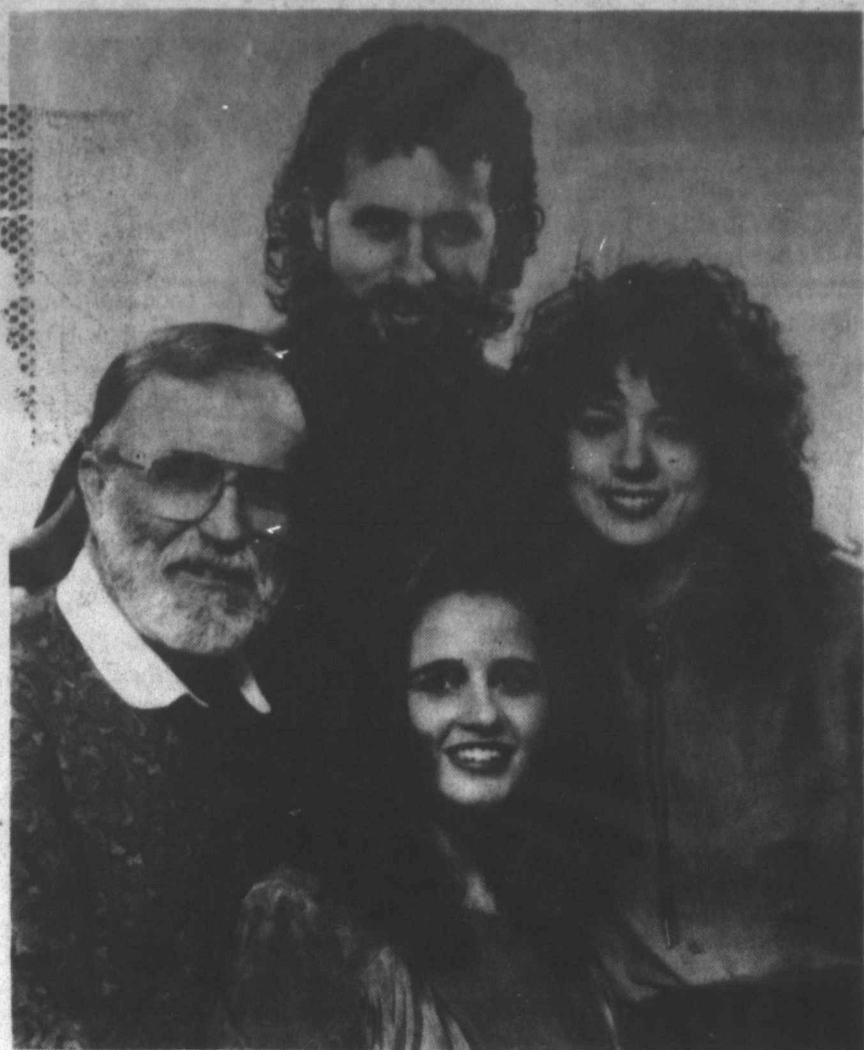

Local Ag Lenders Announce New Rates, Programs

For nearly 30,000 farmers, ranchers and rural homeowners in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas who do business with Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs), October brought good news: the third rate reduction in their variable rate FLBA loans this year. The 8.50% rate became effective October 1 on both existing and new variable rate loans.

Interest rates for new fixed rate loans of 3, 5, 10 and 15 years will also fall later this month. In addition, a new 7-year fixed loan is scheduled for introduction this fall.

The FLBAs have also announced new fixed rate financing for rural property improvements. Under the "improvement loan program", borrowers can finance such things as home construction and remodeling; fencing; pasture improvement; land clearing; irrigation and sprinkler systems; and repair of livestock, poultry and fish-producing facilities.

FLBAs make long-term agricultural and rural housing loans through locally owned and operated offices. Additional on FLBA loans is available through the local offices.

SPS Rates To Be Reviewed

Southwestern Public Service Co. said Wednesday that the Public Utility Commission of Texas has initiated a procedural filing to review the electric utility's rates.

The review is based on the commission staff's semi-annual Earnings Monitoring Report that says SPS revenues for 1991 appeared higher than necessary to earn an appropriate rate of return.

