Election Results Canvassed By Commissioners

Lynn County Commissioners canvassed election results during their Nov. 9 session, noting no changes in the tallies for the Nov. 3 general election. Following that, the court administered the oath of office to Wayne Noland, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, for a two-year unexpired term.

In other action, commissioners discussed problems with dirt roads in the county in Precinct 3 with three visitors to the meeting, B.L. and Pam Miller, and Bill Chancy. Commissioner Sandy Cox said she would work with the Millers and Chancy in working out the problems.

Discussion was held on whether to charge fees for certain items accepted at the county collection station, but no action was taken and the item was tabled until further information could be obtained.

Commissioners discussed business hours of operation for county offices, and although the court may not set the hours, commissioners suggested that offices in the courthouse remain open until 5 p.m.

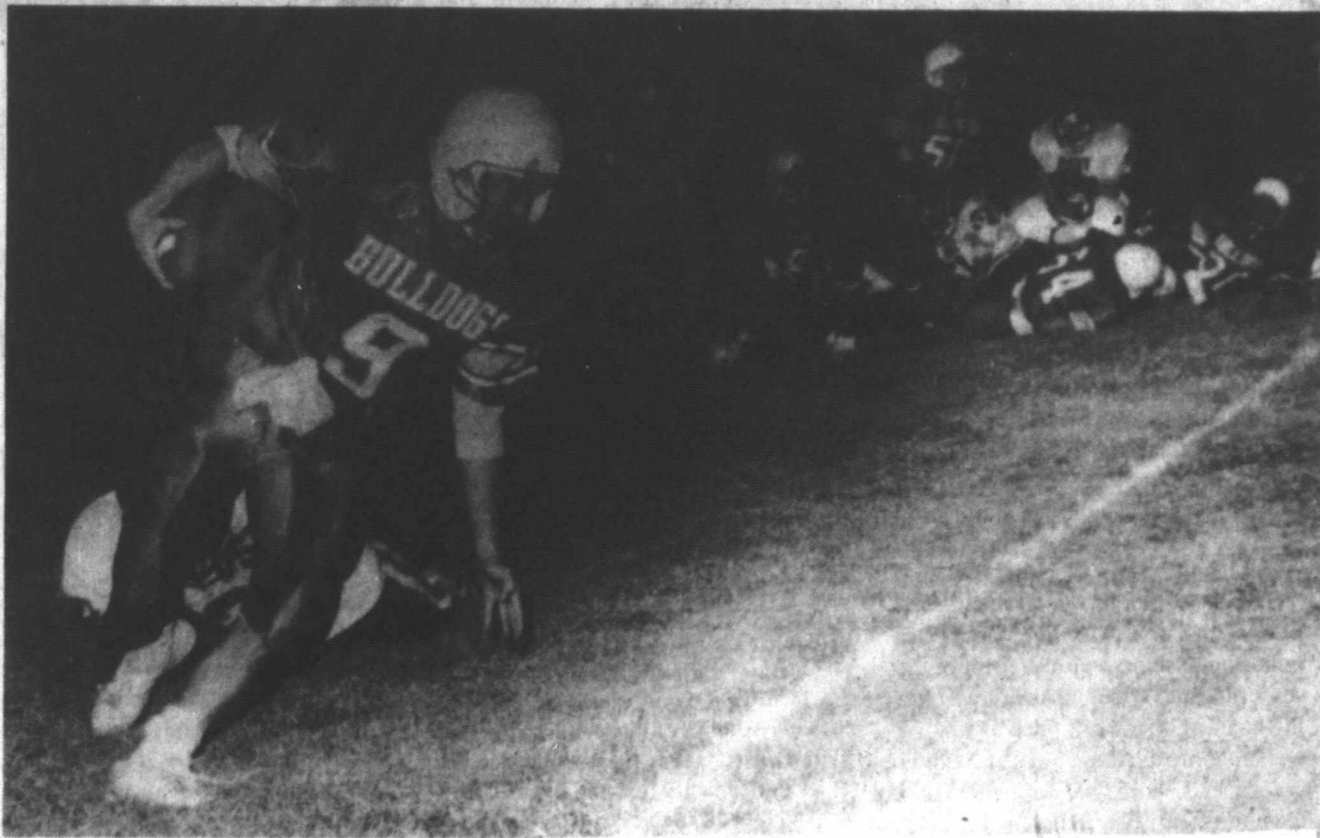
Commissioners approved county officials reports, and moved that the bills be paid.

Eighth Grade Bulldogs Are District Champions - Again

Tahoka eighth grade Bulldogs repeated their seventh grade team's District Championship record when they ran over the Post Antelopes, 26-14, in their last game of the season last Thursday, Nov. 5. They finished their championship season with 7 wins and only 1 loss.

"The million dollar question," says Coach Steve Qualls, "is how about their eleventh and twelfth grade year? Time will answer that one," he adds.

Right before half the Bulldogs trailed the Post team 6-14. Behind the running of Reggie Moore and the offensive line of David Ayala, Mark Montez, James Montez, Monty Hale, Matt Garcia, Daniel Pulattie, Benito Onofre and Joe DeLeon, Coach Qualls says the Bulldogs plowed in. The Dogs changed the scoreboard to a halftime score of 12-14.

After a sermon by Coach Qualls, playtime was definitely over at the start of the second half, according to Qualls.

Joe DeLeon took the second half kickoff and with the help of a block by J. Montez, DeLeon scored on a 65 yard kickoff return.

"The two extra points were a Reggie Moore type statement of 'you can't stop me'," said Coach Qualls.

Moore upped the score to 20-14.

"The rest of the third and fourth quarters was just a matter of controlling the ball and running out the clock," said the coach.

The season's final score came from Randy Burleson who intercepted and returned the ball 40 yards for the final Bulldog touchdown of the year.

Kyle Brown and Monty Hale also intercepted passes for the young Bulldogs.

According to Coach Qualls, the second quarter touchdown was set up by a fine run by Dustin Burleson.

"Reggie Moore is a great running back; Brent Raindl is a great leader and Joe DeLeon can do just about anything. I could go on and on about every one of these guys," said Qualls. "The offensive line is a big key to their success. Linebackers are the best."

"Of all the guys, Kyle Brown is one of the ones I am most excited about. I think he has found his position. The last two games Kyle played safety and intercepted two passes," said the coach.

"It was a great year. I set some goals for these guys and they accomplished every one of them. These goals were to beat Coahoma, beat Idalou, to win district and to get them ready for high school football," he said.

Dogs End Season With Win Over Post, 16-12

The Post Antelopes made the most yards Friday night, had the most first downs and generally played a lot better than would be expected from a team which had won just one game all year, but they also had the most turnovers, and Tahoka's Bulldogs beat Post 16-12 at Kelley Field.

The win left Tahoka in fifth place in the seven-team district, finishing ahead of Post and Sundown, and gave Tahoka record of 4 wins against 6 losses for the year, the Bulldogs' best record since the 1988 team went 4-5-1.

Post dominated the first quarter, scoring on a 3-yard run by Russ Bird at the end of a long drive. The point try was no good and Post led 6-0 at the end of the first period. In the second quarter, Tahoka started a drive at the Post 40 after Cody Hale recovered a Post fumble and good runs by Jace Copeland, Seth Prince and René Luna took the Dogs to a first down at the Antelope 9. But Post held there, and on fourth down, Luna kicked a 25-yard field goal which made it 6-3, Post, at halftime.

Very early in the third quarter, Post's Tim Bell broke on a 40-yard touchdown run and after another failed conversion attempt, Post was leading 12-3. The Bulldogs came ack with a drive which ended with a 14-yard pass into the end zone from QB Heath Brewer to split end Cory Whitley. Luna kicked the point to make the score 12-10 in favor of Post with 4:37 left in the third.

Tahoka struck suddenly early in the fourth quarter as sophomore running back Ramiro Rodriguez, moved up to

varsity two weeks ago, ran 72 yards for what proved to be the winning touchdown. A running try for points failed and it was 16-12.