SPS residential rates have declined 20 per cent since 1983 and are currently among the lowest in the state for investor-owned utilities, according to SPS officials, who offered a chart of rates of 10 investor-owned utilities in the state. The chart showed SPS rates for 1,000 kilowatt hours of power to be the lowest at \$65.19 with second-lowest Southwestern Electric Power at 75.73 and the highest at

\$106.23 for El Paso Electric. SPS said its average retail rates are 29.7 per cent below the average of all other Texas electric utility companies, and SPS official Gerald Diller said "SPS strongly believes its earnings are reasonable and are primarily the result of efficient and cost-effective operations."

The filing did not indicate a target amount of reduction, but SPS does not anticipate that the filing will have a significant financial impact.

In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over rates, but the PUCT may adjust rates for unincorporated areas. Each city would have the option to adopt similar adjustments for customers within its city limits. Headquartered in Amarillo, the company serves 75 communities in Texas.

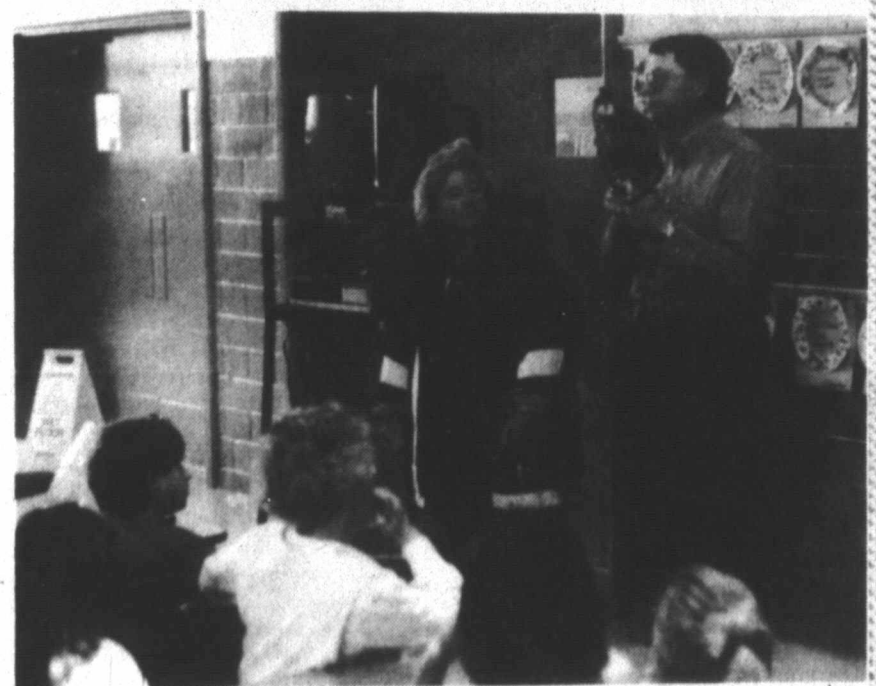

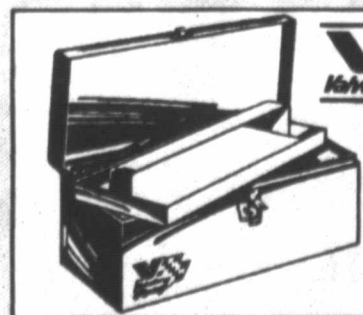

This will entitle you to become eligible to win: \$1,500 to \$15,000 cash, two GEO automobiles, a satellite dish, a big screen television, any number of mink jackets, a trip to Las Vegas, or a trip to Orlando.
I hope no one seriously considers

sending this guy any money! Here are some things to remember when you get one of these telephone scams:

1. Don't send anyone your money.
2. Don't give anyone your checking or savings account numbers.
3. Don't give anyone your credit card numbers.
4. Don't answer any person questions such as your marital status, your income, or when you will be away from your home.
5. Do contact the police or sheriff when you receive a telephone call like this.
6. Do apply these same steps if someone comes to your home and wants to do repairs, or tries to sell you lightning rods.