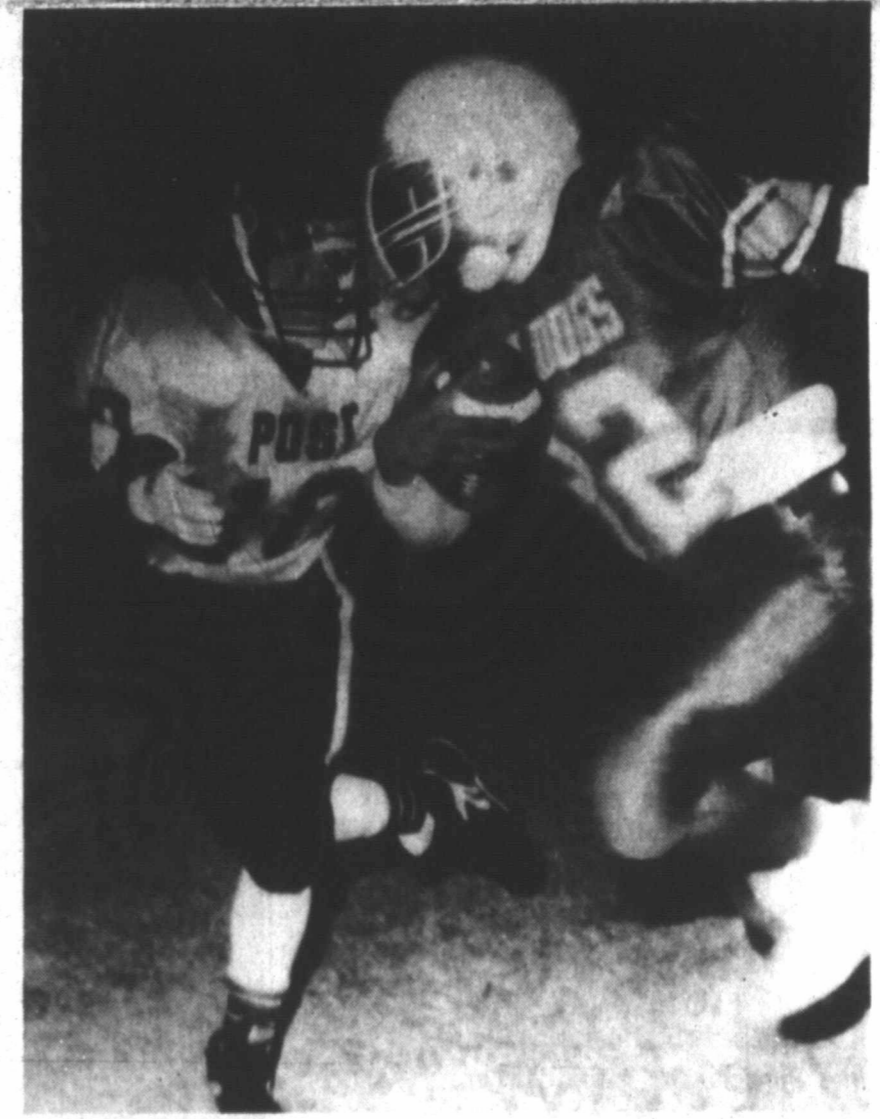
Later in the game, Tahoka drove all the way to the Post 2, where the Antelopes held on downs. The teams exchanged punts, and Post again had the ball with just 1:38 left, at the Antelope 21. Post, out of time outs, nevertheless then put on a remarkable aerial show, completing four passes in a row which carried to the Tahoka 13 as time ran out. Most of the completions were from Post QB Jim Riley Simpson to End Phil Leininger.

Rodriguez' long run made him the top rusher for Tahoka, with 77 yards on 4 carries. Luna carried 24 times for 71 yards. Copeland gained 49 yards in 12 trips; Prince had 17 in six carries and Brewer gained 25 in six carries.

Whitley, who intercepted a pass as well as scoring a touchdown on a pass, was a defensive leader for Tahoka, along with Clayton Laws, Wes Solomon, Tackle John Quintanilla and End Donnie Wiseman, who was playing against his first cousin, Kelly Line, center and linebacker for Post. Line and linebacker Josh Bush played strong defensive games for Post.

WE EITHER are in the middle of, or maybe just finished, some kind of bird hunting season. Just as I typed this statement, a man came into the office who knows about such things, and he said both are true, that dove season just ended and right now it's quail season, and pretty soon it will be sandhill cranes.

"How about sparrows and canaries?" I asked. "I used to shoot sparrows when I was a kid." He informed me there is no season on those things, that meadowlarks are not to be fired on because they are an endangered species and that deer season begins Saturday.

I have never been a hunter, and I'm not sure I know the difference between a dove and a quail, but I do know that deer don't fly, except for those which pull Santa's sleigh.

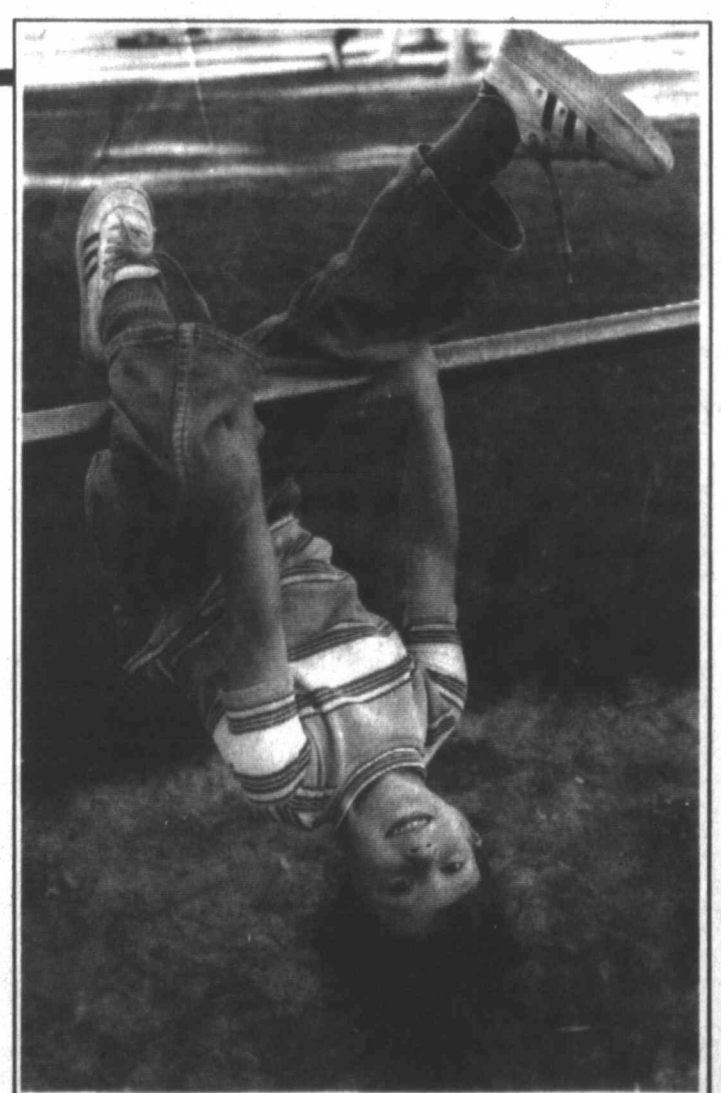

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Elementary Students Win Awards For Media Productions

Fifteen students from Tahoka Elementary received prestigious state awards for their media productions last Saturday in Galveston.

Each spring, Gwen Cate, learning resource specialist, works with small groups of students in creating media projects which encourage the prevention of drug abuse. These projects are entered in the regional Substance Abuse Prevention Media Fair in Lubbock.

The contest is sponsored by the Regional Service Centers, Texas Association of Educational Technology and Texans' War on Drugs.

Last spring there were 13 projects from Tahoka Elementary entered in the Regional Fair. Of these 13 projects, 12 placed at regional and 10 advanced to the state competition. At state the 10 projects competed with schools of all sizes from all over the state and six of Tahoka Elementary projects placed first, second or third place in their division.

A third place state plaque for K-3 Audio was awarded to Iseal Galindo, La'Shae and Phillip DeLeon Saturday at the Hotel Galvez. Second place awards were presented to Jhonathan Ribble for Photographic Print in K-3 division and Courtney Stennett for Photographic Print in 4-6 division. Also, winning second place at state were Cynthia Solorzano, Brad Ashbrook, Olivia Cantu and Chris Craig for their Photographic Essay in the 4-6 division.

First place state plaque for Photographic Essay was presented to Clay Pittman, Baldemar Davila and Mich-

elle Martin. Also, winning first place in 4-6 Clothing were Valerie Lopez, Amie Lopez, and Kalie Krey.

The group travelled with several parents and sponsors to the awards ceremony Saturday in Galveston. There they toured the historic railroad museum and ate in an authentic dining car. Many of the children stated that riding the ferry and seeing the ocean was the most exciting part of the trip.

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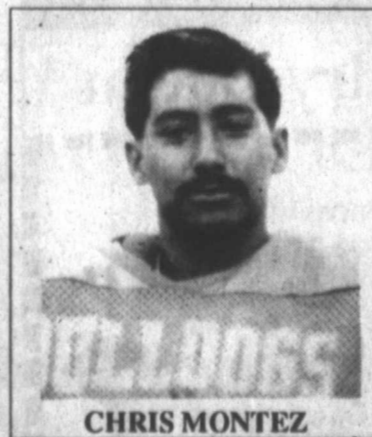

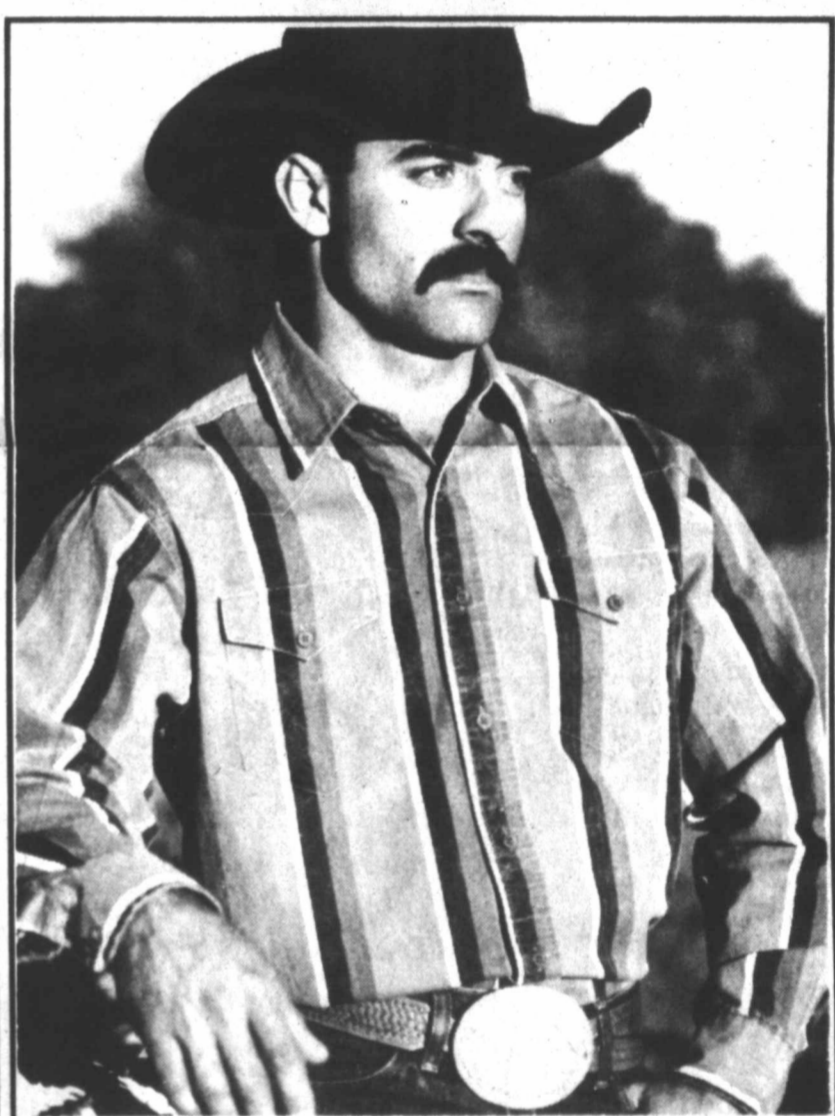

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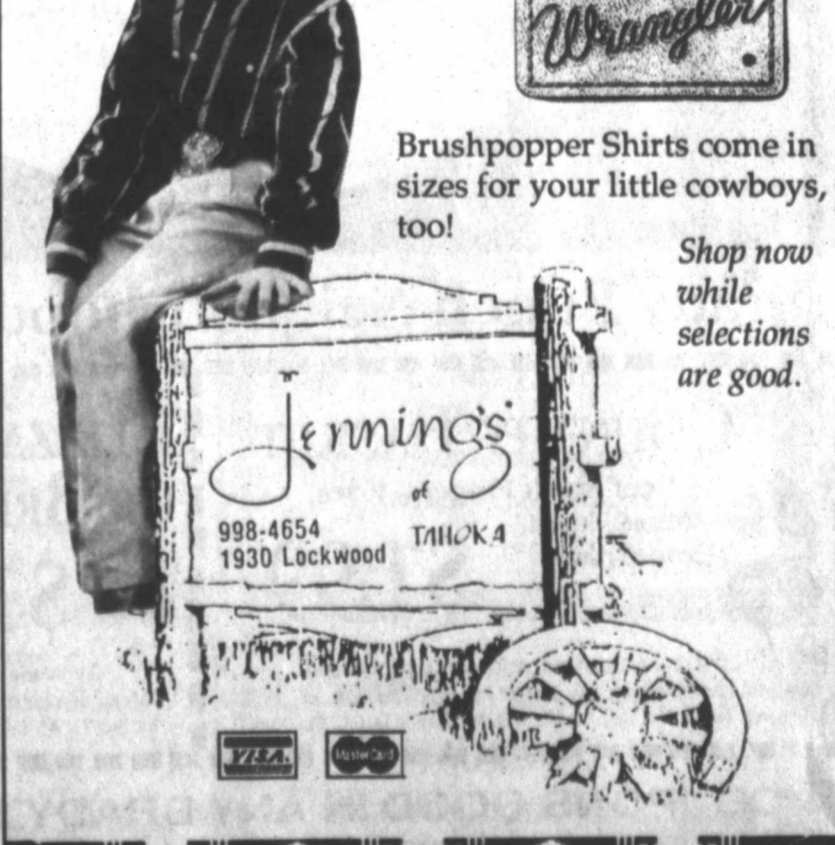

The Lynn County Chapter of the American Cancer Society will participate in the 16th annual Great American Smokeout on Nov. 19 by encouraging smokers to quit for a day... and possibly for good.

A Gallup poll conducted after the 1991 Great American Smokeout found that a record number of smokers, 5.8 million, stayed off cigarettes longer than the 24 hours. That's nearly 1 million more than the previous year.

Of the 35.5% of American smokers

who participated in the event, 7 million gave up cigarettes for the full 24 hours.

It is estimated there are 38 million exsmokers in the United States. About 87% of lung cancer cases are caused by smoking and when deaths from heart attacks caused by smoking and other smoker-related diseases are totaled, more than 400,000 people die each year from tobacco use.

Insects Seek Winter Homes

Insects are beginning to look for a place to spend the winter, said Tommy Doederlein, Extension Entomologist for Dawson/Lynn County, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Most of the insects are just looking for place to overwinter and are not establishing permanent residences," Doederlein said.

The agent said mechanical control is possible by caulking all cracks to prevent insect entry. Caulking also makes the structure more air-tight and should help lower heating costs.

Store firewood away from the house to help eliminate hiding places for the pests.

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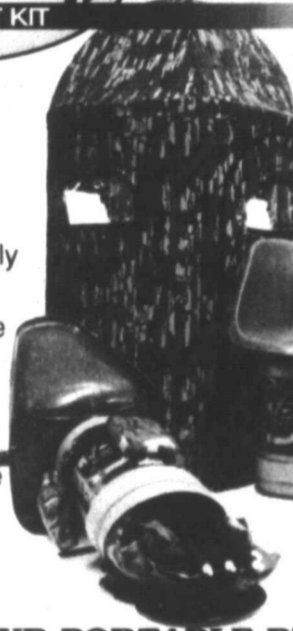
